## County Pay Plan Called 'Biased' More Planning \$\$\$ Urged By Goodin

Agent Value Cited; Pushes Pay Raises

The job classification and pay plan under which the county is currently operating in all departments was termed "biased" by Agriculture Agent Cecil Tucker during presentation of the requested budget for the Extension Service before the County Commission.

Tucker made the remark following his request that the salary of the assistant agriculture agent be increased from \$1,200 from his current salary of \$1,400 to \$1,600, the maximum provided in the plan for the position.

"From the work load standpoint, he should receive the raise," Tucker insisted. "Would you like us to show you how valuable our work is to the farmers?" To answer to a question from Commission Chairman John Alexander as to "how far do you go in giving assistant including any argument of a central violation, Tucker stated, "As far as we can go."

Total of the budget requests submitted by Tucker was \$28,704, an increase of more than \$8,000 over the current budget of \$20,482.

The 1967-68 single item in the increase was \$2,198 for a proposed new position of technical assistant to operate the laboratory and assist in field trials, demonstrations, etc."

Also requested was \$183 in general maintenance repairs to the Agriculture center and \$1,350 for renovations to the center including installation of a central air-conditioner and the removal of a partition to enlarge the meeting room at the center.

Tucker's current salary is \$9,833 and no increase was requested. Pay plan calls for the position of \$9,000 to \$11,000 for the position.

The Sheriff's Department budget requested was \$24,822 up from the budget for the current fiscal year of \$23,100.

## Zayre's Construction Due Soon

Construction will start within three weeks on the new \$500,000 Zayre's Department Store in Fern Park, officials of A. R. Abrams of Atlanta, Inc., contractors, told The Herald today.

A fall opening, possibly in November, is anticipated.

The single story 200 by 300 feet building of masonry and structural steel will be located on a 13 acre tract on the southeast corner of Highway 17-92 and SR 436, the first in what is reported to be a multi-million dollar shopping complex there. Purchasers were Kinmay of Florida, Inc., a corporation formed by Kinco Corporation and Zayre's, Inc., owners of large discount houses throughout the United States. First portion of the property was bought from Mr. and Mrs. James Kayser at \$60,000. Sale of remaining acreage was handled by Walter Bondar at a price of \$485,000.

The new Zayre's will be the first department store of its kind in Seminole County.

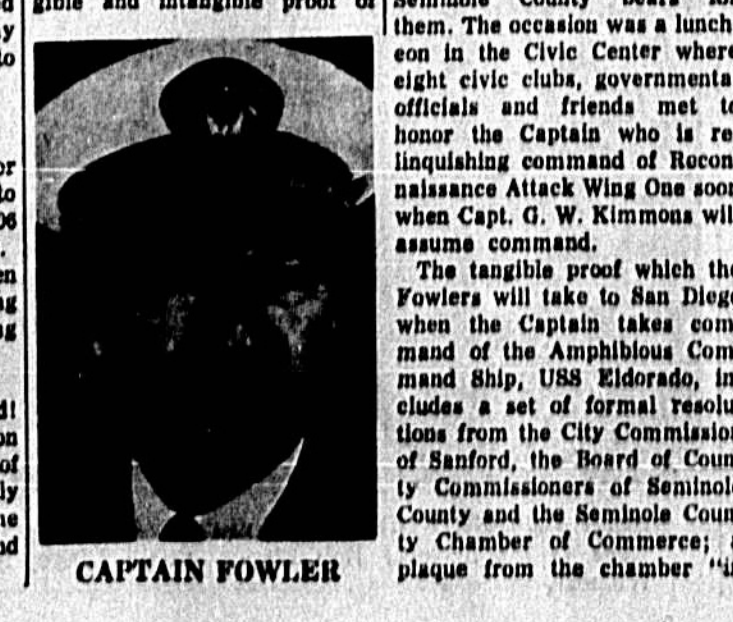

# Two Yank Outfits Battered By Red Troops

## 25 GIs Killed In Skirmish; Mekong Delta Outposts Hit

**Will Kirk Make Solons Return!**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A large force of North Vietnamese troops attacked two U.S. infantry companies today and left 25 American dead and 23 wounded in the jungles just north of the Ia Trang Valley in the central highlands.

