NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 12—(AP)—For bringing Vanderbilt from mediocrity to greatness in a single year, youthful Henry R. Sanders yesterday was awarded as the Southeastern Conference's outstanding football coach of 1941.

The honor came to Sanders in the Nashville Banner's annual poll of conference coaches to name the one of their number who turned in the outstanding performance of the season.

Sanders ran up a total of 61 points, including five of 12 first place ballots cast, to lead the field. Runnersup were Wally Butts of Georgia with 55 points, John Barnhill of Tennessee with 53 and Allyn McKernan of Mississippi State, last year's winner, with 35.

British And Dutch Ships Destroy Two Of Italy's Cruisers

85,000 Germans Are Reported Killed As Reds Announce Complete Victory

Nazis Sustain Losses In Libya

Winter Aids Reds In Their Routing Of Hitler's Armies

A pack of British and Dutch destroyers, pouncing with sudden, effective fire on two Italian cruisers in the Mediterranean, sank one and left the other burning from stem to stern, the Admiralty announced today. Thus, with an Italian cruiser believed to have been sunk by a British submarine yesterday, the entire flotilla of three Italian cruisers apparently has been destroyed.

London announced today that forces driving west from Tobruk, have cut off the Axis, thus cutting Axis attempts to reach Derna and Benghazi.

From Cairo, a report said a new and destructive British offensive was proceeding deep in the German desert last night, supported by point-blank warship shelling of the Axis base of Derna and other base naval action.

Germany was said to have thrown 13 tank divisions, 18 infantry divisions and five motorized infantry divisions into the "second general offensive" against Moscow that started Nov. 16.

The plan was to strike at Moscow from the north, south and west, encircling and capturing the city.

Up to Dec. 8, our forces conducted fierce defensive battles, holding back attacks by enemy shock groups on the flanks and repulsing artillery thrusts, the communiqué explained.

"On Dec. 8, our troops on the western front, having worn down the enemy, launched counter-offensives against the enemy tanks," it continued.

As a result of this offensive both enemy tank groups have been routed and are rapidly retreating, leaving behind a trail of wreckage and suffering serious losses.

Approximately 50 miles west of Tobruk through two days of bloody combats the British and Dutch forces of the British Eighth Army, including a German tank regiment, have once again broken through the German lines and are now driving westward.

The notice concerned a resolution that was adopted by the House committee in 1937, which authorized the project on a favorable report by the United States Engineering Department.

Bill Is Passed For Many New Fighting Ships

Congress Calls For 30 Percent Increase In Navy

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—In swift reaction to the Japanese stroke at Pearl Harbor, the administration yesterday passed a bill authorizing the construction of seven or eight 45,000-ton battleships and about 100 other fighting ships — an overall increase of 30 per cent in the two-ocean navy.

The bill was offered in the Senate just before that branch passed a \$1,072,250,000 measure to expand all military activities.

Company D Honors Captain Runge At Party At Blanding

House Is Urged To Pass Draft Act Extensions

Men From 19 To 44 Would Be Liable For Army Service Under Bill Rules

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP) Secretary of War Stimson urged the House Military Committee to approve promptly far-reaching extensions of the draft act to provide "a great pool of men" to meet any emergency.

In a letter to Chairman McLaughlin (D-Ky.) as the committee opens hearings of legislation to register all men from 19 to 44, inclusive, liable for military duty, Mr. Stimson said:

"The broad purpose of the bill is to provide a framework into which we can steadily and solidly build the structure which will accomplish victory," he added.

Brig. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, estimated that 10,000,000 between the ages of 19 and 44, inclusive, would be available for Army or Navy duty.

Army Calls For Men To Join Air Corps

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The Army Recruiting Service appealed today for 20,000 applicants monthly for aviation cadet training. Recruits must be between 20 and 28 years of age. Also sought are 150,000 more men between 18 and 25 for the Air Corps and its service branches. Particularly called for were 6,000 experienced automobile mechanics from non-essential war industries.

Chairman Urges Buying Of Seals

"Christmas seals are definitely a part of the defense program. They are on sale now and will provide for the defense of military and civilian people throughout the year," Mrs. E. L. DeJoy, Chairman of the Tuberculosis Seal Drive, said this morning in urging all those to action who have not yet sent in money to the local headquarters for seals.

Waves of Japanese planes bombed Nichols Field and native sections at Manila today despite fierce resistance by U. S. fighters. Reports indicate several Jap planes were shot down. Tokyo claims the sinking of the 32,600 ton Arizona, in action off Hawaii while the U. S. Navy Department is silent.

