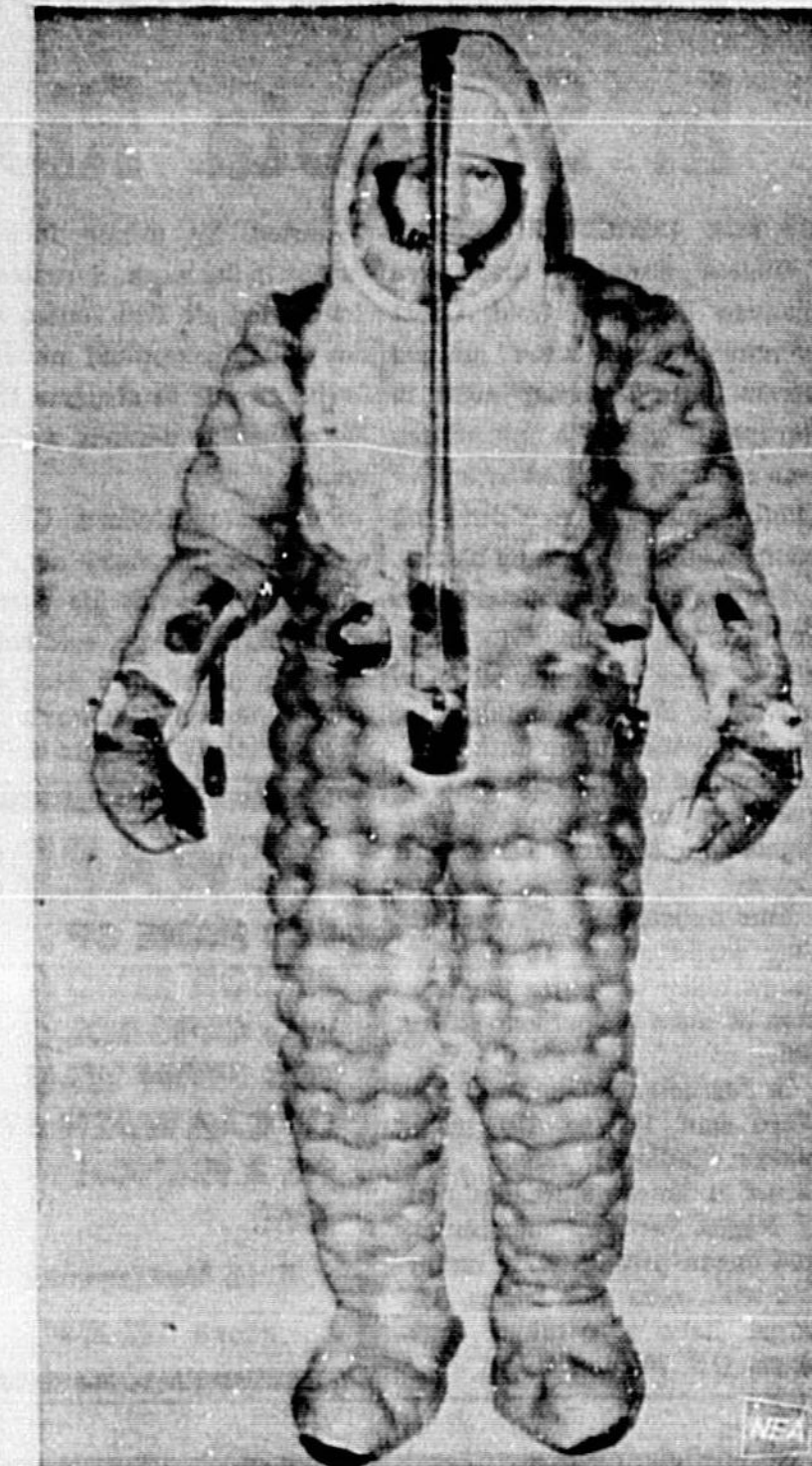

### Regents Study Policy On Student Disorders

WINTER PARK, Fla. (AP)—Regents were trying to cooperate with students, but didn't understand their problems. "I think the problem is that the philosophies the Regents hold and the philosophies that we hold are in many ways different and it hard to bridge that philosophy gap," he said. A survey of students at state universities revealed strong objections to the policies coming before the Regents. There was unanimous disapproval of a policy designed to go along with a new state law that students suspended for drug possession be denied readmission to state universities for two years. "I feel the statute which established this ruling is unconstitutional and eventually it will be proven so in court," Anderson said. "My only concern is how many students are going to be messed up in the meantime." "It's really absurd because it has nothing to do with whether they're guilty or not," said Rick Johnson, students for a Democratic Society member at Florida State. ### Transportation Dept. Probe Is Launched

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—District engineers are top sources for getting basic information on Florida's road program, but they're often afraid to talk, says Sen. William Beaufort, a former State Road Board member. He urged legislators Thursday to consider a district approach as they launch an investigation into operations of the huge State Transportation Department.

