A. You will 'receive \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of GI insurance in force. The payments will begin after you have been totally disabled for six months.

A. There is no limit to' the mount of the loan, under the aw. The lender, however, has a ight to impose limit on the mount he is willing to lend you. The leval limit is on the amount of VA's guarantee which is 60 percent of the loan, un to a maxmum guarantee of \$7,500.
