Colorful Grid Meetings Scheduled Between Dixie Elevens This Afternoon

(By The Associated Press) Referees' whistles called the football stalwarts to the field for the season's close.

A majority of the teams in the Southern and Southern Intercollegiate associations will face a season that will be spectacular and strong opposition for close games.

The Alabama eleven paraded its conference championship before the University of Georgia at Birmingham. A victory for the Crimson Tide meant a spotless record while Georgia by winning would claim runner-up position.

Tennessee met Kentucky at Knoxville, Tennessee, however, and predictions were for a volunteer victory which would further solidify the final rating. Georgia and Tennessee entered their games with the same record of four games won and one lost.

The team that scalped each of them—the Vanderbilt Commodore—was primed for a Sewanee eleven that held Alabama to its closest score of the season.

A state championship was at stake in Mississippi where A and M met Ole Miss, while another culmination of spirited rivalry was in prospect at New Orleans in a meeting of Louisiana State and Tulane.

Georgia Tech and Auburn had a rendezvous in Atlanta. At Charlottesville, Virginia, North Carolina and Virginia pranced out for their thirty first meeting.

Among the S. I. A. A. teams the spotlight fell on two claimants to first honors, Centenary and Chattanooga. The former began its tussle with Oglethorpe with a slight advantage in the rating but Chattanooga went against Union without an association defeat and two tie games.

Washington and Lee's Generals were at Jacksonville for a meeting with the Florida Alligator while Baltimore was the stage for Maryland and Johns Hopkins.

Furman and Clemson at Columbia South Carolina and North Carolina State and Wake Forest at Raleigh were also on the boards.

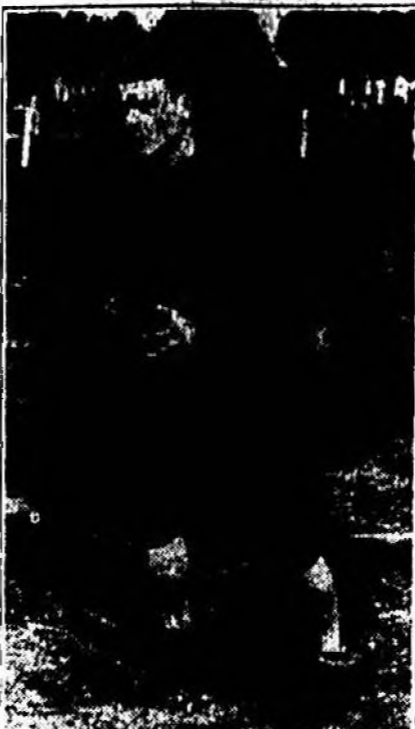

RUNNERS START AT LONGWOOD IN EARLY DECEMBER

Edward Pohlman Announces Opening of "Bangtails" Season on Dec. 11 For a 30 Day Racing Meeting

The "bangtail" season at Seminola is to open on Dec. 11 and continue for a period of 31 days, according to an announcement made yesterday by Edward A. Pohlman, general manager of the big racing plant at Longwood. He also announced that many reservations for stable accommodations were coming to the offices of the association every day that by opening date it would be necessary to erect several new stables.

Over 200 runners are on the course now awaiting the sound of the bugle that is to open the second running meeting in the history of the track. The pacers and trotters are expected to get away the end of this month, providing stable room for another 200 runners.

Many of the grand circuit horsemen may retain their stables here and winter their entire string at Seminola, according to officials. The local climate and the conditions at the track are said to be ideal for wintering the thoroughbreds and it is expected that at least one half dozen will be left over the winter months, or until the campaigning on the northern tracks begins in the early spring.

Many of the favorites who raced here at the inaugural meeting for runners last year are expected to be saddled again this season. Cars are being unloaded daily, with horses from Maryland, Kentucky and New York. Many strings are expected to come from Mexico and several will get in from Havana in the near future.

OOSTERBAAN AND STURHAHN AGAIN BID FOR HONORS

Two All-American Choices of Last Season Clamoring for Same Recognition With Fine Records This Season

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Two brilliant All-American choices last season—Sturhahn, Yale guard, and Oosterbaan, Michigan end—are bidding again for football's highest honors as a result of sensational play in the waning college campaign.

