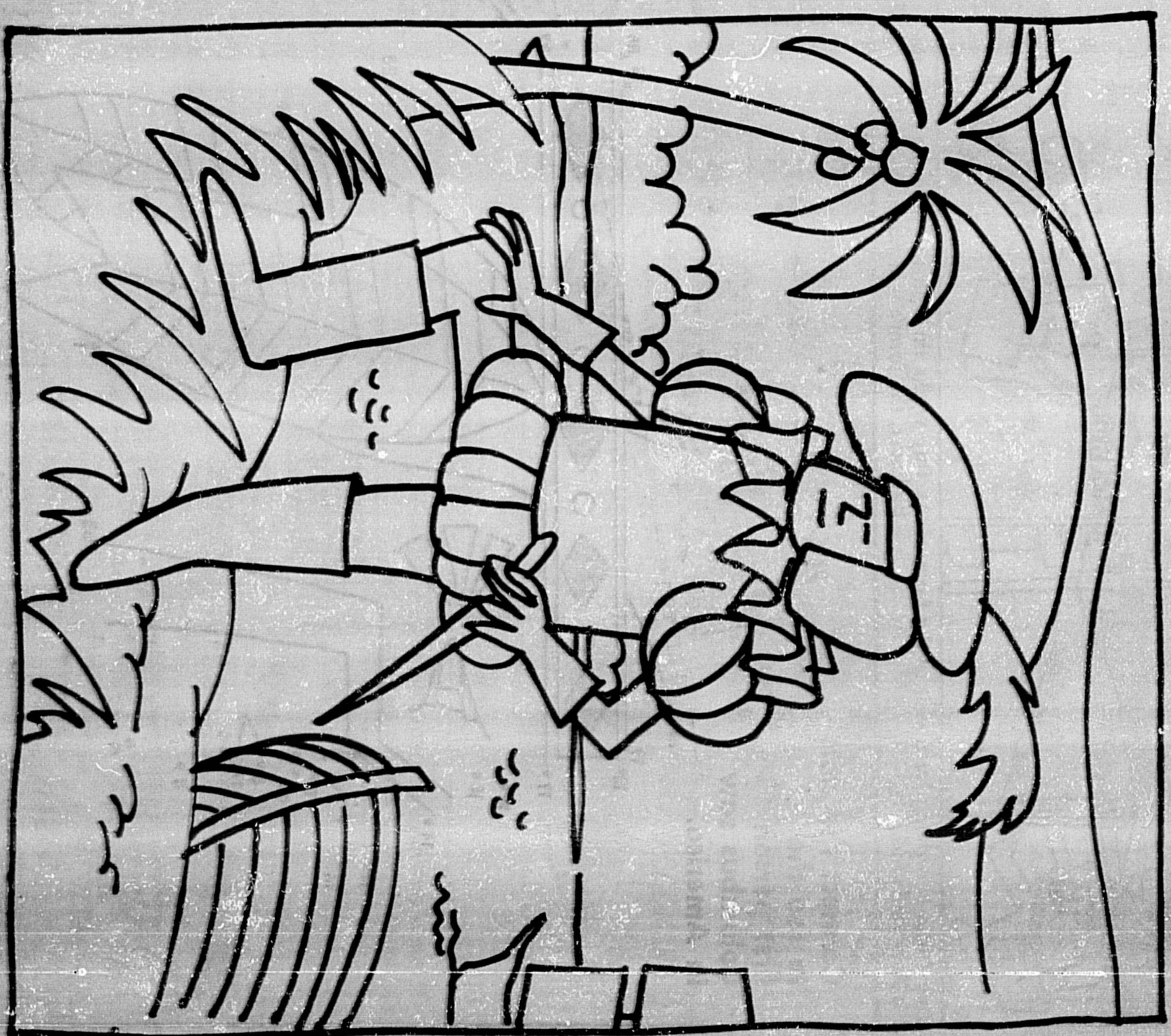

City-Airport Session Called Off

Newsmen Foil Closed Meet

A planned "unpublicized" meeting involving a number of city officials and a consulting firm utilized by Page Airways, Inc., the Sanford Airport's fixed base operator, failed to come off the morning after newspaper reporters refused to leave the office of Don Rathel, former Sanford industrial director and now associated with Page Airways.

