

# Bald Eagle's Nest Undisturbed Audubon Society Lauds Developer

CASSELLBERRY — Harold Scott, executive director of the Florida Audubon Society is pleased to sing the praises of land developer, Richard Bond.

Bond, several months ago, while walking through his 1,100-acre tract on which the planned development, Sterling Park, is to be built, discovered an inhabited bald eagle nest. He contacted the Audubon Society for assistance in saving the eagle while continuing the development.

Although the law requires only that he not cut down the tree which houses the nest, Bond has set aside the 650 feet radius asked by the Audubon Society. The land set aside is

some 22 acres and an additional buffer zone made up of the golf course. Through this measure the eagle's food sources should not be disturbed.

According to a study done by National Geographic, the eagle will travel 80 miles for food, most of which will come from

the ocean. The eagle migrates in the winter but will return to raise a family in the spring. His wing spread is a span of six-to-eight feet.

The planned development of Sterling Park is bounded on the northeast by Camelot subdivision, on the west and south by Summeret, reaches to Red Bug and Tuskuwilla Roads.

Some 432 of the 1,100 acres will be devoted to single family houses in the \$30,000 to \$50,000 price range; 104 to patio homes, 57 to apartments, 21 to commercial and 56 acres to be set aside for two elementary and one junior high school.

# Senator Spessard Holland's Enduring Bequest

When such an admired, useful and extraordinarily effective career as that of Spessard Lindsey Holland comes to an end the time for deserved tributes fades into the more permanent and more vital meanings.

In the very highest meaning of the showman phrase Senator Holland was a "public servant." A solid and skilled competitor, his life-time devotion to his native state was shown by markers which now should be used by those who would walk in his footsteps and attain the high goal which he never lost an election the calibre of the youngster from Bartow was dramatized as he flew the fabric and drove WWV planes over the trenches winning the Distinguished Service Cross.

What an apt decoration for this great man who was to polish that word "service" in the prosaic, time-consuming and often boring fields of governmental service.

Polk County judge, state senator, Florida's gov-

error and United States Senator for a distinguished quarter-century, his passing evoked such tributes from such a wide range of notables that these alone are a rare memorial.

But these formalities, the dry statistics which are on the record as to the Holland accomplishments are indeed just the bare bones. The meat of this gentle senator's devotion and activities are to be found in the causes he espoused and the flame which he lit in younger public servants which now burns brighter.

Accountability, a current yardstick which more and more voters are demanding from the persons they send into positions of power, was a norm of the Holland career.

A conservative by choice, the outstanding accomplishment which he was known to have cherished most was in the field of civil rights. For it took 13 years for his drive to abolish the poll tax requirement to succeed and bring about the 24th amendment to the

United States Constitution which removed this block to full suffrage.

The times in which Holland sat in posita of power at all levels of government—1919-1970—covered great changes in the responsibilities which elected officials had to understand and face.

In Florida the transformation has been of such magnitudes, although slow in developing, that the ability of this devoted gentleman to interpret them wisely, to respond to the changing needs of his constituency so deftly that this accomplishment is one of many that he has left for the guidance of those who would inherit his political estate.

On the national and international scene his attention to his senatorial duties was recognized by his peers. Senator Frank Church, Democrat of Idaho, whose basic political philosophy is liberal, made this comment:

Senator Holland "was a perfect gentleman at all times, never permitting his keen interest in the sub-

ject matter, nor his determination to win the fight, to overcome his unflagging civility.

A rare man, a rare public servant, a beloved gentleman who personal life and career was of such a nature as to support and give substance to his professional achievements, it is quite in order that this example should spur other Floridians into like endeavors.

One such is the junior senator from Florida, Lawton Chiles of Lakeland, who was so well in tune with the Holland approach to public service, that he was greatly affected by the approach to public service when the Chiles won a year ago, placed the young Lakeland man in the seat which the elder of Bartow was vacating by choice. Of course there are others, but saying farewell to Senator Holland, laying our tribute with the true memorial to his greatness is alleviated as the true memorial to this gentleman is now in the hands of other dedicated public servants who can build up gloriously if the Holland example is kept in sight.

