# Not Enough Videotaping In Drunken-Driving Cases?

Persons charged with drunken driving are not being videotaped often enough while taking field sobriety tests during the booking process, according to an assistant state

attorney in Seminole County. "It's true when they say one picture is worth a thousand words," said Craig Boda, an assistant state attorney responsible for prosecuting one-third of the county's drunkendriving cases. "We've had a problem with them (arresting officers at the Seminole County Correctional Facility) not using it (the videotape machine) enough.

"Why they aren't using it more I don't know," he added. In January 1981 a videotape recorder was installed at the county jail to record people taking field sobriety tests who are

charged with driving while intoxicated. The recording is used as evidence by assistant state attorneys when the case comes to trial, said Steve Saunders, jall administrator.

Whether the recorder is used or not, however, is a decision left to the arresting officer, said John Spolski, communications

supervisor for the Sheriff's Department. Spolski said the video recorder is not used sometimes when the department's computerized Breathalyzer reading in-

The county's computerized Breathalyzer machine is rarely challenged by the defense attorney in a drunken driving court case because the machine is one of the newest available and quite accurate, Spolski said.

dicates a large blood-alcohol level in the person charged.

When an individual charged with drunk driving sees a videotape of himself obviously drunk and unable to perform the sobriety tests, however, he almost always pleads guilty to the charge, Boda said.

Since Dec. 1, 24 people charged with drunken driving have been videotaped at the county jail, Spolski said. He said he was unable to gather the actual number of arrests for drunken driving made during that time before press time today.

Asked whether some judges refused to admit the videotape as evidence in a drunken driving trial he prosecuted, Boda said

He said the only problem he thought a judge might have with the videotape is certifying that it was not tampered with prior to the trial. Usually the law-enforcement agency's custody officer can be subpoenaed to certify the tape was always in his

custody, the assistant state attorney said. Last June the Seminole County Sheriff's Department received a grant from the state Bureau of Highway Safety for \$10,794 to purchase three color video recorders and accompanying equipment.

The Sheriff's Department already had its black-and-white recorder operable and some of the new equipment was incorporated into the drunken driver recorder system. The rest of the equipment was used elsewhere in the jail's video recorder system, Saunders said.

The other two color video recorder systems were given to the Sanford and Altamonte Springs police departments.

Sanford's Breathalyzer unit is currently not functioning, and all people arrested for drunken driving are booked and videotaped if the officer requests it, at the county jail, according to a Sanford Police Department representative.

# **Promised** 'Fireworks' Fizzle In Casselberry

It's been more than a week since the Casselberry City Council was promised "fireworks" by a disgruntled city resident whose reappointment to the city's Planning and Zoning Commission was rejected by the council, but to date all is quiet.

Vince Ballassona, 30 Apple Hill Hollow, "promised fireworks" to the council at its Jan. 11 meeting after it voted 4-1 to reject Mayor Owen Sheppard's reappointment recommendation of Ballassona to the board. Councilman Jim Lavigne cast the dissenting vote.

However, Ballassona was not present at Monday's council meeting, as he earlier indicated he would be.

"On the advice of my attorney, I didn't attend the meeting," Ballassona said. "We're still looking at the situation, and I can promise you this, we're not done

The opposition to Ballassona's reappointment was led by Councilman Frank Schutte, who said he questioned NU. WAY 4 LEGITES! action on a matter that could have influenced a controversial condominium project. However, Ballassona said he requested the delay as "a citizen of Casselberry, not as a board member."

Councilman Bill Grier said at the Jan. il meeting, he could not support the reappointment because of reports he received that Ballassona had used distasteful language in front of two women in a local store and that he was asked to leave the store.

"My argument is not with Councilman Grier," Ballassona said. "Schutte is the one I want. He's the one who's leading this whole thing against me."

However, the council Monday night unanimously approved the appointment of Beverly Heroy, 160 Lemon Lane, to the board position previously held by Bollassona.

In other action Monday night, the council voted unanimously to reappoint James Allen, 525 Grandview Way, and William Spegele, 2009 Kewannee Trail, to the Board of Adjustment. Lavigne was appointed to the board as the council's representative, replacing Councilman John Leighty, who is now serving as council vice chairman.

# Property-Tax Hike Seen Needed To Save St. Johns

River Water Management District, said. which includes Seminole County, are sincere about wanting to save the river, saved. they can agree to a property tax increase to pay the costs.

That was the message given by Fran Pignone of Orlando, chairman of the of Commerce task force to save the river.

