It's hard to be hard hilled this time of year... My desk is loaded with Santa Claus letters from hundreds of Sanford kids... Some are written in pencil, some printed.

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Metro Phone Tie-In Nears

In a little more than two months from now more than 50,000 telephone subscribers in Sanford, South Seminole County and Winter Park will be able to pick up the telephone and call each other... talk as long as they wish... and pay no toll charges.

Robert Shelden, manager of Southern Bell Telephone Company in Sanford said today work between Southern Bell and the Winter Park Telephone Company crews are proceeding "on schedule" with installation of the new "metro system."

Feb. 18 has been set as the date for the "cut-over" which will probably come sometime between midnight and 2 a.m., when the calling is at its lowest ebb.

Winter Parkers already have their new directories which include the Sanford listings.

Sanford directories are due out about Feb. 9, 13, with deadline for new subscribers or new listings set Dec. 31.

The new Sanford directory will contain approximately 40,000 Winter Park telephone listings.

(None of the above figures include the advertising on the yellow pages.)

Shelden emphasized that DeBary and Deltona subscribers are able to call both Deland and Sanford, toll-free, but will not be able to call the Winter Park numbers under the new metro system.

The option of the "metro system" for Seminole County came about through the urging of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Presently the county is "cut in two" with Southern Bell serving the Sanford and adjacent area and the rest of the county, south of Five Points, (approximately) served by the Winter Park Telephone Company.

For many years this has necessitated long distance calls to other parts of the county, in some instances only a few blocks, or less than a mile away.

In one area of the county, subscribers on one side of the street have to call long distance to subscribers on the other side of the street.

All that will be eliminated under the new metro system with all subscribers to pay a very small monthly additional fee on their regular telephone bills.

The only Seminole County area not included in the new metro set-up is the New Lake area, which is served by the Florida Telephone Corporation and is listed in the Orlando section of the directory.

Orlando numbers will not be included in the metro hook-up.

Shelden said no "ribbon-cutting ceremonies or anything like that" is planned for the Feb. 18 cut-over, since no new buildings or installations are involved.

City OKs Piers Bid

Contract to construct piers and docks for the lake-front marina was awarded to Berlevle Uniflotts, Inc. of Jacksonville by City Commissioners Monday.

Berlevle's bid was \$163,538 for concrete floating piers with 136 wet berths for boats of various sizes.

Plans call for two piers to the east of the neck of the landfill in the harbor and one to the west, with 20 of the berths on the west pier to be covered storage.

Total combined length of the piers is about 1,100 feet.

The job will be re-bid.

Installation of the piers and docks will probably not begin before sometime in March, as though construction will proceed at once at the construction firm's marina manufacturing plant in Jacksonville," according to City Manager W. E. Knox.

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In Courthouse Squabble

City of Sanford has a "vital interest" in the question of whether or not Sanford is, in fact, the county seat of Seminole County, and therefore plans to "intervene in the action (injunction suit) filed on the Board of County Commissioners" by a group of South Seminole County residents.

Decision was made by City Commissioners Monday to request City Attorney W. E. Hutchison to "enter into the matter."

The city's intervention is "solely to determine whether or not the City of Sanford is or is not the county seat."

In careful wording of the motion, Commissioner Joe Baker emphasized the city does not wish to become involved in the question of desirability of building a new courthouse or not as a lobbying group, but we do undeniably have a material interest in whether or not this city will be construed by the courts as being the permanent county seat.

Hutchison was requested to consult with County Commissioner Chairman John Alexander and County Attorney Harold Johnson.

Hutchison noted that as far as he has been able to determine there is no precedent present before the courts in the matter.

Bank Moves To Alleviate Road Tieups

Hearing on request by the Florida State Bank to close the north-south alley and construct a through street on Railroad Ave. has been set for Dec. 27.

(Date of next commission meeting was also changed to Dec. 27, a Tuesday, since Monday, Dec. 26 is a legal holiday.)

Bank officials have indicated they will provide a 50 foot easement on their parking lot property, (to the west of the present alley) in the interest of constructing the street through from the present intersection of Railroad Ave. and Commercial Street, north, one block, to Fulton Street.

The change would align the present one block section, south of Commercial to First St.

