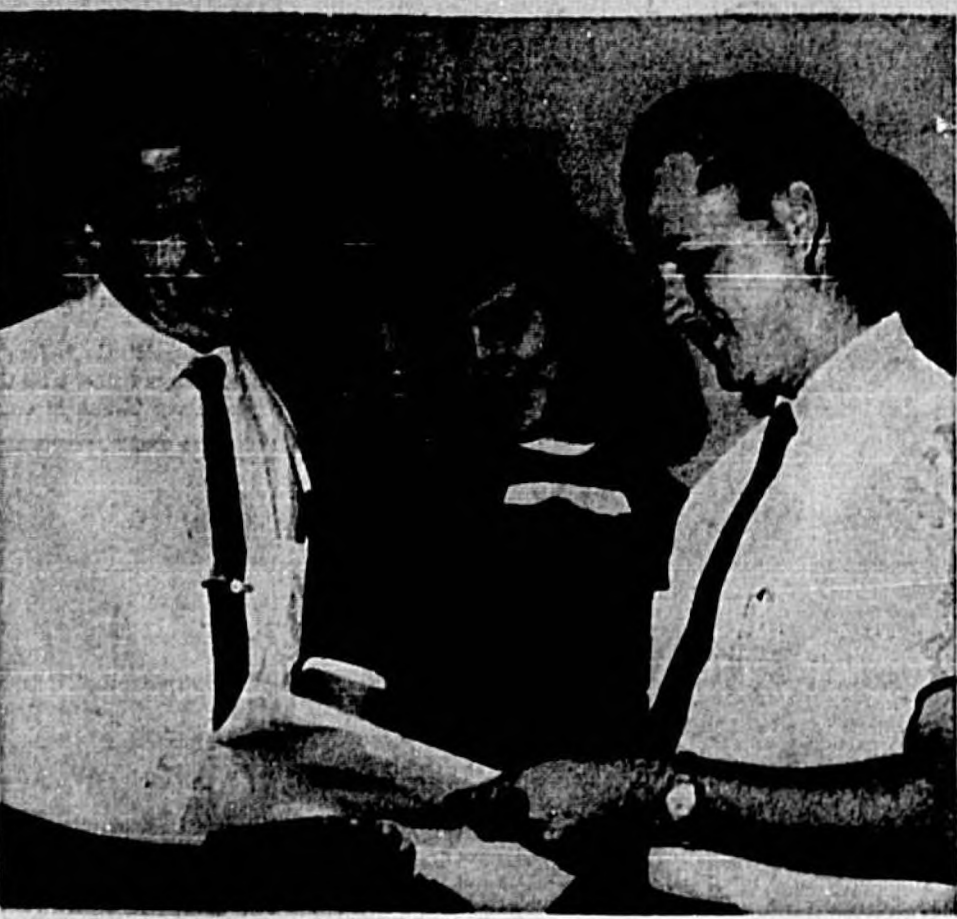

John Birch Aims Outlined To JCs

Sanford-Seminole Jaycees heard a talk on the John Birch Society Thursday by Rev. Philip Blair Jones, coordinator of the society from Houston, Texas, who is in town for a lecture Saturday evening.

A former Sanford resident, Jones defined the John Birch Society as "a bunch of individuals" believing in less government and more individual responsibility.

He reviewed briefly the history of the so-called "right-wing" organization, which was named for John Birch, a Baptist missionary in China, who served as an intelligence officer for Gen. Clare Chennault during World War II. He was killed by the Communists 10 days after the war against Japan ended, and is the first known victim of the "cold war."

Jones defined an extreme right winger as "anyone who advocates a blockade of Cuba before Oct. 22, 1963," and asked the audience to learn the facts about the John Birch Society before condemning it.

He said that the society does not believe in the policies of containment, co-existence or cooperation with the Soviet Union;

He outlined some of the aims of the organization, such as getting the United Nations out of the United States and vice versa, impeaching Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Earl Warren, blockading Cuba and getting the government out of competition with private enterprise.

He said that Red China should have a seat in the UN . . . curs!

