

Sanford reclaims **Second Street**

\$1.9 million project pays off for city

SANFORD - To celebrate the completion of the \$1.9 million Second Street reclamation project, Sanford city officials hosted a commemorative ribbon cutting on Thursday in Magnolia Square. The project, completed

The project, completed March 12, lasted 11 months. The brick street received improvements to the stormwater drainage system and streetscaping in the downtown area.

The historic bricks on Second Street, in place since about 1920, were recycled and placed back into the street.

"Obviously there will be improvements to drainage. and aesthetic improvements,"
commissioner Brady Lessard

SANFORD - Jean Metts invited a hundred friends to lunch on Friday.

Her guests arrived just be-fore noon at an 83-year-old building at 407 West Fourth Street in Sanford. Volunteers wearing white aprons with red hearts served

the meals on fine china that Metts brought from her home. Fresh green fern hung in the newly painted dining room.
"Does this look like a soup kitchen?" Metts asked. In the 1910s and 1920s the

same building was known as White's Wholesale Grocery. Goods were received by rail on a track behind the grocery. Later, the building was used to store chemicals. For many years it was vacant.

Seminole County, now the property owner, has turned the facility over to the not-forprofit Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, Inc. That's where Jean Metts comes in. She and others distribute food to the needy. And the next step is to

Not everyone in Sanford supports the free dinner program - or soup kitchen as they call it - and are doing all they can to prevent Metts from turning on the stove and dishing out the food. The The naysayers fear "undestrables" will line up to be fed each

night.
On Friday, the Sanford
Chamber of Commerce and its members and other volunteers rallied behind Metts. Former County Commissioner Win Adams said that the county would be a better place to live if everyone "was doing what Jean Metts is doing."

Metts said she would like to be able to provide free dinner for the elderly, single mothers on low income and other Sanford residents by early June. "No more than six weeks, and we should have cleared all the obstacles." Metts said. See Metts, Page 5A

Goldsboro gains counseling center

Some expect problems with facility

SANFORD - A non-profit counseling center and low security facility is coming into the Goldsboro community on the west side of Sanford. The Grove Counseling Cen-

ter, to be built at 401 Pecan Avenue, will have 32 beds for court-ordered clients who pose a "level six" moderate security risk. The youth will be under 24-hour visual supervi-

Escaping the facility will be a felony. Many of the youth will have committed property crimes and drug offenses, but not violent offenses, according to Larry Visser, director of the program.

Workers at the counseling center will have a chance to build a relationship with clients and try to stop criminal behavior before it blossoms into career criminal activity. Visser said.

This is an opportunity to salvage some of these lives."

Visser said.

Commissioner Velma Wilwho represents Goldsboro, said the facility will benefit the community. The building where the facility will be constructed is vacant, and building the facility will improve the area, she said.

The facility may have vocational training programs for area youth. It also may offer space for a police sub-station. "I see more positives than negatives," Williams said.

Commissioners Whitey Eckstein and Mac McClanahan also said they believe the Grove Counseling Center will benefit clients, as well as the

neighboring community by generating jobs. Mayor Larry Dale said he is

concerned about the number of calls the police department may receive from the facility. and that the non-profit facility may place a burden on taxpayers.

Commissioner Brady Lessard said he does not believe Goldsboro is the right area for the program. Several residents said they

were opposed to placing the facility in Goldsboro. Tyrone Alexander.

Goldsboro resident, said that the facility will increase crime See Counseling, Page 5A

Here comes the rain again - hopefully

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Recent rainfall is decreasing the chances of fires starting statewide and in Seminole

County.

The drought index in Sanford is decreasing. Across the state, some of the outdoor burning restrictions have been lifted.

The state's Division of Forestry said that because of re-cent rain and the changes in fuel moisture an drought indexes, some outdoor burning

restrictions can be relaxed. In Sanford, the drought index is 472 on a scale of 0 for flooding to 800 for desert conditions. The drought index has decreased from 535 on Monday, 510 on April 23,

and 478 on April 18. "Sanford is in pretty descent condition, especially considering how dry it's been," Liz Compton, spokesperson for Agriculture and Consumer Services, said. Drought indexes around


the state vary from 711 in Highlands Glades and Okeechobee to 219 in Lakeland. In Orlando, the drought index is 434.

Last year, the state's fire season reached emergency levels in the summer. Bob Crawford, the Commissioner of Agriculture, said residents should not adopt a false sense of security.