Newspaper reporters and photographers, tipped off to the meeting, arrived at the consultant's office shortly before the 10 a.m. session was to begin and watched as City Commissioners Thomas McDonald and Gordon Meyer, City Manager W. E. Knowles, Sanford Airport Manager J. S. Red, Cleveland, David F. Kelley, Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) director, A. K. Shoemaker Jr., SIC chairman, and Rathel gathered for the attempted closed door session.

Bill Scott, Sanford Herald reporter, attempted to explain that the newly defined "State Sunshine Law" forbids the meeting of public tax supported bodies behind a closed door but Rathel made an attempt to close the door in Scott's face. Unmindful that another reporter had managed to slip inside unnoticed.

While Herald photographer Bill Vincent snapped pictures of Rathel barring the door, Scott was told by the consultant that his office "was Page Airways' property."

When Rathel turned his attention the other reporter, Scott also entered the room, where he encountered City Commissioner McDonald, who blasted The Herald verbally for always hounding this city by printing bad stories.

McDonald accused The Herald of not caring about the city's welfare, just so a story could be written.

At this point John Kridler, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce manager, arrived and, after surveying the scene, stated, "If this is a meeting, I can't attend it."

Kridler later explained to The Herald he was not aware that the SIC would be meeting when he came to the building.

Upon hearing Kridler's remarks about leaving, McDonald remarked "me, too" and followed the Chamber manager out the door.

By this time an argument had evolved between Rathel and Bob Lloyd, Orlando Sentinel reporter, after Lloyd sat in an office chair.

Rathel went to the telephone apparently to call police to remove the two reporters but was stopped from dialing the number by Knowles.

The consultant then explained that only certain people had been invited to discuss the Page Airways question and even Meyer was not included in the invitations.

Meyer later explained his reason for being there was in the interest of the city taxpayers, who have to pay for the airport operation in the event not enough revenue is obtained from airport leases to offset the cost of the facility.

McDonald, Knowles and Shoemaker are members of the SIC as is Kridler, who left after ascertaining there was a meeting.

The meeting between the city officials and Page Airways was requested after last Thursday's SIC meeting, when the commission heard a representative from Sanford Aviation, Inc., ask for permission to establish a second fixed base operation at the airport.

The SIC is to consider allowing the new firm to locate at the airport after a meeting has been held between city and Page Airways officials.

Later today, Shoemaker called The Herald to advise that he had talked to Gerald Winston, Page Airways president, and had been advised that the firm is sending a representative from Rochester, N. Y., later this week for a session with city officials over the lack of air services at the airport.

436 Property Need On Agenda

County Commissioners will discuss at tomorrow's meeting the problem of rights-of-way connected with the scheduled four-laning of SR 436 from 1-4 to the Orange county line in West Seminole County.

Al Davis, planning engineer with the district office, State Department of Transportation in Deland, will be on hand to offer possible solutions and to answer questions.

The discussion stems from a possible set back in the road program for this county in that that DCT is going to require that Seminole County acquire the remaining rights-of-way for SR 436 between 1-4 and the Orange County line, whereas the commission had previously anticipated acquiring only the rights-of-way necessary to complete the work already begun on the 4 1/2 of a mile from the county line east, which was necessary to complete the portion being repaved and widened from U. S. 441 and the county line.

The commission adopted a resolution authorizing the expenditure of \$40,000 by the DCT of secondary road funds for the purchase of the rights-of-way for the 4 1/2 mile section now being repaved, but contained no allowances for the remaining rights-of-way between 1-4 to a point 4 1/2 mile east of the county line.

ONE-HALF MILLION

County Commissioner Robert Parker has stated that it is estimated that \$500,000 will be required to obtain the rights-of-way for the entire distance. Since the money will have to come from the funds already allotted for the county's secondary road program for the next year, the commission will have to determine tomorrow where the money will come from, and which projects, if any, will have to be deleted from the coming year's program. One possibility is the previously discussed possibility of a bond issue for the secondary road program.