The John Birch Society is in favor of federal fiscal responsibility and is alarmed at the fact that, according to Sen. Byrd of Virginia, the national debt has reached the astronomical figure of one trillion, 250 billion dollars.

The society is against giving foreign aid to Communist countries and so called "neutralist" nations.

He warned the group that they could get cradle-to-the-grave security from the federal government but they would be surrendering their freedom.

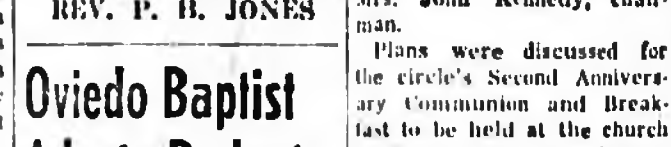

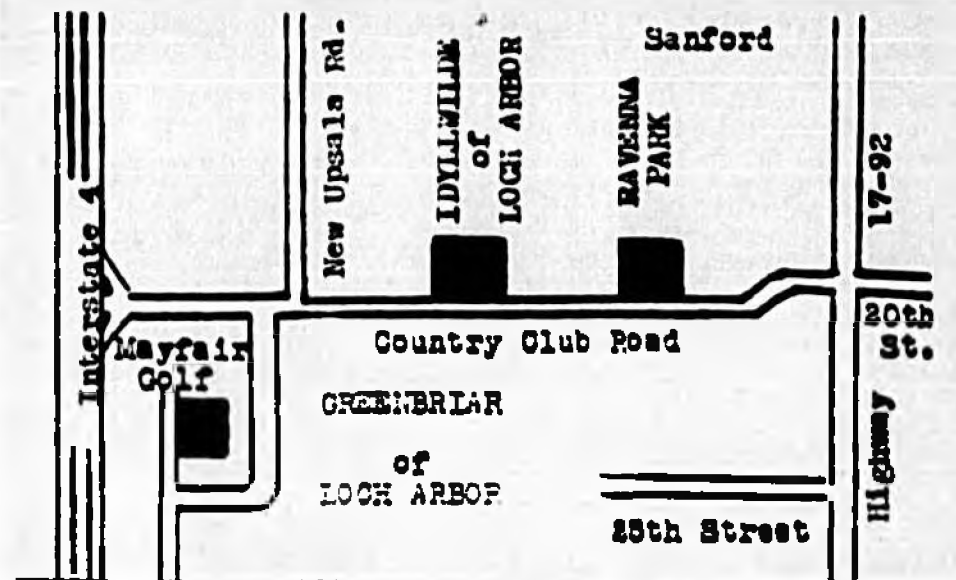

The Baby Seminoles exploded for a pair of quick touchdowns during the third period of last night's appearance at Sanford's Memorial Stadium and posted a 18 to 0 decision over a stubborn kennel of DeLand High School Bullpups.

Approximately 1,500 fans braved a chill breeze to see the little Tribe, led by Sonny Messer, Bernie Harbour and Rick Walstrom, extend its current win streak to 26 consecutive junior varsity victories.

The little Seminoles recorded nine first downs as they picked up 83 yards on the ground—12 of them by Messer—and capitalized on Harbour's articulate right wing who completed six of a dozen aerials for another 81 yards.

Early in the fourth period halfback Ernie Baumeister took a DeLand punt on his own 48 and scampered 52 yards for a TD but the play was nullified when the Seminoles roughed up the Bullpup punter.

About two minutes later Nopper thrilled the fans when he latched onto a Bullpup pass on his own 25 and went 41 yards for a TD, only to have this effort nullified by a clipping penalty. The locals had a bad night in the penalty department. They lost 75 yards via this route and undoubtedly this was one of the key factors in the ball game.

The little Tribe will have to get plenty of rest over the weekend since they go right back into action Tuesday night in the same ball orchard against the Baby Bulls of Daytona's Mainland High.

He arrived to find his two daughters fatally injured by a car that struck them as they walked across the road getting off a bus.

Delores Mary Damron, 11, and Darlene Carol Damron, 12, died hours later at a hospital.