The Soviet soft-shoe acts have a cold purpose. Communist China is emerging into the world, and the Soviet Union wants to mend fences.

Also, to the degree that the United States of America is retreating from its commitments, Russia is advancing into the vacuum. Hopefully the Western nations will see through the Soviet performance.

More hopefully, the Soviet five-year public relations plan does not include pushing doorbells and kissing babies. That would be just too much.

### U.S. To Dicker On Trade Bars

WASHINGTON (NEA) — President Nixon and Treasury Secretary Connally are getting ready to compromise with the Europeans and the Japanese on the 10 per cent surtax and the floating dollar.

Instead of holding out for a major overhaul of foreign discriminatory practices, the United States will settle for modest revocations of major currencies and promises by the chief trading nations that they will seriously study what can be done to lessen discrimination against American goods.

The hope is for a new yen value 13 to 14 per cent above the August rate and comparable, though not necessarily quite so large, official shifts in other major currencies.

The new rates hoped for are, in general, not far from the levels most currencies have now reached on the world's exchange.

There will be no attempt to hold feet to the fire—in Japan, Western Europe, Canada or elsewhere—in contrast to the broadly hinted implications of

### S. Viet Forces - How Ready?

—Though the North Vietnamese still like to stage assaults to coincide with events like elections and inaugurations in South Vietnam, their capacity to embarrass Saigon seems limited. They seldom sustain attacks for very long.

The net of their October operations in the Khek area of eastern Cambodia and across the border in South Vietnam's Tay Ninh province, has not been as successful as they hoped. They suffered sharp casualties as they risked a concentration of forces of a size (three or four divisions) seldom attempted since 1969.

In the late phase of the operation, South Vietnamese soldiers probing for the assault forces could find little. The concentration had been dispersed.

The North Vietnamese still are not back in the old prime Cambodian border sanctuaries at the Parrot's Beak and south of the prized, populous Mekong Delta. South Vietnamese patrols and sweeps are keeping these zones free from sizable enemy build-ups.

Even if Hanoi's forces could re-establish a presence in problems would be difficult. The allied Cambodian venture of 1970 cut off seaborn supplies coming in via the nearby Gulf of Siam. Today they would be dependent on the long, vulnerable inland trail route through Laos and Cambodia.

It is, of course, true that U.S. artillery and air power helped crucially in blunting Hanoi's Khek drives. Yet it is not exactly fair to suggest, as some appraisers have done, that Saigon's reliance on this heavy air support proves that the South Vietnamese ground troops can't cut it.

Through the war, U. S. ground forces, notwithstanding their own superior firepower, were almost entirely dependent on the air in tactical air power. The carrying in of air strikes in close-order operations has been routine.

It has been the compensation for Hanoi's telling mastery of guerrilla warfare, which neither U. S. troops nor U.S. trained South Vietnamese could match.

The natural question is: What about Saigon's capacity to provide its own air support?

In the recent Khek area combat, the South Vietnamese air force flew hundreds of tactical sorties—in higher proportion to ours than they have ever flown before. They were effective, but they have no B-52s, and few of the most sophisticated fighter-bombers. They probably will have somewhat more basic air strength than they have today.

### One, Two Three - You're Out!

Curt Flood is covering as much ground in the courts these days as he used to cover in center field back in his days of indentured servitude with the St. Louis Cardinals. Now the U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to hear Flood's suit, which contends the "reserve clause" in baseball contracts is unconstitutional.

Flood is currently 6-for-2 since a federal district court and U.S. appeals court both rejected his suit. But both rejections were based on a 1922 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that exempted baseball from the antitrust restrictions and he is hopeful that the time is ripe for an over-ruling.