There will be a report from the county road department relative to the criteria for rumble strips at intersections. These are currently placed at high speed intersections to focus attention upon stop streets.

There will be a discussion upon a joint resolution with Orange and Osceola Counties concerning a plan of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Planning Commission.

U. S. Strength In Vietnam Below 384,000 Withdrawing GIs Top Nixon Timetable

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command announced today it is running several days ahead of President Nixon's timetable for reduction of American forces in Vietnam.

A spokesman said a military withdrawal timetable in the country has dropped below the 384,000 men that Nixon ordered reached by Thursday. He said precise figures were not available but would be announced next Monday.

Since Nixon announced the first American troop withdrawals from Vietnam in June 1969, U.S. strength has been reduced about 160,000 men from a peak of 542,000 in April 1968. The President has announced that total American troops will be reduced another 100,000 during the next six months, bringing U.S. strength to less than 384,000 by next May.

Sources in Saigon have hinted that this may be accelerated and more than 100,000 men may be withdrawn from the American force. Combat divisions are now being positioned in the interior of South Vietnam for the next phases of Nixon's withdrawal program.

The U.S. Command released an official weekly military strength summary today that said 384,000 American troops were in the country. It also said that since the date including Army and Marine units have reached the withdrawal timetable, the Oct. 15 ceiling of 384,000, a spokesman said.

During the past 24 hours, units leaving Vietnam included detachments from the 7th and 11th Marine Brigades, the 1st Brigade of the 9th Infantry Division, the 19th Infantry Brigade and the 2nd Squadron, 1st Cavalry.

Headquarters said American strength in Vietnam was at the lowest since Dec. 24, 1966, when there were 376,400 U.S. troops in the battle zone.

The strength summary gave this breakdown as of last Thursday: Army 202,280; Navy 18,790; Marines 27,600; Air Force 45,900, and Coast Guard 100. This does not include about 22,000 Navy men of the 7th Fleet and 9th Coast Guard aboard ships operating off the coast of Vietnam.

The U.S. Command also announced that the Air Force two-engine F-105s are being withdrawn from the theater to be used to work targets for bombers and for armed reconnaissance.

The Command did not specify the mission of the planes, but the F-105s are used to work targets for bombers and for armed reconnaissance.

Headquarters also announced the loss of two American helicopters in South Vietnam. The helicopters were shot down by Communist forces over the weekend, killing one U.S. crewman and wounding another.