Mme. Nhu Blasts JFK 'Liberalism'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mme. Nho Nhu, defending the policies of her family in South Viet Nam, has charged that the Kennedy administration apparently "is following the new fashion of liberalism which is much closer to communism than we are."

Mme. Nhu, speaking in a television interview Sunday, said she was led to this conclusion by recent trends in United States policies in her troubled country.

She appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press."

In fact, she blamed the present tension between the regime of her brother-in-law, Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem, and the U. S. government on the fact that "we are more strongly anti-communist than you are."

Mme. Nhu, 38, began the second week of her U. S. lecture tour today with three scheduled appearances. She was to have lunch at the New York Times and later fly to Boston for talks at Radcliffe College and Harvard University in Cambridge.

Rescue workers said a mass of more than 30 million cubic yards of earth is sliding down the side of Mt. Tofe at a rate of about one foot an hour.

They said the earth was part of the reservoir, which was divided into two parts by the giant landslide that devastated the Piave Valley Wednesday night.

Wheat Sale Savings Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman estimates the United States will save about \$200 million in storage costs by selling U. S. wheat to Russia.

Freeman estimates are based on pending Soviet purchases of between 150 to 200 million bushels, which would only make a dent in the 1.2 billion bushel U. S. surplus stockpile now stored in American granaries.

The Agriculture Department indicated today that Russia and other Communist countries might purchase as much as 250 million bushels of U. S. wheat.

A weekly publication by the department's Foreign Agricultural Service said that "inquiries in recent weeks have indicated that around 250 million bushels may be involved, with the Soviet Union apparently interested in about 130 million."

School Bus Driver Cited

Trooper J. L. Sikes reported today that Mrs. Florence Watts, school bus driver, was cited for failure to yield the right-of-way when her bus, loaded with Lyman High School band members Friday evening, collided with a car driven by Ronald Payne, Maitland, at Seminola Boulevard and Highway 17-92.

Karl Hits Present Legislative Lineup

DAYTONA BEACH (UPI)—State Rep. Fred R. Karl became the second candidate in Florida's 1964 gubernatorial race Sunday with a slap against present legislative re-appointment.

Karl, who joined State Sen. John Matthews Jr. of Jacksonville in the race, said he would fight to get the big-city voter just as much voice in state government as small-town citizens.

In a bid for the Metropolitan vote, the 35-year-old Daytona Beach attorney predicted the U. S. Supreme Court will nullify the state's present apportionment of 44 senators and 112 representatives. If it

doesn't, Karl said, he'll fight the setup when it goes to the polls next year.

Karl's move leaves three unannounced candidates—but almost sure-fire bets for the race—in State Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland, former State Sen. Fred O. Dickson of West Palm Beach, and Jacksonville Mayor Hayden Burns.

Karl said the fact that both he and Matthews are close friends and have similar philosophies on government will be tough on their mutual friends, but the end result will probably hurt Burns' chances.

"Matthews has weakened the position of Mayor Burns and in my travels I find this is of real concern to the Burns people," he said.

Karl designated Albert Cowan, Ormond Beach banker, as his campaign treasurer, and the Ormond Beach National Bank as his depository.

He estimated it will take \$500,000 to \$1 million to wage a successful campaign and said he has sufficient financial commitments to make a go of it.

Three School Trustees Qualify

Don Bales, Ray Slaton and Fred Bistime have qualified to succeed themselves for school trustee in the Nov. 5 election. It was reported today by Supt. R. T. Milwee.

The superintendent also reported preliminary plans for a new shop building at Seminole High School have been forwarded to Tallahassee for state approval.

Designed by Architect John A. Burton IV, the building will house woodworking, basic electricity, art and metal, and drafting.

Team Visits 4 College Sites

Florida's enrollment in institutions of higher learning will more than double within the next seven years to an estimated 200,000, it was reported this morning by Dr. J. Broward Culpepper, executive director of the State Board of Control.

Dr. Culpepper predicted the enrollment will expand from the present 95,000 to 200,000 by 1970, if the Legislature and state school building program keep pace with the State's estimated population growth.