Associated Press Correspondent Peter Aronson reported from Pleiku that the two companies, from the U.S. 4th Infantry Division, had completed a follow-up mission of an area hit by Red bombers. They were on their way out when they came under attack and heavy automatic weapons fire.

There was no report on North Vietnamese casualties.

Aronson said one U.S. helicopter was shot down and another hit by Communist ground fire, but were able to make it back to their base camp. One crewman was wounded.

The fighting broke out about noon and lasted four hours. The U.S. Command said the battle was broken just before dark.

The action took place 33 miles southwest of Pleiku and only three miles from the Cambodian border, across which North Vietnamese troops infiltrate into the central highlands of South Vietnam. It was the first fighting in the area in six weeks.

Communist guerrillas struck forces against two Mekong Delta outposts before dawn, but were chased back across flooded paddies filled with heavy losses.

American warplanes and naval ships carried the war to North Vietnam against its attacks deep in Red territory Tuesday and ship-to-shore bombardments hit up the coast.

Five Red MIG-17s were reported shot down. The U.S. Command said they refused battle.

The U.S. headquarters at a unit of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division was fighting off Red fire from the north according to the last report from the Ia Trang battle field. The site of the American unit was not known in Saigon.

The fighting raged in a mountainous area close to the Cambodian frontier where French, North Vietnamese and American troops have been engaged since the start of the Vietnam war.

The military action approved Tuesday was a product of long term negotiating and compromise.

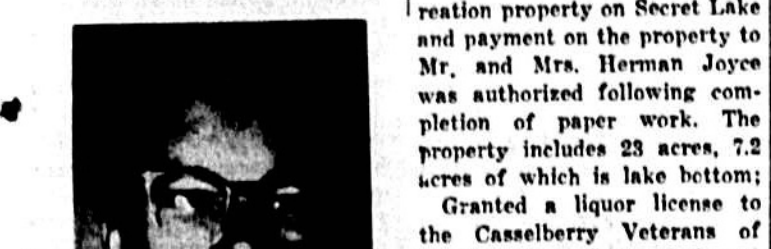

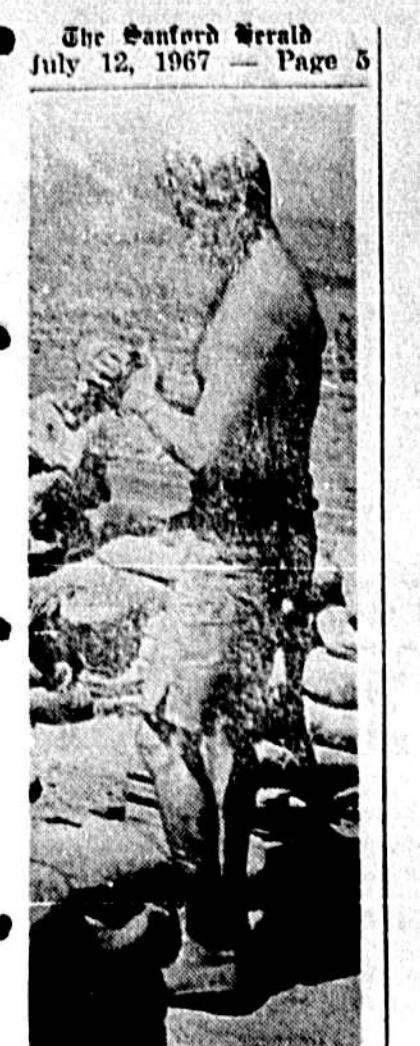

## Money Woes Plaguing The Lutherans

NEW YORK (AP) — Money blues today troubled the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, particularly the sluggish response to a special fund drive, but church representatives pleaded and scolded to try to get more pep in it.

"I know of people that are literally going to bed because of our lack of funds," said the Rev. Arnold G. Ahlman of Denver, one of a succession of delegates voicing their concern Monday at the church's biennial convention.

"We can all afford," he added, "but fellows, we've got to work harder at doing something about this."

At one point, the 1,700 Lutherans got on their knees in the grand ballroom of the New York Hilton Hotel and prayed about it.

Besides a general sag in financial support, what especially worried the 2.8 million member church, second largest in American Lutheranism, was that a 1967 capital fund drive for \$48 million has yielded only \$23.5 million.

