Postmaster General Albert S. Burleson, recently appointed by President Wilson to take charge of the postal affairs of the United States, is heartily in favor of one cent letter postage. He announced himself to a delegation representing the National One Cent Letter Postage Association which waited on him in Washington a few days ago. "I am heartily in favor of one cent letter postage," declared Postmaster General Burleson, who went on to explain that he hoped to bring it about as soon as revenues of the department could be adjusted.

The postmaster general told the advocates of one cent letter postage that he had long believed that their contention was right. He stated, however, that as head of the department it was his business to see that sufficient revenue was raised to meet all expenses and while he admitted that there was a big surplus received from last year's surplus each year he added that it would be necessary to make such an adjustment of rates as would put the department on a business basis. Postmaster General Burleson is strongly in favor of putting the postal department on an efficient basis. He also favors adequate compensation for postal employees, and such a readjustment of rates as will permit the operation of the department in a business like manner. It is the purpose of the present post-office administration to establish civic service rules throughout the department, applying eventually to even first class postmasters.

Senator Theodore E. Burton, from Ohio, and Representative Charles L. Bartlett from Georgia have re-introduced one cent letter postage bills in the senate and house of representatives. These bills call for the inauguration of one cent letter postage by July 1 of this year. Senator Burton has long championed the battle for one cent letter postage, while Representative Bartlett has favored the cheaper rate for many years.

I see by Dixie that the grafting insurance companies are trying to beat the family of the late E. O. Painter out of his life insurance and actually had the nerve to take his body and cut it all to pieces trying to prove that he suicided in order to get the insurance. Every one familiar with E. O. Painter knows that suicide would be the farthest thing from his thoughts but because he held a large policy the grafters want to trim Painter's family for about 100,000 dollars. It is about time for the people of Florida to rouse up in their might and wipe the insurance companies off the map. The fire insurance companies and life insurance companies are always trying to beat somebody out of half of the policy and seldom do any of them pay the full amount for a death or a fire loss. Dr. Vanvalzah, one of the valiant knights in the Florida legislature is now trying to get the scum of the fire insurance com-

panies, but is having a hard time doing it for these companies have plenty of money and influence.

A poor man pays an exorbitant price now for a small insurance and in the event that he suffers a fire loss he is badgered to death trying to get his money and usually gets about half the amount due him and is lucky to get even that.

The Florida legislature should pass a law that the fire insurance companies not only the fire insurance companies but the life insurance companies. Some of them are really trying to be honest and pay their losses without resisting, but in the case of the late Mr. Painter, if all reports are true the insurance companies should be arraigned for maltreating the body of the dead. There is no law that permits this high handed outrage, and the insurance companies should be put where they belong.

Few things in our modern civilization retain so firmly the absurd and often cruel traditions of the past as funerals, and though the subject is a delicate one, intimately and often painfully personal, it has at last reached the courts and there may be such public discussion of the matter as may tend to clarify public opinion on the subject.

The executor of a poor man's estate, when he presented his bills to the court for approval displayed a bill of \$600 for funeral expenses. There was a costly coffin, a mass of flowers and a dozen or so of carriages, only a few of which were really occupied. The total estate left by the deceased was a trifle over one thousand dollars and the court very wisely held that in such a case to pay \$600 for funeral expenses was wastefully extravagant. Most people of common sense will agree with the court.

It seems certain that there must be a reform of public sentiment in such matters. Easy to understand is the public sentiment that prompts a bereaved family to have a pretentious funeral, and it is easy at the time of bereavement to overlook the duty we owe to the living in trying to do homage to the dead. In France the government has taken a hand in regulating this matter, by declining to allow any but the deceased's immediate relatives to enter the cemetery on the day of burial. They may follow the hearse to the cemetery gate, but then must turn back while the interment is carried on simply and privately. So it has come about in France that ostentatious display at funerals has come to be regarded in bad taste, and at the funerals of private individuals there are no more elaborate displays or private shows.

Custom is responsible for much of the extravagance at modern funerals, custom and the fear of criticism and of being thought mean. It is true that we have just learned from the time when it used to be the practice to hire professional mourners, to wear huge scarfs of crepe and to provide black gloves for all who came to witness the funeral ceremonies. But there is room for much more improvement still and it will come when popular opinion agrees that to make a display of grief is vulgar and in bad taste.

The State Board of Health, always solicitous for health conditions in Florida, is giving some good advice for summer use.

The dangers of the warm season affect the digestive system and the alimentary canal more generally than the respiratory or circulatory systems, although pneumonia is not infrequent summer disease. For this reason every body should be especially careful with regard to the diet, both as to eating and drinking.

The first and fundamental rule is, be clean, keep clean, inside and outside. A bath every day is a necessity just as much as the daily breakfast. An all over bath in the morning and a sponge bath at night are none too much. The increase of the inevitable perspiration leaves unpleasant excretions on the skin, which become unhealthy if not removed frequently and thoroughly. Massage the skin, keep it lively and glowing.