Valuable information can be gotten, "if the district engineer will open up and talk," Beaufort told a subcommittee of the full House Senate committee which began the study with a meeting here.

"This is where you can find out what's going on in a department. These fellows are a little afraid to talk," the Jacksonville Democrat said.

The Transportation Department was formerly the State Road Department. The new name was a result of the 1960 Governmental Reorganization act.

The full committee divided into five subcommittees, which will study specific areas such as budgeting, planning, utilization of funds, contracts, and other points.

Rep. Tommy Stevens, D-Dade City, directed the staff of his subcommittee to do research on a prime project of the legislative group: The determination of circumstances behind the reported loss of \$21 million in federal roadbuilding funds over a two-year period.

Rep. Lynwood Arnold, D-Jacksonville, chairman of the overall committee, said that a key objective of the group is to come up with corrective legislation designed to make the department more effective.

The construction subcommittee, headed by Rep. Ted Randall, D-Port Myers, decided to look into change orders and procedures used in granting the changes in requirements for construction jobs.

"I question whether the rules laid down by the Road Department apply to all people alike," said Sen. Ralph Poston, D-Miami.

### Cycling Tips For Children

Learn and obey all traffic rules and lights; the bicycle is a vehicle. Use hand and arm signals to show your intent to turn or stop. Do not ride bicycles on streets with heavy automobile traffic. Do not cross or turn at a busy intersection; dismount and walk the bike across the pedestrian crossing. Do not ride after dark. If it is necessary, be sure to have a bell or horn, a headlight, and red reflector on the rear. Wear light-colored clothing. Do not ride double on one bicycle. It makes balancing difficult and prevents a clear view of the road. Do not hitch a ride on a moving car or truck. Do not perform stunts on the street; if you want to try stunts, do it in a field or yard. Keep your bicycle in good condition; check tire pressure and brakes and oil and grease the bicycle when necessary. Be extra careful with an unfamiliar bicycle. If your local laws allow riding on sidewalks, be careful to avoid hitting pedestrians.

He knew what the public wanted and needed and he proceeded to do the job at hand. To him a complainant's ignorance was an opportunity to serve through explanation and not a personal insult or bait up in anyway the complainant's lack of knowledge.

It was not necessary for anyone to have political pull in order to get special attention or a personal interview with their tax assessor. All anyone had to do was ask.

Competent was another word which aptly described the 32-year old county officer. He knew his job to the finest detail and he did it well.

No one could think of Oz without remembering he was a Christian. He believed and practiced his belief. As the news of his passing reached through the county those who knew him kept saying, "He was such a nice guy." And he was.

## Manufacturing Plant Studied Home Firm Rents Base Space

An Orlando firm, interested in construction of modular and mobile homes possibly in Sanford, has leased 2,000 square feet of Sanford Airport Building 9 to construct two prototype homes for evaluation purposes before building a plant to manufacture the units.

This was confirmed today by Richard P. Coniff, general manager of diversification for Florida Gas Company of Orlando.

Coniff stated that Stan Hoffmann was acting as consultant for the gas firm in setting up an evaluation program to study engineering before constructing a plant to build the 13,000 to 18,000 range homes.

Coniff said Florida Gas was talking about buying property near Sanford if it was decided to market the homes.

"It's possible that we would build a plant on this property or construct on 4,500 acres already owned by us near the Martin tract south of Orlando," Coniff divulged.