His argument is that the reserve clause, which gives a player exclusive rights to a club until it decides it doesn't want him any more, prevents an athlete from making the most of his marketable commodity, his body. Organized Baseball (it is just about like General Motors or Dow Chemical) argues that without the reserve clause all the best players would soon gravitate to whichever team had the most money and that team, having the best players, would keep winning and making more money and getting more good players ad infinitum.

Some of our closest allies have found the free market in the United States slipping down all astrologically to a level never anticipated by the American planners. This heavy downturn has taken place primarily because of the uncertainties surrounding the Nixon-Connally action.

Officials here now realize that this uncertainty must end if there is to be irreversible damage to our relationships and to the economies of some of our staunchest supporters around the world.

It also seems to officials here now that negotiating for fair trade practices, while vitally important, will take so long and involve so many nations, directly and indirectly, that it would be unwise to hold foreign countries under the pressure of the "universal" per cent surtax until U. S. aims are achieved.

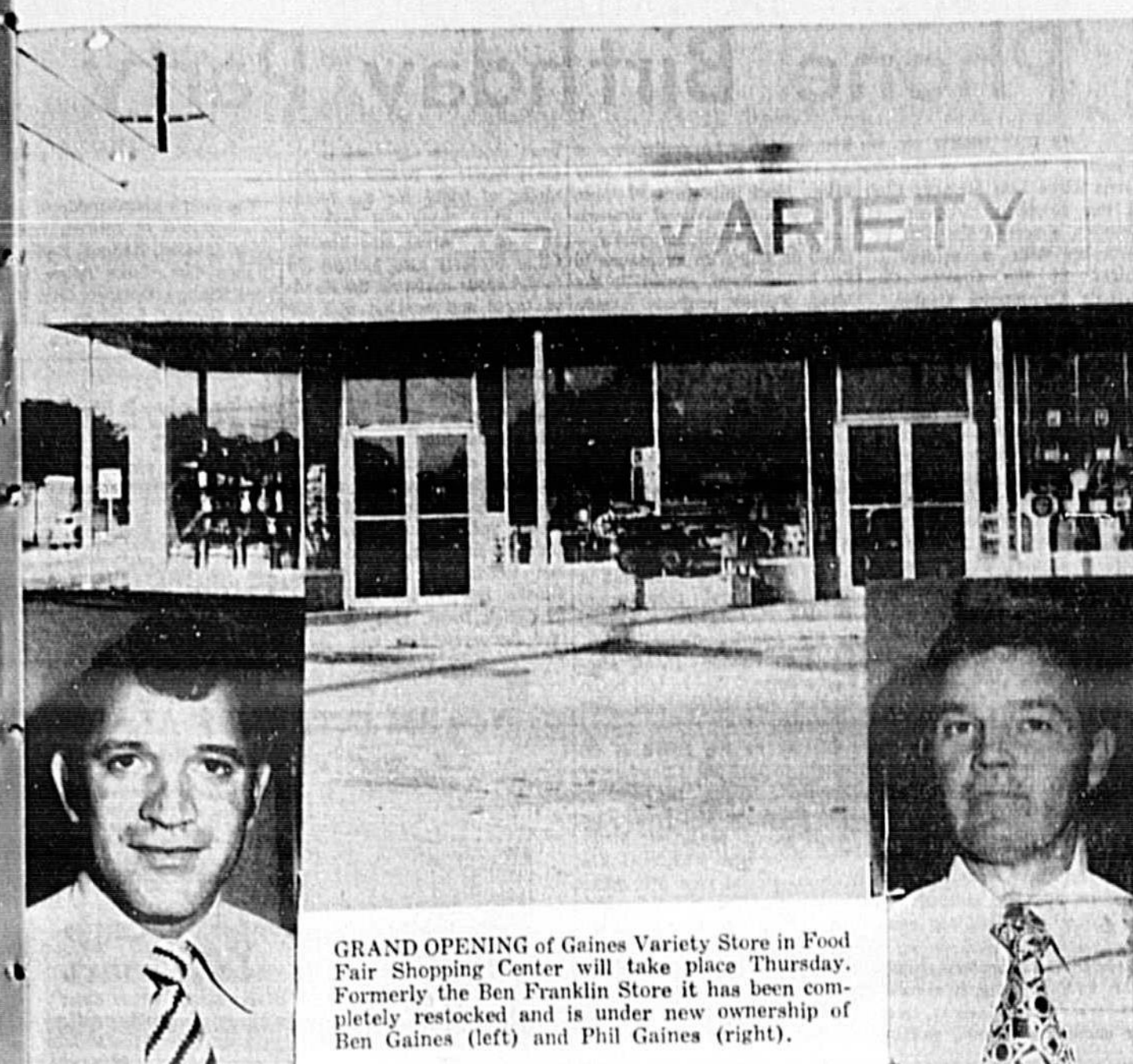

## Village Attorney Disagrees

### 'Sunshine Law' Is Upheld

The proposed new charter of North Orlando did not meet with the approval of the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation with regard to the "Sunshine Law."

Rep. Robert Milburn questioned a section of the charter which provided that the Village Council could recess for meetings in which only they would be present.

Sen. William Gunter mentioned that this issue is opposed to the "Sunshine Law."

Rep. William Fulford remarked the passage outlined that the closed executive sessions are only for the purpose of discussion of incidents in which a person's character or reputation would not be defamed and would tend for carte blanche closed sessions.

Sen. Gunter said a court decision does not allow this type meeting. The delegation voted to strike all verbiage except "all meetings shall be public" from this particular section of the charter.

The charter was then approved by the delegation as amended, with Rep. William Gibson casting the only dissenting vote.

Also approved, with Gibson again voting the only "nay," is a City of Casselberry charter change. The proposed change would give the city power to annex 16-20 "islands" which are contiguous to the city and bounded on all four sides by land.

The charter was amended to note that the contiguous "gray area" be tied down to "exclusive use of lakes and road rights of way as constituting a boundary.

Other projects also include aid to the aged; assisting the disadvantaged and working with the youth of our country.