Theological ferment in the denomination has been alluded to as part of the difficulty crippling the fund drive.

The church's president, the Rev. Dr. Oliver R. Harms, said earlier:

"I did not know the devil's influence I would be completely mystified how this effort, intended to bring out the best in many of us, has instead brought so little good and so much else in so many of us."

He referred to those who "prefer to find fault with someone or something rather than to trust the power of God at work in them."

The campaign, in which all members are urged to make a gift of gratitude on their birthday, is designed to meet capital needs in overseas missions, church colleges and seminaries, and extending domestic missions.

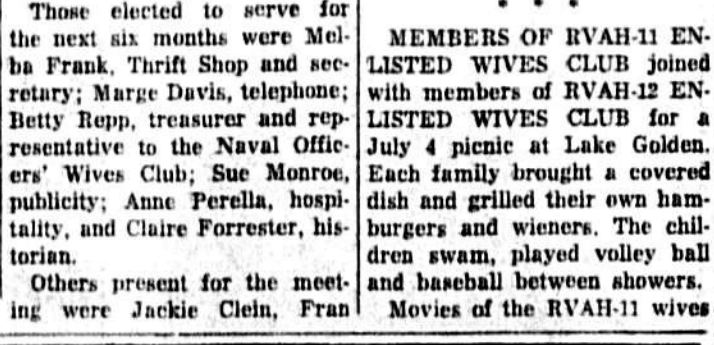

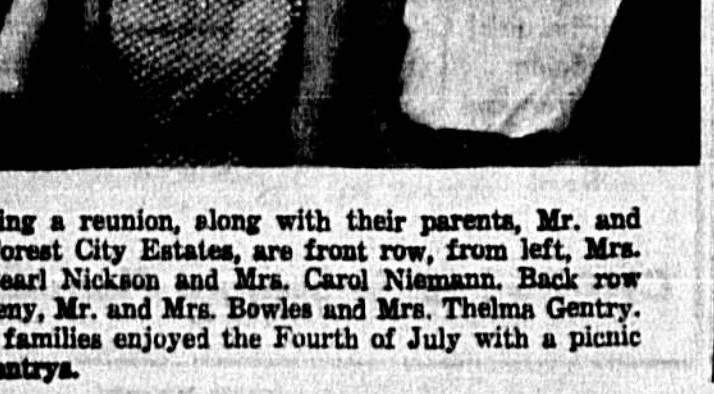

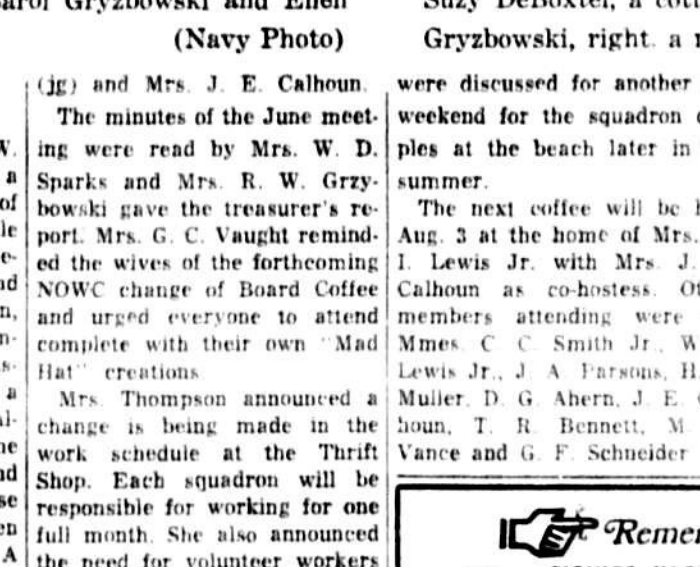

## After 20 Years, He Comes Home

Connecticut state police, who notified Bangor of Wiley's arrest, quoted the truck driver as saying he had been in Bangor 40 times since 1947, when he was reported missing but he never had occasion to take in contact with the police.

## Probe Hike In Freight

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Department of Justice called for an investigation of a claim by the nation's railroads that they need an average increase in freight rates of 2.53 per cent.