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Courthouse

Space Survey Goes On

Architects for the proposed new Courthouse facility are continuing with a space study survey despite an injunction suit which has been filed against the County to halt any construction.

The architectural firm of John Burton and James Gamble Rogers have been conducting a space allocation survey since November and plan to complete the job by the first of the year.

Meanwhile, County Attorney Harold Johnson is "hoping to file pleadings or an answer to the suit toward the end of next week."

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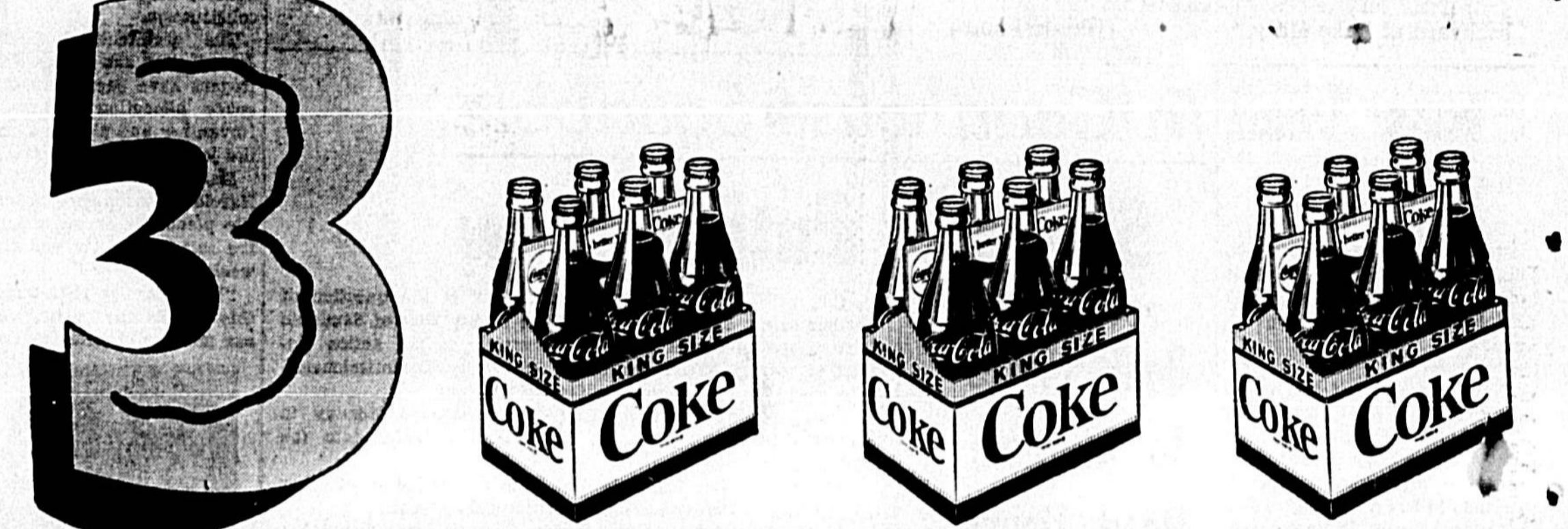

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — The Communists charged U.S. planes with attacking Hanoi today for the second time in two days. There was no immediate comment from the U.S. command, which earlier said it could "not confirm or deny" the Communist claim of a raid inside Hanoi Tuesday in which women and children were killed. A U.S. spokesman said pilot reports on raids against North Vietnam today had not been received at the Saigon headquarters. The official Soviet news agency, reported from Hanoi that American planes raided the North Vietnamese capital for about an hour and a half today. "As yesterday," the Tass correspondent said, "they bombed the right and left banks of the Red river, the embankment and the area of the bridge linking Hanoi with its suburb Zy alam."

