Long Lease In Industrial Park Signed

The largest fiberglass boat manufacturing company in the southeast United States will commence operations of a branch plant here on May 1.

The transaction was the second large such negotiation completed here recently by the industrial committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. The first was the transfer of the Del Mar building on West 20th Street to Chemical Corporation of America, at Tallahassee.

Harold L. Slama, president of Southern Fiberglass, said this morning part of his firm's operations will be removed here from Orlando, with operations to commence May 1.

He said presently the Orlando branch employs about 80 persons and manufactures nine fiberglass boats daily. About seven or eight of the Orlando personnel will be transferred to the Sanford plant, with another 55-65 persons to be employed locally.

Production here will increase the firm's output to 15 boats daily, five at Orlando and 10 in Sanford Slama said. The firm manufactures the Cobia line of sports boating craft. These will be on display Thursday through Saturday at the industrial exhibit at Sanford Civic Center.

When Gene R. Meadors, owner of Meadors Marine, learned only two weeks ago that Southern Fiberglass needed to expand its operations at Orlando, he informed Scott Burns and Carl Schilke, co-chairmen of the Chamber's industrial committee.

Civil Rights 'Debate' Explains Bill's Impact, Says Russell

Seventh Week Of Talkathon Gets Under Way

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey said today that debate on the civil rights bill "has now reached the filibuster stage."

But Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., said there were indications that the "preliminary debate" was bringing to the American people a better understanding of the bill's "momentous impact" on their daily lives and system of government.

The leaders of the opposing Senate factions gave their views in statements written for UPI as the Senate headed into the seventh week of debate on the House-passed bill, hopeful of finally voting on some amendments.

The Senate, which has been on a 18-hour work day, resumes talk today on the measure to ban racial discrimination in voting, education, employment, unions, public accommodations and use of federal funds.

Humphrey, in declaring that debate had reached the filibuster stage, said both supporters and opponents of the bill had presented their cases "in depth." The main question ahead is whether the Senate is going to be permitted to vote on the bill, he said.

The Minnesota senator said he was confident that "when the time comes that we are forced to invoke cloture we will receive that two-thirds vote" needed to shut off debate.

Russell indicated, however, that the Southerners were prepared for a long talkfest. He said that "when the bill has been fully debated, we have reason to hope that all of our people will understand how it will destroy many more rights and liberties than it can possibly create."

The Georgia senator said opponents would "continue to utilize all of the means at our command to separate fact from fiction and pretense, and sequent the entire country with the destructive effects that this bill will have on our present system and the American way of life."

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Total income and cash flow of Food Fair Properties, Inc. increased in 1963 to all-time high levels. Samuel Friedman, president, in the annual report to shareholders, also disclosed that the company, one of the leading developers and operators of shopping centers, is diversifying its activities into the urban redevelopment industry.

The company's 1963 cash flow (net income plus depreciation and deferred income taxes) amounted to \$3,607,389, compared with \$2,418,206 the year before.

Total income, including \$168,877 profit on sale of land, was \$9,568,428, against \$8,291,502 in 1962 when profit on sale of land was \$35,440. Net income after depreciation expense of \$3,376,539 was \$235,879, compared to \$175,381 in 1962 when depreciation expense totaled \$2,078,611. The company's total assets increased in 1963 to a new high of \$94,925,284.

