Radio-TV Highlights

NEW YORK (AP)—It's possible that television has dealt a paralyzing blow to the dining room. This is far from being a report on a nationwide survey but look around yourself and draw your own conclusions. For nearly three centuries the dinner hour of the English-speaking peoples has been growing progressively later. Fashion has moved it from noon forward to 6, 7 and 8 o'clock, despite the efforts of some of the landed gentry of a century and more ago to keep it at the quaint hour of 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Now television sometimes seems bent on moving it forward to 9 and 10 p.m. This, of course, may be merely an urban phenomenon. But it's certainly not just New York City happening in such places as Los Angeles and Nashville, Tenn. Men seem to be getting home from work later. Whatever their individual excuses, there's no denying traffic problems everywhere. When most men come home at evening these days they find their children huddled around the TV set. In many households the family sits together regularly. But in others the children have taken to eating while watching TV. Their parents eat together later when the "big programs" come on. The result is less use of the dining room and more meals eaten off tray tables before the living room TV set. Room by room American homes are getting smaller. We've lost the woodshed and the butler's pantry and the music room and parlor and spare bedroom. Must the dining room go too? The answer seems to lie less in architectural blueprints than in 36 million television sets drawing people away from their dining rooms. It's a theory of mine that you're

Tax Facts

(This is one of a series of articles on Federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Florida Institute of Certified Public Accountants.) Nobody likes to be sick. But if there was sickness in your family during 1935, you may have some compensation tax-wise.

First there is the question of "sick pay." If you were absent from work due to injury or sickness and received payments from your employer (either sick benefits or regular pay) or his insurance company, these payments, within limits, are free of tax. There are two limitations: First, the maximum is \$100 per week, plus any amounts which came from your own contributions to the plan.

Second, unless the absence was for sickness during which you were hospitalized at least one day, or for an injury, the payments are not tax free until after the first 7 calendar days of absence.

If these payments are included in the wages shown on your withholding slips, you should subtract the proper amount from your income in the place provided on the first page of the tax return (Form 1040). Attach an explanation as described in the instructions. You are entitled to exclude this amount even if you do not itemize your deductions.

Apart from sick pay, you may have received payments covering medical expenses for yourself and your dependents. Don't include these in your income, but don't deduct the medical expenses covered by these payments either.

Medical Deductions If you itemize your deductions, you may be able to save tax money by listing medical and dental expenses you paid for yourself and your dependents.

This year you list your medical and dental expenses on a separate sheet, rather than on the form itself. Space is provided on the form for figuring the amount that is allowable as a deduction.

You are allowed a deduction for your medical expenses beyond three per cent of your income. If you (or your husband or wife) were 65 or over at the end of the year, the three per cent rule does not apply to your own medical expenses. It does apply to any medical expenses you pay for your dependents.

Your deduction is limited to a maximum amount for the year, as explained in the instructions. Medicines and drugs may be included in your medical expenses only to the extent they exceed one per cent of your gross income.

Among the items to include in your list of medical expenses are fees of doctors, dentists, hospitals and nurses. List premiums for Blue Cross and other health, accident or hospitalization insurance, but remember you cannot deduct medical expenses paid or reimbursed by insurance.

There are several provisions of special interest to widows and widowers:

1. You may file a joint return with a husband or wife who died during the tax year if no separate return is filed.

2. If you have not remarried and have in your household a dependent child or stepchild, you are entitled for the next two years to use the same tax computation (with income-splitting) as you would have been entitled to on a joint return.

3. When life insurance proceeds are taken as an annuity or in installments, widows and widowers are allowed \$1,000 per year of tax-free payments in addition to the principal.

4. You may be entitled to retirement income credit if your deceased husband or wife would have qualified.

5. You may be entitled to a deduction for child care expenses.

The instructions that come with your tax forms give further information. Help is also available from the Internal Revenue Service, which urges you to consult a properly qualified advisor if you need outside assistance.