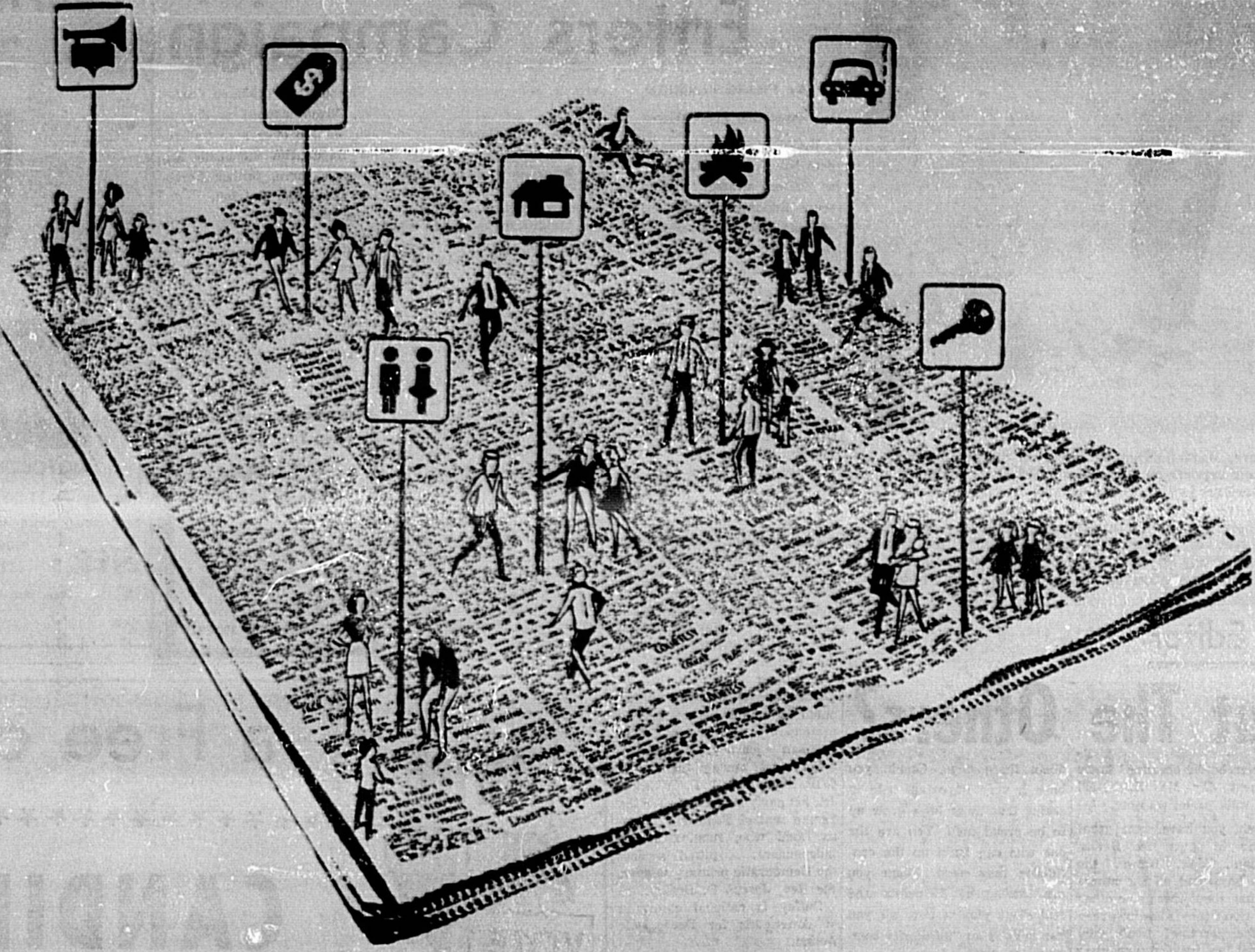

Books, Lectures Bring In \$\$

Dissenters Bite Hand That Feeds

 NEW YORK (AP) — Leaders of the nation's various anti-establishment groups are finding that the hand they are biting is feeding them, too.

Through best-selling books, high-priced lecture appearances and other by-products of their rebellion, the top names of such organizations as the Yippies, Women's Libs, and the Black Panthers are grossing profits which have mounted into the tens of thousands.

They say, however, the big money is not lining their pockets. Instead it is going into the coffers of the various branches of The Movement.

"It's not my role to be rich. It's happened accidentally," says Yippie leader Jerry Rubin, whose best-selling book "Do It!" has sold more than 200,000 copies at \$2.45. Based on standard author's royalties, he can figure to earn more than \$50,000.

Rubin points out that because his publisher issues royalty checks only twice a year, he has not yet seen a penny of profit. But when the money comes on Feb. 1:

"I may burn it. I may hand it out for free... Any way to completely and thoroughly destroy capitalism," he says.

Abbie Hoffman, a confederate with Rubin in the Chicago 7 trial and a cofounder of the Yippies, said, "When a revolution has been made, he's got to give it away."

Hoffman's two books—"Woodstock Nation" and "Revolution for the Hell of It"—both of which advocates his goal "to create chaos in the ruling class," have grossed him some \$75,000. After contract fees, publishing costs and miscellaneous expenses, he claims his actual earnings have been divided up as follows: \$25,000 for Black Panther defense funds, \$10,000 for ball money for other revolutionaries, several times \$10,000 for Chicago trial expenses.

Hoffman and Rubin also say they are committed to giving at least \$5,000 a month to the Youth International Party—Yippies—for assorted "projects."

Asked about the use of Establishment channels to further their cause, Hoffman quoted Lenin: "When capitalism hangs itself, it will be the bourgeoisie who sell the rope."