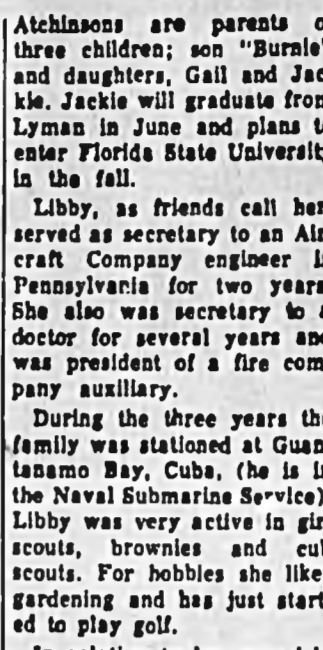

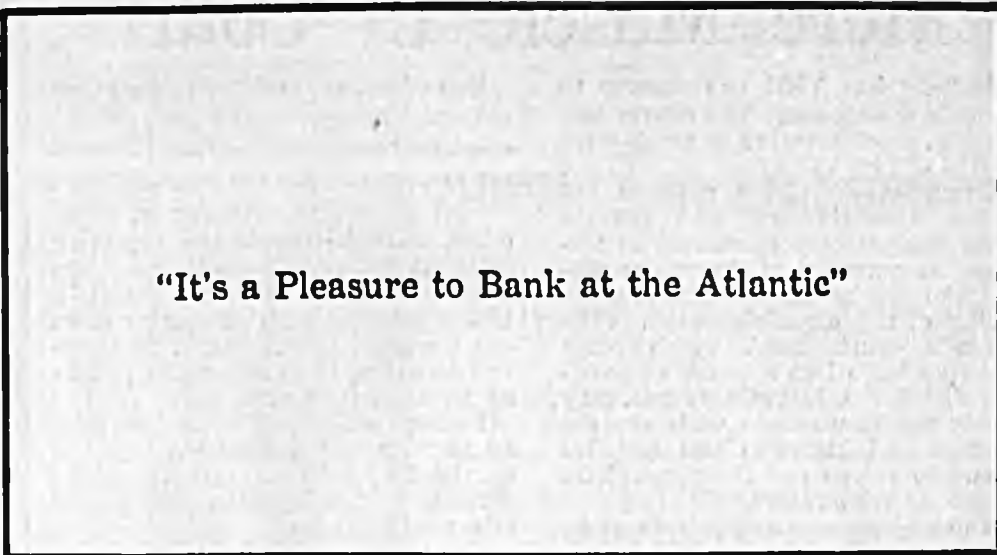

The language you use in everyday conversation with your friends at school is probably adequate. But do you feel like a wallflower in conversation with older people because your active vocabulary is limited or inaccurate? The best way to enlarge and improve it is to improve your passive (reading) vocabulary. There are four simple steps. LEARN FROM CONTEXT. Try this sentence for vocabulary size. "No matter where I go my little sister turns up, leading me to conclude that she shares ubiquity with the deity." Look at it in its context,

the way it is used. There's only one sense that word can have there—being everywhere at the same time. Don't go to the dictionary till you've made an educated guess. Then, by all means, do go to the dictionary. Then practice that old saying: "Use a word three times, and it's yours."

LEARN FROM LISTENING. Maybe it was the same wise man who said "Knowledge enters through a closed mouth," and "Choose at least one friend who is smarter than you." Your elders—parents, friends of the family, your teachers—will frequently use words you've never heard or are unsure of. Wait for the proper moment, then respectfully ask them the exact meaning. They'll be flattered; you'll be informed.

LEARN FROM WHAT YOU ALREADY KNOW. In grade school they taught you prefixes and suffixes. Make full use of them. Submarine, anteroom, ambidextrous, amphibian, perimeter, polygon, extricate. If you forget what those mean, try here to derive their meaning from your knowledge of the entire word. Then when you encounter a strange word with one of these prefixes, you have additional knowledge to bring to the context.

Psychology, a aquarium, changeable, staturesque, anthropoid, lunacy, aviary are

all words with suffixes. Think of other words with the same suffixes and discover the common denominator between the meanings.

LEARN FROM THE DICTIONARY. If you could learn all new words from the three foregoing steps, there would be no market for dictionaries. No top editor or writer would be caught without one; it's part of learning's equipment.

Here's how to use the dictionary:
1. Get the EXACT meaning.
2. Look for examples of

how the word has been used.
3. Look for different shades of meaning, colloquial usage.
4. If you look up a verb, don't leave the page till you check out its noun, adjective, adverb.

Learning new words is not enough; learn them with precision. Then use them three times and they're yours.
You should have completed this reading in 60 seconds.