Sturhahn, chosen for all-American ranking in 1925 from coaching opinions gathered by the Associated Press, carried a blocked kick to a touchdown for the winning Yale points against Harvard Saturday, while Oosterbaan named on the same eleven, scooped up a Minnesota fumble and raced for the points that gave Michigan a tie for the Big Ten conference title.

While the play of both lacked the spectacular flashes that marked their work in early games last year, both have played consistent football.

A scarcity of outstanding backfield stars to compare with Grange, Wilson, Oberlander and Nevers, choices in 1925, and a second team that boasted such celebrities as Flourney and Eddie Tryon, is offset this year by a wealth of brilliant ends, Hansen, of Syracuse; Thayer, of Pennsylvania; Born, Army; Berda, Brown; Floyd, Navy; Saltontall, Harvard, from the East, and a host of mid-western stars are clamoring for recognition.

SERVICE TEAMS SPEED TO WINDY CITY FOR CLASH

Elaborate Preparations Are Made for Annual Meeting of Army and Navy Elevens; 100,000 Fans Are Expected

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Football squads of the United States Military and Naval Academies sped toward Chicago today in special trains with a threat of rain menacing their annual contest to be played at Soldier's Field Saturday.

Taking cognizance of the mid-West's greatest football spectacle, the Weather Bureau issued a special forecast.

The two service teams reach the city this afternoon. The Navy will hasten to Soldier's Field for a short practice. Army warriors will go at once, under police guard, to the South Shore Country Club.

Both teams will dine tonight in a manner appropriate to Thanksgiving on turkey and stuffing. But there will be a meager portion on each plate, and none of the delicacies which upset the tensed mental and physical pulse of the athletes.

Promises of rain did not daunt the army of workmen protecting the Soldier Field gridiron, for underlying it is a \$35,000 drainage system and above it lie four inches of straw and a rubber tarpaulin. Four inches of rain can fall, affluents said, without impairing the condition of the field.

The Military and Naval football squads will be met today with whose shoulders rest the principal roles in the great gridiron carnival. Police will prevent admittance from rushing the players, and will guide them to seclusion.

Tomorrow the Navy will practice at Stage Field of the University of Chicago and the Army will workout at its country club home.