"Although the rain has brought some relief to many area, it has been spotty and varied in intensity," state Ag-riculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford said. "We should remain cautious and vigilant until substantial rain is re-See Rain, Page 5A







The honorable Randy Morris, who need not run until 2002 to remain a Seminole County commissioner, said Friday he expects to see a number of political sand castles washed out in the tide in the next year and a half. Election Year 2000 suits

Morris just fine. "I'm going to take it easy," he said. 'I might even buy Carlton Henley a pizza. We'll sit this one out and see what happens in the shifting sands."

Chosen by the people in 1996, Morris and Henley can relax as Dick Vander Weide, Grant Maloy and Daryl McLain defend their commission seats in 2000. Each has opened a

campaign account.

Van DerWeide and McLain are two-term commissioners, Maloy is in his first. Van DerWeide was unopposed in 1996 but insiders say he'll be pressed in the 2000 Republican primary by Rick Patterson, a financial planner from Longwood.

Maloy's opposition could from as many as three others - Tom Haygood, Wayne Weinberg and/or Ed Martinez.

McLain may be challenged by Paul Lovestrand or Don Nicholas.

Win Adams, unseated by Henley in District 4, said Friday that he had not made a decision about running for the commission in 2000. People are coming to me, urging me to run," Adams

Van DerWeide and Maloy worked to get Henley elected and boot Adams in 1998. Beating either of them in 2000 would be a sweet success for him if Adams chooses to run so soon.

Less than 14 percent of the eligible voters participated in the last election, a dismal turnout that hurt Adams. The 2000 election - a Presidential Election - ought to bring out 30 percent or more of the voters. This probably would benefit Adams, a good campaigner with a familiar and friendly face.

Adams, 56, gave his enthusiastic support to Jean Metts at her community luncheon Friday in Sanford. Other political leaders from the county and city were invited but Adams was the only one to appear. Her plans to feed free diners to the needy prompted Adams to participate. Metts was grateful. Very grateful.

After Adams gave a sweet words of encouragement to Metts, my gut reaction was this fellow is no Carlton

Whether he runs for the county commission or gives the school board a shot in 2000, Win Adams will remain close to the heart of the community. If you don't like Win Adams, you don't like people.

Sandy Goard, the Supervisor of Elections for the county since 1983, says she is looking forward Elections 2000. Her own job is on the line. Kerry Lyons, who did not run for reelection as a Sanford City Commissioner, has opened an account to challenge Goard. How bold.

Goard waltzed by contenders in 1988 and 1992 and was unopposed in 1996.

Word is that all incumbents have begun to build their sand castles. Stay tuned.

Media tries to do what's best for the community

This week presented local media with the choice of whether to give the names of two teenagers facing felony charges after police say the teenagers made notes threatening to kill fellow students.

Listing the names of children who face criminal charges is a sensitive topic. A rule of thumb is that when there are felony charges, the names will be included in an article. The Seminole Herald chose to list the names.

Laws govern when a minor under age 18 may or may not be listed in the newspaper.

Newspapers do of course have the option of not listing the name of a minor facing a felony. The majority of local or even national television and radio stations may talk about the teenagers by name, but this is not a basis for a sound decision by a newspaper.

The lives of the teenagers and their families lie in devastation. It may take years to rebuild their lives.

The eighth grade student at Sanford Middle School made straight "A's" with no prior discipline record. School officials said they do not believe either student truly wanted to hurt anyone.

News journalists walk the line between providing a public service and leveling personal harm on a daily basis. When a child is involved, the line becomes razor thin. Objectivity is a double-edged sword for journalists.

A cardinal rule is to get both sides of a story. When naming a child accused of a crime, the journalist has a special responsibility to ask teachers, administrators and police for the full story, such as the Sanford Middle School student's high grades and clean background.

Journalists often feel uncomfortable with the demands of the job. This week's incidents were heart breaking. Any journalist who does not pause in sadness while writing the stories of recent weeks has lost too much compassion to the Job.

Last week's incidents seem to stem from the Littleton. Colo. tragedy. Law enforcement and school officials do not say these are copy cat incidents. However, it is time for the media to ask an important question.

At what point does media coverage of tragedy lead to further tragedy?

This is my view on the soup kitchen. Unlike Jean Metts, I live on Elm Ave. in Sanford. 1 use the free food bank once a month. Occasionally, I go to dinner on Wednesday nights at the church on 4th and Park Avenue. When I go outside sometimes among the very nice residents or when I am awaiting my welfare check, I do not see negative influences or the police in action. Isn't it wonderful that God made us all different in ethnic and cultural backgrounds!

If there was no alcohol nor cigarettes nor prescription drugs to sell, more people would be unemployed and the soup kitchens would require even more food to feed people.

