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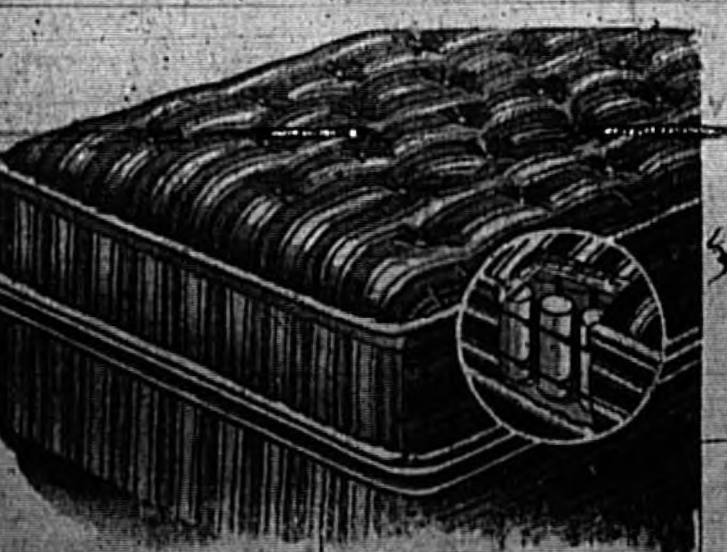

John Roosevelt seems to have had a pretty serious run-in with union forces out in Los Angeles. A case where idealistic theories clash with practical realities.

Those who advocate federal laws against lynching because negroes are unable to obtain justice in state courts should consider the verdict in the Athens, Ga. case where two brothers were freed and one of them acquitted on charges of beating a negro. This case was tried in federal court.

Bright and idealistic young men who see in World Federation, or a One World Government, or the future salvation of this troubled planet, should consider the plight of India, one continent unable to unite under one government. How in the name of Heaven are you going to get Britain and Russia under one government, while you cannot get Hindustan and Pakistan under one government?

The State House has passed a bill making it illegal to dump poisonous industrial wastes into the St. Johns River. We hope it becomes a law. Then may be the next session of the Legislature will pass another bill making it illegal to dump poisonous municipal wastes into the St. Johns River. For what good does it do to prohibit the few industrial plants along the St. Johns from dumping their refuse into the river if you are going to permit the population cities along its banks to pollute it with the filth of their sewers.

A United States deputy warns in the United Nations committee that the atomic bomb is already on that Canada, Britain, Russia, as well as the United States, are already conducting large scale atomic operations. But the real danger of atomic weapons in the hands of other nations is their possible use in another "meek attack" such as the Japs pulled on us at Pearl Harbor. When the next war starts, it will probably come suddenly, without much advance warning, and not in one spot far out in the Pacific but in a dozen different places at once.

The Royal Poincianas blooming in the backyard of Monte Harris on East Second Street is the only one of its kind that we have seen in Sanford, or for that matter in this part of Florida, although we have heard of some out in Geneva, Winter Park and one or two other places. Extremely susceptible to cold weather, the Poinciana is very difficult to raise this far north. Though they are found in great abundance around Miami and Palm Beach, and since they bloom in summer when there is not much humidity, they are particularly desirable. They can be grown from seed from the tree and if they are well protected from the cold they will survive. They should have lots of them.

Looking At The Stars

Soon, probably early in 1948, man will be able to look out into space twice as far as ever before. At California Technical Institute's Astrophysical Laboratories on Mt. Palomar, 127 miles from the school's Pasadena campus, a giant 200-inch telescope that cost six million dollars is being set in place. Photographs will be possible, according to the magazine Science Illustrated, that will show what condition matter was in almost as long ago as when the stars were formed.