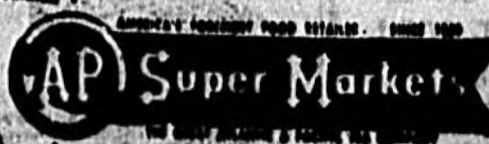

**Veterans Corner**

Here are authoritative answers from the Veterans Administration to four questions of interest to former servicemen and their families:

**Q.** If I add the total disability income provision to my National Service Life Insurance, how much will I be paid if I become disabled?

**A.** You will receive \$5 a month for each \$1,000 of GI insurance in force. The payments will begin after you have been totally disabled for six months.

**Q.** Is there any limit on the amount of money I can borrow, using my GI home loan benefit?

**A.** There is no limit to the amount of the loan, under the law. The lender, however, has a right to impose limit on the amount he is willing to lend you. The legal limit is on the amount of VA's guarantee which is 60 percent of the loan, up to a maximum guarantee of \$7,500.

**Q.** Could I take farm training under the Korean GI Bill on a part-time basis?

**A.** No. Under the law, GI farm training must occupy your full time.

**Q.** I am a veteran drawing a VA pension, and I have just been married. Will my income ceiling for the year be the \$1,400 that applies to single veterans or the \$2,700 for veterans with dependents?

**A.** The income you received while single will be subject on a prorated basis, to the \$1,400 limit, while your income for the same year after marriage will be subject, also prorated, to the \$2,700 ceiling.

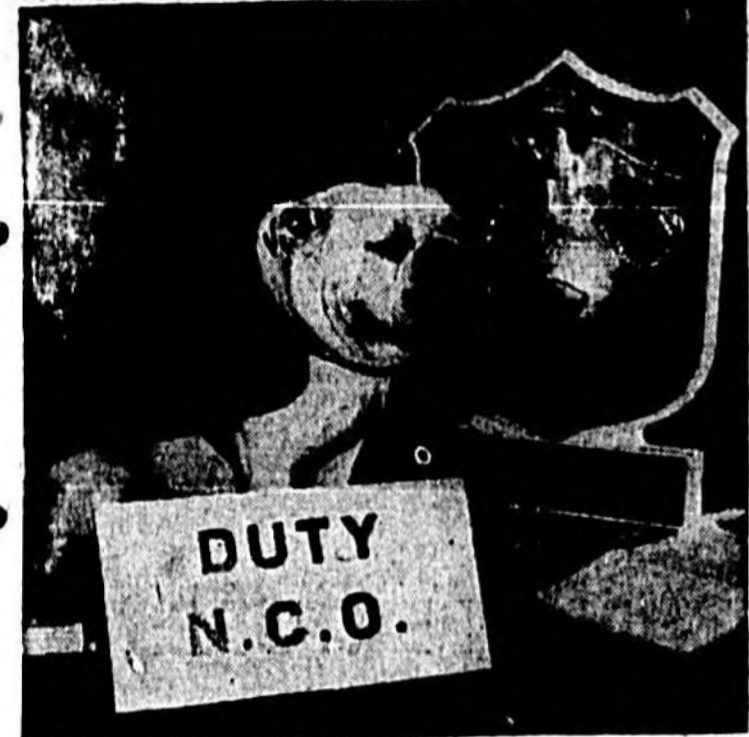

Far from being a drawback, Dolores feels that her financial independence accelerated her career.

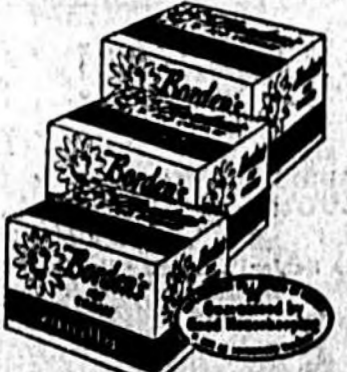
"Because I didn't need jobs to get by on," she reasoned, "I could afford to pass up the roles that wouldn't help me. That's why I was a star in London at 21."