Once, on a Sunday afternoon after church, I took a ride through the Historic area on Elm Ave. I noticed that there are homes and businesses that need remodeling and improvements, as well as the

railroad tracks. Mr. Beck has probably never had to use the welfare system, but I did to support seven children. There were times when the food stamps ran out before the month ended and the rent and utility bills were due. I believe God made some people poor and some people rich. However, four of my seven children are homeowners and have good

I received my college degree at age 52 and my monthly income is \$649. I am a proud woman who loves to eat at the church as well as meet other people there who might have more of a financial need than myself. I respect them at their level of economic ability.

Homeowners may be forced to relocate

SANFORD - The Sanford Housing Authority is seeking to move tenants of 170 old and deteriorating public housing units into single family homes and affordable housing.
If the Sanford Housing

Authority receives a federal grant, all 170 units in Edward Higgins Terrace, Cowan Moughton Terrace, and Lake Monroe Terrace will be demolished.

Each family asked to relocate will be given a voucher to purchase a home. or the option of remaining in public housing.

Officials of the Sanford Housing Authority are holding meetings with residents to the explain program. Residents expressed concerns about finding replacement homes.

Several residents requested that a representative from the U.S. Department of Housing

and Urban Development be present at future meetings.

We will work with you," Sanford Housing Authority Executive Director Tim Hudson said Thursday at the fourth meeting with residents concerning the program.

Hudson said that although HUD does not guarantee the purchase of a home, the Sanford Housing Authority will ensure that no demolition will begin until housing has been found for every resident."

The Department of Housing and Urban Development will announce whether the Hope VI grant is awarded to the Sanford Housing Authority in

"Hope six is a tool that housing authorities can use to help families live outside these invisible four walls and live with other families in mixed communities." Hudson said. "It's a tool to improve your quality of life."

To make the voucher portable, residents must live in the issuing jurisdiction (Seminole County) for at least 12 months.

Under HUD regulations, residents will have at least 60 days after a voucher is given to find replacement housing. The Housing Authority can grant two 30 days exceptions.

If the grant is approved, a demolition company would be brought on board within six months. Then, the Housing Authority would have 18 months to do the demolitions, Hudson said.

We're going to work with you all for the next 18 months," Hudson said.

Residents will receive "creative financing" from the government during the loan application to receive approval on a morigage for a home, Hudson said.

We want to keep your payments at about \$490 (per month)." Hudson said.

The Housing Authority will establish a relocation budget with the grant, Hudson said. Sanford Housing

Authority will build about 30-50 houses if the grant is approved, Hudson said.

The City Commission wants the Housing Authority to include a business incubator in the project, with inexpensive rental spaces for businesses that will train residents in job skills.

Meanwhile, repairs are underway at the complexes. "We can not assume that we will get the grant," Hudson

liudson said the program will give residents a chance to own property and leave public housing. He said the surrounding community will benefit from property values. increased

Treens Kaye, director of Central Florida Legal Services, said she is concerned about whether the handicapped and ciderly will find replacement housing.

Attorneys for Central Florida Legal Services said they were concerned that residents could be asked to





The dead come to life at Sanford cemeteries

Echoes of the past still ring

SANFORD - The past whispers to people willing to

The City of Sanford is restoring its cemeteries and updating the records of people buried in the plots. While conducting research for the project, Sanford Museum officials have been surprised by how much they learn about the city.

For example, three African-American Civil War veterans are buried in a city cemetery. Each name catalogued yields a little more detail on the families that built the city.

The Lakeview and Evergreen cemeteries. located near Seminole High School, were likely acquired by the city in the 1920's. museum officials said. There is also a nearby African-American cemetery popularly called the Page Jackson Cemetery.

T.J. Miller once owned the Lakeview cemetery, and the city purchased the cemetery from the Miller family in the 1920's. Historians are still researching who laid the cemetery out.

Miller's horse, Bob, is buried on a right-of-way next to the road, outside the Lakeview Cemetery. The cemetery was likely constructed at around the turn of the century. Sanford Museum Director Alicia Clark said.

The oldest person buried in the Lakeview Cemetery is a veteran of the War of 1812. Some of the bodies may have been moved from a string of forts that were once scattered around the Sanford area, including Ft. Reid. The fort was located near what is now 20th Street.

*Mellonville Avenue used to be an old pioneer road." Clark said. "They would have traveled down that road."

The Evergreen Cemetery may have been built to handle overflow from the Lakeview Cemetery. The city acquired the cemetery in the 1920's.

A 1924 city bond in the Sanford Museum lists Evergreen Cemetery for \$10,000.

In 1991, the Chase family donated \$60,000 to

refurbish the entrances for the Evergreen Cemetery.

Both cemeteries are divided into sections to help family members locate

"Cemeteries are an important resource for encalogy and histor Clark said. They tie peoples families together. We're learning a lot more stories."