However, in an effort to eliminate such "straight" institu-

tions, Hoffman and others formed their own speakers' bureau, offering such luminaries as themselves, lawyer William Kunstler, women's movement activist Shulamith Firestone, and Jo Freeman, and rock writer Richard Goldstein.

"It's absurd to book through the going lecture bureaus and let them rip off 25-30 per cent of radical speakers," says Robert Lamb, office manager of The Movement Speakers' Bureau in New York. He said that with MoveSpeak—as it is known—the speaker would get 75 per cent, the bureau, 25. And all profits beyond office costs would be voted back into every one's favorite Movement cause.

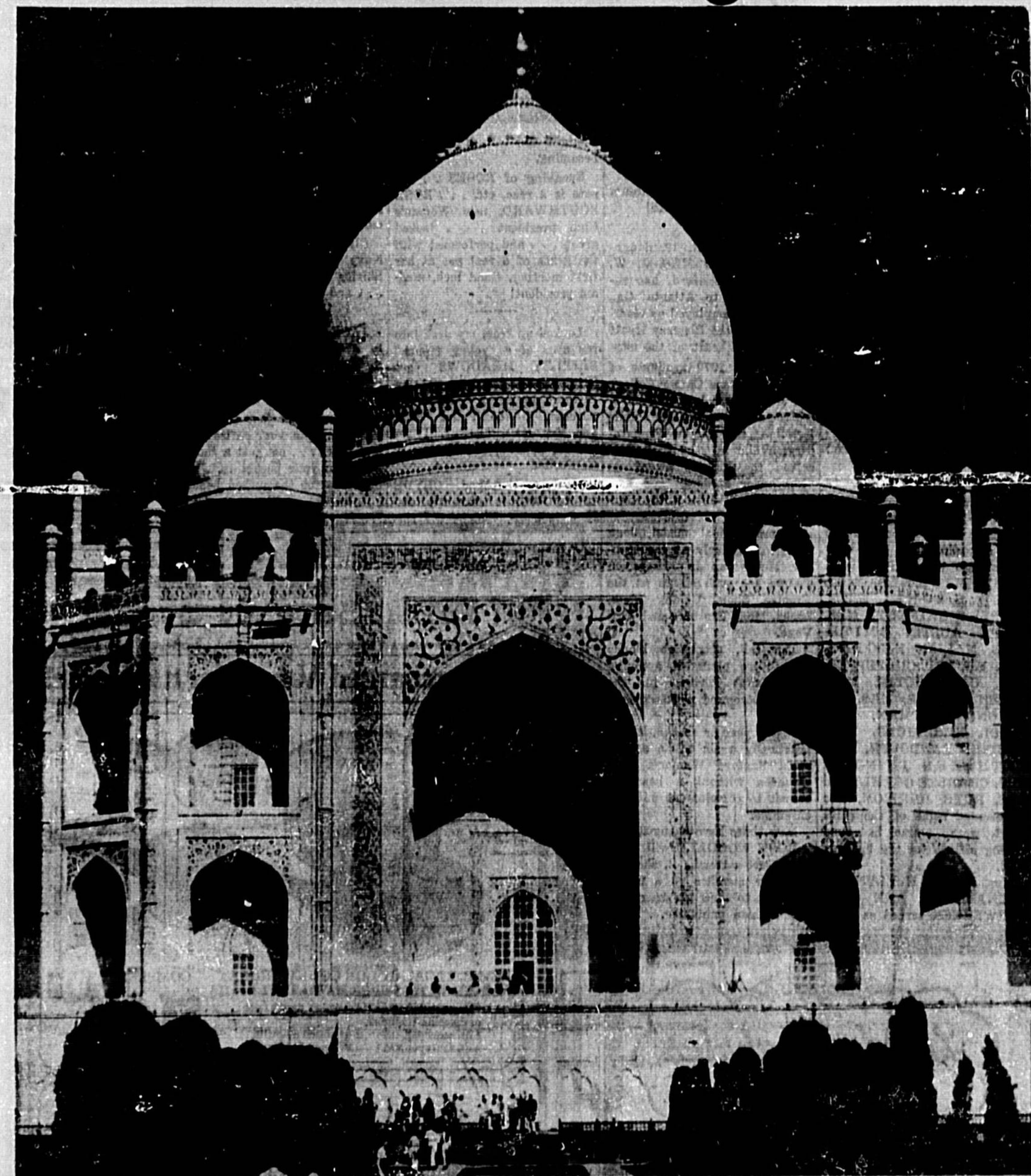
In the past, radical speakers have commanded fees up to \$2,000 an appearance.