Mrs. Pignone said that currently the district is levying a property tax of 12.1 improperly advertised. cents per \$1,000 assessed property value but that is has authority to levy up to 37.5 cents per \$1,000. She added that the Legislature can authorize a tax rate of up

to \$1 per \$1,000 value. The people of Jacksonville are willing to pay the additional taxes, Mrs. Pignone said. And Sonny Vagara, executive director of the district, said a \$1 tax rate would bring the district \$10 million in revenues annually. The money could be used to purchase some 160,000 acres more of property needed for flood-plain storage of water during the rainy seesons. The district to date has acquired more than 100,000 acres.

Mrs. Pignone said it may be three to four years before federal money can be received for the project, designed to increase the flow and decrease pollution in the river. "We may not have gold

He said the immediate problem facing the district involves the need for the Legislature to re-enact legislation authorizing the district to levy taxes. He district, to the Greater Sanford Chamber said the new legislation is necessary because of a state appellate court ruling that the act authorizing the taxation was

> Vagara said the state is committed to spending \$80 million to save the river over the next 10 years.

> Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the chamber committee, said U.S. Rep. Bill Chappell, D-Ocala, whose district includes part of Seminole County, is to meet with the committee at 3 p.m. Thursday at Sanford City Hall. He is to report on the assistance he will be giving on gaining federal funding for the project.

Dennis Auth, water management district engineer, said a major reason that the flow of the St. Johns has been decreasing in large part because of the infringement of development. Where the river had 687,604 square miles of waterstorage area in marshes and flood plains previously, some 297,000 square miles of that has been lost because of development. The loss of storage area means less dilution of pollution. In the lost storage area, Auth said, 240

canals have been built over the years. Where water in marshlands would move about 100 feet in a day, water in the canals moves about 40 miles daily.

Of the 160,000 acres the district hopes to acquire, the state owns some of the property and the federal government owns some, Auth said. But the state at this point has not determined how much of the property it does own in the area.

Vagara said the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is scheduled to determine by April whether it will approve the water management district's plan to acquire the marshland and flood plain or will opt for a ditch approach to store water. The corps is charged by the federal government, when it approves a plan, to consider whether the acquisition of land, the ditch approach or a combination is the

Vagara cautioned that saving the St. Johns cannot be equated with stopping Lake Monroe from flowing south, a backward flow. He said a backward flow in the river should not occur, after the acquisition of storage land, as often as it now does. "It's still possible to increase the flow of the river and stop pollution," he said. — DONNA ESTES

# They're Carving Up County 3 Or 4 Ways

Seminole County, at this point in the reapportionment propositions floating around the state capitol, stands to be cut up among three state Senate districts and four state House districts.

Neither of the county's two state representatives - Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, and Bobby Brantley, R-Longwood - is happy with the proposal. Hattaway went so far as to say today that if districts as currently drawn are passed by the Legislature, Florida's Supreme Court may wind up drawing the district lines for the state.

State Sen. John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach, whose current district includes Seminole county, did not play a part in the proposed Senate districting, done entirely by a Republican-Democratic coalition headed by State Sen. Dempsey Barron, D-Panama City.

Vogt predicted the Barron proposal, which splits up Seminole among three

districts, will pass the Senate today. He said it is likely the House will hold the plan hostage to get what it wants in a congressional-district plan. Vogt was critical particularly of the plan's chopping up the city of Sanford, adding, however, that despite his efforts he was unable to correct the problem.

Vogt is not a member of the Barron coalition. "No one has been looking out for Seminole County in the Senate," he said. "I tried but was unsuccessful."

He said more Republicans than Democrats had input into the Barron plan and that the Republican Party hopes to pick up four Senate seats under the

While Seminole has a population of some 180,000 -- 75 percent of the 240,000 needed for a Senate seat - that 75 percent, under the Barron proposal, would be split among three districts.

One senatorial district would include part of the south end of the county - part of Casselberry and part of Altamonte Springs (about 15,000) people - with Orange County in a district for Sen. Toni Jennings, R-Orlando.

A central portion of Seminole County and part of Sanford would be included with part of Brevard and Osceola counties in a district for Vogt. His current district includes Seminole.

Sanford with Lake County and other areas for Sen. Dick Langley, R-North Lake Minneola. The House apportionment plan as of 9

p.m. Tuesday, Brantley said, would split Seminole into four districts. Only Brantley's district would be wholly contained within Seminole County. While Seminole, with its 180,000

population, could have two entire House districts (each district is to have \$1,000 to 83,000 people), the current plan is to give the county only one complete House district - for Brantley - and split the remainder of the county into three districts to be included with other counties.

Brantley said the plan calls for part of Sanford to be placed with Volusia County, part of the south end (15,000 people) to to be included in a district for State Rep. Thomas Drage, R-Orlando; and to include part of the county with 15,000 people from Brevard into a district for Hattaway.