The 126-ton telescope tube, set in a 375-ton cradle, will enable man to look back a billion years. He will view stars whose light, traveling at 186,000 miles a second, had to start a billion years ago to get to Palomar in 1948. Quite incidentally, but comprehended more easily, the mystery of the canals on Mars may then be solved. Possibly the telescope will reveal that they were made by intelligent creatures, now extinct. The telescope may give a glimpse beyond our universe, may show that our immense universe of 150 galaxies is finite, one among many. Further this giant's look into the limits of creation will make it possible to project the field of nuclear physics into the heavens and yield new data on harnessing atomic power.

Such glimpses of immensity make a person feel very small—or like a god. It all depends on the point of view. A tiny speck, map, is viewed against the incomprehensibly vast distances that make up the universe. But the knowledge that makes such contraptions as this telescope a tool of humanity raises man to Olympian heights. And after a look into the limitless beyond, how petty and unimportant seem most of the worries and vexations of earthly life!

New Mormon Trek

A great event in the history of the West which took place 100 years ago will be commemorated this summer. This is the Mormon trek from Nauvoo, Ill., to the Great Salt Lake of Utah, which began Feb. 4, 1846, and ended July 24, 1847. The 1947 repetition of this journey will have the advantage of modern modes of transportation, for it will begin on July 16 and end a week later.

There will be 148 men, three women and two boys, corresponding to the original company under Brigham Young's leadership. They will travel in 72 automobiles with covered-wagon tops, corresponding to the number of wagons in Young's caravan. Even the daily diet of the 1846-47 pioneers will be followed, with buffalo, antelope, deer and bear meat. It is to be hoped, however, that the present-day travelers will fare better; for Young's party found food scarce and travel conditions hard. Still, today's party should get a good idea of what their ancestors went through.

Anyone who considers what the Mormons have made of a forbidding land with few natural advantages, must acknowledge their sturdiness. And anyone who reads history must be ashamed of the brutal treatment by their non-Mormon neighbors, which sent the followers of Joseph Smith on their trans-continental trek.

Just Yes Or No

Anyone who has had to do with lawyers, government officials and other persons who lay down the law, will sympathize with William S. Knudsen, the automobile manufacturer who had charge of the nation's industrial production during the war. According to his recent biography, he was conferring with John L. O'Brien, the Buffalo lawyer whom he had just made his chief legal adviser.

"We are pretty busy around here, John," said Knudsen, "so just tell me yes or tell me no, but don't give me the reasons."

Most of us have at one time or another wished that we, too, could dispense with the reasons. Wordiness is one of the great modern evils.

BUDAPEST, June 6, (AP)—Matyas Rakosi, Hungary's No. 1 Communist and virtual dictator, has told factory workers that his party took over control of this country "before the United States could rub its eyes." "We were able to solve the crisis before the foreign press, food and aid, was able to intervene," Rakosi said. "Before the United States could rub its eyes, everything was perfectly put over." "Such a task could only be carried out when democracy is unflinching and led by the brave and unflinching Communist Party."

Rakosi's description of the events which culminated in the resignation of Premier Ferenc Nagy was delivered Wednesday, but was not published in the press here. The excerpts were found today in an official text from the files of MTI, the official government news agency. President Truman's view, that the coup was an outrage, was not published in any Hungarian newspaper. Brief mention was made that the peace treaty for Hungary had been ratified by the U. S. Senate, but there were no comments.

(Continued from Page One) an alleged vote fraud in Kansas City. The witnesses are federal judges Albert L. Reeves, Albert A. Ridge, and John Caske Collet and U. S. Attorney Sam Wear.

Attorney General Clark, heatedly denying that the Justice Department had tried to "whitewash" irregularities in the 1946 democratic primary, told the Senate judiciary subcommittee yesterday that the judges had decided the evidence was not sufficient.

In the primary Rep. Roger Slaughter, opposed by President Truman, was defeated by Enos Axell. Subsequently Axell lost the election to Republican Albert L. Reeves, Jr., son of Judge Reeves.

After the Justice Department decided there was no basis for federal action the Kansas City Star made its own investigation. Largely on the basis of evidence uncovered by the paper, a state grand jury indicted 78 persons on charges of violating election laws.