Miss 'Dead' 5 Months, Now Alive, Pregnant

NEW YORK (AP) — A 27-year-old woman research analyst, reported dead five months ago, has been found alive in a bizarre plot by her and two male companions to defraud two insurance companies by staging her accidental drowning. Dr. and Mrs. Werner A. Lindenmaier of Upper Montclair, N.J., had not known that their daughter, Miriam, was alive until they were reunited with her Tuesday in the Bronx County courthouse. Miss Lindenmaier, who was employed as a \$5,500-a-year media and rate analyst for a Manhattan firm for more than six years before she disappeared, was found working as a waitress for 87 cents an hour and tips in a restaurant in White Plains, N.Y. She was arrested Tuesday in her hotel room where she was registered under the name of Elizabeth Pangborn, authorities said. One of the accused men, Alvin Brodie, 34, a construction worker named by authorities as the father of Miss Lindenmaier's unborn child, was alleged to have promised her that they could go to Spain with the \$30,000 in insurance money. Burton B. Roberts, chief assistant Bronx district attorney, said official wiretapping, authorized by the Bronx Supreme Court last September, played a key role in solving the case. He said that police listening in on a telephone conversation heard Miss Lindenmaier's voice for the first time Thanksgiving Day. Following this up, they traced her to White Plains, about 119 miles north of Times Square, then put her under surveillance before making the arrest. She signed a waiver of immunity and testified before a grand jury Tuesday. The Western Palms town of Cleveland, in names after United States President Grover Cleveland who arbitrated a dispute between Brazil and Argentina in 1895.

Miss 'Dead' 5 Months, Now Alive, Pregnant

Roberts said Miss Lindenmaier, a 5-foot, 6-inch blonde who wears thick-lensed eyeglasses, is six months pregnant. Authorities said Brodie resides with his wife and four children. Miss Lindenmaier, described by associates as a quiet, bright person who rarely used make-up, Brodie, and a second man, Thomas Martin, 26, a New York elevator operator, were arraigned Tuesday night in Bronx Criminal Court. They were charged with attempted grand larceny and conspiracy by "staging the accidental death" of Miss Lindenmaier last July 9 in Long Island Sound. Miss Lindenmaier was paroled in custody of her parents. The two men were ordered held in \$7,500 bail each. A preliminary hearing for all three was scheduled for Dec. 20. Roberts said that last July 9, the trio rented a dory with an outboard motor. About two hours later, Roberts continued, the two men told police that the boat had capsized off Hart Island in Long Island Sound. They told police that Miss Lindenmaier had drowned and her body had not surfaced. Roberts said two insurance policies, with Brodie as beneficiary, aroused his suspicion. In addition, the girl was reported to be an excellent swimmer. The police, one for \$10,000 with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. and the other for \$8,000 with the Equitable Life Assurance Society, provided for double indemnity, or a total of \$18,000 in case of accidental death. Roberts said that Brodie had made claims for the insurance proceeds but both companies but neither had paid off.

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Warning Signals

Both death and traffic accidents run high on our county roads. The current road deaths in Seminole County stand at 29, which is three ahead of 1965 at this time and even with the entire 12 months of 1965. The latest traffic counts by the State Road Department for South Seminole shows that the jam on our roads is getting thicker. The intersection of State Road 436, SR-481 and SR-484 is still one of the most tangled spots in the area. Scores of cars go through that intersection daily. Recently there were two major accidents within a 24 hour period there. The State Road Department should

and MUST authorize better traffic signals for this portion in order to remove the present danger from this busy intersection. We hope that the State Road Department takes a hard look at traffic flow figures at this intersection as well as other sections of Seminole to be certain they are properly marked and regulated with signals. If signals and marking in busy areas do not give every driver a fair chance, he will force his way through. And therein lies the problem. Our death and accident toll is already too high, so we cannot take any more chances.

Inflation Is For The Birds

With all the talk about inflation, it is strange that so little mention has been made of the rapidly rising cost of feeding the birds. If you think this is inconsequential, you just haven't been paying attention. Bird watching—and this, of course, means bird feeding—is an escalating even faster than the cost of people feeding. Only a short time ago bird lovers could buy 50 pounds of choice sunflower seed (fillet mignon to many birds) for \$6. And that was considered high. But today 50 pounds of the same sunflower seed from \$10 up. And that isn't chicken feed, birds!

To complicate the problem, birds pay even less attention than humans to helpful hints by government experts on how to cut the cost of living—such as by living cheaper, and by not taking the old man and the kids along on buying expeditions. (How are those for solutions?) Birds couldn't care less that their benefactors have a common participation in their. They simply won't diet. And bird watchers can no more stop feeding birds

—and well—than they can stop talking about the birds they have wooed and won. Some ladies who watch birds even cook up gooey stuff by the bucket for bluebirds and other finicky feathered friends, and the rest of this is also going up. (Meanwhile, it has been rumored, husbands of these ladies flounder, munch dry breakfast cereal. But this may be just old husbands' tales.) In any event, the cost of bird feeding is going sky high. And this is strictly for the birds!