A handful of other Movement leaders share financial success in publishing. Panther author Eldridge Cleaver's book, "Soul on Ice," has sold some 120,000 hardbound copies—at \$5.95—and nearly 2 million in paperback. And that doesn't count the 100,000 copies of his "Writings" for another publisher.

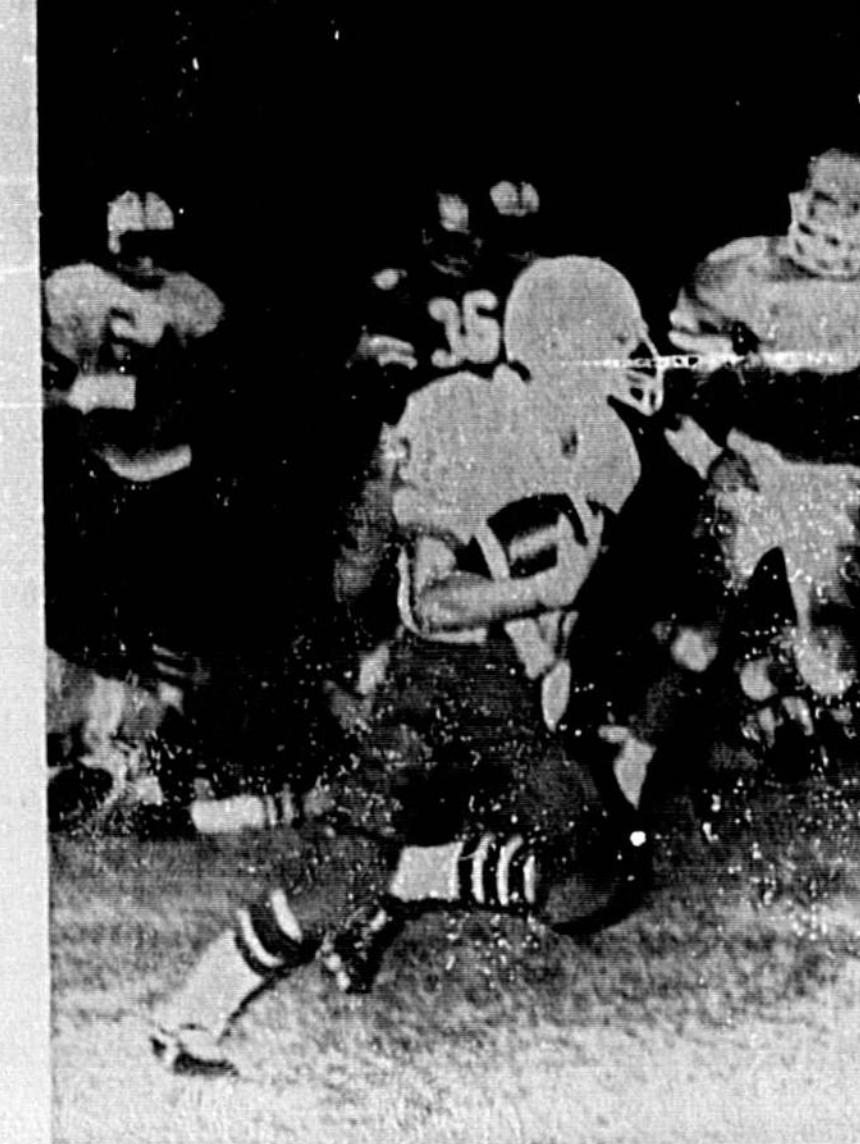

