

### Florida Power Drops Osceola 15 To 1 In Free Scoring Game

#### Kinlaw Permits Osceolans But One Hit; Also Paces Team Mates At Bat With Triple, Three Singles

Florida Power produced a powerful batting attack and a sparkling pitching performance by Stinson Kinlaw last night to defeat Osceola 15 to 1.

Kinlaw came close to hurling a no-hit no-run game but a single by Winger in the sixth inning robbed him of the honor. For five innings he held complete control and never seemed on the verge of letting down. The single in the sixth was the only safety he gave up for the evening.

Florida Power collected 15 hits off the offerings of the Osceola hurlers but their total would have been less had the Osceola outfielders been able to judge the balls that came their way. Time after time long, high fly balls were misplayed completely.

Errors played a prominent part in Osceola's downfall, the Blue-shirts being guilty of nine miscues.

Osceola's lone score was tallied

in the sixth. Dalbo walked, went to second on a fielder's choice and advanced to third on the same play, coming home on Winger's single.

Florida Power scored almost at will, pushing across five runs in the second inning, three in the third, four in the fourth, two in the fifth, and one in the sixth.

Fitcher Kinlaw not only tossed his team to victory but paced his mates at the plate with a triple and three singles. Weaver connected for a triple and two singles.

There is no game tonight but tomorrow Reel and Lemmond tangle.

### Field Trials To Begin Sunday In Marion County

Invitations have been extended to hunters from all parts of Florida and Georgia and it is expected that more than 100 dogs will be entered.

Headquarters for the meet will be at the Ocala House hotel and all hunters who wish to enter dogs are urged to get their entries in by Saturday, Oct. 14.

The first cast will be staged at daybreak about three miles east of Ocala with a puppy race on the program for Sunday afternoon. A bench show will be held Monday night, Oct. 16, and the final cast will be run Tuesday morning.

Winners of all events will be announced Tuesday afternoon and the judges will present the trophies in the lobby of the hotel. Winners of the all-age and derby class hounds will be awarded silver pitcher, trophies with silver goblets go to the hunters whose dogs place second, third and fourth.

The puppies will run after a released fox and the winner of this event will be awarded a beautiful silver cup, donated by Holmes L. Allen of Miami.

Horses will be available for those who wish to ride and a nice camping spot has been found for those who wish to pitch their tents for the three day hunt.

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### CHALKING 'EM UP

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A Real Playground

Fort Mellon Park is rapidly becoming one of the finest play spots in the State. That long stretch along the lake front can't be equaled in the entire State. Jacksonville has its Memorial park—a gem of beautiful landscaping in a setting that can hardly be surpassed—Miami, Palm Beach, St. Augustine, and Orlando have their parks too, but none of these cities will be able to boast of a better park than Fort Mellon.

At present only part of the tremendous space there has been sowed to grass or set with trees. The eastern half will be completed later. When that is done the people of Sanford can well feel proud of themselves for having achieved something extremely worthwhile.

In the western half of the park, basketball, sand-trouge courts, a tennis court, and at present, construction is underway on six bowling alleys and a miniature golf course. The two latter features will be privately owned and a charge will be made for use of them but the others are owned by the City and are free to the public. The idea back of leasing of space for the bowling alleys and miniature golf course was that the City could understand the expense at this time of such construction and yet it was felt that bowling alleys and a miniature golf course would mean a great deal to those persons who have to go to Orlando or DeLand to bowl or play miniature golf.

All of the features in the park with the exception of the tennis court will be lighted for night play.

Recreation Problem Not Simple

While on the subject of recreational facilities, we may as well note the appointment of a recreation advisory board by Mayor Higgins. The board will see that City Recreation is adequately conducted as it should be. Recreation seems a simple matter. Many persons think it consists only of getting a tennis ball and racquet, or some kind of ball and bat, and going out and playing with somebody. Proper conduct of recreation is an extremely difficult proposition. The program is designed to reach all classes and this calls for providing a number of different kinds of games or sports at varying times. Some of America's more progressive cities pay recreational directors and boards thousands of dollars each year to insure proper recreation for its citizens.

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



"Europe's farmers are marching to war," American farmers are marching to work," Sanford Herald. And when it's over, over there, we'll be lucky if Europe's leaders haven't farmed-off some of the work of paying for their war on the broad shoulders of your Uncle Sam.—Times-Union

According to the head of the American Legion, if this country is involved in a war in Europe it means a dictatorship for us whether we win or lose. The safest thing to do is to keep out of the war, and the best way to do that is to furnish the Allies with the planes they need to keep their planes from spreading.

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A Good Alternative

What is the best alternative we have seen to the outright repeal of the arms embargo has been suggested by former President Hoover who advocates the modification of the present Neutrality Act to permit the sale of pursuit planes, but not of bombing planes, to Britain and France. There is an important distinction here which may have been overlooked by the average citizen. Pursuit planes are used primarily for defense against bombing raids. Bombing planes are used exclusively for bombing purposes and it is they and they alone which wreak such havoc on civilian populations.