Marines still are holding out on Wake and Midway islands despite heavy Jap attacks by air and sea. The Army says the Japs were wiped out at Lingayen.

A Singapore communiqué says Dutch submarines sank four full-loaded Jap troopships off southern Thailand.

Bulgaria formally declared war on the U. S. today.

America's First Hero

When Floridians first heard that the 29,000-ton Japanese battleship Haruna had been sunk, their morale soared to new heights, but when they read that the man who sent his torpedo crashing into the side of the big ship at the sacrifice of his own life was a native Floridian, they were proud, though sad, indeed.

Captain Colin Kelly thus becomes the first American hero of World War II. No greater honor can come to any man than that he gave his life for his country. Captain Kelly did this with a reckless abandon and a courageous spirit that stirs the emotions to their very depths. He did it at a time when Americans everywhere were sorely feeling the need of stimulating news.

During the past twenty years many of us had almost lost faith in human nature, in the fundamental strength of the American people. We had seen the selfishness of the twenties rife the savings of widows and orphans. National idols turned out to have feet of clay. The men we elected to public office soon lost the respect of the people. Petty strikes and discord shook our confidence in mankind.

We wondered about the younger generation. Were their school buses and playgrounds, their planned recreation, their clubs, societies and fraternities, their swing bands and jitterbugging, their NYAs and their jook joints, giving us a generation of pampered weaklings whose only thought was of themselves and what they could get out of life while their responsibilities to their families, their fellow man and to their country were forgotten?

Captain Kelly has answered that question in a grand and glorious manner. He has proved the younger generation with the Supreme Sacrifice. Twenty-six years of age, single-handed and unaided, he sank the first Japanese battleship. The men who fought at Chateau Thierry, at San Juan Hill and Bull Run take off their hats to him. There was a man.

Infant Deaths

One reason Florida ranks so far behind most other progressive states in the matter of health is because of its inadequate hospital facilities. "Infant deaths," the Times continues, "are 56.3 per 1,000 live births in Florida, compared to a national average of 48. Stillbirths are 45.5 in Florida, compared to a national average of 32. Syphilis deaths are 24.1 per 100,000 population in Florida, compared with 15 in the nation."
"These are shocking figures," concludes the Times. "We can take no pride in this record, but we can do something about it to see that it does not recur."

Jap Planes Bomb Nichols Field And Civilians

Fernando and Lt. Lingayon had been beaten down to defeat and only at two points in the north and northeast extremes of the island, presumably about Vigan itself, and in the vicinity of Legaspi in the extreme south, did the invader stand on American soil.
Fifth columnists set off red flares in Manila last night in a new outbreak of fifth column activity and rifles blazed in the blackout and sentries fired under orders of "shoot to kill."
The rockets were sighted from downtown Manila early in the evening and others were seen from the Bay front.

Sentries and members of the constabulary under orders to enforce the blackout and ask no questions, fired on several houses from which lights could be seen. Pedestrians and motorists who failed to respond to challenges after the curfew hour also drew rifle shots from the sentries.
The flares lasted for several hours in the districts. There a large neon-lighted clock stop a sign flashed on and was promptly shot out.
More than 500 Europeans have been arrested in a round-up of Italians and Germans.

In the Hongkong and Singapore British theaters, the Japanese were inching forward. Japanese military headquarters said today its troops have occupied the island of Hongkong and British territory being held in the island of New Britain and are preparing for an attack upon the island colony. This is on the island of New Britain, the Japanese big post Asia naval base.

The Japanese announcement said Kowloon was occupied yesterday.
Latest British advice prior to the Japanese announcement said heavy Japanese bombers had forced Hongkong's defenders to withdraw toward Kowloon, which is in the mainland section of greater Hongkong.

The island of Hongkong itself is a strongly fortified fortress with numerous defense positions built from the island's granite and rock surface.
British planes struck heavy blows at the Japanese advanced operations base in Southern Thailand. The enemy began a strong push into Borneo Malaysia after 24 hours of comparative inaction, following destruction of their original presence there.

Every British plane returned from a second assault on Hsaocong, 60 miles north of the British-Malayan border, where the Japanese landed Dec. 9, unopposed by the Siamese.
Official reports said the Japanese succeeded in landing three or four planes and strafing a number of points east and south of the Thai border where heavy but confused fighting continued all day in an area broken by rough, jungle-clad hills.
British aircraft over Malaya found no evidence that the Japanese were attempting further disembarkations or trying to reinforce the units landed earlier at Kota Bharu and Kelantan.
The push which the Japanese pursued today, was expected late today to be at Sandakan, a Malayan Malay area bordering on Thailand.
Fighting the British island off Western Malaya, again was attacked today morning, but there was no material damage to military objectives.