Spokesmen for some 100 railroads, ranging from the smallest to the giants, told the interstate commerce commission the hike would help offset the wage increases.

But Donald J. Graham, a transportation attorney for the agricultural shippers, testified at an ICC hearing Monday that there is an emergency situation and that he need for a 3.5 per cent increase in freight rates. He said rail profits are running \$10 million ahead of last year, and asked the ICC to look into the situation.

## Special Plates For Legislators

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—State Sen. J. Elmer Cross, D-Gainesville, asked the Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday to give priority to his bill providing special auto license plates for legislators.

Cross wants a tag number of numerical designation to go before new license tags. He said the bill would give him a "3" before his tag number.

## Auto Strike Threatened Unless Demands Are Met

DETROIT (AP)—Walter P. Reuther takes to Chrysler Corp. today new contract demands of his United Auto Workers union. They include profit sharing with the threat of a strike to get it.

Reuther's Chrysler visit is his third in as many days to members of automotive Big Three, where current three-year pacts run out Sept. 30.

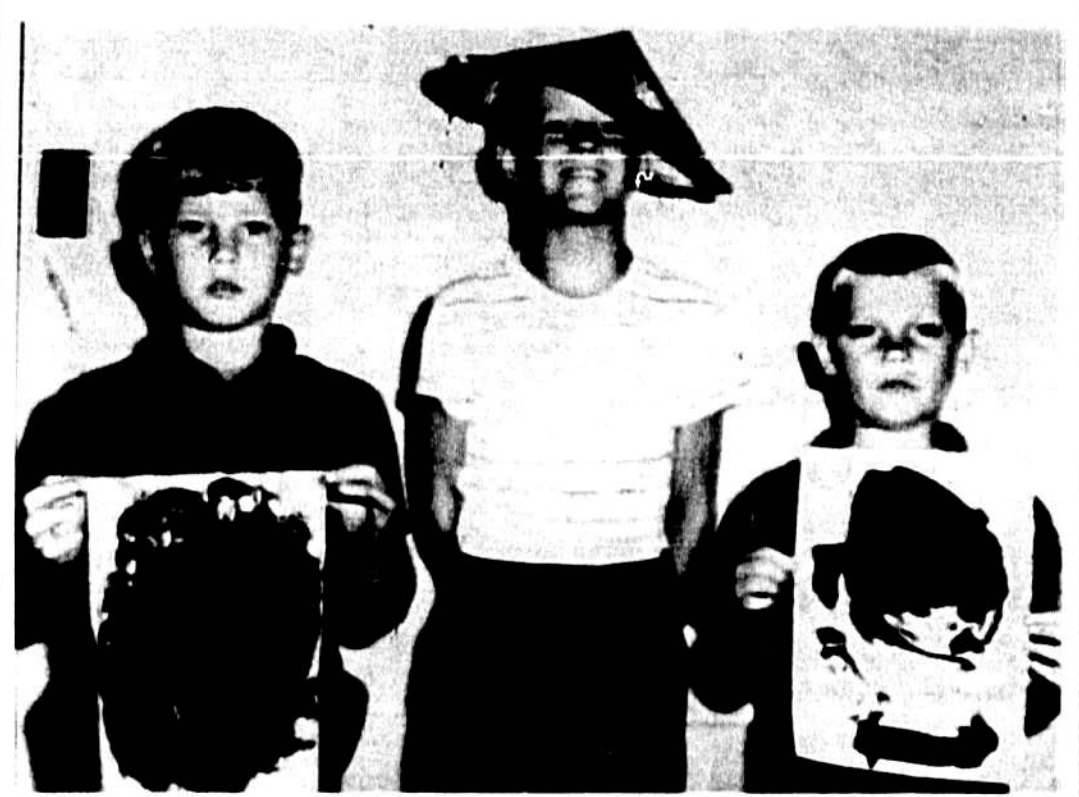

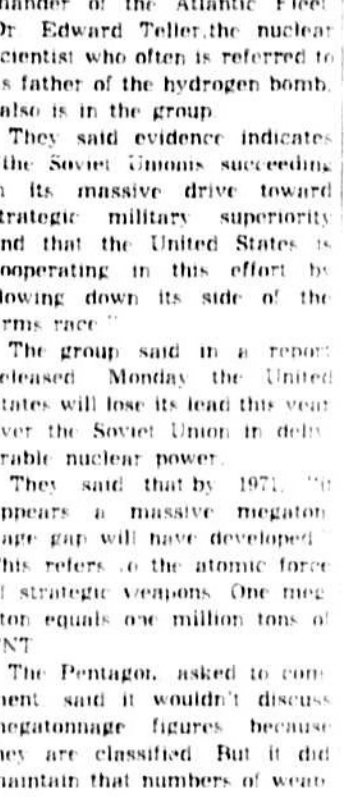

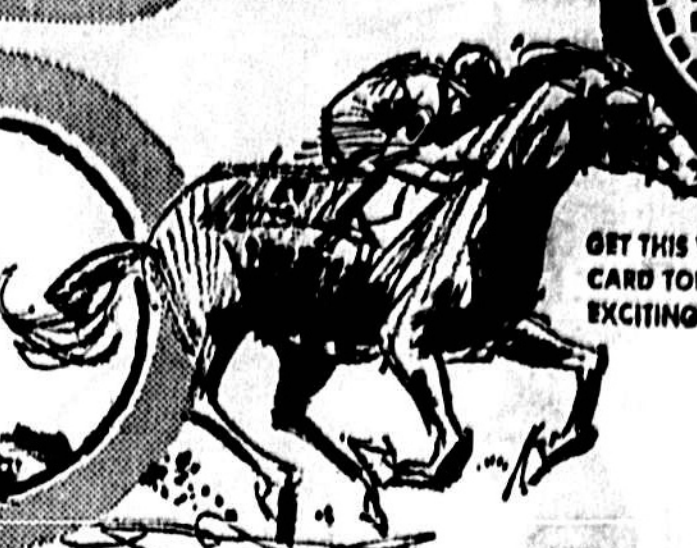

**Red Cross News**

With Christmas still months away, chapters across the country have begun making and filling gift bags for Red Cross Shop Early-Vietnam 1967. The project is designed to put an ARC gift in the hands of every US serviceman and woman in South Vietnam during the holiday season. The hundreds of letters from men of every military rank in South Vietnam who received the gifts last Christmas testified to the popularity of the program. The plan calls for the production of 250,000 of the gift bags with the quota of the local chapter being 1,000. They will be filled with personal and useful items and shipped to the field directors between early September and October 15th.

