City OKs Pay Hike To Aides

The Communists began the fighting at Tuy Hoa, 30 miles south of the city, on Monday night. They fired a salvo of 200 rockets and a barrage of anti-aircraft fire and destroyed two missile sites in North Viet Nam Monday night.

The assault on Tuy Hoa was the second major Communist attack against a government company defending a bridge 15 miles to the north. Most of the company was wiped out.

The government rushed a "reaction force" of armed troops north from Tuy Hoa to help the outnumbered defenders but the Viet Cong waited until the middle of the relief column was well into an ambush and struck with machine guns, mortars and recoilless rifle fire. Four of five armored vehicles were destroyed.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Clay was an easy victor over a sore-backed, sore-headed Floyd Patterson, today designated Ernie Terrell as his next possible opponent.

The unbeaten Louisville lip gained nothing in the way of prestige in jabbing and hooking his way to a 12th round technical knockout over Patterson Monday night at the Convention Center.

Referee Harry Krause stopped the fight at 2:18 of the 12th of a scheduled 15-rounder with the dead-game, 30-year-old Patterson staggered about the ring, glassy-eyed and in obvious pain.

Most of Patterson's pain came from a muscle spasm he suffered in the fourth round—two rounds before he suffered

amazing courage he displayed in the face of Clay's almost constant attack.

Clay took command in the second round, though, when he landed 36 left jabs and hooks and followed up 24 similar blows in the next session.

That set the pattern for the rest of the fight—Clay pitching and Patterson catching.

From that point on, Clay had Patterson on the verge of being counted out, he waited until the count reached nine before signaling he was willing to resume fighting.

Patterson failed in this objective but he did earn 2 salute from the man who beat him after the fight.