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — The evolution of the Supreme Court — its willingness to plunge into the various thickets of American existence — has been a slow process. From the beginning the court had the power to make decisions, and often did, broad enough to affect all American life although some of them at the time may have seemed too remote to give that impression. But how deeply the court got into the everyday scene with its multitude of problems, including very human ones, depended on the members of the court at any one period their philosophy about the role of the court, their courage, timidity, conservatism, liberalism, perhaps intellectual vigor, and the mood of the times.

The present court is the most activist in history, leaving its imprimatur in all directions. It has shown an equal readiness to strike down laws on civil rights, school prayer or legislative reapportionment are just the spectacular examples. The problem is all the more difficult when, as in the case of the national police chief, the general is one of Ky's strongest personal supporters. Ky presides over the coalition, but the balance of power is so delicate in Saigon that if Ky lost this man's support his government might well fall.

This sifting out of poor men at U.S. suggestion was what caused the downfall of Premier Quat and the end of the last civilian government of Saigon. Moreover, in some important ways the police chief is a genius upon whom Ky depends heavily. He developed and carried out the brilliant maneuver which ended the recent revolt of the dissident Buddhist cronies.

Neither Ky nor his American advisers have a solution to this problem except to hold on precariously until there can be elections, which hopefully will provide a government with enough legitimacy so that whatever heads the state will be able — with U.S. backing — to enforce reasonable government and uphold the safeguards of personal liberty.

House Industry Got Burned In Heated Economy

NEW YORK (AP) — The housing industry really got burned in this year's overheated economy.

Hopes, plans and the number of housing starts were caught in an inferno of interest rates. The peak of the most recent housing boom — it seems to be either boom or bust in housing — was in 1965, when 1.58 million private, nonfarm residential units were built.

In 1964 the total still was 1.33 million units, falling but still robust. By 1965, however, the decline was evident. Only 1.48 million units were erected.

This year the total will be about 1.2 million, but that figure doesn't tell the entire story. Housing starts late this year fell to a yearly average of only 845,000 units, the lowest in 20 years.

In itself, this drop is precipitous. Consider, though, that it came while inflation was growing, while new family units were being formed, while population was increasing.

About the only saving explanation is that there was a decline — not relative but actual — in the number of young married couples in the home-buying ages of 20 to 24. But this couldn't be the entire answer.

The decline this year was in direct proportion to rising interest rates, some of which soared to their highest in three or four decades.

Another factor was competition between money lenders. Funds were withdrawn from savings and loan associations, the traditional mortgage suppliers, for higher returns elsewhere.

Some builders found themselves having houses on their hands for as long as a year. Some small builders went out of business. Construction crews of larger builders were broken up.

Builders of duplex dwellings have found potential renters standing in line hoping to be favorably recommended to future buyers. But the buyers weren't standing in line.

In fact, the demand for rental apartments is now stronger in some areas than it has been at any time in recent years. Vacancy rates have fallen, evidence that people are renting rather than buying.

Purchases of perhaps as many as 400,000 units have been postponed, based on projections that show normal demand this year would have been about 1.6 million units.

With this evidence of a one-industry depression amidst abundance, the federal government has now stepped in to make funds available.

First, ceilings were posted on interest rates. Savings and loan associations, which provide 40 per cent of the mortgage money, were given ceilings higher than most. This should cause an inflow of money.

The administration then announced that the Federal National Mortgage Association would make \$250 million in special aid available for construction of low and medium-cost homes.