The bags, red or green in color, will be made of denim or cotton material, sturdy enough to withstand the tropical heat of Vietnam and remain serviceable for their owners' personal effects after the original contents are used. ARC headquarters has suggested that a holiday greeting card, identifying the Red Cross Chapter and co-operation agencies providing the gifts, be placed in each bag.

The following items are suggested as suitable fillers. A selection of about six to ten small items with some variety would be possible within these guidelines. Paper books, terry washcloth (other than white or light color), small package writing paper with self-seal envelopes, pocket games (small enough to put in pocket—such as checkers, pinocle is very popular), small tins of nuts or candies—(vacuum packaged), windproof type cigarette lighter, plastic cigarette case, wipe a shine packet shoe polish, ball-point pen, plastic soap case, small address book, nail clipper, comb, plastic toothbrush holder. No liquids, glass containers, combustibles, food or any item that would melt or deteriorate in heat should be included. No medications of any kind are appropriate for inclusion.

Any family, individual or group interested in helping with this project should contact the local office at 223-4125. Let's all get together and make this Christmas a happy one for our servicemen and women in Vietnam.

### 'Pill' To 475

## Rap Health Dept. Funds

Seminole County Public Health Department is distributing "birth control pills" to some 475 patients in the county, Dr. Frank Leone revealed during budget hearings before the County Commission Wednesday afternoon.

When Swofford remarked that that we "need a pill-pod" to cut-down on the birth of illegitimate children that continues to be a drain on the taxpayers, Leone revealed the "family-planning" aspect of the county health service dispenses the contraceptives to 475 patients now.

The "pills" are being supplied by the federal government. The plan as revealed by Dr. Leone is to have 1,000 to 1,500 patients on the "pill."

Householder came forth with the report following indication by Alexander that the county is continuing its policy of only permitting \$100 in budgets for travel and per diem allowances to conferences and meetings by various departments.
