

AKRON MAKES FIRST FLIGHT AS AIR QUEEN

Giant Dirigible Soars Over Ohio For More Than Three Hours; Test Is Successful

AKRON, Ohio, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The U. S. S. Akron was taken upon her first flight yesterday, and came down safely three hours and 47 minutes later, the proven mistress of the air.

The flight was the first test for the world's largest dirigible, built here for the United States navy and the Akron went through it in a manner, highly pleasing to navy officials.

The cigar shaped ship, her silver hull glistening under a bright sun, cruised about this section of Northeastern Ohio, floated over downtown Cleveland and returned to the municipal airport here at dusk.

The only uncheduled part of the flight came in landing the giant ship after darkness. Apparently misjudging the altitude the field lights were not fast enough to her portable lighting mast.

It was estimated the ship flew approximately 125 miles. The flight made under perfect weather conditions which prevailed after several days of waiting.

Commander Charles E. Doolittle, former skipper of the USS Akron, a carrier of the wreck of the USS Akron six months ago, was in command of the Akron.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—President Hoover was informed yesterday a clamping down of immigration laws had closed the door on thousands of jobless men.

With an eye to cutting off recruits in the army of the nation's unemployed, the chief executive announced more than a year ago that immigration provisions of the constitution would be strictly enforced.

As the first complete report of the unemployment situation was made last week, it was estimated that 22 million persons had been unemployed since July 1.

Formal Invitation To Be Given Laval

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—A formal invitation for Premier Laval of France to visit the United States will be extended tomorrow provided the cabinet approves the trip. Secretary Stimson said today that he is personally keenly desirous of the visit by the statesman to discuss world problems with President Hoover. He remarked there is no limit to the subject which might be discussed advantageously.

ITALY'S PROFFER FOR EARLY TRUCE IS OKEYED BY U. S.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The Italian proposal of a "gentlemen's agreement" for an immediate one-year armistice truce received the endorsement of the United States before the League of Nations assembly disarmament committee yesterday, but met the opposition of Japan.

Hugh Wilson, American ambassador to Switzerland and representative of his government in the disarmament committee, announced the United States was ready to accept the plan for the armistice holiday except for construction, which is needed, he said, as a measure of unemployment relief.

Naotake Sato, Japanese spokesman, declared it was impractical to attempt an immediate truce and urged that the matter be postponed for consideration at the beginning of the general disarmament conference in February.

Wilson voiced dissatisfaction with the Japanese position and declared the psychological value of the truce would be entirely lost if it did not begin now.

The present number level of the United States is considerably lower than the figure provided for in the London agreement. Thus any undertaking not to augment existing naval strength would be an embarrassment and dislocate our construction plan.

SINO-JAPANESE TENSION DROPS ARMED ASPECT

Wrangle Is Entering Diplomatic Stage Which Gives Promise Of Long Dispute

SHANGHAI, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The military phase of the dispute between China and Japan in Manchuria apparently was drawing to an end today and yielding the limelight to the diplomatic stage, which promises a long bitter argument. Japan is girded to defend its position of not permitting intervention by other powers. China continued to rally accidental powers behind her cause.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The American government has intervened to bring an end to Sino-Japanese hostilities in Manchuria.

Secretary Stimson, in a note to the League of Nations yesterday expressing sympathy with its stand on the Manchurian situation, disclosed the State Department at all ready had urged Japan and China to restore peace.

His note to the league expressed "wholehearted sympathy" with its resolution that Japan should halt the advance of troops in Manchuria and said the United States had not urged a cessation of fighting, but withdrawal "from the present situation of danger."

Secretary Stimson's request that hostilities cease is understood to have been made through the diplomatic representatives of China and Japan here. Officials of both the Japanese embassy and the Chinese legation conferred separately with State Department officials Tuesday and Wednesday.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—Japan, whose troops have occupied Southern Manchuria since Saturday, was believed to be well prepared to meet her obligations under the League of Nations.