## Schools-Airport Lease In Hassle

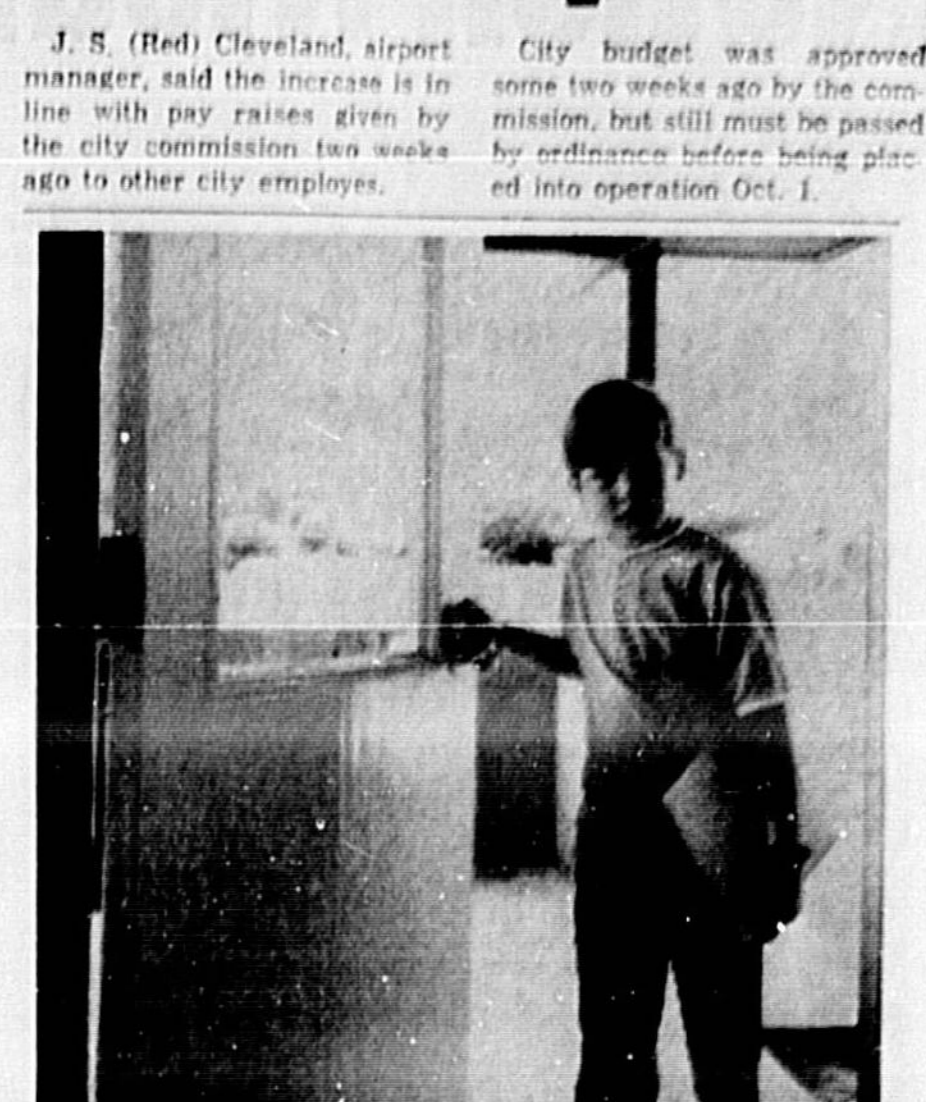

The City Commission will provide the final approval for the budgetary appropriations. They have the power to suggest, alter or abandon the plans.

The Board, created by the City of Sanford, is designed to look after the beautification of the city on a uniform basis. They held their regular meeting this morning at the Chamber of Commerce Building.

The plans for the lake-front Memorial Park, located near the Sanford Marina, will be studied to determine if a decking facility is necessary.

Improvements for the Marina Isle have been deleted from the overall plan for the Memorial Park because that land is under private ownership and is leased to the Holiday Inn.

The game areas, which would have included croquet, shuffleboard and horseshoe areas, have been deleted from the final plans for the Senior Citizens' Park.

The park is designed to be a tranquil park, and the game areas were not deemed conducive to this end. Also, the cost was cited, and the fact that these facilities could be added later on was mentioned.

Additional rain shelters will be added to the Senior Citizens' Park, and water fountains will be provided if feasible.

On the first Wednesday of October the Civic Improvement Board will hold its regular meeting at the C of C Building at 8 p.m. to continue their study of the city next August, at the City's Budgetary hearings.