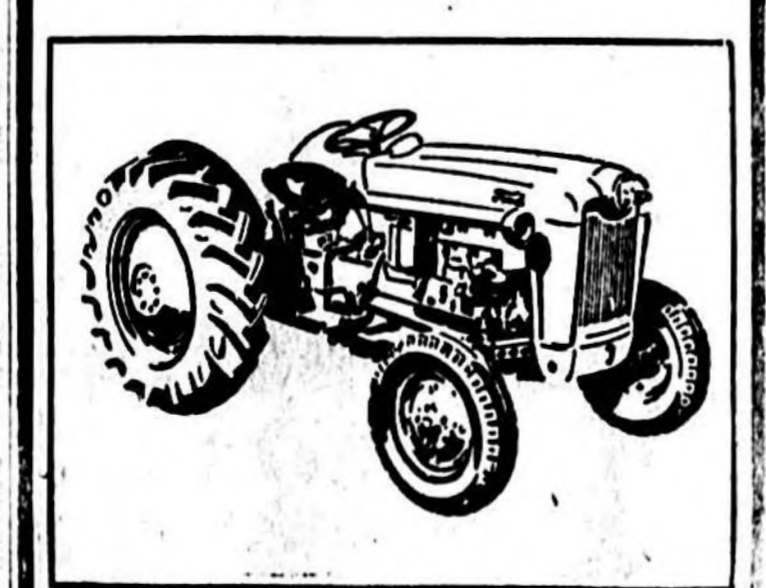

This salad makes use of convenient frozen mixed vegetables.  
Cold Roast Chicken

**COOKED VEGETABLE SALAD**  
Ingredients: 1 package (10 ounces) frozen mixed vegetables, 1/4 cup boiling water, 1/4 teaspoon salt, white wine vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup olive, 4 teaspoons 1/4 teaspoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon curry powder, white pepper, remains, thin cucumber slices.

Method: Cook vegetables according to package directions using 1/4 cup boiling water and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Drain if necessary. Beat olive oil, vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, sugar, curry powder and pepper to taste together with a fork; mix with drained cooked vegetables. Cover and refrigerate for a few hours. Serve on remains; top with lots of cucumber slices arranging cucumber in an attractive pattern. Makes 4 servings.

You can stretch chicken and vegetable salad by adding cold cooked rice. You can change the flavor by adding a dash of curry powder to the dressing used over the salad.

### Care for Your Car— for Safety, Pleasure

CONDITIONING your car for the approaching warm weather is your guarantee of greater safety, increased economy and more driving pleasure during the spring and summer months.

More and more women are assuming the job of overseeing the family car's upkeep. But many do not realize the importance of a thorough inspection job, at least twice a year, by a skilled mechanic. Racers and test drivers—the men who know how to get the most out of an automobile—list proper car maintenance as number one on the list for top performance and safety.

As a prelude to vacation trips and other warm-weather excursions, Danny Eames, one of the nation's foremost test drivers, advocates a complete spring check-up for automobiles by an authorized dealer. As a guide to women motorists, here is his recommended procedure for the servicing of various parts of the car.

1. Engine—A motor tune-up in the spring can make a vast improvement in your car's performance. A complete tune-up usually consists of replacing or regapping spark plugs, checking the air cleaner system, adjusting the carburetor and timing, replacing the oil filter and checking points and condensers and cleaning fuel strainers.
2. Cooling System—In all climates, the cooling system should be flushed with a rust-removing preparation. If, during the winter, you used permanent antifreeze or alcohol, have the radiator drained and refilled with clean, fresh water. Alcohol must be drained or the radiator will boil dry on the first warm day. If a special high temperature cooling thermostat was installed for winter use, this should be replaced with one of standard setting.
3. Brakes and Steering—To avoid brake failure ask your mechanic to check and adjust them, if necessary. Brake linings, drums, the steering mechanism, wheel alignment and balance should also be thoroughly examined.
4. Tires—For maximum motoring safety, especially on forthcoming vacation trips, tires should be rotated, and wheel bearings adjusted and replaced if worn. Tire inflation should be checked at least once a week as a safeguard against premature tire failure. Tires should be inspected for unusual wear patterns and corrected by alignment.
5. Lubrication—After driving in winter conditions, your car's transmission, differential and steering will need a thorough lubrication. Oil should be changed to a heavier summer weight.
6. Battery and Electrical System—Be sure that battery cells are filled, since battery liquid evaporates much more rapidly in heat. And, to prolong the life of your battery, have the generator charging circuit tested. Headlight beams and windshield wipers should be working properly. Replace wipers if they are worn—before spring and summer showers.