The Senate met an hour early in an effort to wind up congressional action on the Labor bill and send it to the White House where President Truman can worry over it.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said he expects final approval, possibly night despite a barrage by Democrats led by Senators Pepper (D-Fla.), Murray of Montana and Barkley of Kentucky.

Taft is standing on his resolution, the Senate can pass the bill over a presidential veto, provisions that is the action President Truman takes after he receives the measure.

The GOP-backed bill provides various curbs on strikes and unions. Over in the House Democrats claim Republicans have failed in their campaign to trim \$400,000,000 from President Truman's \$37,500,000,000 budget.

Rep. Cannon (D-Mo) said that by their own figures the Republicans have cut out the budget by \$3,250,000,000 and that with most of the big money bills out of the way "the Republicans will never reach their \$5,000,000,000 cutting goal."

The House yesterday passed the \$5,280,982,000 War Department bill, trimming it \$435,899,000 below budget estimates. Passage came after the House passed \$40,000,000 for new airplane purchases.

But lines were drawn for a last-minute floor fight as sponsors of the measure started marshalling their strength to bring it before the whole House for consideration.

While opponents were equally determined to stave off a vote until the 60-day session ends. The House had suggested adjournment at noon, but the Senate — which must agree — took no action on the time.

The soft drink tax received 19 to 16 approval in the Senate. It was proposed by Senator Mathews of Jacksonville as a means of meeting part of the huge deficit Governor Caldwell has forecast but House financial leaders have disputed.

When the Senate bill reached the House, Speaker Thomas D. Beasley sparked an immediate flurry of parliamentary debate by referring the measure to the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

By throwing the House into a short informal recess, he cleared the way for the committee to consider it, when opponents tried to employ a standing rule to block the Finance Committee meeting while the House was in session.

Obstacles to the House passage were rugged as Governor Caldwell's friends mustered their strength in an attempt to shove the bill through. They had the backing of school and college interests, as well as various other groups who preferred not to run the risk of having the Governor withhold appropriations for their projects and institutions.

Caldwell has not asked for any particular tax but he has said the Legislature either should trim its record appropriations or find new revenue to avert a deficit.

The soft drink tax predicted yield of \$10,000,000 a year was calculated to meet the \$9,000,000 estimate of comptroller C. M. Gay and School Supt. Colin English for essential school and operations needs for the next two years — and at the same time give the Governor the \$10,000,000 reserve fund he has insisted must be set up.

Bottling company representatives, however, maintained it would not bring in more than half what Mathews estimated. The Bill, as it cleared the Senate, called for a tax of one cent on each five ounce of retail price of a drink, and 78 cents a gallon on syrup used in mixing fountain drinks.

It would apply only on carbonated drinks, not natural fruit or milk beverages. It would be collected by the State Beverage Director through sale of special tax crowns.

Forrestal Warns

sparked with a full peace-time program of parades, parades, parades, and the bestowing of honors.

Old Dahlgren was packed with dotting parents, seethearts, and the gold braid of high rank as 471 graduates rose in a body and took their oath of office from Vice Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, director of last summer's atomic bomb experiments at Bikini and now Atlantic Fleet Commander.

Among the middies was his son, William Purnell Blandy.

Secretary of the Navy Forrestal said today the United States, to avoid another war, must solve "political, economic and security problems such as the nation has never faced."

This country is the "principal core of stability in a world shaken by six years of bitter and destructive fighting," Forrestal said in an address prepared for the graduating class of the Naval Academy.

He predicted that the years ahead will be "more deeply vexed and troubled" than those which have confronted any generation since the start of the Civil War.

"Today the foundations of control and authority are shaken," Forrestal continued.

"Economic stagnation of Germany and Japan enforces a substantial drain upon our own economy. We cannot exterminate, nor permit to starve, these millions of human beings.