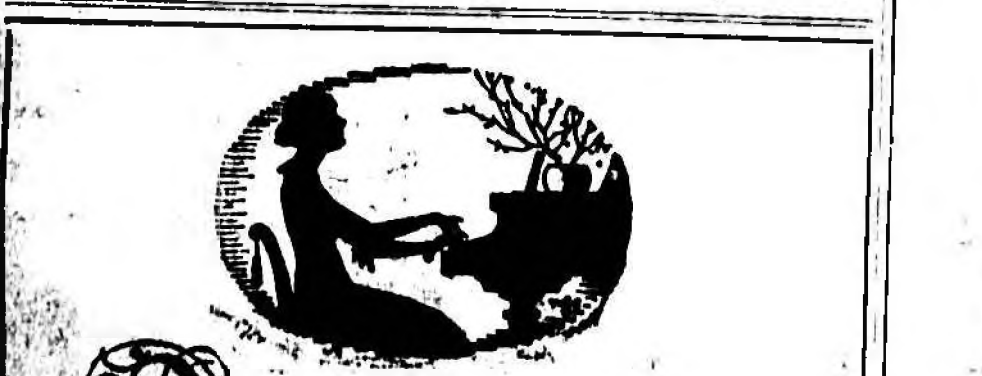

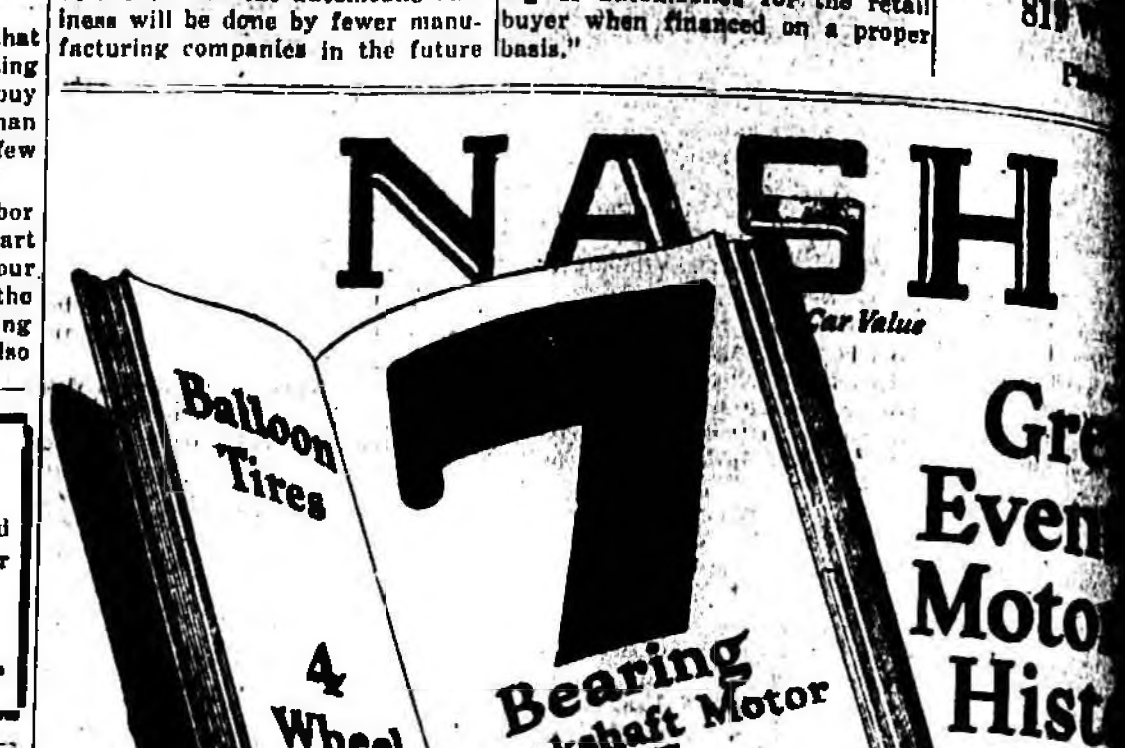

Chicago, Milwaukee And Paul First Major Road Be Offered At Auction

Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, with a total length of 1,200 miles, the first major road to be offered at auction in this country. The road was reorganized in 1925, and the assets which dropped into the hands of the receiver, which included the road, were valued at \$448,000,000. The road was placed at auction by Federal Judge Wilkerson, in whose receivership has been administered and who appointed a committee of Chicago as receiver in chancery to reorganize the road.

The railway's fiscal agents, the National City Bank of New York, throughout have indicated their intention to bid in the road and with them has been a majority of the railroads. An opposing group holding some \$10,000,000 of the road's securities and headed by the "Jameson and the Bondholders' Committee, headed by E. C. Jameson of New York, have been over two months reported as prospective bidders.

The Jameson group waged a strenuous fight in an effort to be permitted to intervene in the receivership, but permission was denied by Judge Wilkerson.

Best Bill Brought Receiver

The railroad went into receivership March 18, 1925, when friendly involuntary proceedings were instituted before Judge Wilkerson. A comparatively minor coal bill was the vehicle of the receivership, but it also was represented that the railroad would be unable to meet \$448,000,000 bonds maturing Jan. 1, 1925.

H. E. Byram, then president of the road; Mark W. Potter, a former member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and E. J. Brundage, former Illinois attorney general, were appointed receivers.

In federal court it was alleged that the receivership was directed by the railroad's bankers so that its financial structure might be reorganized, and the Interstate Commerce Commission also held a hearing to fix the cause for the receivership.

The railroad, with more than 8,000 miles of main line, is one of the nation's most important systems. It was the first western road to push its steel to the Pacific Coast, and the first to operate electrically across the Continental divide. It now operates nearly 700 miles with electricity over two mountain ranges.