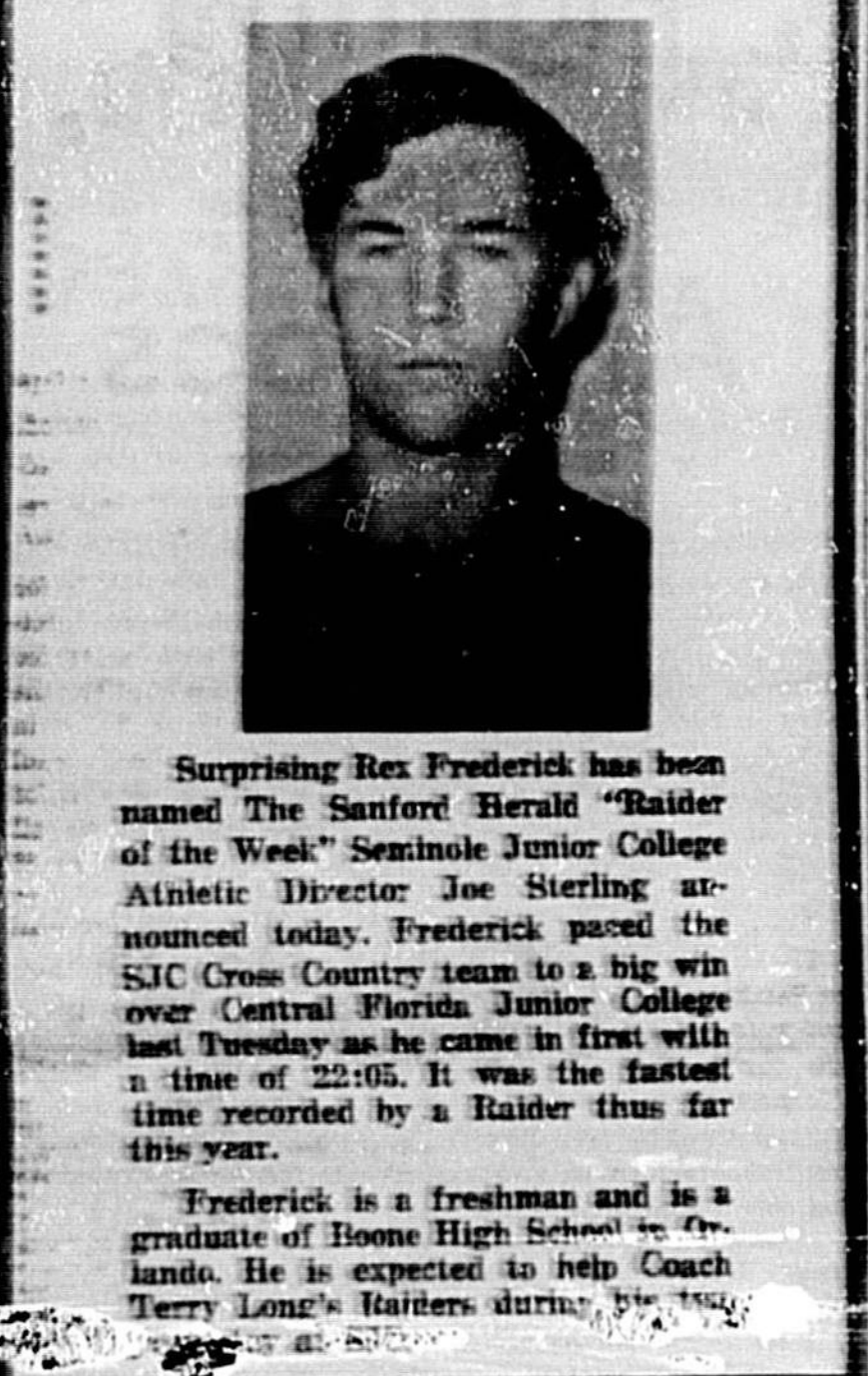

"I would share the symbol use if I got it," Koenig said Thursday. "I don't expect to make a profit out of it. I just believe that the symbol and the name PEACE in our clothes would make us better known than if our merchandise said Jones or Smith or something."