"But we shall have to watch most carefully against a rejuvenation of the conditions which were Hitler, conditions which were largely the result of divergent policies among the victors after World War I had been won.

"In all of the great continents there are vast areas of unrest and of hunger which can develop into political chaos.

"There is no formula, no magic blueprint which can provide the solution to problems that have been centuries in the making and come from bitterness, from friction between races, and hatreds that have existed over the centuries.

"But we have made a beginning in the Charter of the United Nations and the meetings of the council of foreign ministers. However, acrimonious these discussions may be or become, they are better than resort to arms.

"It took 150 years before the concept of our federal government became fixed. Should we despair because the ideals contained in the United Nations Charter and the sincere aspirations of the statesmen who participated in its framing are not realized by Monday morning?"

concerned but, at the moment, inconclusive study in Washington. Nobody knows what may happen. Some people hope nothing sensational will. But there is apprehension behind the State Department's calm facade.

As the Americans see it, the potential trouble arises from the relationship of Russia to India, the fact that they are Asiatic neighbors. The questions being asked by authorities are these:

1. Months hence, when India's links with Britain are cut to a minimum and Britain's direct responsibility for India slacks off, will the Soviets try by political or other means to take over?

2. If they do try, can the United States afford to let them succeed?

3. Might India become on a huge scale another Greece or Turkey?

4. If so, under what circumstances might the Truman Doctrine apply?

Most responsible officials here believe that at a strategic time the Soviets may enter the Indian situation just as they are already politically active in all their neighboring countries.

In general the American government is reported quite pleased with Britain's moves for India's freedom. There is some disappointment at what appears to be the need for dividing India. But authorities here say if that's the way the Indians want it, that's the way it has to be.

Nonetheless it is a reverse for American policy insofar as America had any Indian policy other than encouraging the freedom idea.

The American government has always talked in terms of a strong India and a strong China stabilizing peace in Asia. China at the moment is anything but strong, India divided will be far weaker than India united would have been.

The most authoritative American estimate is that the period of local and not snowball into anything like civil war.

Communists, of course, can aggravate natural conditions of unrest at such a time. American Party numbers about 50,000 members, not large among India's millions, but energetic and resourceful.

In the American view, what India needs is an uninterrupted opportunity to work out her own destiny. This means the outset rapidly decreasing interference in Indian affairs by Britain; no interference by America and none by Russia.

Nationalists Start Counterdrive In China

PEIPING, June 6 (AP)—The government poured new reinforcements into Manchuria by rail and sea today, and one Chinese press report said nationalist troops had launched a counterdrive in a strategic sector of the battle with Chinese Communists.

Red troops continued to menace Mukden, but Chinese dispatches reported a noticeable slackening of pressure on Kaiyuan and Changtu, 50 and 70 miles northeast.

Arrested Students In China To Be Freed

SHANGHAI, June 6 (AP)—Hsiao Tieh-Wu, commander of the Woosung garrison, promised today to release shortly Shanghai students and newspaper reporters arrested in a recent roundup if there was no substantial evidence they were Communist agents.

Several colleges and universities already had resumed classes following a four-week strike for more food, curriculum changes and an end to the civil war, which led to the arrests. Other schools were expected to reopen within a few days.

Home Agency Is Ordered To Close Up Shop

Government Program Is Branded Failure; Bulwinkle Railroad Bill Is Considered

WASHINGTON, June 9. (AP)—The government's program to speed the construction of homes was branded a failure today by the House Appropriations Committee, which called for Expediter Frank R. Creedon to close up shop.

The committee allowed only enough funds to liquidate the Office of Housing Expediter within a year, stipulating that no new business be undertaken after June 30. Its action will have to be backed up by the House and Senate, however, before it will stick.

The Housing agency was set up in 1945 with powers to control use of building materials and to make government payments to producers who would increase their output of such things as brick, tile, lumber and other building materials. The idea was to see that more materials were produced and that they were used to best relieve the housing shortage.