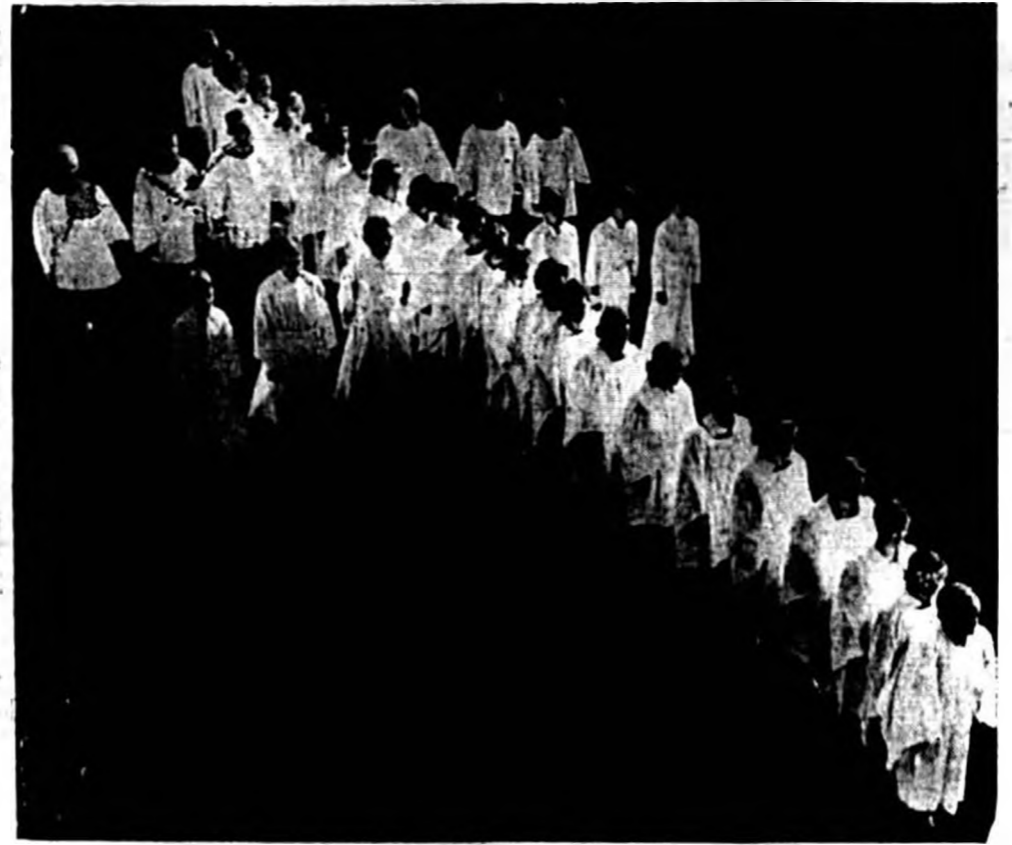

WHAT TO DO IN AN AIR RAID

Official—by the U. S. Office of Civilian Defense



1. KEEP COOL

Above all, keep cool. Don't lose your head. Do not crowd the streets, avoid chaos, prevent disorder and havoc.

You can fool the enemy. It is easy. If planes come over, stay where you are. Don't phone unnecessarily. The chance you will be hit is small. It is part of the risk we must take to win this war.

Until an alarm, go about your usual business and recreation in the ordinary way.

Think twice before you do anything. Don't believe rumors—spreading false rumors is part of the enemy's technique. Don't let him take you in.

Know your air-raid warning. In general, it is short blasts or rising and falling pitch, on whistles or horns. The "all clear" is a steady tone for 2 minutes. Watch this paper for description of the local signal. (This is subject to change.)

Await official information before taking any action. When the Air Raid Warden comes to your home, do what he tells you. He is for your protection. He is your friend.

He will help you do your part to whip the enemy.

We can do it. We will do it, if we stay calm and cool and strong and alert.



2. STAY HOME

The safest place in an air raid is at home.

If you are away from home, get under cover in the nearest shelter. Avoid crowded places. Stay off the streets.

The enemy wants you to run out into the streets, create a mob, start a panic. Don't do it!

If incendiary bombs fall, play a spray from a garden hose (never a splash or stream) of water on the bomb. Switch to a stream to put out any fire started by the bomb. Switch back to a spray for the bomb. The bomb will burn for about 15 minutes if left alone, only about 2 minutes under a fine water spray. A jet splash, stream or bucket of water will make it explode.

Under raid conditions, keep a bathtub and buckets full of water for the use of the fire department in case water mains are broken.