'Sky Spy' Ahead Of Schedule

HOUSTON (UPI)—A "spy in the sky" satellite system—electronic eyes to detect nuclear test ban cheating in the far reaches of space—is more than one year ahead of schedule. It was learned this weekend.

Next year the program will shift toward an attempt to test advanced moonlets that could spot nuclear explosions low in the earth's atmosphere. This is beyond the abilities of the first two satellites—already in orbit and on "catch."

The two satellites, called Vela, weigh about 500 pounds each. They were fired into orbit from Cape Kennedy by an Atlas-Agena rocket in a secrecy-cloaked launching last fall.

Which One Is The Myth - Johnson Or Kennedy?

By Holmes Alexander
WASHINGTON — Some of us the other night at a stag party briefing listened to an analysis of the Johnson Budget by an Eisenhower Republican. The normal political bias was there, but so were the bona fides.
 The briefing officer, an established and experienced expert, had spent 19 workdays doing a line-by-line dissection of LBJ's 1,165-page, four-pound, seven-ounce fiscal testament, the Federal Budget for the year that begins in July, and of related documents. All the presidential claims of prudence and frugality, economy and cutback,

made since last November, were examined, analyzed and evaluated. And as the meaning of it all began to break through upon us, a financial reporter at my table leaned toward me and said: "Poor Jack!"
 Poor John F. Kennedy! For, if our briefing officer's revelations of LBJ's fiscal trickery and bookkeeping contrivances were at all valid, and if the country, the Congress and the press are being gulled into believing the presidential claims, then Johnson had written another searing chapter on the "myth" of JFK.

Somebody asked the inevitable question: If cutting the Budget and halving the deficit were so easy, why hadn't Kennedy, with exactly the same team of financial advisers that Johnson was using, done the same thing?
 "Well, Kennedy walked more boldly, more honestly up to the facts," we were told. So, which man is the "myth": JFK or LBJ? I would want to wait a while to find the answer. Johnson, with his keener sensitivity to public and Congressional sentiment, moved with speed and flourish to achieve economies. He cancelled the Dynasoar project. He ordered the closing of obsolete military bases. He cut the projected Federal roster. He brought in a Budget that was well under the frightening \$100 billion figure.

He slashed the "planned" deficit in twain.
 Before going into the alleged bamboozle, it ought to be said that a certain amount is allowable for political showmanship. All presidents make their budgets and budget-planning look as plausible and palatable as possible. In Johnson's case, he greatly heartened the general public, which is sickened by decades of big Federal spending. And he cheered the business community, which has already responded with rising private enterprise investment. Confidence-building is part of any president's job, and Johnson does it superbly.

Moreover, although Johnson is accused by Republicans of saving today what must be spent tomorrow, there is a chance that he may be saving tomorrow also. Military spending, especially on the nuclear arsenal, has reached a high plateau from which we may, by 1965-66 be able to level off or make a drastic reduction. If so, Johnson's betting-on-the-future economies will prove more genuine than Republicans allow. But meanwhile, here are some hand - is - quicker - than - the-eye manipulations which seem to make Johnson look like a better president than Kennedy:
 Soon after Kennedy's death, Johnson increased his predecessor's spending program by \$300 million, which might just as well have come next year. The move made JFK look like the spender and LBJ like next year's saver. Kennedy had estimated the tax cut would stimulate prosperity and gain \$1.4 billion in Federal revenues. Somehow, Johnson leaped on Walter Heller and Kermit Gordon—the financial wizards who served both Presidents — to make this figure read \$4.6 billion — a gain of better than \$3 billion for Johnson over Kennedy.
 Soon after Kennedy's death, Johnson announced a "substantial decrease in Federal employment. But the decrease came to only 1290 persons by Republican count, and at about the same time the President proposed adding double that number, 2628 persons, in Federal contracts with private enterprise.

Britain Joins U. S., New York Faces Biggest Traffic Jam In History

LONDON (UPI) — Britain, following the United States and Russia, announced today that military nuclear fuel production is being "gradually terminated."

Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home told parliament any plutonium produced by civil reactors will not be used for nuclear weapons.

Douglas-Home's announcement said the United States also has undertaken to use none of the plutonium, supplied to it by Britain under existing agreements, for weapons production.

"Her majesty's government have already adjusted their supplies of fissile material to the minimum necessary to maintain our independent nuclear deterrent and to meet all our defense requirements for the foreseeable future," the announcement said.

Welcoming the United States and Soviet decisions Monday to cut back production of fissionable material, Douglas-Home said Britain is "contributing fully to the initiative President Johnson and Premier Nikita Khrushchev are now taking."

He said British production of fissionable materials always has been on a very much smaller scale than in the United States and Russia.

In Moscow East-West agreement on reduction of enrichment uranium and plutonium production was hailed by diplomats here as an important step in continuing the cold war thaw.

But scientific experts in Western missions here said it would be wrong to expect the agreement to alter the military strength of either side.

At Geneva, Russia said that its cutback in the production of nuclear explosives would be approximately the same as the American reduction.

President Johnson announced Monday that the United States will reduce production of enriched uranium by 40 per cent and of plutonium by 20 per cent.

Local residents also will be entertained by the Bahia Shrine Temple band of Orlando at 7:30 p.m. Friday at First Street and Magnolia Avenue, Robb said.

The two-day program for the Shriners, themselves, will open with a golf tournament at noon Friday at Mayfair Country Club.

Highlight of the meeting will be the initiation of 100 candidates into the Shrine Saturday afternoon at Seminole High School.

ETV Programs Due To Begin Early In 1965

Dr. Al Edmunds, director of Educational television station WMFE-TV, Channel 23, said today that he expects the station will go on the air Jan. 4, 1965.

The station, an ultra high frequency operation, has received a grant of \$119,087 which was turned over to R. Earl Kipp, president of the ETV Corporation and superintendent of Orange County Schools, by the corporation's treasurer, R. T. Milwee, superintendent of Seminole County schools.

Milwee said the grant was the first to a public school system in the United States. "There have been 18 other grants," said Milwee, "but this is the first one to be made to a public school system. The others have been made to colleges, universities and other high level organizations and institutions."

The station's programming is scheduled to reach some 100,000 school children daily, not including those who will be reached through an adult education program to be started later.

At the present time, the ETV group has five programs on the air, all to be carried on Channel 2.

Reconnaissance Called 'Highly Dangerous'

MIAMI (UPI) — The Cuban government lodged a protest with the Swiss embassy today regarding U. S. reconnaissance flights over the Communist island.

News of the protest was aired on a Havana Radio broadcast monitored here.

"The Cuban government has never and will never accept the fact that U. S. Air Force planes violate Cuban air space," said the written protest, signed by Minister Raul Roa.

The United States has continued air surveillance of the Caribbean island since the missile crisis of 1962.

"Regarding the statement made yesterday by the U. S. State Department that any interference with these American planes would be 'highly dangerous,' the Cuban government wants to make clear that the responsibility of any dangerous situation thus created will be exclusively the responsibility of the U. S. government," the note added.

Roa said Cuba has "repeatedly protested" U. S. overflights. He charged such flights are "a violation of international law and the sovereignty of Cuba."

Floridans Off To World's Fair

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant and state officials left for New York in a Florida National Guard plane today to participate in the opening of the World's Fair Wednesday.

A number of National Guard personnel accompanied the governor.

An hour later, a group of close to 100 Florida business leaders and newsmen, with state agriculture commissioner Doyle Conner as host, left for the fair aboard a new Eastern 727 jetliner, furnished by Eastern Air Lines.

A number of private businesses, including Minute Maid, Coca Cola, Tupperware, Viking Lithographers and the Florida Gas Company, are paying expenses of the businessmen and newsmen.

The Florida group will see President Johnson officially open the fair at noon Wednesday and at 2 p. m. will assemble for dedication of the Florida pavilion.

The Florida group will return Thursday.
