# Use Of Big Stick To Force Fair Trade Is Urged By Solon

BALTIMORE, May 1.-(AP Use of a "big stick" to force fair trade practices and "to halt this vicious program of further concentration of wealth and power" was called for yesterday by Senator Nye.

In an address to the Maryland Retail Grocers association, the North Dakuta Republican complained of the growth of the chair store system and gave notice of legislation he would introduce next session to give the federal trade commission more active machinery in combating trusts.

Senator Nye, in deploring the concentration of wealth and power, named, as "a leading cause" of unemployment, "the lack of anything resembling an interest in human'ty by those few who have come into control of industrial enterprises."