The state officer made his prediction in briefing local leaders on the state's desires and needs for the location of a four-year state university in East Central Florida.

Attending the briefing were city and county officers, Chamber of Commerce officials, officers of Longwood, Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, North Orlando and Oviedo, engineers and property owners.

Dr. Culpepper further stated that six of the nine counties in East Central Florida have "offered such interesting sites for this new university that we would like to place a school in each county." He said that that was a "prophetic statement" because of the state's population boom.

Gen. J. C. Hutchison, County Commission chairman, speaking for the entire county, promised Dr. Culpepper and his site inspection team—Jerry Jones, Jack Sutton and Forrest Kelly — the county "will go all out" to cooperate as far as possible in providing water, sewerage, utilities, recreation site and other required facilities.

The inspection team, which last month visited the Lake Aida site proposed by the City of Sanford, was to spend today and Tuesday inspecting four more sites in Seminole County and will inspect two in Orange County next week to complete its viewing of 23 sites offered by the six counties.

The board already has promised a decision of a site selection at its Nov. 8 or Dec. 6 meeting. Seminole County voters will vote Nov. 5 on permissive legislation permitting the county to proceed with a site acquisition should the state choose one in this county.

The inspection team was being taken on a guided tour today of sites at Geneva, on Lake Howell, southeast of Casselberry, one offering grants by C. S. Lee surrounding Chuluota, and the fourth south of Lake Jessup and west of Oviedo.

Also, during their visit here the state officers were to be flown by Navy helicopter over all five sites.

Man Claims His Stray \$14,000

LAKE WORTH (UPI)—Retired carpenter Bert Wallime arrived today and claimed \$14,000 he had left in a suitcase on a bus in Georgia last week.

Wallime, formerly of Duluth, Minn., was headed for Florida on the bus when he saw some boys looking at him and thought they were going to kill him and take his money.

He got off at Cartersville, Ga., to get help, but forgot the suitcase.

A native of Finland who speaks little English, he was unable to make his plight understood until a local man who spoke Finnish was found.

Authorities then telephoned ahead and had the Lake Worth police hold the suitcase for him.

Police said Wallime immediately put the money in a bank when he picked it up today.

"I think he learned at this late stage in life that the best place for money is in the bank," Detective Sgt. William Mackenzie said.

VAH-7 Gets Safety Award

Sanford's Heavy Attack Squadron 7 today received the Chief of Naval Operations safety award, one of the most respected honors in the field of Naval aviation.

The prized, engraved plaque was presented to the VAH-7 commanding officer, Cdr. Leroy A. Heath, by Rear Adm. Robert Goldthwaite, commander of Fleet Air Jacksonville, following an inspection of the squadron's 350 officers and men.

The "Peacemakers," who compiled a perfect safety record for three years from fiscal 1960 through 1962, won the award in competition with the 19 other units which comprise the Navy's heavy attack striking force.

Six of its competitors are based at Heavy Attack headquarters for the Pacific Fleet at the Whitley Island (Wash.) Naval Air Station.

It was the first time since 1959 that a local unit had captured the award. Grading in the safety competition is based on such factors as total flying time and the nature and number of aircraft landings as opposed to the participants' overall accident rate, taking into account the variance in accident potential for each model of aircraft.

It was VAH-7's first full year of operations with the superonic A-3A Vigilante attack bomber, an aircraft which the squadron has flown since it first entered fleet operations in 1962.

Cdr. Heath's squadron returned last month from its second deployment to the Mediterranean with the sleek, swept-wing weapons system.

In presenting the award, Admiral Goldthwaite praised the squadron's leadership and the team effort which he said was an integral part of compiling the winning safety record.

Goldthwaite, the first commander of Heavy Attack Wing One when it was based in Norfolk, Va., flew into Sanford Naval Air Station especially to present the award.

He attended a short reception in the VAH-7 hangar before returning to his Jacksonville headquarters.

VAH-7 recently added another laurel to its record by winning the Heavy Attack Wing One September Bomber Stream.