If you have a soda-and-acid extinguisher (the kind you turn upside down), use it with your finger over the nozzle to make a spray. Don't use the chemical kind (small cylinders of liquid) on bombs. It is all right for ordinary fires.

But above all, keep cool, stay home.

Choose one member of the family to be the home air-raid warden—who will remember all the rules and what to do. Mother makes the best.



3. PUT OUT LIGHTS

Whether or not black-out is ordered, don't show more light than is necessary. If planes come over, put out or cover all lights at once—don't wait for the black-out order. The light that can't be seen will never guide a Jap. Remember a candle light may be seen for miles from the air.

If you have portieres, overdrapes, or curtains, arrange a double thickness over your windows. Blankets will do. If you have heavy black paper, paste it on your windows. Don't crowd or stampede stores to get it, however. You probably have everything you need at home. Be ingenious—improvise!

Should you get an air-raid warning, remember to shut off gas stoves, gas furnaces, and gas pilot lights on both. Bomb explosions may blow them out, blast effect. Gas that collects may be explosive later!

Prepare one room, the one with the least window glass, in the strongest part of your house, for a refuge room. Put food and drinking water in it. Put a sturdy table in it. Put mattresses and chairs in it. Take a magazine or two and a deck of cards, into it. Take things like eyeglasses and dentures with you when you go into it. Take toilet facilities, paper, a screen. If you have a portable radio, take that too. Above all, keep calm. Stay at home. Put out lights.



4. LIE DOWN

If bombs start to fall near you, lie down. You will feel the blast least that way, escape fragments or splashes.

The safest place is under a good desk table—the stronger the legs the better.

A mattress under a table affords comfort with safety.

The enemy may use explosive bombs or incendiary bombs, or both. If incendiary bombs fall, it's more important to deal with them than to be safe from them. So do what is necessary with a spray (never a splash or stream) of water, then go back to safety under a table in a refuge room.

Don't make any noise or cover in your immediate neighborhood in a dark room. However, stay under cover till the "all clear" is sounded.

Remember, "all clear". Official news of "all clear" will come from your Air Raid Warden. Don't believe rumors. Watch this paper for the "all clear" description.



5. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS

Glass shatters easily, so stay away from windows.

Don't go to windows and look out in an air raid. It's a dangerous thing, and helps the enemy. The Air Raid Warden is out there watching for you. Don't let him see you, not if planes come over.

At night, there is danger of being caught in blast from incendiary bombs.

Antiaircraft fire means falling bombs. You are safer if it indoors, away from windows. It is more important to be in a place than it is to see it from a window.

Stay in your refuge room, away from windows. This is the safest place. Go there at the first alarm, stay there till "all clear".

Above all, keep calm. Stay at home. Put out lights.



6. YOU CAN HELP

Strong, calm service. If you know what to do, you can help. If you have a portable radio, take that too. Above all, keep calm. Stay at home. Put out lights.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS our country has been violently attacked and forced into a war of vast proportions, which will inevitably bring grief and distress to many and self-sacrifice to all; and WHEREAS for more than sixty years the American National Red Cross has played a vital role in binding up the wounds of the injured, in sheltering, feeding, and clothing the homeless, in securing the distressed, in rebuilding broken lives, and in rehabilitating the victims of catastrophes of nature and of war; and WHEREAS in preparation for just such an emergency as we are now facing, the American National Red Cross has been spending funds at the rate of more than one million dollars a month, which is but a small fraction of the amount that the organization now requires to carry out effectively its functions as an essential auxiliary of our armed forces, particularly as a friendly liaison in welfare problems between the man in service and his family at home, and as a key agency in the civil-defense plans;

NOW THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, and President of the American National Red Cross, do hereby publish the beginning, as of this date, of a Red Cross War Fund Campaign for the raising of a minimum sum of fifty million dollars; and I appeal to the American people to make this campaign an overwhelming success. Realizing the desire of every American to participate in the national war effort, I cordially anticipate an immediate and spontaneous response to this appeal.

House Group Passes Bill To Aid Navy

One Billion Dollars Is Loaned By U. S. Through Nov. 30 To 33 Countries

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—(AP)—Authorization for an expansion of the United States' two-ocean navy was quickly approved by the House Naval Affairs Committee today after the size of the contemplated increase was reduced from 800,000 tons to 100,000 tons at the request of the Navy.

High up on the list is legislation authorizing President Roosevelt to use some of the war time powers granted to Woodrow Wilson two decades ago. These powers would permit the President to centralize control of all communication and transportation systems, put a statutory ban on trading with enemy aliens, and to shift various functions of government agencies to coordinate the war effort.