Brantley said the Senate plan could be "good or bad for Seminole County, depending on how you look at it. But nothing is carved in stone yet," he added. He said he has talked with Miss Jen-

nings and Langley and both have agreed to participate in a Seminole County legislative delegation if the Barron planin approved. Hallaway said Barron has "chopped

up Seminole County to protect Vogt, Jennings and Langley. They are using Seminole County as part of the puzzle." Hattaway noted, however, that he and Vogt have always worked well together for the county.


Barron has said his plan has the support of 30 of the 40 state senators. Vogt is not part of the Barron group. Brantley said the Barron plan, ap-

proved by a Senate committee Tuesday, is likely to pass the Senate this week. Brantley said the plan then will likely be held hostage by the House as a

bargaining point to trade on other issues. "The county definitely is going to be split," Brantley said. "By talking to Miss Jennings and Langley I wanted to be sure they would attend and participate with the delegation. By being included with Orange, this may help bridge the gap that there has always been between Seminole and Orange, and help Seminole, especially on roads."

Hattaway said reapportionment is "a long ways from completion." Using the word "gerry mandering" several times to describe both the current Senate and House plans, Hattaway said State Rep. Fran Carlton, D-Orlando, is responsible for the boundaries set in the House districts.

Brantley added that Mrs. Carlton's commitment is to keep Orange County

# Lunch Prices Likely To Hold

Despite a deficit in the operation of the student lunch programs in the Seminole County public achools, School Superintendent Robert Hughes will not recommend that prices for the lunches be increased this school year,

"It would be confusing to students who participate in the program and their parents to attempt a price increase at this point in the year," Hughes said. "There are still too many unanswered questions."

Hughes added that participation in the program historically increases as the school year advances.

And School Board members Bill Kroll and Roland Williams

Kroll said a price increase at this point, "would kill the program. It would make it worse off than it already is. It would have the tendency to drive away more paying customers," he

Williams said he is still studying information gathered by school food-service personnel on the status of the program. "I would like to hold the prices down. I know that inflation is really hurting families quite a bit right now," he said. Board member Pat Telson said lunch prices that went into effect this school year (a 10-cent increase per lunch for paying students) had something to do with the dropoff in participation in the program.

"After looking at the price, some mothers probably thought it would be better to send a sandwich with their children to school." she said.

Mrs. Telson noted that she has been fighting for years to have the lunch program in the elementary schools include a salad bar. She said more and more children are becoming aware of salads and their nutritional value.

She said she must read a food-service report on the lunch program and student participation before making a judgment

on whether prices should be increased. The school food service this year instituted a salad bar in the high schools and is considering including one in the middle

schools next school year. - DONNA ESTES

#### Blast Kills 6 Pupils; **Water Heater Blamed**

SPENCER, Okla. (UPI) -A large water heater that exploded during lunch hour in an elementary-school cafeteria, killing five students and a teacher, had been checked out by maintenance men only hours earlier. Investigators blamed a pressure buildup in the

kitchen area's water heater, which Oklahoma City School Superintendent Tom Payment confirmed had been worked on earlier Toesday.

#### **Auto Negotiations Stall**

#### Crash Victims Lost?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Salvage operations entered their seventh day today for the sunken wreckage of an Air Florida jetlines, and the director of the recovery team worried aloud that some of the missing 18 bodies might never be found.

Late this morning, divers recovered the flight data recorder and cockpit voice recorder from the jetliner — devices they hope will help pinpoint the cause of the disaster in which 78 people died.

which handles all incoming and outgoing calls, "lost its namory ... everything was erased, but we don't know why."

i"Usually, a power surge or a lightning hit will cause its sismory to be erased, but in this case, we're not sure what deemed it," said Strickler.

# Apopka Couple Jailed In 3 Holdups

An Apooka couple have been arrested and charged in connection with the armed robberles of three Seminole County financial institutions

Richard J. Burlason, 21, and his wife, Cynthia McAfee Burlason, 20, of Rock Springs Road, were arrested Monday and charged with robberies at the Sweetwater branch of the Southeast National Bank, Longwood on Sept. 9; Security First Federal Savings on Oct. 14 at the Longwood Village Shopping Plaza; and the First Family Federal Savings and Loan, on State Road 434, on Jan. 6, 1962, according to John Spolski, sheriff's department spokesman. Mrs. Burlason has been released on \$8,000 bond, but her husband remains locked up. The couple were extradited to Florida from the Coffee County jail in Douglas, Gn. where they were being held for

possession of marijuana, Spoiski said. When the robbers left the First Family Federal Savings and Loan in Longwood, a clerk reportedly stepped outside the store and copied the license plate number on the fleeing vehicle. That license plate number was placed into the national crime information computers which resulted in Georgia officers tracing the number to the vehicle driven by the Burlasons, Spolski added.