# Confirmation Seen Sure For Hi Court Nominees

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's Supreme Court nominees begin testifying today before the Senate Judiciary Committee whose members so far have voiced few objections to their confirmation. Barring disclosure of new information, Lewis F. Powell Jr., a Richmond, Va., lawyer, and William H. Rehnquist, an assistant attorney general, seem headed for Senate confirmation. Sen. James O. # Wage Increase Ceiling At 5.5% Labor Protests Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's Pay Board has imposed on American workers a 5.5 per cent general ceiling on yearly wage increases, bringing angry protests from organized labor. The Pay Board rejected by a 10-5 vote Monday labor's demand for retroactive payment of negotiated pay boosts which were caught in the wage price freeze, except in a handful of cases. "They have abrogated our contracts," said President George Meany of the AFL-CIO. However, a federation spokesman said the AFL-CIO convention, starting in Miami Nov. 16, will decide whether the federation will cooperate.

But it ruled that these raises are subject to challenge and possible rollback if found to be "unreasonably in excess of a general standard." Asked whether the five labor members of the 15-man, labor-industry public board would quit, Chairman George Boldt replied promptly: "I am confident they will not." He got that impression, he added, from conversations with the labor members. But an aggrieved union could take the Pay Board into court, and it seemed equally probable that the AFL-CIO leaders could ask Congress for relief. They already have a foothold at the Capitol; the House Banking Committee last week approved Phase 2 guidelines which, among other concessions, would grant labor its demand for retroactivity. President Paul Jennings of the International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers said he would formally recommend to the AFL-CIO convention that the federation

# Foreign Aid Vote In House Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House is voting today on a resolution likely to offer the administration a brief, new lease on foreign aid. But the measure doesn't stand a chance in the Senate. The Senate begins debate Wednesday on its own sharply reduced foreign assistance program, more than \$1 billion below the level the administration had set as an acceptable minimum. It would, in the administration view, be better than nothing. And nothing is what the aid program will get until Congress settles on legislation to supplant the \$2.8-billion aid bill the Senate rejected 10 days ago. The State Department continued to urge upon Congress a continuing resolution to authorize aid spending at or near current levels after Nov. 15, when present funds expire. But Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott said there was no chance for winning congressional approval of a continuing resolution. He said he assumes the White House is aware of their regular appropriations.

