

Communist China, hard pressed to control the millions held under her thumb, is inaugurating a new spy plan to keep a check on citizens all the way down to the village level. Many Chinese live in the thousands of unmapped villages scattered through the many promise. News doe not reach these tiny hamlets easily. Promise some people living there have not yet heard that the war with Japan is over. Certainly there are many thousands not yet indoctrinated with the new political outlook demanded of all Chinese loyal to the People's Republic.

So a new program of teaching and telling begins. Committees are being formed of "three to eleven local activists" to work closely with the people and detect spies or others not following the party line. These committees have four duties. They are:

1. To elevate political vigilance of the people and at the same time to observe them closely in order to guard against activities of spies and traitors.

2. To prevent sabotage and to organize and lead the people in co-operation with the government. 8. To increase the mass support for the government by assisting in re-education of counter-revolu-

tionaries. 4. To help in the preservation of law and order. Thus becomes plain the foundattion of an organization which, if properly supervised, can be counted on to conduct

nation-wide movements on a grand scale. In other words, spying on your neighbor in China will become, soon, a government duty and a proof of loyalty. Pray that America, even in her darkest hour of most dread danger, may never descend to this low level.

Long Step Toward Unity

The Schuman plan, proposed by the French Foreign Minister, Robert Schuman, aiming to pool Western Europe's coal and steel, has begun to operate. The nations involved, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy Luxembourg and the Netherlands, have sent representatives to the opening session in Luxembourg.

The plan's fundamental purpose is to end the long enmity between France and Germany. Their wars were mostly waged to give the winner control of the loser's coal and steel. Sleeping Sickness No Casualties Occur Is Spreading Over Califorina Areas

SAN FRANCISCO UM — Ah en cephalitis epidemic is creeping northward up California's centra valleys, borne on the wings of the tiny female mosquito.

Already the sleeping sickness has claimed 30 lives and nearly \$600 here here traveled stricken.

500 have been reported stricken, the State Health Department re

Twelve died within the last week Doctors are powerless to check the disease. There is no known vaccine for humans. The only hope is to kill off the mosquitos. Hundreds of men are

spraying 276 towns in the valley towlands and then laying down quarter-mile-wide barriers of poi son residue spray around them. The female culex tarsalis mos quito—common in California—car ries the disease from birds and fowl to horses and humans. It is

not carried from horses to humans. A total of 499 cases have been reported to the State Health De partment, but only 315 have been clinically diagnosed as encephali Two blood tests from the patient

are necessary to determine abso-lutely that the disease is enceph-alitis. In most of the reported cases, the necessary two blood bean countries and possessions tests were not taken.

Dr. Malcolm Merrill. acting director of the health department, said the disease acts quickly. Those stricken usually recover quickly or die within 24 to 48 hours.