### Man Says Atomic Age Encourages Building Of Dam

By MILTON MARMOR  
LONDON (U.P.)—A Soviet engineer says the atomic age has made possible the building of a vast international dam across the Bering Straits — connecting Asia with America.

After such a dam was built, the engineer said on a Moscow radio broadcast, an electric railway line could run from London to Washington with a branch line to Peiping.

London to Paris trains would run through an English Channel tunnel that has been talked about for 50 years.

The gigantic 45-mile Bering Straits dam would keep cold water and ice from the Arctic Ocean from entering the Pacific. Hundreds of huge pumps in the pro-

posed dam would be "operated by an atomic power station of about two to three million kilowatts."

The Soviet engineer continued: "The pumps would create an artificial warm current like the Gulf Stream. . . . This warmth would transform the climate of the continents of Asia and North America, which would become akin to the climates of the parts of Europe passed by the Gulf Stream."

The engineer said the dam also would destroy the "notorious Siberian anticyclones" and prevent forming of huge masses of cold arctic air. Thus Europe as well as the other two continents would be saved from the cold breath of the arctic.

The great Siberian rivers

would become important international waterways," he said.

He called on engineers and scientists "of interested countries" to make a joint study of the problems involved in a Bering Straits dam.

**COACH COMPANY TO INCREASE FARE**

"The chemical methods for detecting poison are pretty good, and chances of getting away with it are slim."

### Freighter Breaks In Two In Storm

SEATTLE (U.P.)—There were three sharp cracks — crack, crack, crack, just like that. And then the general alarm rang. I rushed out of my cabin and there was the hull of the ship streaking by in the other direction.

"It was a sight that will be burned in my memory forever. I thought — this is it!"

That, in the words of Mrs. Vernon Lester of West Vancouver, B.C., is the way the freighter Washington Mail broke in two in the storm-swept Gulf of Alaska at 11:15 p.m. last Saturday.

It was the start of an afternoon of what could have been "sheer terror—if it hadn't been for those wonderful American seamen."

The 60 crewmen and passengers on the Washington Mail were rescued by the Navy troopship Gen. H. B. Freeman.

The Lesters, along with 46 of the survivors, came back to the United States last night aboard a chartered plane from Kodiak, where the Freeman landed them shortly after noon yesterday. Ten other survivors remained for a brief time in Kodiak.

It was a second honeymoon for the Lesters. They left their four daughters — 18, 15, 11 and 5 — at home — and took the Washington Mail for Tokyo.

"On our first honeymoon I ran out of money," remarked Lester. "On this one, we ran out of ship."

"There was no sign of anything wrong," said Lester. "It was after lunch, and we had gone to our cabin to rest. We had had rough weather, yes, but the sailors said: 'It's nothing to worry about. It can get much worse out here.' And then here were the three tremendous crashes."

"We thought we had hit something," his wife said. "When the general alarm rang, we put on our life belts. Vern told me to put on a pair of his trousers over my slacks. My suit coat and skirt I wrapped around my head and shoulders for warmth. And I grabbed a coat too."

"Our cabin was right next to the lifeboats and as I rushed out on deck there was the bow of the ship flung by in the other direction. That was when I thought: 'This is it.'"

"That was the rough time," Mrs. Lester said of the order to abandon ship. "It was nearly dark by then, and snowing and the waves were 40 feet high."

"I had put on my husband's trousers over my slacks and as I started up the deck I almost stumbled. The darned trousers had slipped down to my ankles. But it broke the tension for everyone. It made them laugh."

The Lesters and a number of others moved toward the lifeboat

hanging from davits. As the lifeboat swung in toward the ship the women were lifted and tossed inside. The men waited and one by one jumped into the swinging boat.