The Burlasons have also beeen implicated in bank robberies in Denver, Colo., according to sheriff's deputies. In addition, Charleston, S.C., and Nashville, Tenn. law enforcement agencies want to question the Buriasons regarding bank holdups in those cities, Spolski said.

SIGNS, MAILBOXES MOWED DOWN

An investigation is continuing to determine who is responsible for the vandalism of numerous street signs and mailboxes slong State Road 426, from State Road 46 to Seminole Woods Estates.

Sheriff's deputies said someone, using a vehicle, tore down all the mailboxes and about 15 road signs along the roadway sometime between 6:30 p.m. Sunday and 7:30 a.m. Monday, The amount of damage done to the signe, maliboxes and roadway is undetermined, deputies said.

SHOOTING INQUIRY

An investigation was continuing today into the shooting incident Tuesday which resulted in the deaths of two men. Lize R. Powell, 25, of 1805 W. 15th St., was shot and killed Monday, along with a man identified by police only as John Doe, in what appears to be "an attempted burglary," according to John Spolski, sheriff's department spokesman.

"The possibility that this shooting was drug-related has not been ruled out, however," Spoiski said. He added that deputies found some pills in the vehicle which Powell and another Sanford man, Thomas Maner, 27, occupied at the time of the shooting. However, it is not known whether the pills are controlled substances, he said.

Sooiski said Powell and Maner were sitting ins car in the driveway of 1911 Southwest Road located next to Joe's Tavern, Sanford, eating chicken which they had purchased at a nearby restaurant. At that time, three mer, with guns approached the parked vehicle and attempted to rob the car's occupants, but their would-be victims resisted, he said.

During the struggle, two or more shots were fired, at least, one from a shotgun, fatally wounding Powell and one of the unidentified assallants

An investigation is continuing today to determine who is responsible for dumping embalming materials at a private cemetery on the outskirts of Sanford. However, no new clues have surfaced as to how the embalming materials got to the cemetery, located behind the Evergreen Cemetery on W. 25th Street, sheriff's deputies said.

After receiving reports that someone had dumped empty embalming fluid bottles, medical bedclothing, surgical masks, human hair, a dead man's identification tag and other materials at the cemetery, police arrived on the scene Tuesday to photograph the area and begin the investigation.

Dr. Jorgu Deju, Seminole County Health director, said his department is investigating the dump site to ensure no health hazard exists and to assist sheriff's deputies in determining how the materials got there.

Sanford police traced the identification tag belonging to the dead man to Browns' Paradise Memorial Chapel, \$35 W. 13th St., Sanford, which was in charge of the man's funeral arrangements. Robert Brown, of the funeral home, was contacted and said he had no knowledge of the illegal dumping. "The materials were thrown into a trash can and taken away by garbage collectors," he said Tuesday. "I have no idea how

'We (Longwood) are within range on firefighter pay, but with paramedics, other departments offered a higher incentive," he

Chapman is currently the only trained paramedic on the Longwood Fire Department staff. Since 1979 the department has either trained or hired six paramedics, and none of them now work for Longwood, he said.

"It's a very tight job market," Chapman said, "especially if you're not one of the departments offering the higher pay."

Paramedics on Chapman's staff earned \$13.006 annually before the commission agreed to increase their incentive pay. The

emergency medical technicians the fire chief hires in future months will now receive \$2,100 annually in incentive pay, rather than \$720. The added incentive pay will boost paramedica' starting salaries in Longwood to

\$14,456 a year. Chapman said. A few weeks ago one of his six-year veteran paramedics resigned to work for Winter Springs. Earning a fire engineer's pay, the resigning officer will create a \$1,790 surplus in Chapman's salary budget because he will starting pay, he said.

Of the total \$2,900 Chapman actually needed for hiking paramedic incentive pay, the resignation allowed him to ask the commission for only \$1,200, Chapman said.

Longwood now will fall about midway on the pay scale for paramedics compared to other area fire departments, Chapman said.

According to the fire chief's survey, Winter Springs, Altamonte Springs and Reedy Creek currently offer the best salaries for trained paramedica. Winter Springs starts paramedics at \$15,322, Altamonte Springs \$15,504, and Reedy Creek \$15,184, Chapman



# County Commission, Builders Agree On Sewer Hookup Fees

All of the basic details needed to finalize an agreement between Seminole County home builders and government on sewer connection fees apparently have been agreed on.