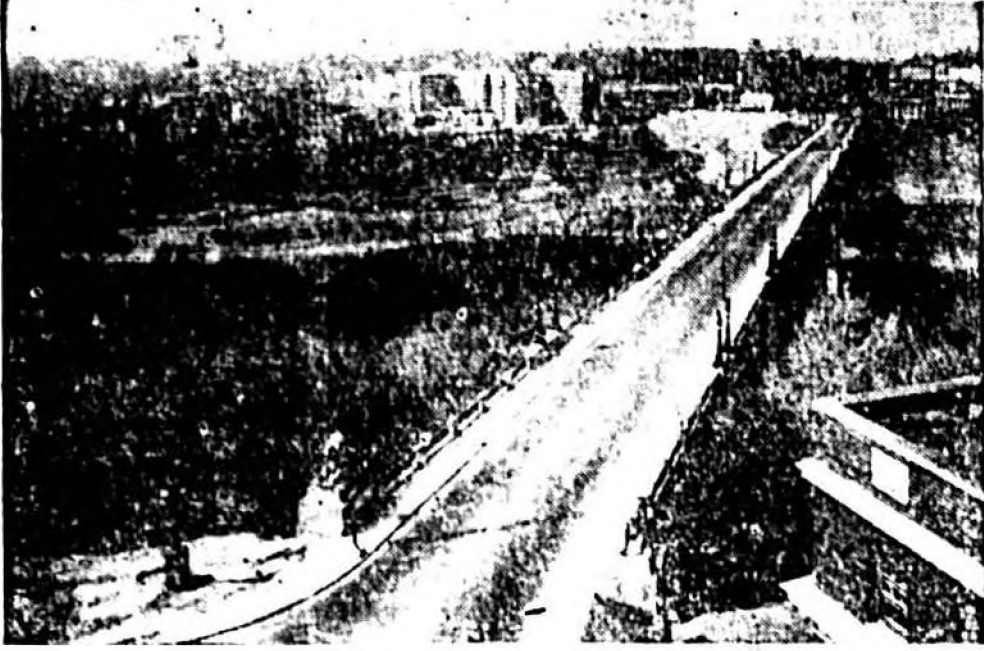

Labor Organization Condemns Efforts For Lower Wages

SPEER RETURNS FROM 2-WEEKS' TRIP TO GOTHAM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The federal government gravely pondering the possibilities toward lower wages, organized labor condemned the action of the steel corporations last night as a betrayal of faith.

As president of the American Federation of Labor, William Green warned that any cuts "generally wrong and economically undesirable."

President Hoover, who has been struggling against the forces which have been and now are striving to bring about a return of prosperity, he said.

It was not long before the Green statement reached the White House and other high administrative quarters. It was felt that the steel corporations are bound to follow.

President Hoover is not expected definitely to take action. His chief concern is to make plain to the public that the steel industry is to be no lowering of American living standards.

Green charged the United States Steel corporation with violating a promise made to the nation when it and others agreed wages would be maintained during this distressing period of unemployment.

The reference was to the meeting between President Hoover and prominent industrial and labor leaders two years ago.

After that session, a White House statement and the conference had agreed to maintain wages on the one hand and new demands for increases on the other.

Labor has kept its pledge, Green declared in his protest last night. He made no mention of retaliatory moves such as strikes, summing up, his sentiment, he said it was represented by the experienced opinion of Julius Allen, assistant secretary of commerce, that there will be hell to pay throughout the United States in the event of a general wage reduction.

This opinion was expressed by Allen last night. Today he had no comment.

Green suggested the tariff schedule protecting the steel companies from foreign competition should be reduced.

He said they were the beneficiaries of a very high protective rate on the theory that it is necessary in order to protect the American wage standard. American wages and the American standard of living.

Pointing to statements that the steel corporation would save the steel corporation \$1,000,000 a year, Green said that means that the employees will have \$25,000,000 less to spend.

U. S. labor had criticized the steel corporation particularly for cutting wages after paying large dividends during recent years. He cited a 40 percent stock dividend in June, 1927, and cash dividend amounting to 100 percent from April 1, 1921, to Dec. 31, 1929.

He said it seemed to be the policy of this and other great corporations to pay generous dividends during periods of prosperity and reduce wages during periods of adversity.

DETROIT, Sept. 24.—(A.P.)—The American Legion national convention today asked Congress to submit a repeal or modification of the present prohibition laws to the states with the request that each state submit the issue to its voters.

The vote was 1028 to 394. The vote came after a debate in which advocates of the resolution denigrated the prohibition law and asked the Legion to assume leadership in the fight seeking change through referendum.

The opposition argued that the Legion should not stand. It was the first time that prohibition came before the National Legion convention in its 13 years of existence. An effort to have the issue thrown out of the convention as political and not in the Legion's scope failed.