"I do not like to think of the day when bombing planes, engaged in the killing of women and children, on both or either side in this war, will be identified as the product of American manufacture," says Mr. Hoover, and this is something which would certainly be the case if the United States permits the sale of bombers to any belligerent nation.

But the sale of pursuit planes would not, and could not, be engaged in any such nefarious occupation. Pursuit planes would be used by whatever power we sold them to in warding off attacks from enemy bombers. They would be employed in attempting to shoot down bombing planes bent upon destroying from the air defenseless towns and cities, and in this connection the annihilation of women and children.

"Equally important," says Mr. Hoover, "I am convinced that we should permit nations to buy from us the instruments by which they can defend themselves from such barbarities. We should therefore permit the sale of pursuit planes, light observation planes, anti-aircraft guns, and any other instruments of defense against attacks on civilians."

It seems to us that Mr. Hoover has got something there, though for practical reasons it may be impossible to enact such a law. But as far as most right-thinking Americans are concerned, what they are primarily interested in is saving civilian populations from destruction from the air, and not in augmenting this destruction through the sale of bombing planes.

It is just as unpleasant, just as horrible, to think of German civilians being bombed from the air, as to contemplate British or French citizens being destroyed in this manner. We should help the British and French to protect themselves against such raids. We should not encourage them to carry them on themselves.

Fire Don'ts

As this is national Fire Prevention Week when everyone is supposed to give some thought to the best means for preventing, or at least, curbing, the annual toll from fires of one kind and another, the following list of "don'ts" prepared by the chief of the New York Fire Department may be of interest:

- 1—Don't allow rubbish to accumulate in cellars and yards. 2—Don't smoke in bed. 3—Don't store oily mops or rags in closets. 4—Don't use gasoline in the home for any purpose, including the cleaning of garments. 5—Don't provide decorative shades of inflammable material around electric bulbs. 6—Don't permit children to play with matches. 7—Don't replace an electric fuse with one of a larger capacity. 8—Provide metal screens in front of open fire places. 9—Don't place ashes from the stove in wooden receptacles. 10—Have flues, and chimneys examined every year.

Are We?

Well, the Clyde Liner Iroquois, which was to have been torpedoed with its 677 Americans by a British submarine in order to bring the United States into the war against Germany, has arrived safely in port escorted by two Navy destroyers. So that's that.

Or, are we supposed to believe that the timely warning of Admiral Raeder enabling our government to put the Iroquois on guard and give our Navy an opportunity to afford her every possible means of protection was the thing that prevented the British Admiralty from carrying out its evil designs to sink her?

And are we supposed, because of this, to be eternally grateful to the German Nazis who made this timely warning possible?

Key West Group Seeks Financing Of New Pipe Line

KEY WEST, Fla., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Ready now for its second season as a resort city, Key West is experiencing a bit of trouble with its lifeline—the Overseas Highway that stretches across the picturesque Florida keys to the mainland.

Down this Highway flow the tourists who give the rejuvenated city its design for living, and, in passing, they pay tolls which in turn pay for the broad strip of concrete and hurricane-proof bridges that form the connecting link between the island and Miami, 140 miles distant.

But revenue has been disappointing since the \$7,400,000 highway was opened to traffic July 4, 1938. Differences have arisen which resulted in the ousting of Paul H. Marks, attorney for the Overseas Highway and Toll Bridge Commission, and later the replacement of R. M. Duncan, who became the highway's general manager after serving as chief engineer during construction.

The temporary appointment of Edward R. Neff to succeed Duncan was criticized by Key West members of the commission, who are anxious to see the highway opened to traffic July 4, 1939. Neff, former chief engineer, was formally appointed to the post. At the same meeting, however, the commission refused to

posed attorney questioned Slade's authority to preside. The commission adopted a resolution asking G. A. Worley, Dade county state attorney, to investigate its actions "to clear the board's name."

An effort to drive greater revenue had been made by boosting tolls from \$1 to \$1.75 for a car and driver, but the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, which financed the highway, and the general public objected strongly. The RFC recommended economy instead of increased tolls. After a month, the rates were reduced to their previous level.

On petition of Key West citizens, the commission voted to try a half-rate, week-end excursion—\$1 a round trip—during the month of October.

The commission decided, against RFC recommendations, to spend \$15,000 for advertising and publicity.

That part of the Overseas Highway on which tolls are charged was built on the old Florida East Coast Railway right-of-way, a \$48,000,000 system of bridges and viaducts that were badly damaged in the hurricane of Labor Day, 1935. They were bought from the railroad for \$648,000.

Mild Manners Are Characteristic Of French Army Head

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—When the light strikes his face right, Maurice Gamelin looks like the Cowardly Lion in "The Wizard of Oz." Under the light of the lamps at home he looks like a mild, rather stern little business man.

Under no kind of light does the tidy Frenchman look like the master mind of the allied armies in the new World War.

So much for appearances. Gamelin has his record to stand on.