The appropriations committee said the program "has not been successful." Moreover, it said the prospect now is for plenty of building materials in the near future. It proposed the agency begin winding up its affairs at the end of this month.

In TVA, the background is this: This grant project, involving a series of dams on the Tennessee River Valley, combines flood control with power production.

Court Denies Freight Rate Case Review

Ruling On Search And Seizure Guarantee Will Not Be Reconsidered By Tribunal

WASHINGTON, June 9. (AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to reconsider its approval of a 10 per cent increase in railroad class freight rates in the industrial north and east.

The court in approving the increase on May 12 also approved a 10 per cent cut for the rest of the country east of the Rockies. The tribunal voted 7-2 in upholding ICC orders requiring the rate changes.

Governors of the New England states and attorneys general for nine other states urged the Supreme Court to reconsider its action.

The court also refused to reconsider its recent 5-4 decision upholding a conviction based on evidence accidentally uncovered in a search of a man's home after his arrest in a different case.

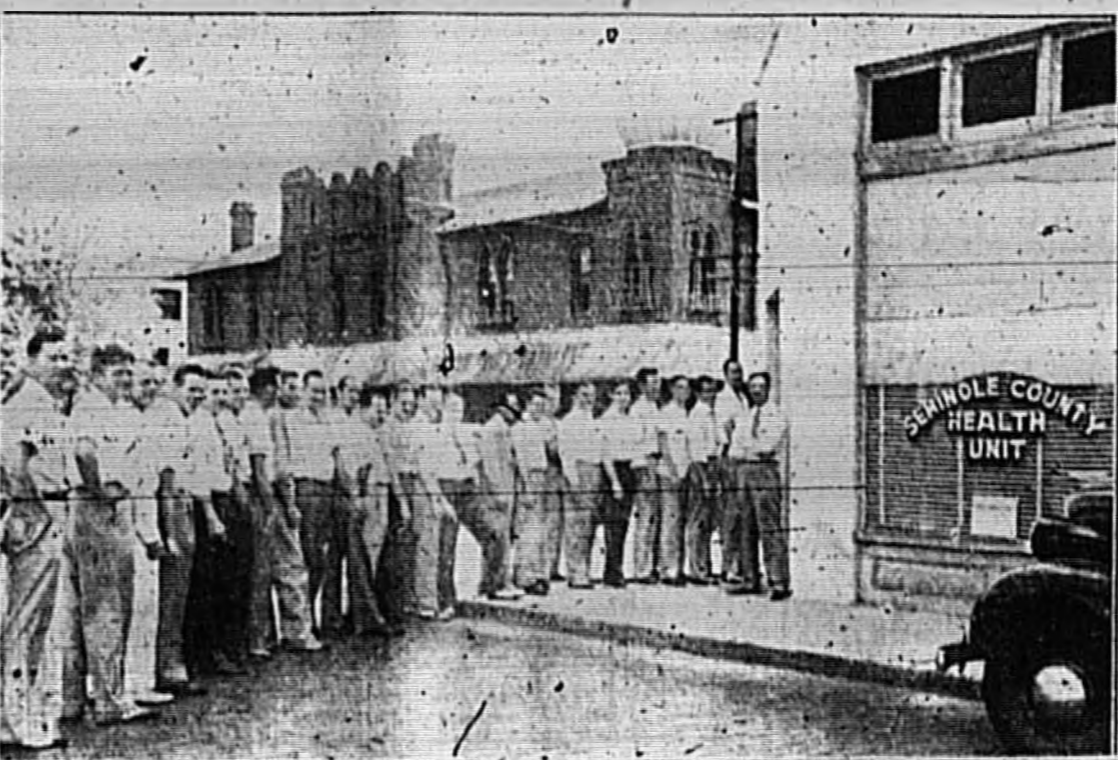

Independent State Receives Approval Of Moslem League

12,000 Driven From Homes In Flooded States

DAMAGE IS EXPECTED TO RUN INTO MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

The American Red Cross estimated more than 12,000 people in a four state area were driven from their homes by floods on the Mississippi and its tributaries today as the death toll from the week-end floods and tornadoes reached at least 23.

