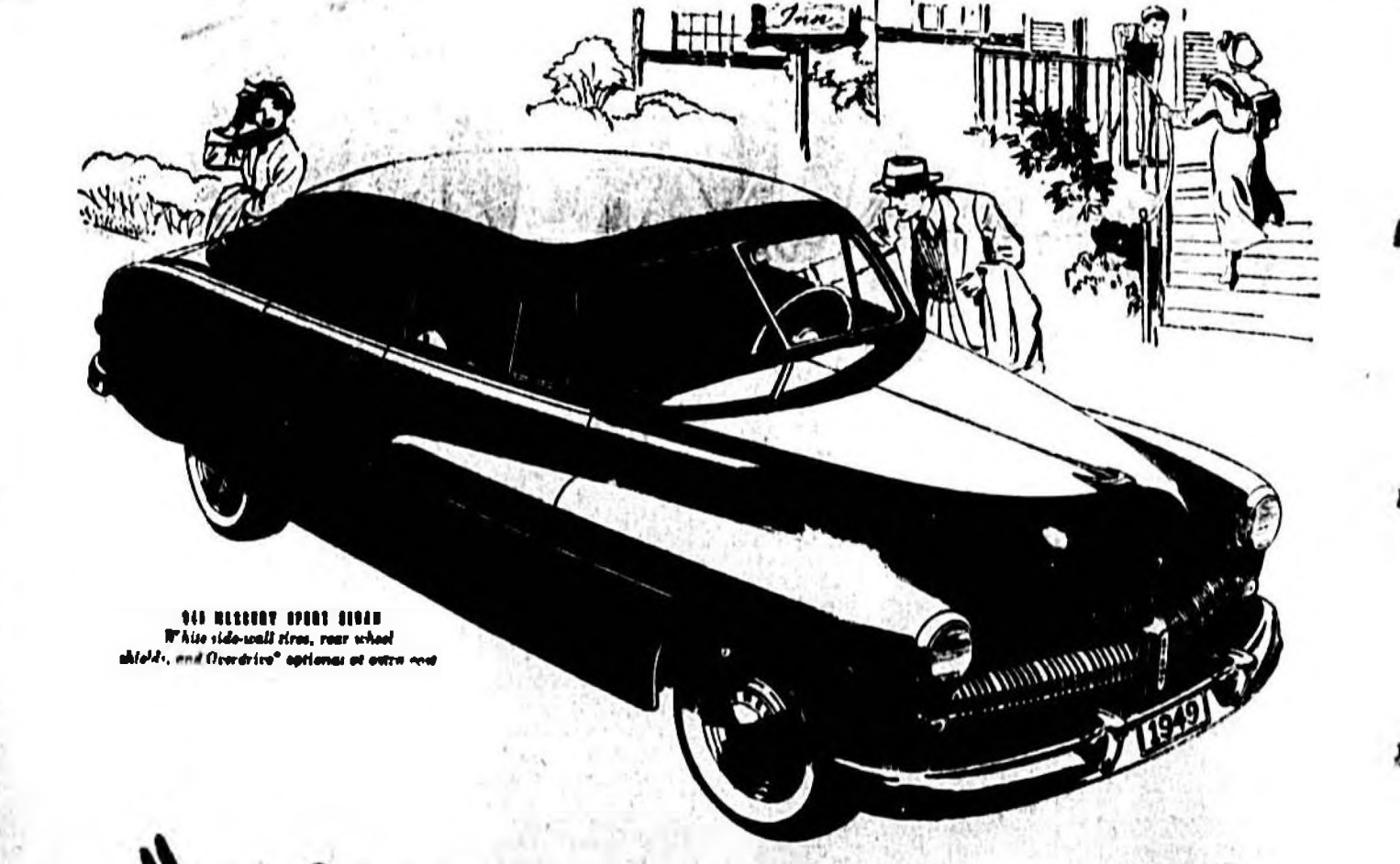

Recipe for Stuffed Fish Follows: CHURCH OF THE SAVIORS SQUARES Ingredients: 1 cup sifted cake flour, 1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup butter or margarine (2 1/2 pounds), 1 cup granulated sugar, 2 eggs, 2 small (1/4 pint) unsweetened chocolate melted, 1/2 cup vanilla, 1/2 cup chopped Method: Mix sifted flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream butter and sugar with a spoon until light and fluffy. Add the sugar and mix well. Continue to cream the mixture until it is soft and well mixed, adding the melted chocolate and the egg. Turn into 8 x 8 x 2-inch greased pan and bake in a moderate (325) oven for 35 minutes. They can be eaten hot or when partly cooled cut into squares. Remove from pan when you use a sharp knife and a cutting board.

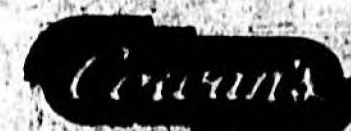





Using fly lures both with plugs and fly rods he reported success in catching such salt water fish as snook, tarpon, barracuda, red fish and lady fish. Fasten the fly 12 to 20 inches back of the plug, he advised. Use a two gang plunker plug that will not allow the line to tangle.