On Feb. 1, members of the county Home Builders Association and the county commission will meet to iron out a resolution on sewer hookup charges, and how they will be paid.

One of those details is the payment of \$450 at the time the sewer hookup is registered by the state Department of Environmental Regulation. That money will go to the former owners of the county's Consumers Utilities Plant to pay off the remaining \$764,000 debt, according to Ken Hooper, county environmental services director.

The commission and builders also have agreed to time payments on the remaining \$75 of the total \$525 hookup fee adopted by the commission in Oct. 1981.

The county's \$75 share of the fee will be paid in \$6.50 monthly increments. Added to this fee will be a monthly \$1 service charge proposed by Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff and tentatively agreed to by the builders.

Two reasons were given for breaking the \$75 into monthly payments. Builders said paying the entire \$525 fee at one time would be too expensive.

The commission also saw the move as a way of keeping tabs on its sewer hookup permits. If builders miss too many payments, the one-year permits will be recalled by the commission when they expire.

If builders maintain regular payments, their permits will be automatically renewed at year's end, the commission said. Pending regular payment maintenance, there will be no time limit on sewer hookups granted builders.

A final resolution dealing with the sewer hook-up fees will be drawn up and approved after the Feb. 1 meeting, Hooper



# Bowing To Peking

The contest of wills between Washington and Peking over the prospective sale of advanced U.S. fighter aircraft to Taiwan ended ignominously ROBERT WALTERS recently when the Reagan administration threw in the towel.

In so doing, a President who prides himself on standing by America's traditional friends appeared to grant Peking a veto over what, if any, U.S. arms will be sold to the Nationalist government on Taiwan.

The Nationalist Chinese, whose air force relies mainly on aging F-5A, F-104, and F-100 fighters, WASHINGTON (NEA) - What ever had requested permission to buy F-16s. But the Nationalists would have accepted the new F-5G, the latest model in the Northrop export line.

Instead, they got nothing more than a vague promise to replace older fighters with "comparable" aircraft plus an extension of the agreement under which Taiwan co-produces the

This hardly conforms to the spirit at least of the Taiwan Relations Act, which includes a congressionally mandated provision to provide adequate defensive weaponry to the Nationalist Chinese.

Although the question of which fighters should be sold to Taiwan was always fraught with considerations as much political as military, a Nationalist air force boasting only 386 combat aircraft certainly needs to retain a technological edge over an opponent with roughly 5,300 planes.

The arms-supply provision of the Taiwan Relations Act also served as a tangible promise that the United States would not abandon an old friend simply because an alliance was no longer as convenient as it had once been.

The Reagan administration should be the last to forget that when America is seen to have cast aside a smaller friend, other friends in exposed locations begin to wonder whether it is time to reassess their own ties to Washington.

Put another way, the bad news for Tajwan won't be received well in such places as South Korea, Thailand, Pakistan, Israel, Turkey, and Jordan

The rationale for permitting Peking to have its way on the matter of a new fighter aircraft for Taiwan was that this would strengthen a Sino-American rapprochement intended principally to contain the Soviet Union.

Ironically, it may have just the reverse effect. The hard-headed realists in Peking may well be asking themselves now to what extent THEY can count on the United States in a pinch.

If, as we suspect, the mainland Chinese are far more worried about the 46 Soviet army divisions on their northern borders than about regaining Taiwan, the concession from Washington may translate in Peking as an ominous failure of

mission have actively undermined the federal government's longstanding commitment to the protection of unfettered competition. - The Justice Department is in the process of weakening antitrust enforcement guidelines that specify, for instance, that the

market for a product is highly concentrated if four companies control 75 percent of an industry's sales. - The department has dropped an antitrust suit that alleged that Mack Trucks Inc. and an

industry trade hasociation conspired to raise and fix the prices that truck owners, operators and dealers were charged for truck - The FTC shut down its five-year-long investigation of the auto industry - one of the nation's largest and most concentrated in-

dustries - without ascertaining whether the dominant firms engaged in illegal anticompetitive practices. - After eight years of litigation, the FTC has, in effect, scrapped its antitrust suit designed to force divestiture of the country's eight largest oil companies — Exxon, Gulf, Texaco, Mobil, Shell, Atlantic Richfield,

Around the academic circuit, various in dividuals have been pushing this idea hard and it's good for all sorts of grants - bil special by producer Jim Devaney,

The thing is even making headway in Congress. Some 60 members of the House of Representatives support the idea, and so do a substantial number of U.S. Senators. According to one columnist, William F Lincoln of the San Jose (Calif.) Mercury

