

Senator Covington, from Dade City in Passe County, described Whitehair, his chal-lenger from DeLand is Volusia County, as an sidtime county political bass who is sosting a comebask. Obvisanly angered, White-hair told a labor union sub-

onco: "Volusia County has told the rest of the districtyou take Whitehair." He shouted: "Volusia County has recented me to the rest of the district; Covington should stay home."

Volusia County has slightly under a third of the total Democeratic votes in the 11 counties. Covington has pledg-ed, if elected, to subdivide the district to give the eastern and western parts their own

Whitehair says he favors keeping the district as it is, electing four senators at large. In theory it would be possible for Volusia to dominate the district's representation, though this year it has but one candidate running.

Sen. Covington reminded Vousians last night that Whitehair in his prime (he's now past 65) was the central fig-ure of a Volusia County politfeal ring which for years ezercised airtight political control in Volusia, The Whitehair ring once



Parole Granted Survivor O Love Triangle

TALLAHASSEF (UPI) French war hero Maurice Chavigny, 52, will be paroled from Raiford Prison May 24 after serving 8% years of two life serving 8% years of two life sentences for the love triangle slayings of a retired Ameri-can army general and his wife Chavigny is to be taken into custedy at the prison gates by immigration authorities for deportation to France. A con-dition of his lifetime parole is that he never set foot back in the United States. But Parole Commission Chairman Roy Russell said he vanted it understood that "we are not releasing any menace on society."

He said Chavigny has been a model prisoner since he en-tered Raiford early in 1958 "and he is just as eligible to be paroled to St. Petersburg or anywhere else but he want to return to France."

Chavigny, who saw servic in four wars and received 1 medals for bravery, was in this country on a visa when Brig Gen. Wilbur McReynolds. 64, and his "youngish looking wife, Faye, 61, were shot to death in their plush St. Peters-burg home in April, 1957. The state charged the solder of fortune shot down the

couple during an argument over a love affair between Chavigny and Mrs. McRey-nolds. Chavigny claimed that the general shot his wife and he then shot McReynolds in self defense. At Raiford, Chavigny has

been teaching in the inmate "He has done a very com mendable job and been an efective influence for good,"

Russell said. Other parole commissioners said they feared if the Frenchman were kept behind bars much longer, he might lose his sense of responsibility and lose interest in rehabilitation in the outside world. Chavigny met the McReynolds in Indochina where he was serving with the French army and McReynolds was serving with an American aid

He had lived in the McReynolds home for two years as a houseguest and chauffeur. He was convicted on two second-degree murder charges and given the maximum sentence of life in prison on each. Judge Robert U. Bird ordered that the sentences run consecutively rather than concurrently. Judge Bird said at the time he did it that way so so that, should Chavigny be paroled from the first life sentence, he would still have to face the second.

At the start of his trial in Clearwater, the dapper Chavigny showed up wearing a enth grader at Sanford United Nations uniform that he had worn during the Korean War while serving in the will represent the French army. He wore several rows of decorations across it for valor on the battlefield.



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Indicted Sherif **Of Dade County**

Claims Innocen MIAMI (UPI) - The sheriff of Florida's most heavilypopulated county was free from jail in his own custody today on grand jury charges of perjury and election code

violations. Dade County Sheriff T. A Buchanan was suspended from office by Gov. Haydon Burns following the indictment by the county Grand Jury, which included charges of failing to report a \$25,000 campaign contribution from a gambling ligure in 1963.

The Gov. named Chief Depuy George P. Leppig as acting sheriff until he can appoint a stand-in for Buchanan pending the outcome of the case. It is Burns' practice to reinstate to office any such public official who is found innocent of charges which led o his suspension. Buchanan flew back to Mi-

ami from Air Force Reserve duty in Georgia late Tueslay, was arrested on the charges, booked at the County Jail and then released in his own custody on a judge's orders.

"I want to assure the people of Dade County," Buchanan said, "That I am not guilty of these charges. "My only request of the people is that they withhold their judgment on these charges until they have been fairly and openly aired in the American and Democratic forum of the courtroom."