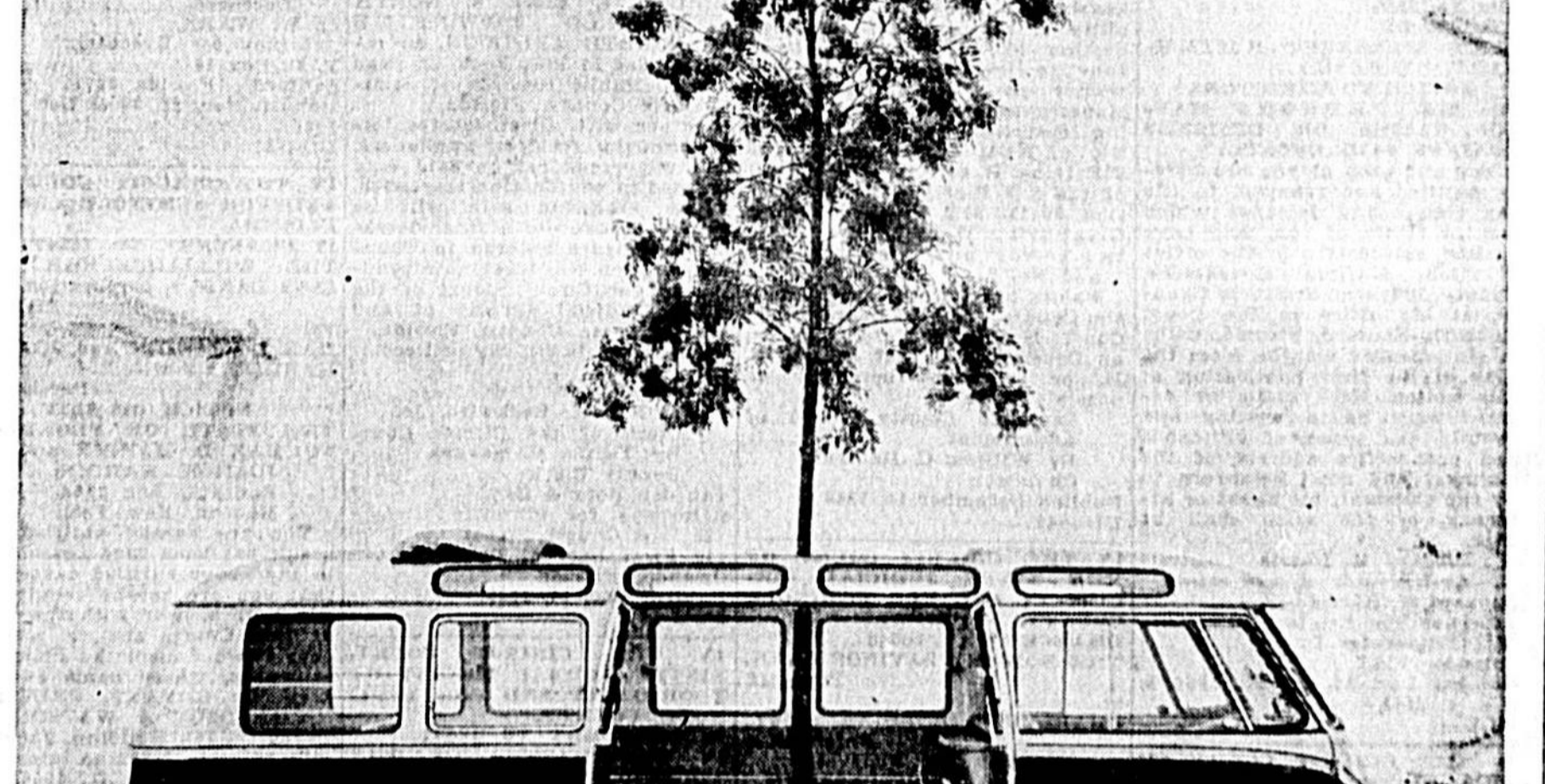

But after the VW's all filled up, you can still go through the roof.