News: "The U.S. Academy for Peace will be a federal, non-profit graduate school for midcareer students from virtually every vocation - the military, the State Department, the diplomatic corps, private corporations. public agencies, community organizations and special interest groups. "The academy will conduct research and

training in the intricate theories and skills of negotiations, conciliation, arbitration and mediation. The women and men who attend the academy will be able to return to their prior positions with expanded capabilities to resolve conflict equitably, efficiently, costeffectively." Who would make up the faculty? It would be

an enclave of the "peace movement" from the '60s and '70s. At long last, generously funded, we would hear from the Clergy and Laity Concerned, from the National and think-tanks like the Institute for Policy Studies, and from all the flaky types on campuses across the country who would rather conduct teach-ins than ordinary academic courses.







The next time the Tribe displays its split personality will be Saturday night in a home confrontation with Metro power Evans.





In fact, Dickerson looked too good. "The other fighters' corner men were directly questioning us as to what his experience really was," said Perez. "Jerry acted like a pro and looked like a

Dickerson remembers the incident as a lot of fun, but also condedes he was apprehensive prior to his first go around.

"At first I was kinda nervous because everybody was looking at me," he remembers. "But I said to myself, 'Knock him out right from the beginning and you won't have to go three rounds." While Dickerson didn't put the guy away for good, he made him taste the canvas enough that his corner men were

ready to throw in the towel. "I didn't knock him out, but I just kept knocking him down. They were trying to get the ref to stop it, but he wouldn't so I just kept knocking the guy through the

"I'd fake to the head...then hit him in

the body," continued Dickerson.

While it was Dickerson who was doing the knocking down in his first bout, it wasn't always that way. On the contrary, it was a beating that He took which got him interested in boxing.

When Dickerson was younger he used to go to a place on U.S. 17-92 where there was a gymnasium. It was open to the public and kids would go in and put on the gloves and flail away at each other for a couple rounds.

One day Dickerson went in the place and was coaxed to fight a more experienced fighter. Needless to say, the results didn't draw any rave reviews this

"They brought in this guy and he had been boxing for a while," said the hardpunching righthander, "I was all right in the beginning, but after a while I got tired and the guy started 'whupping' me to

The gymnasium closed up and Dickerson turned to the "usual sports"

for a while. A year or so ago, however, Lap Elliston-a friend and fighter out of the Second stretch gym-influenced Dickerson to come down and see how he

The results were similar. After a couple visits, Perez took the rookie into the ring and gave him a professional

"He just went to beatin' my brains out." laughs Dickerson. "I said, 'Wow, to do a guy like this you really have to know something (about boxing)."

And, fortunately for Dickerson he ran into (literally) Perez. The exmiddleweight is an encyclopedia of ring savvy. He moves easily from fighter to fighter teaching, talking and instructing.

He's conscientious and picks up their flaws quickly. He gets his message across, but more importantly he has an attentive audience that makes it worthwhile for him.

"Jerry listens good and he trains good," says Perez. "He does what he is told. Sometimes he pays the price, but how else are you going to learn?"

The Brooklyn Dodgers, see, had the hated New York Yankees — the Bronx Bombers, the despised descendants of Murderers' Row - whipped in a World Series game. It was the top of the ninth. The Dodgers led. The Yanks had no one on base. It was two outs and Tommy Henrich had two strikes.

Then Brooklyn pitcher Hugh Casey smoked another pitch. Henrich swung and missed, and the crowd roared. But the roar self-stifled because the ball hit the edge of Mickey Owen's mitt and caroomed off toward the grandstand.

That's all it took. The Yankees proceeded to batter the Dodgers beyond recall. Some say it was 14 years before the Dodgers got over it. At least it was that long before they won their first World Series.

And it wouldn't have mattered if Mickey Owen had hit .455 and knocked 61 home runs to get the Dodgers into the Series. Those figures would have been buried; they wouldn't have mattered. Mickey Owen was a costly error on a big play.

Most of the activity was taking place at the other end of the field in the Silverdome, where the majority of the media were clustering around the more notable members of the Bengals like Ken Anderson, the team's No. 1 quarterback and NFL Player of the Year; Coach Forrest Gregg; rookie receiver and non-stop talker Cris Collinsworth; brutser fullback Pete Johnson, and Harvard man Pat McInally, the AFC's top punter

Thompson didn't draw that much attention during Tuesday's session at which the two Super Bowl XVI contenders, the Bengals and the San Francisco 49ers, held still long enough so the press, radio and TV people could interview them and take their pictures.