Peace organizations claim the symbol was first used in England in 1838 during the first Alderman election to ban the bomb. The sign stands the semaphore signals for the letters "N" and "D" which stood for nuclear disarmament.

A counter claim has also come forward pinpointing the symbol's origin to the Baraceni invasion of Spain in the year 11.

For Needed Rights-Of-Way SR-46, 436 Land Purchases OK'd

County Commissioners this morning adopted a resolution authorizing the State Department of Transportation to proceed with acquisition of rights-of-way on SR 436 and SR 46 and to expend all necessary funds from the county secondary road program with any necessary adjustments to be made at the expense of other projects.

According to Al Davis, state planning engineer, the problem arose in funds for acquiring the rights-of-way and four-footing 436 because a \$40,000 figure was erroneously entered into the budget, where as the figure was actually for rights-of-way in Orange County from Arapka to the Seminole County line.

Hospital Educational Director OK'd

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees last night approved the hiring of a hospital educational director.

In a motion by Dr. Harold Miller, trustee, the board approved to have Robert Beszner, hospital administrator, set up qualifications and a job description for an educator, who would have charge of the medical facility's public relations, audio-visual, employee and patient education programs and to work with persons and organizations toward receiving endorsements for the hospital.

No salary was mentioned for the position. The trustees reaffirmed an earlier action made at the request of Charles Lansing, trustee, and voted to move the hospital's bank account from the bank at Oviedo to another unspecified banking house where the account would draw a high

rate of interest. Lansing explained that at the Oviedo bank a 4.5 per cent interest was most the account. He stated it is possible for an account, which is \$120,000 deposited in a savings account, would draw 7.5 per cent at other banking institutions.

Dr. Thomas Largen, trustee, discussed a proposal for the 23 hospital staff doctors under 60-years-of-age, who are charged with the responsibility of running the facility's room on a regular rotating basis.

He stated that a plan whereby doctors would receive \$100 for working a 24-hour period was being discussed. This would enable the physician on call to elect to work his shift or give the amount to another doctor in case he does not desire to "pull" the rotating arrangement.

Dr. Largen said he felt the board should take no action on the proposal until the recommendation of the hospital staff is made known.

Garbage 'Tote' Act Is Amended

Sanford City Commission, faced with mounting opposition from the city's residents, last night amended the recently passed city ordinance which allows backyards to collect refuse for those residents willing to pay an extra 50 cents a month.

By a three-two vote, the commission amended its ordinance, which had been scheduled for a second reading, and voted to allow those persons opposing the change to curb pickups to retain the backyard collection privilege they come to the city hall and sign a request for the service and agree to pay a \$2.50 monthly refuse bill, instead of the \$2 a month bill to be paid by those persons who continue to carry the refuse to the street.

Tio-Breaking Vote On a motion by Commissioner Thomas McDonald, seconded by Commissioner J. A. Crapp and with Mayor Lee P. Moore casting the tie-breaking vote, the commission approved the change, which will now require that a new city ordinance be drawn exempting those residents paying the extra fee from having to "tote" their refuse cans to the curb.

Mayor Moore said the change might cost more than 50 cents a month to administer. Knowles said the problem was locating labor willing to do the work and he added that an increase in pay for the refuse workers has not solved problems of finding people willing to tote garbage.

During discussion it was brought out that private garbage collection cost \$4 monthly while the city offer the same backyard collection at \$2.50 a month fee.

Another Dock Unit Said Sinking

Sanford City Commission last night tabled a request from Cobia Bosta, Inc., affiliated with Monroe Harbour, Inc., leasee of the city-owned lakefront marina, to either replace or pay for the replacement costs of another sinking dock unit in west harbor.

In a letter to the city manager, Carl Deeter, Cobia vice president and general manager, advised the unit had been taking on water since last Fall and pumping has been required to keep the dock from sinking.

Deeter's letter stated, "It is not taking on water so fast regular pumping will not keep it afloat and in our opinion needs replacing."

Deeter stated that failure to replace it immediately and strong wave action in the harbor could result in damage to the connecting floats. Monroe Harbour can't replace the float and then submit you a bill or the city can replace the float," Deeter advised.