The average person should drink more in the summer than in the winter, to supplant nature's efforts to wash the body through the pores of the skin.

What should be the summer drink? Water, ice water if you want it and don't drink it to excess. Most of the soda water beverages are palatable and harmless, but with the average person any drink that contains a flavoring of sweetness is a thirst producer rather than a quencher, so after all, water, just plain, clean, cold water is about the best of all summer drinks.

The great and oily danger from ice water is its excessive use. To persons who are overheated or who work in high temperatures, ice water is seriously dangerous. It produces congestion, better known as cramps in the stomach. Acting on the nervous system, it has a tendency to bring about paralysis. Men working before the furnaces in rolling mills or as stokers in the holds of steamships, soon learn the danger of ice water, although some lose their lives in learning.

Excesses of all kinds should be avoided. It goes, therefore, without saying that the over indulgence in alcoholic drinks should be shunned in summer or winter. This is not advised from the temperance standpoint, but from that of the best physical welfare. Don't drink malt beverages to excess. In moderation they may not be harmful;

they may be beneficial under certain conditions and for certain individuals.

Be careful in eating. Don't gourmandize. Too much is worse than none at all, especially in summer. Eat ripe fruit, but be sure it is not over ripe. Eat vegetables well cooked. Remember that a meat diet is heating. It is like the fuel under the boiler that keeps steam up for working. But there are other kinds of fuel. Meat is especially harmful when it is cooked with a large amount of fat. Too many persons believe with all their souls that meat is a necessity, but it is really surprising how well a strong, healthy person can exist and work hard with no meat at all, or with very little, taken at only one meal a day and that the dinner or heaviest meal. Most of us eat too much meat, a good deal more than we need.

When meat is fried it retains a large proportion of the fat in the form of grease. It is not wholesome. In large quantities it imposes a heavy burden on the digestive organs. Florida people as a rule eat too much fat with their food. They would be better without it.

Better cooking would save a good deal of suffering and probably a good many lives. It would make many more efficient, more productive laborers, whether they work with their brains or their muscles. Cooking is an art, but it is too often made a drudgery.

In warm weather dress light. Don't wear heavy clothing. Don't follow the dictate of fashion when they prescribe garments unsuited to the climate and the prevailing temperatures. Heat has killed more than cold.

Don't hurry. Start a little sooner and you won't have to run. Be moderate in every way and living won't be nearly so burdensome as excesses and carelessness make it.

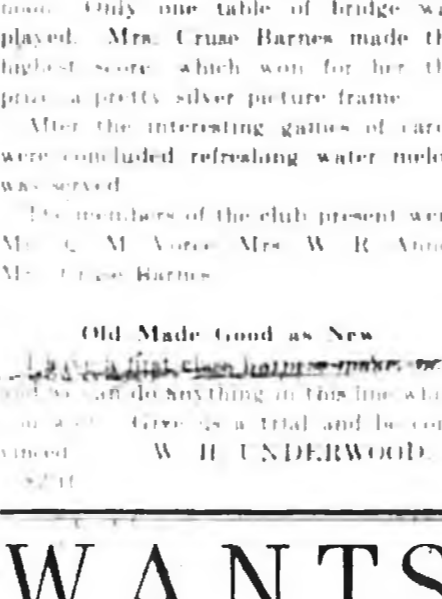

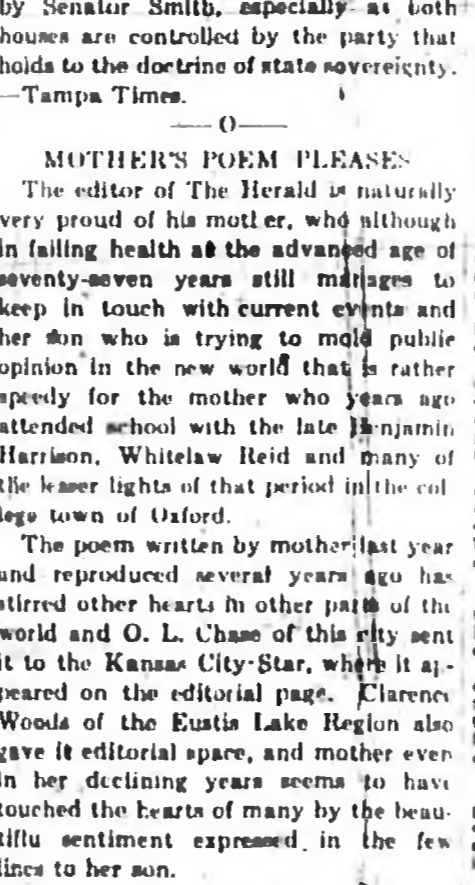
NEGROES IN PULLMANS