# City Liquor Sales Eased

Hutchison, city attorney, to draft an ordinance that will allow eating establishments with 200 persons or more capacity to serve alcoholic beverages on Sundays. The present city ordinance limits Sunday alcohol sales to establishments with 100 rooms or more. This restricts the sale to Holiday Inn motel only. Mayor Mack N. Cleveland's letter to the Commission on behalf of Trophy Lounge, his client, precipitated the decision to change the city's "blue law." Commissioner J. H. Crapps moved for the change. His motion was seconded by Commissioner Gordon Meyer and the vote was unanimously passed. Only eating establishments are affected. Package stores operated by restaurants will not be included in the change in the law. City Commission in another action appointed a new five-man Housing Authority board to operate the city's 280 low income public housing units. The new board will have a three-two black majority and includes: John Robert Smith, 1211 Harding Avenue, retired Navy petty officer; Samuel Wright Jr., Daytona Beach Junior College instructor, 1122 Loqui Avenue resident; and Rich and Evans, 2811 Bungalow Boulevard, Seminole High School assistant principal. Two whites named were substituted by Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts and include Dr. Yann Parker and Rev. Father William Ennis, of All Souls Catholic Church. The new board will assume office on Nov. 15. The City Commission, which has been serving as interim board since the mass resignation of the previous board, will resign as the Housing Authority.