As soon as he came out on the field, Thompson, a hig, good looking native of American Samoa, headed out and stationed himself around the 15-yard line in front of the goalposts. He had a football with him-

Holding it in front of him, he stood stock still, allowed the ball to drop and kicked it. Nobody drop kicks anymore, but Jack

Thompson wanted to see if he could do it. The ball drifted to the left of the upright and Thomson made a face,

"God, I used to be the champion drop kicker of all time," said the laughing 25-year-old former Washington State All-America.

"Nahh," he quickly amended what he had said. "I was just kidding."

A couple of reporters congregated around him and one of them asked him how he felt sitting on the Bengals' bench for the third straight season serving as Anderson's understudy without getting much playing time.

"I'm an impatient sort," he said, smiling to take some of the sting out of the statement. You could see his impatience. His body language signified clearly how anxious he was to get going ... somewhere ... anywhere ....

but there really was nowhere for him to go. "In a different situation, I would possibly be playing somewhere else," he said. "When I was drafted by Cincinnati three years ago, I knew I was gonna be in the hunt for the job of quarterback. No matter where I went, no one was going to hand it to me. But look, I understand all that Kenny had a tremendous



year. He won every honor you can think of and he has been so deserving of all of them. Sure, he gets a lotta publicity but that goes hand in hand with performance. Me. Right now, I'm not the No. 1 quarterback."

as young and eager as he is, he's naturally restless waiting for that day to arrive. It could come very suddenly this Sanday if something happens to Anderson Otherwise,

Thompson figures to see Super Bowl XVI from the bench and he knows it. When I came in this league, I had

delusions of grandeur," he said, smiping again. Never in my wildest dreams did I ever think I'd have to wait six or seven years. to get my chance the way Danny White did in Dallas. I'm still taking it day by day."

Thompson and Anderson have what Thompson calls "a good rapport" between them. They are friendly enough.

"He understands that I'd love to be playing" Thompson said, "but I hope he also understands if ever there was a guy who believes he (Anderson) fully deserves to play, it's me. I'm happy for him."

Shortly after the Bengals made Thompson their first draft choice and he reported to them, Anderson took him out to dinner and although neither is much of a drinker, they had a few that evening. Purposely, because Anderson wanted to get something off his mind

"He told me right out, 'I know you're going for my job," Thompson revealed. "He looked me straight in the face and said to me, 'LET IT BE KNOWN, I'm gonna keep my job as long as I can.' He just put it out on the table. I told him that was great and I understood what he was saying, but I also said I was going to do my darndest to win the job. He understood that, too. I still wanna play. The fire is still there. I gave myself a timetable when I first got here and that was to play from day one. It didn't turn out that way. # Favorite Salads Provide **Perfect Minerals Source**

This week's special cook, Faye Hendley of Chuluota, is sharing a few of her favorite salad ideas.

Faye continues, "My dear husband led me into a lively acquaintance with his scrumptious Georgia specialties, and in huge volume as our four sons and a daughter swelled our team to seven - all of them with small grizzly bear appetites."

Faye had been a home missionary, pioneering four churches, before marrying her husband, Reese. Through the years, they have been involved in his work building subdivisions and related activities. But, gradually, she says, "We were right in the middle of pastoring and building churches even while my husband was still in construction work."

Faye stresses nutrition, saying, "We loved every moment of our full lives, but we HAD to eat well to keep the team healthy and strong, yet live on a budget."

WASHINGTON (NEA) -My wise and sympathetic automobile mechanic says that engine backfiring is the result of a spontaneous combustion taking place within a cylinder. In other words it's a detonation. It may be caused by an imbalance of compression ratio, heat, fuel value and timing. Very interesting.

But it's no compensation. The other week I started my 1980 Audi 4000 and all of the above took place. I didn't think much of it at first, because the car has backfired on ignition since it was born. When the engine died, I merely started it again and commenced to roll down my driveway to the street near my home.

His own theory is that the fuel injection systems in some VW vehicles permit the occasion of overly rich gasoline mixtures, that is: too much gas in the air recipe. The mixture then explodes out of hand, sends its anger through the exhaust, and in some occurrences causes engines to flame.

The mechanic says this may be what happened in my car, Then again, it may not be. He could not find a faulty part, the motor was clean and well maintained, there were no electrical shortages, thus his guess is a product of elimination. In any case, he concludes that it could happen

That means I have to worry every time I start my automobile. And the same may be said for owners of similar makes and models. The mechanic says there should be no problem unless there is a backfire first; in that event the only thing any of us can do is to hope that our extinguishers work.



# **Eating** Habits Vary

By GAYNOR MADDOX Special to the Herald Many older people seem to lose interest in food.

There are those who do not enjoy eating because their teeth are in bad condition.

