

The largest fiberglass boat nanufacturing company in the southeast United States will commence operations of a branch plant here on May 1. Southern Fiberglass Products, Inc., of Orlando, has taken a long-term lease on the new Williams plant at Sanford Industrial Park, on Sanford Avenue, at HLH Products.

The transaction was the second large such negotiation completed here recently by the industrial committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. The first was the transfer of the Del Mar building on West 20th Street to Chemical Corporation of America, at Tallahassee.

Harold L. Slama, president of Southern Fiberglass, said this morning part of his firm's operations will be removed here from Orlando, with operations to commence May 1.

He said presently the Orlando branch employs about 80 persons and manufactures nine fiberglass boats dally. About seven or eight of the Orlando personnel will be transferred to the Sanford plant, with another 55-65 persons to be employed locally, Production here will increase the firm's output to 15 boats daily, five at Orlando and 10 in Sanford Slama said. The firm manufactures the Cobia line of sports boating craft. These will be on display Thursday through Saturday at the industrial exhibit at Sanford Civic Center.

More Muscle In Court

Nobody has THE one answer to juvenile delinguency. The courts are, frankly, experimenting in an attempt to find the best approach in handling delinquents-to strike a mean between understanding and punish-ment that is best.calculated to salvage the potential of the young people who are brought before them.

Part of this experimentation is the juvenile court itself, which often looks as little like a court as possible. The judge, in business suit, may sit at the same table with the defendant and his mom and dad. Informality reigns and the atmosphere is one of friendliness.

The object, of course, is to show a youngster that the law and its enforcers are not to be feared and dreaded but that they are there to help him. .

Too often, apparently, this method not only has prevented fear of the court on the part of youthful offenders but respect for the court as well.

This picture is changing in many cities. Juvenile courts are becoming more formal and awesome, more like regular courts. The judge, robed in black, presides with solemnity from the elevation of his bench. The formal swearing-in procedure is followed with all witnesses.

Perhaps a little awe and fear mixed in with the compassion and understanding may be just the right formula to reach these youngsters. It's worth trying.

For to accord dignity to a court is also to accord dignity to those taking part in the proceedings. Maybe that's just what some kids need.

Crowded World

Even the skeptics have to admit that the human species is a rousing success in one way-the biological senze.

Human reproduction in the past few decades has been so phenomenal that the population of the world today constitutes about 4 per cent of all human beings who ever lived.

According to the estimate of An-nabelle Dismond of the Population Reference Bureau, 77 billion babies have been born since the advent of Homo sapiens about 600,000 years ago. (If, as some scientists now believe, man emerged a million years before that, the number of bables would be 96 billion.)

Such numbers are too big to comprehend. Even dire predictions of billions more babies crowding into the world within the next century seem academic in Western countries, where living standards continue to rise.

Americans tend to feel themselves exempt from the population explosion, forgetting that this country has the highest birth rate of any indus-trialized nation. Although the rate has dropped in recent years, the absolute numbers go on soaring.

If current trends continuo-a 50 per cent increase every generation -there will be one billion Americans 100 years from now.

America, fortunately, still has ma-ny open spaces and wilderness areas where we can get away from our own kind-like the dwindling redwood forests of California, through which roadbuilders want to slash a superhighway.

Where we will all park our cars in order to enjoy the beauties of na-ture, no one has explained. Recent studies of what happens

to animal populations under conditions of overcrowding suggest that satisfying the world's demands for food and material resources may be the least of our children's worries. Observations of jackrabbits in Minnesota and the famous lemmings of Norway, for example, show that animals react disastrously and ir-

rationally to overcrowding. The "acute stress syndrome" takes the form of liver disease and heart trouble, as well as such abnormal social behavior as killing the young and, in the lemmings, sudden mass migrations.


Contrary to popular belief, the lemmings die not from suicide but apparently from diseases of the nervous system brought on by stress.

The frightening implication is that men are not so different from the other animals as we would like to believe. As one scientist has written, if we cannot control our numbers through the use of our human intellects, subhuman mechanisms are waiting to do it for us.
