Hot Cocoa Carrot Pecan Bread

CARROT PECAN BREAD

1 1/2 cups sifted regular flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup corn oil

1 cup grated (medium fine) carrots (2 medium)

2 eggs

1/2 cup chopped pecans

On wax paper, sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. In a medium mixing bowl, stir together the sugar and corn oil; stir in flour mixture and carrots. Thoroughly beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in pecans. Turn into a greased 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 inch loaf pan. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—about 1 hour. Place pan on wire rack to cool for 5 minutes; turn out on rack right-side up, cool completely. Wrap tightly in plastic film and store overnight before slicing about 1/2-inch thick. If tightly wrapped, this bread keeps well.

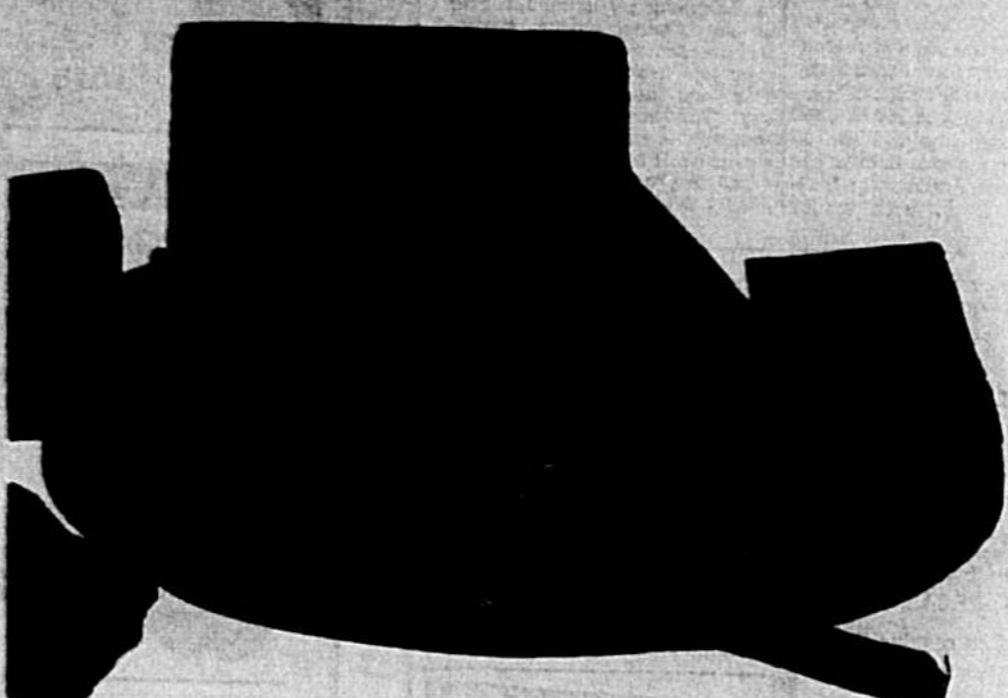

Truman Library Presented With Manuscript

NEW YORK (AP) — The
Harry S. Truman Library has
been presented with the manu-
script and memorabilia from
the song, "I'm Just Wild About
Harry."
Margaret Truman Daniel ac-
cepted two display cases on be-
half of her father from the writ-
ers of the song, Noble Sissle, 78,
and Eddie Blake, 84.
Sissle and Blake became part-
ners in 1915. "I'm Just Wild
About Harry" was written in
1931 for the long-running Negro
musical, "Buffalo Along."
A letter from the composers
to Truman said in part:
"The interesting thing about
'Harry' was that it actually was
written as an election song in a
show whose plot was almost a
parallel to the 1940 presidential
campaign. The story was about
the race for mayor in a small
Southern town. Our hero, Harry
Walton, was the underdog in his
race as you were in the election
of 1940.
"Although we did not have a
'Chicago Tribune' telling the
people that his rival had been
elected, it first appeared that
one of the candidates opposing
Harry in our race had won...
Well, a friend asked the ingenu-
ous how she felt about Harry when
he'd apparently lost. She re-
plied, 'I'm Just Wild About Har-
ry,' and went into the song."
Sissle and Blake are giving
most of their archives to the
Yale University Library.

This economical cut of meat makes a worthwhile main dish. Stuffed Veal Breast, Potatoes Broccoli, Salad Bowl, Fruit Sherbet, Reversal.

STUFFED VEAL BREAST
1/2 pound boned veal breast
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup packaged seasoned rice
1/4 cup chopped prunes
Salted boned veal breast, about 1 1/2 pounds
1 can (10-ounce) chicken gravy
1/4 teaspoon thyme
In a 15-inch skillet, cook together the sausage, onion and celery, crumbling sausage with a fork, until vegetables soften. Mix in croutons and prunes. Arrange over half of veal; fold meat over and shingle edge together. Roast in a small shallow pan in a 325-degree oven for about 1 1/2 hours. Ripen fat from pan. Let pan dripings sit a day, drained mushrooms and thyme. Continue cooking until veal is very tender—1 hour or longer. Thin gravy, if necessary, with liquid drained from mushrooms. Makes 4 servings.