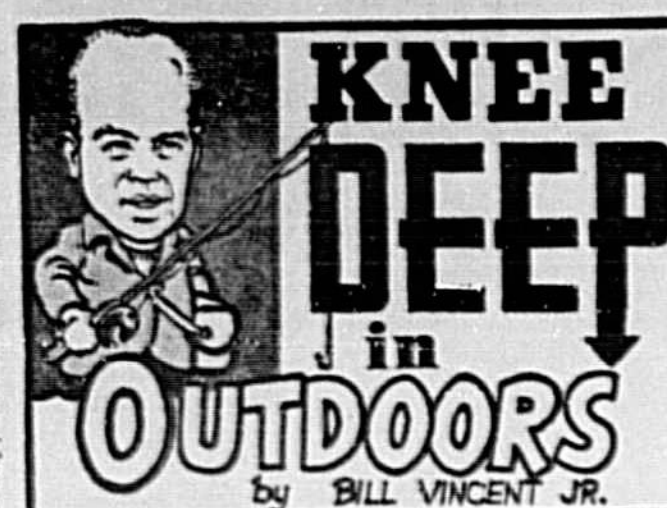

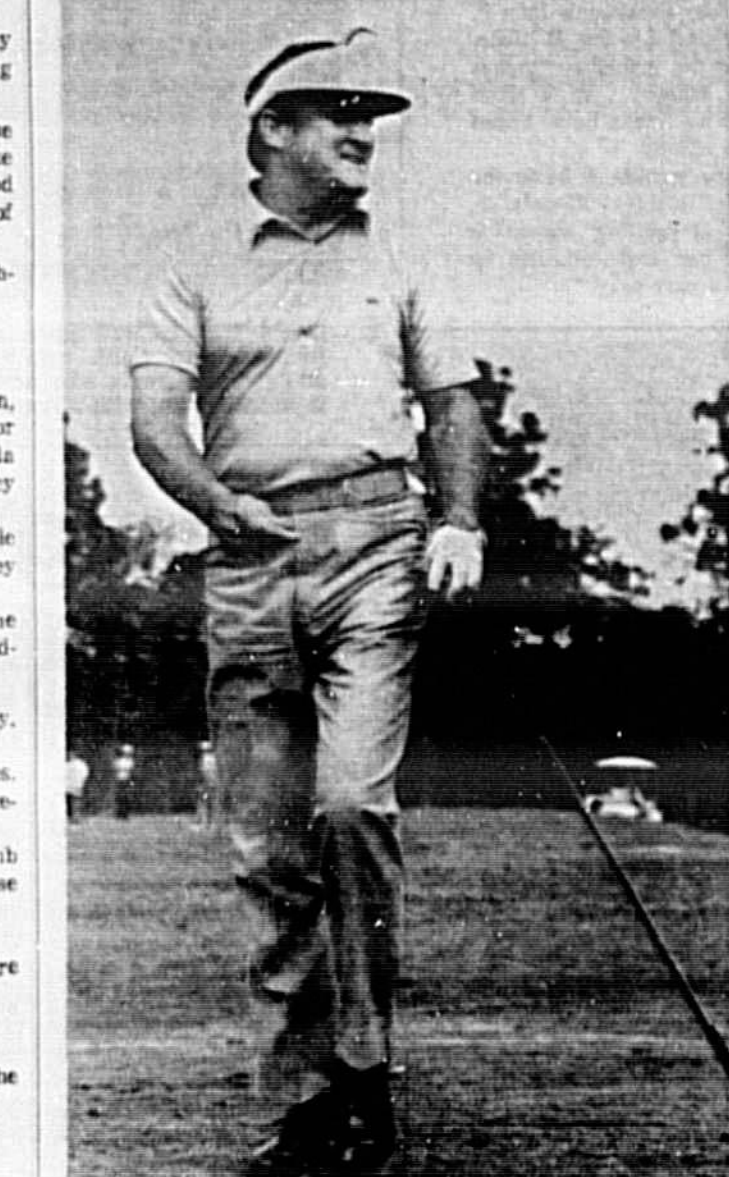

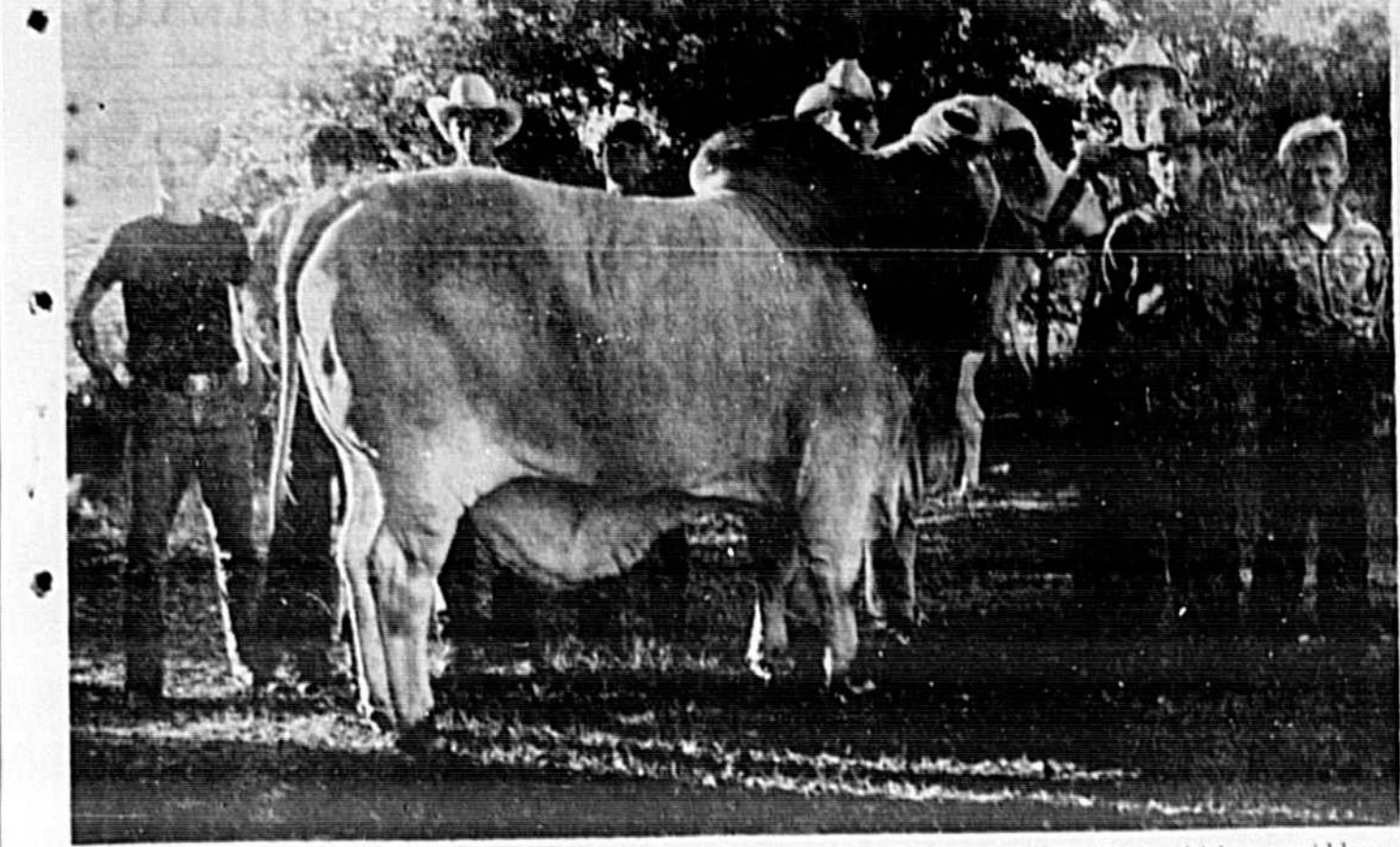

Only three coaches have ever won more games than Alabama's Bear Bryant, who notched No. 208 in Saturday night's 147 thriller over Louisiana State. They are Amos Alonzo Stang with 314, Pop Warner with 313 and Warren Woodson with 239.

Trail Blazer are Jess Neely, 207; Jake Gaither, 203; and Eddie Anderson and Eddie Robinson, 201. Only Bryant and Robinson are still active head coaches.

Next to join the 20 club probably will be Ohio State's Woody Hayes — but he only has 173 and can't make it before 1974.

But for a record any coach would envy, next Gary Anderson of Montclair, N.J. State. Since coming to Montclair State in 1969, Anderson has compiled a 23.5 mark, but even that pales by comparison to his achievements in the scholastic ranks at Blair Academy and Montclair High.

In 27 years at the scholastic level, Anderson's teams won 209 games, 103 and tied six. In 26 seasons as a baseball coach, his record was 461-151.

He also coached hockey for nine years (148-119), his basketball record for eight (118-83) and swimming for four (14-17). In two years as Montclair State's baseball coach, Anderson shows a 36-12 state.

His all sport coaching record is 1,013-293. He only losing season as a head coach came with Montclair High's baseball team in 1967. In his own athletic career at Montclair High, East is east and west is west and Oklahoma doesn't care for that set-up. ## 112-Apt. Complex Ceremony Slated

Groundbreaking for the first section (112 units) of a 900 Federal Housing Administration (FHA) insured apartments project will be held at the Christian Village land site off Onora Road in Sanford Sunday at 3:30 p.m. Owned by the Christian Benevolent Foundation of Florida, Inc., the first phase will include 40 one-bedroom and 72 two-bedroom apartments, to be built in village units with landscaped courtyards.

The one- and two-bedroom units will be intermingled and all will be of one-story construction.

Each apartment will have a balcony. Electrical appliances, including hot water heater, refrigerator and range, will be furnished.

The complex will have a centrally located laundry facility, meeting room, office space and janitorial accommodations. There will be 174 parking spaces, including visitor parking. The entire area will be landscaped with 1,865 square feet of sidewalks.

Entrance to the complex is located one-third mile west of U.S. 17-92 on Onora Road.