The agencies Midwest Area office in St. Louis reported that an estimated 2,962 families were homeless in Iowa, Missouri, Illinois and Nebraska as damage to crops and city property was estimated in the millions of dollars.

Ontario's heaviest hit by floods had seven of Iowa's 11 deaths and the Red Cross said 1,445 families were affected as the Des Moines River slowly receded from about one third of the homes in the city of 122,000 population.

At Hannibal, Mo., the Red Cross said 400 families were affected and 350 families still homeless in six Illinois counties in the Quincy area.

The Mississippi swollen by high water from the Des Moines, rolled on over thousands of acres of Illinois and Missouri farm lands after breaking six levees and inundating 112,000 acres.

Lt. and Mrs. A. K. Powers and son Alex, after visiting historic sites in western France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg in company with a party of American officers and their wives, recently wrote that stores in Belgium were full of American-made items.

Council Hearing Is Disrupted By Attack Of Dissident Moslem Raddars

NEW DELHI, June 9. (AP)—The Moslem League voted tonight to make Moslem India a new nation, a move which has aroused opponents of the League who broke into the meeting.

The League Council voted almost unanimously to accept the independence plan under which Moslem areas will be permitted to establish an independent state of Pakistan after a preliminary period as a British dominion.

Within five minutes after the vote, four Khaksars, from a band of Muslims opposed to the Moslem League which M. A. Jinnah heads, broke into the session in the Imperial Hotel.

Minutes later, after police broke up the melee, a wounded man was hauled screaming from the assembly hall.

Several League lawmakers who acted as traffic patrolmen were cut and wounded. One said he was stabbed in the face by a Khakar, one of a group who had newly demonstrated in front of the hotel during the session in opposition to the plan.

British Envoy To Get Clarification On Hungary Coup

LONDON, June 9. (AP)—The British Ambassador to Moscow has been instructed to obtain clarification of Soviet policy towards Hungary, the House of Commons was informed today.

Minister of State Hector McNeill said, "It would be premature for his majesty's government to pass judgment on what has happened." But he expressed hope that "these changes in the structure of the Hungarian government will not lead to any departure from the principles of parliamentary democracy."

2 British Policemen Kidnaped In Palestine

JERUSALEM, June 9. (AP)—A British police sergeant and a British police constable were kidnaped from a swimming pool at Ramat Gan near Tel Aviv tonight by twelve armed Jews.

The men were taken to a house in the city of Ramat Gan. The 12 men entered the pool and ordered the policemen to "come with us." One resisted and was struck on the head. A woman was injured by a small bomb tossed into the water.

Authorities associated the kidnaping with the Jerusalem trial of five members of the underground organization Irgun Zvai Leumi, accused in connection with the liberation of prisoners at Acre Prison May 4. It was recalled that Irgun had threatened reprisals "when danger of death sentences against our soldiers is in sight."

Political Fund Drive Opened By Wallace

NEWARK, N. J., June 9. (AP)—Former Vice President Henry Wallace will make four speeches, confer with the press, church and labor leaders, and attend a 225-plate dinner in his honor here today as part of a drive for what the sponsors say will be a political fund to back a "progressive" candidate for president in 1948.

The visit here was being sponsored by the New Jersey Independent Citizens League, which said it had issued 7,000 invitations to the Essex House dinner tonight.

Traying of negroes by the State Mobile Unit will start in Goldsboro tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock, according to Mr. Edward Kireher, secretary of the Seminole County Health and Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Frank Quillman, director of the County health unit, today stated that he felt that the response among average citizens is not as good as it should be for the tests, which are designed to screen out any tuberculosis tendencies. A greater response is also needed from the business people, he said.