Some have little energy for marketing and cooking. Others simply hate to eat alone following the death of a SDOUSE.

There are also physiological causes of disinterest in foods among the elderly.

"Changes in bodily functions of elderly persons are gaining increasing attention because they may have nutritional implications and may affect an individual's eating and drinking patterns," says Dr. Ewald W. Busse, associate provost and dean of medical and allied health education at Duke University.

Busse is also senior fellow of the Center for the Study of and Development at Duke.

The aging processes do not necessarily progress at the same rate in all people, notes Busse in Contemporary Nutrition.

Some of these physiological changes that occur in later life are decline in kidney function, changes in the nervous system, gradual loss of neurons within the brain as well as perceptual changes, such as decreased hearing, vision, taste and smell.

There is some controversy as to whether age or other factors, such as smoking, are responsible for the decline in taste sensitivity as one grows

Still, it is a fact that elderly people show a decline in the number of taste buds. Their most frequent complaint relating to food is that it tastes either sour, bitter or dry.

It is estimated that one-half of the muscle cells disappear by age 80; many are replaced by lat and fibrous connective tissue.

In addition, the caloric requirement of an elderly individual drops because of lowered metabolism and reduction in exercise. Therefore, a gradual cutdown in food consumption is desirable after age 60.

# **Barley Base** Of Crunchy Casserole

Cooks are beginning to appreciate some of our grandparents' cooking standbys for their nutritional value. Many, such as barley, also help make dishes more economical and may be substituted for rice, potatoes or noodles for everyday

meals.

Casseroles alky are making a comeback. They are an easy and economical way to feed a family or to entertain.

A simple dish to prepare is a curried chicken casserole that combines barley, apple, celery, walnuts and chopped, cooked, chicken, topped with buttered bread crumbs.

Quickly spread meringue over top of pie, carefully sealing to edge of crust. Place pie on ovenproof platter or wooden board and bake at 475 degress F for 4-5 minutes, until meringue is browned. Serve immediately. For ease in cutting, use a sharp knife dipped in hot water.



# Reapportionment Approval Likely

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Senate today likely will approve a reapportionment plan that sacrifices a few senators, but protects most incumbents and may allow the election of the first black since Reconstruction.

The reapportlonment committee late Tuesday approved 18-2 a redistricting plan worked out by chairman Dempsey Barron of Panama City, but after stripping a white senator of his district to make the election of a black more likely.

The plan comes to the Senate floor late

A possibility is the Miami district currently represented by Dick Anderson.

"I felt that the higher the percentage of blacks in the district, the safer the legality of the plan and the better the minority access," said Barron.

He confirmed that his staff had contacted U.S. Justice Department officials in Washington who indicated that a district with a 55 percent black majority probably would not be

Another Commerce Department report showed that while single family home construction went up 1.8 percent in December, the total for the 1981 was only 706,100 single family

That was the worst year for housing starts since 1946, when there were 1,023,000 housing starts.

Despite the rise in construction last month, a leading industry analyst remained glum.

"I don't think we are ready to concede we are at the end of

the decline," said Michael Sumichrast, chief economist of the National Association of Home Builders.

He said the industry was "worried about the upturn in interest rates during the last five weeks" but he thought rates

would resume their decline. President Reagan discussed the economy at his nationally

broadcast news conference - his first of the year. He said the Federal Reserve Board is "sending the wrong signal" to businesses by increasing the money supply, which money markets at first feared would trigger a new rise in

interest rates. However, in recent days the increase was attributed to technical factors and many analysts now expect a large decline in the money supply to be announced at the end of the

week that would point to further decreases in interest rates. Reagan said he does not think his economic plans to encourage business spending through tax cuts have failed, despite a government survey showing such investment to be down half a percent this year.

"I think there's a little caution at work, and perhaps part of that is waiting to see what the Federal Reserve system is doing," he said.

Three Nobel Prize-winning economists, testifying on Capitol Hill, were highly critical of the administration's fiscal policy. Lawrence Klein, James Tobin and Wassily Leontiel, all winners of the Nobel Prize for Economics, agreed the administration's final 10 percent cut, scheduled for July 1, 1983, was unnecessary and should be delayed until the economy could

And they were unanimous that the Federal Reserve Board should ease up on its control of the money supply.

On Wall Street, investors seemed to agree, as stocks fell for the first time in four sessions Tuesday after there were some indications the Fed may have at least temporarily tightened credit to stem a recent money supply surge.

The Dow Jones industrial average, up more than 3 points at the outset following a 7.52-point jump Monday, lost 7.71 to 847.41, with much seiling coming after the Fed acted.