### Teen Aged Work Hard At Summer Music Foundation

BREVARD, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—An eager bunch of barefoot, blue-jeaned teen-agers, summer camping near here, is doing the music work on a Southern grown music culture.

A cacophony of orchestra, choral, voice and instrument echoes through their mountain haven, deep in the heart of the Blue Ridge. Blending with the shouts of swimmers and the ping of tennis balls.

Out of this tested combination, its leader is convinced, will come a home-grown Dixie music culture that will take.

"The veneer of imported music has peeled off Southern cultural hides like bark off a slippery elm," contends native North Carolinian Jim Pfohl, director of the camp. "The South must grow its own performers, develop its own organizations, to come of age in music."

Transylvania Music Camp, which Pfohl is directing for the civic, non-profit Brevard Music Foundation, is trying to fill that big order.

Mrs. Henry N. Carrier, a great-granddaughter of showman P. I. Barnum and president of the foundation, believes the camp and its annual post-camp festival has attained a development "as the nucleus of a Southern-born music culture of national import."

Growth of the camp during its first years here may justify her optimistic south-wide outlook. It is comparable, but not patterned after, the annual high schoolers music camp at Interlochen, Mich., and Boston Symphony Conducter Serge Koussevitzky's Berkshire camp.

It began with a handful of campers, most of them from North Carolina. It was Pfohl's personal project and he recruited the students from among his contacts in the area.

Director of music at Davidson College, near Charlotte, N. C., After two summers of musically successful but financially tight operations, the foundation was formed. It took over the camp and added a music festival.

The camp and its festival have prospered. Enrollment this year is nearly 125 boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 18 drawn from ten states.

Four scholastic are offered. A fifth will be set up by violinist Carroll Glenn, a southern native of Chester, S. C., with proceeds from a camp concert. Her husband, pianist Eugene List, will appear with the camp band in another concert.

The ambition of the festival knows no bounds. This year it will close its Aug. 12-14 and 19-21 season with what may be the South's first full orchestral and choral performance of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony.

The instructional staff of 65 is drawn from the nation's leading opera, symphony, philharmonic and ballet societies.

Five hours a day is devoted to rehearsal or practice and lessons. Tuesday and Saturday night and Sunday afternoon concerts, open to the public, are well-attended.

Practice studios dot the hillside above the camp lake. A basketball court open on two sides, serves as the auditorium for orchestra and band rehearsals. Porches of the mess hall, administration building, and other camp structures often are the scene of rehearsals for smaller groups.

Outstanding performers among the students remain on after the seven-week camp season for a few others who come in for the occasion to make up the 70-piece festival orchestra, which Pfohl directs.

While it is the festival, now approaching its fourth season, that has gained attention for the foundation, it is the camp and its work on which the South can hope to build its own music culture, Pfohl contends.

"We are showing the South that music is for normal, average people, and not something foisted off on a gullible public by a bunch of screwballs and crackpots. It is that prejudice, as much as anything, that has blocked the spread of music in the South."

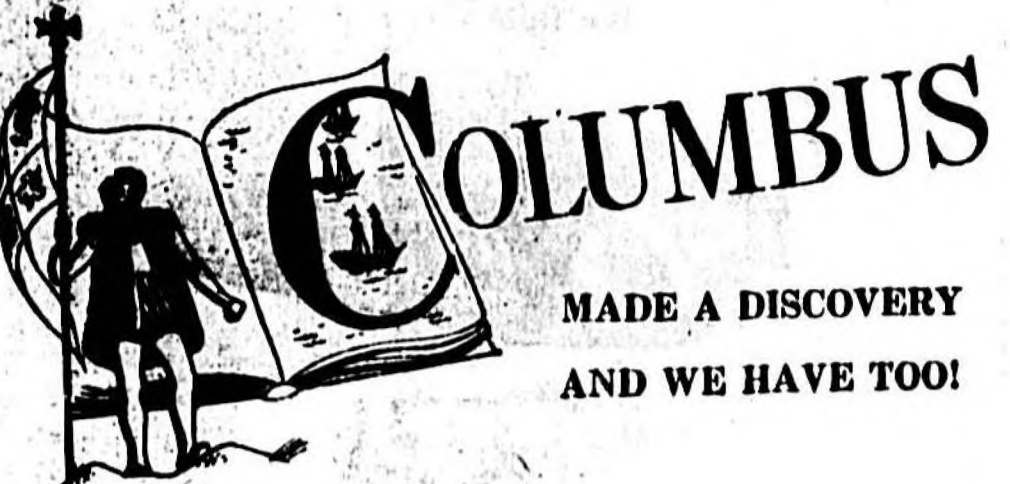

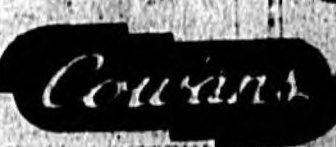