Target date for completion of section one is January, 1973. Vanguard Construction Co. Inc. of Temple Terrace, is the contractor.

**SR 436 Traffic** — Study to determine ways of relieving the traffic situation on the eight-mile stretch of SR 436 between the west city limits of Altamonte and the east city limits of Casselberry will be a major item for consideration at the CALNO Council of Local Governments at Casselberry City Hall.

## Handwriting On The Blackboards Calling For Year-Round Schools

(Editor's Note: In a time when it is almost impossible to get money to construct new school buildings, something new is being tried in American schools. It is year-round, continuous education. This is the first of two articles dealing with the subject, and the possible ramifications.)

The adult American attended schools nine months a year, with three summer months for vacation. His children are doing the same thing.

But there is a change in the wind, in part of necessity, in part because of a recognized need for continuous education. It is year-round schooling, if adopted nationally, it will mean drastic changes in the lives of everyone involved — pupils, teachers, parents, administrators.

"I definitely feel the year-round program will prove successful," said Wilma Cole, principal of the Becky-David elementary school,

## Advertising Delayed On Two Schools

School Board Tuesday afternoon approved sending plans for two new schools to Tallahassee for approval by the State Education Department but declined to permit the usual advertising for construction bids until more information is known on possibility of instituting year-round county schools.

Final plans were approved for Brantley High and Tusawilla Elementary Schools submitted by Eoghan Kelley and John Drago, architects for the respective schools, but the board refused to allow the bid requests at least for the present.

A meeting was scheduled for Monday at 1 p.m. to allow the School Board to hear a report on costs to air condition county schools to allow all year schools utilizing the 45-15 attendance plan.

Dr. Stuart Culpepper argued to submit the plans for bidding explaining, "Even if we go to year-round we will still need the school." His motion died for lack of a second.

Supt. John Angel said costs to air condition seven schools would be \$1.25 million, plus another \$187,000 for electricity to operate them.

It was developed that costs to build Brantley High could be diverted to pay for the six computer facilities, the new school might not be needed.

Kelley disclosed in his final plans that the \$750,000 estimated cost to construct the high school had been reduced to a projected \$2,483,766 by relocating the auditorium, vocational technology center, food preparation and swimming pool complex from the first phase.

Projected costs for the elementary school is \$900,000. Whether the school system will go the year-round (45 days in school 15 days out) plan is still under discussion and a report is expected from the special school housing committee in January on recommendations for solving the county's over-flowing school population.

Consensus seems to be the committee will suggest the year-round plan but there is still a chance county taxpayers will be called on to approve a school bond issue to build more schools in the South Seminole area where the majority of growth is occurring.

Dr. Culpepper warned other board members he would mobilize his county area to pressure the board into not delaying building the two schools.

## Revision Of County Approved

Redistricting of the Seminole County Commission was approved Tuesday.

Based on a recent census, which shows district 1 to have 17,000 population; district 2, 15,375; district 3, 16,010; district 4, 17,147; and district 5, 15,151, the concern of "this board should rest with these current figures, not on the projected 1980 figures," according to Commission Chairman Greg Drummond.

Camilla Brice, supervisor of elections, has attempted to prepare a redistricting plan which would meet the approval of all the commissioners.

Commissioner Al Davis said precincts a party registered voters and total population. And the redistricting plan is not designed to discriminate against any area or commissioner, rather to more equitably distribute the population into districts for better representation.

On motion of Commissioner John Kimbrough, the redistricting was adopted, effective January, 1972. Administrative Assistant Rosilyn Lopez was instructed to draw up a resolution delineating the new district lines as well as precincts and polling places.

The slim Serifowski, although facing no criminal charge, has testified his uncle paid \$1,000 to arrange the marriage.

He said in court he has never kissed his wife of two years, nor been with her since the day they were married.

Defendants are Stephan Kasouris, 40, and Dominic J. Tito, 50, accused of making the matrimonial arrangements, and Serifowski's wife.