From the age of 20 months, when his mother painted a picture of him in his lace-trimmed dress, bearing a toy drum, Gamelin has been a soldier. There have been five French generals in his family.

When he was a student in a Catholic academy, the young Gamelin immersed himself in the career of the great Napoleon.

At St. Cyr, the West Point of France, he was graduated first in a class of more than 400. That was in 1893, when he was only 21. Then he went to Algeria for three years of wild campaigning.

There following the work that has made contemporaries call him "map crazy," Gamelin did surveying and drew maps. He pored over maps; he memorized them. He learned the terrain of France by memory—and the terrain of parts of the world he never had visited.

When Joffre became commander-in-chief in 1911, Gamelin became his military secretary. It was the quiet, little map-studying major who formulated the order that, in 1914, started the Marne counter-offensive, a maneuver that has been credited with turning the tide of victory against the Germans.

When the war had ended, Gamelin had been elevated to the rank of divisional general. In 1925 he subdued the bloody Marne revolt in Syria, then became commander of France's Army of the Levant.

Next it was chief of the general staff (in 1931). And when Premier Daladier came into power, Gamelin achieved an honor held by no soldier since his own hero, Napoleon—he was made commander of the army, the navy and of the air force.

That is the man who now heads the allied armies fighting Germany; if not "the greatest soldier in the world today," certainly one of the greatest.

Townhall History For Ninety Years Related

WHITEFIELD, N. H., Oct. 12.—(AP)—This is the tale of a New England town hall and how it grew.

Ninety years ago, Aurin M. Chase, grandfather of William B. Chase, present head of the Chase colony here, built a church. The Methodists used it in the mornings and the Free Will Baptists in the afternoons. About 1874, the two congregations disagreed and built separate churches.

The town moved its offices to the former church. A little later the Maine Central railroad came in and the town fathers had to move the building, backing the occasion to dig a basement over which to place it.

About 1900 the late Dr. G. H. Morrison gave the town a clock.

 Norwegian coast, had failed to return to their home harbors. Two were reported to have made emergency landings in Denmark, while two were unaccounted for and were probably lost.

In extended comment, DNB observed that "the time of unchallenged British mastery over the North Sea is past for all time," and added that it is proved beyond question that all of the east and north coasts of the British Isles were easily within effective range of German bombers.

German authorities said the plane-cruiser battle resulted from a call for help sent out by German surface vessels.

According to the DNB account, the German navy several days ago started intensive patrolling in the North Sea to intercept

contraband cargoes consigned to enemy countries.

Numerous ships were held up and naval vessels made their way far north into the North Sea without encountering enemy craft.

But on Monday morning, DNB said, scouting planes sent out from the ships in the latitude of the Shetland Islands spotted a strong flotilla of heavy British cruisers apparently heading for the German ships.

(A British communique Monday said a German naval squadron was sighted off the south coast of Norway Sunday but "darkness enabled the enemy to escape.")

A radio call for help was sent and several squadrons of heavy bombers were started instantly from the German mainland, said DNB.

The bombers reportedly reached the British cruisers before they were in a position to attack the German fleet and in rainy, cloudy weather the planes circled and took turns at making power dives and dropping bombs.

some weighing more than 1,000 pounds.

DNB reported that German observers counted six direct hits by the heaviest bombs and four by bombs of medium size.

(Previously the Germans had said two hits were made on a warship and six on a cruiser.)

The British admiralty, describing the action, said all bombs were wide of the mark.

Observers said there were "thunderous explosions," clouds of smoke rose from the ships and fire was plainly visible on others.

The ship's anti-aircraft guns fired ceaselessly, but completely without effect, the German account said.

All but four of the bombers returned after flights of from eight to 10 hours, DNB continued. It said the four missing planes departed from the scene of battle, but apparently developed mechanical difficulties on the home stretch.

"Mastery of the North Sea and the air over it now lies in German hands," the agency's account concluded.

The order for the air force to throw its power against the British at sea was described by one official as "one of the most important announcements since the Polish war ended."

It was assumed that the success claimed by the Germans since their aerial war against the British fleet began Oct. 7 occurred the order to continue with the campaign.

The order was issued as dis-appointment over the failure of the Allies or neutral powers to take up the peace overtures of Adolf Hitler became evident in Germany.

For some time the Nazis have said that bombers would be let loose against the British war-ships "in a businesslike way" if the Allies powers decided to continue the war.

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### Lindbergh to Speak Over Radio Friday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh will make a radio speech on the United States and its relation to the European war next Friday from the Mutual Broadcasting system announced last night.

The noted flyer's address, it was said, will be a continuation of his widely discussed speech several weeks ago in which he urged the United States to do everything possible to avoid involvement in the European conflict.

The speech, it is expected, will clarify his stand on the administration's proposal for repeal of the arms embargo provision of the neutrality act.

Lindbergh's first address was reported and distributed in large quantities by organizations which interpreted his remarks as indicating opposition to the repeal proposal. The flyer was "distressed" by this, it was widely reported, and determined to make his position clear.