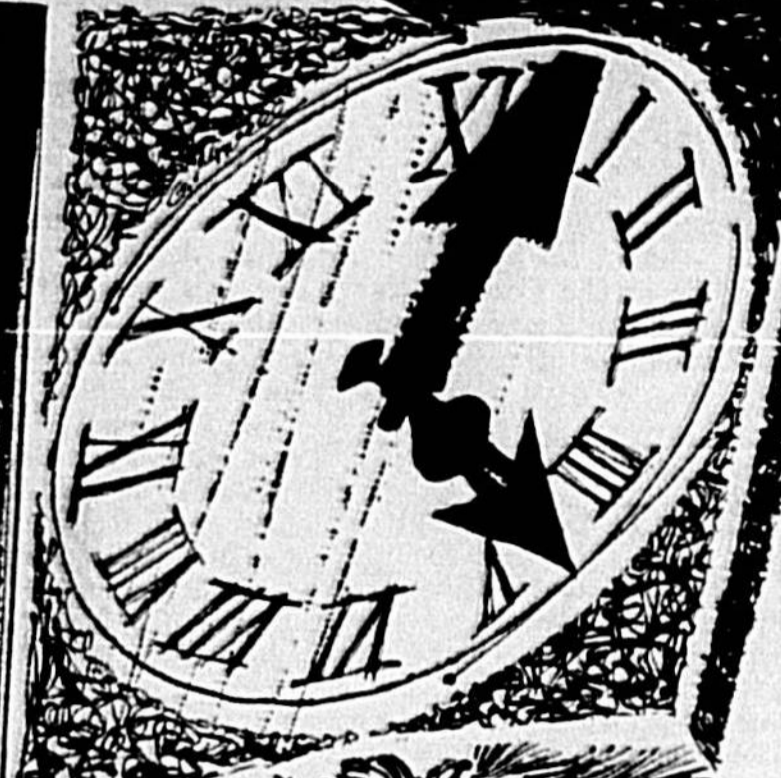

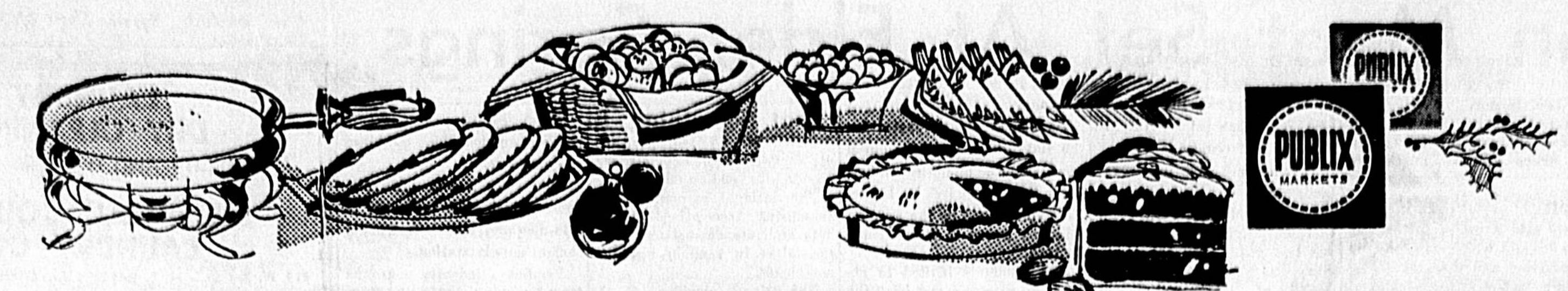

Bicycle Riders Given Warning By Law Officer

Bicycle riders, or those who expect Santa to fill their dreams and bring them one for Christmas, "got the word" from Deputy Wesley Place, Seminole County Sheriff's Department.

Speaking to members of the Lake Mary second grade classes Deputy Place laid down some "hard and fast" rules for bike owners and "would-be owners."

"We wouldn't want to see a Christmas scene of a child on his shiny new bike, end in tragedy," said Deputy Place.

These are some of the rules children must abide by in order to ride safely:

1. Bike must have a seat and fenders. This is not meant to be funny, as some children feel it is "cool" not to have these.)
2. Do not ride on a sidewalk.
3. Keep bike in good repair by oiling regularly and making sure all parts are intact and clean.
4. Only one person on a bike.
5. Have a light on the front and tail light or reflector on back. Wear light-colored clothes when riding at night.
6. Never ride more than two abreast on the edge of roads. Always ride as close to the edge as possible and always on the right-hand side.
7. Keep bike in special place. Don't lay it down where some one may trip over it and hurt themselves.
8. Know and use hand signals as if you are driving a car. Obey all traffic signs the way motorists must do.
9. Never hang onto a car or truck. Keep both hands on handlebars at all times.
10. If packages must be carried, have a basket for this purpose.