"And that Freeman—that wonderful, wonderful Freeman," interposed her husband. "We could see her lights—they were like the most wonderful Christmas tree anyone ever saw."

Two lifeboats were lowered, filled with the 60 crewmen and passengers. They made for the Freeman, about 1,000 yards away. The Washington Mail sank about 12 minutes after the second lifeboat rolled away.

When the lifeboats pulled alongside the Freeman, the crew of the troopship dropped cradles and lines to take the passengers aboard.

"It was a miracle that we made it without a serious accident," said Lester.

"Do you know—they say no ship has ever been wrecked in the North Pacific and all of the people aboard saved," Mr. Lester said.

"But it happened to us. We couldn't have lived through the night in those lifeboats—with the cold and the snow."

"God was with us all right. And now I'm going home and I'm never going to leave again."

### Psychologist Says 'Age Of Man' Gone

VIENNA, Austria (U.P.)—A leading psychologist tells Austrian men that the "age of man" is closing and they had better accept the equality of women as an established fact.

If they do, they will avoid "sexual conflicts."

The psychologist, Prof. Oskar Spiel, heads a municipal school where boys and girls are taught on an "individually psychological basis." He said in a lecture to the Austrian Society for Sexual Research:

"We live in the final phase of a masculine civilization which lasted for centuries."

Many Austrian men he said, still do not realize that and want to "assume the role of master over women." As a result, some men are having a "paralyzing fear" that they may fall with women.

Girls, on the other hand, may be "intimidated" by this male attitude and react by viewing everything male "with devaluation and scorn."

### TelePrompter Has Developed Device, 'Optical Outrider'

By CHARLES MERCER NEW YORK (AP)—TelePrompter, which has developed many marvelous devices to aid the harried speaker appearing before television cameras, has come up with a new one. It's called the "optical outrider."

The viewing public has become highly conscious of the TelePrompter, a machine which feeds a moving script for a speaker who almost—but not quite—appears to be talking extemporaneously. Most TV viewers these days can tell when a speaker uses a TelePrompter. In some cases the movement of a speaker's eyes as he reads his lines is pretty obvious.

But the optical outrider would appear to solve that problem. Published descriptions of the new development make it sound virtually foolproof. A glass coated with a thin layer of titanium dioxide is placed between the speaker and the TV camera. Magic lantern mirrors project the lines of a speech onto the coating on the speaker's side of the glass. The speaker reads his speech while gazing directly into the camera. The audience sees only the speaker.

A TelePrompter spokesman says the new optical outrider has been used with extraordinary efficiency on closed-circuit television programs by business men addressing audiences of their employees. In salesmanship, where the direct eye-to-eye approach is most important, where sincerity is prized above all, the new invention obviously is a great boon.

It would be surprising if the major political parties failed to make use of the new invention in this election year when television will have such a big role. But as one voter and viewer, I draw a fine line of distinction between salesmanship and politics. I hope that whenever a politician uses the optical outrider the TV audience will be so informed. In politics sincerity is more than a direct gaze. It includes a politician's ability to have firmly in mind a great mass of information which he interprets according to his views. If a politician has this attribute he is, to my mind, genuinely sincere. If he does not have it, then he can only be "sincere" in quotation marks.

### Citizens' Group To Be Appointed Soon By Governor

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A five-member citizens' committee will be appointed soon by Gov. Collins to take inventory of state-owned submerged land and make recommendations for preservation of Florida's waterfront beauty.

Collins was authorized by the Cabinet to make appointments after he reported "increased concern among citizens about filling and dredging."

The governor asked cabinet members to submit names of persons they believed qualified to serve on the committee.

"A lot of people are afraid the natural beauty is going to be destroyed by unplanned and indiscriminate dredging and filling," Collins said.

"Some is necessary but at the same time some advantage has been taken by private owners and some sound practices have occurred."

The governor said the committee will be financed by the State Natural Improvement Fund and will have authority to hire an aide to give it technical assistance.