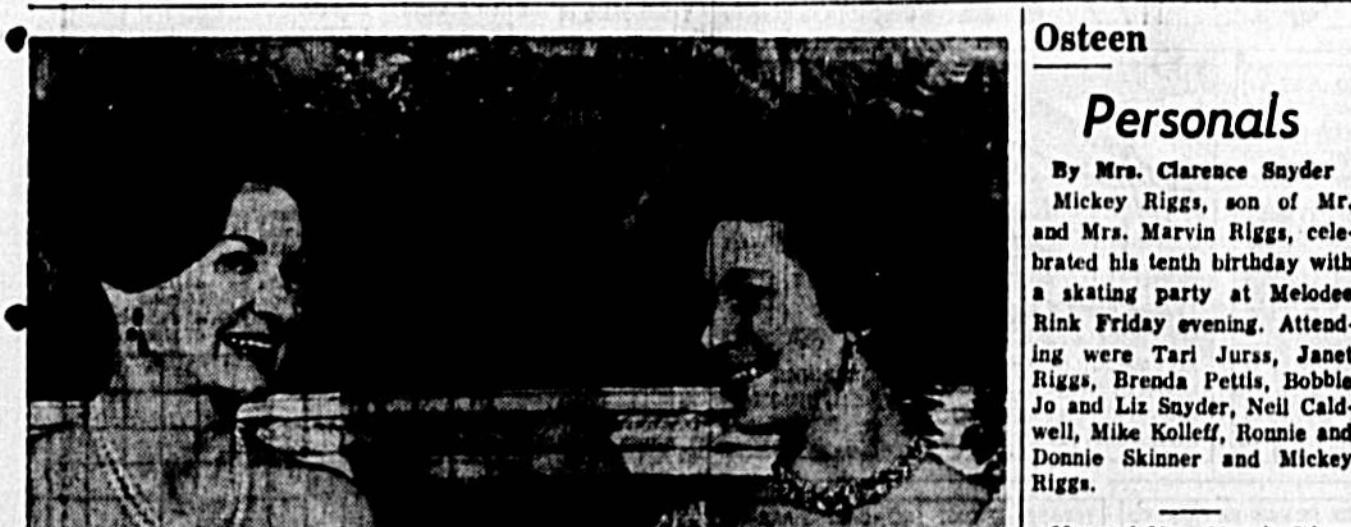

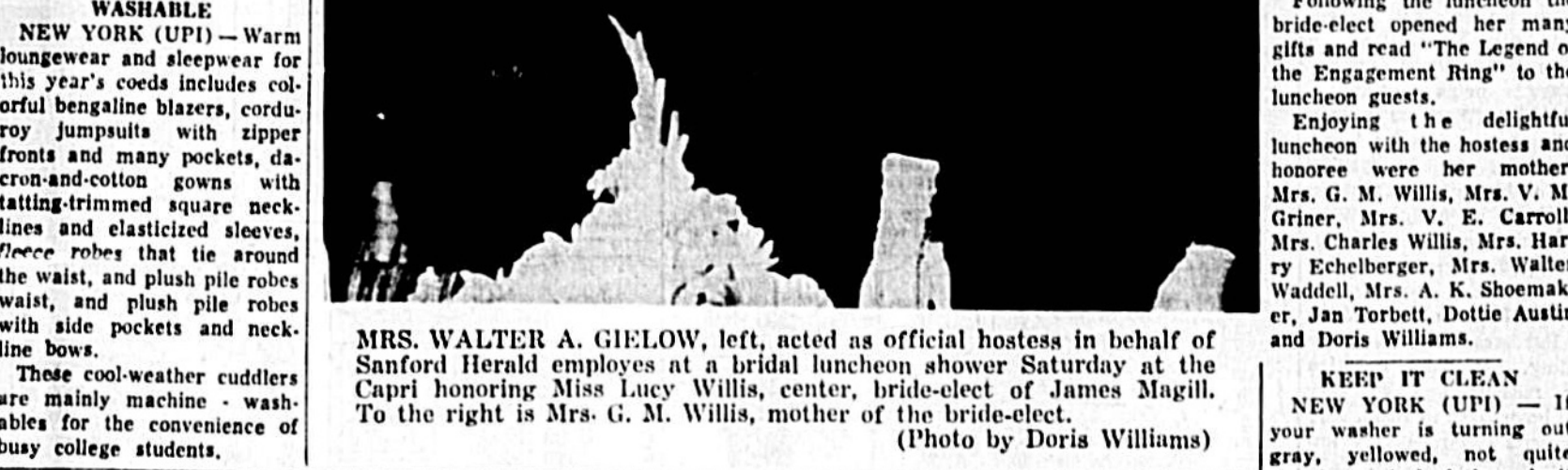

Their Problems Are World-Wide... Teenagers List Worst Woes

NEW YORK (UPI)—Many American teenagers, asked to explain their pursuit of pleasure via drinking bouts and sexual experimentation, most say they are bored.

The reasoning: today today because tomorrow might not come. The threat of nuclear war, according to studies by sociologists, gives the teenagers their biggest worry.

But about teenagers' affluence and well developed country, has problems much more like those of the typical American teenager.

Hyun Sook Han, 17, from Seoul, Korea, said one of the biggest gripes is the hard examinations in school. Another one: "adults often are obligated about allowing teenagers to have freedom." Korean girls must wear dresses on dates and they cannot be out after 9 p.m.

Tomoko Yasukawa, 18, from Tokyo, said her peers are complaining about parents who do not want them playing rock 'n' roll records all the time—spending allowances on such records.

"Girls in my country seem to have more freedom," she said.

The girls in Denmark, according to Anne Grete, go steadily more than American girls do. She was astounded that a girl could not go out by herself in Memphis, Tenn., where she lived for four weeks.

Taru Tamminen, 17, from Helsinki, Finland, said girls in her land go with boys and are a later age than do in America. "Maybe it's the cold weather," she said. Only two girls in her class of 40 were more than 16 years old.

Constanza Calderon, 19, of Mexico City, reported that hard work and social life is much more formal in her hometown than it is in America. Girls hardly ever wear shorts or blue jeans. They wear dresses everywhere. When they date, they have a chaperone.

Cooking also is a problem for girls in her country. The girls are expected to help in the kitchen. "We don't have as you do," she said. "It's a harder."

Peta Nelson, 18, from Umatilla, Transkei in South Africa, said the major problem for her peers is—"where is the next date coming from?" Another problem: school. She said it is very hard and the usual examinations last six hours.