All people buried in Lakeview Cemetery are listed on the cemeteries website at USgenweb.org The site was establish one year ago by volunteer genealogist Cindy Knecht, who now lives in Michigan but still works on

This is the wave of the future for genealogy." Clark said. "it's pretty amazing. We can answer a lot of genealogy questions here." Half of the people in Evergreen are listed on the

City workers have made a grid with a list of available names for the so-called Page Jackson cemetery for African-Americans near the Evergreen and Lakeview cemeteries. The city has learned that Jackson and Stephen Gerard were farmers who lived behind

the Evergreen Cemetery. "We're building up the stories of the families in Sanford," Clark said.

Three Civil War veterans have been found in the Page Jackson portion of the cemetery, Clark said. Museum officials are looking into the folklore of people buried in the cemeteries.

We went from knowing nothing to learning a lot about the history of our

city."
City crews have cleared marked graves in the cemetery.

"We have a record," Clark said. "Unfortunately, twothirds of the people can not be identified."

Historians are studying what the markings and symbols on a number of Grave Stones mean.

The African-American communities in Sanford used to have burial societies as a type of insurance plan to prepare for funeral expenses.

This way even if you were poor you could afford a burial," Clark said.

The Odd Fellows was a burial society with a mission to provide a descent burial for the dead. African-American Odd Fellows are buried in the black section of the cemeteries, and white

Odd Fellows are buried in the white section.

Historians are still researching what the meaning was behind many Odd Fellow symbols. Museum officials are

continuing to learn about important people in the city's past. For example, officials are looking into

gaining more information on Frank Mosely and K.S. Johnson, early undertakers at the cemetery.

Cyberspace helping to stop child abuse

GAINESVILLE, Fla.--University of Florida pediatricians are among the first in the nation to use cyberspace and video technology to diagnose child abuse and neglect from hundreds of miles away

The pilot telehealth initiative is aimed at curbing a problem of tragic scope in Florida. A total of 111,576 reports of suspected child abuse were called into the Florida Abuse Hotline Information System in Tallahassee during fiscal year 1997-98, and nearly 20,000 of these children were seen by trained health experts with the state-funded Child Protection Teams.

The telehealth system involves continuous internet access. television and telephone linkage between University of Florida pediatricians who staff Child Protection Teams in Gainesville and Jacksonville, and with medical personnel at community hospitals in St. Augustine and Orange Park. Another connection is to be established in Ocala next fall.

We're talking about quicker, less stressful and less expensive medical attention for children brought into a small town hospital who, in the past--if child abuse was suspected-would have to be transported to the nearest hub of specialty care," said Dr. jay Whitworth, Medical Director of the state-

wide child protection team program.

We're concerned first and foremost about protecting children who need to be protected and properly cared for an, secondly, about reducing the reporting of cases where medical findings do not indicate abuse or neglect," said Whitworth, who also is UF professor of pediatrics based at the Children's Crisis Center on the campus of University Medical Center in Jacksonville. "Certainly, we want to reduce the number of families who are investigated unnecessarily.

We anticipate this system will enable health professionals to quickly determine whether a child needs treatment or, in cases of suspected abuse or neglect, whether further medical evaluation and investigation are needed," said Dr. Howard Rogers, a UF pediatrician who directs the Child Protection Team in Gainesville.

"Health professionals are increasingly trying to play it safe and do the right thing for the children," Rogers said. "But to do so, they need quick and thorough medical consultation to get accurate answers to crucial questions before they can recommend a course of action for an injured child and decide whether to file a report with the abuse hotline.

Rogers, who works at the Gerold Schiebler Children's Medical Services Center near the UF Health Science Center, sees about 10 cases of suspected child abuse every week.

Florida's telehealth project provides a round-the-clock audiovisual connection between the emergency room teams in the community hospitals and the Child Protection team physicians and nurses. The use of video cameras, including a hand-held cameral with zoom lenses, enable medical personnel to record both full views of a patient and close-up views of bruises and other injuries, which are transmitted to the TV monitors viewed by doctors and nurses on both ends of the line. X-ray images also can be transmitted by computer for simultaneous viewing and analysis by the special-

The system is designed with dedicated telephone lines so that the health professionals can talk in confidence with the injured child and with adults who brought the child in for

Another phase of the pilot project involves training nurses who are at the front line in seeing children brought into emergency rooms for evaluation of injuries and sudden illness, this expanding the role that nurses play in child abuse

Whitworth said the system also will reduce travel time and costs for injured children, their families or guardians and the health professionals who need to consult in medical evaluations and decision making.

Rogers notes that the ability to provide community medical personnel quick access to child abuse specialists for consultation is particularly important in the broad region served by the Gainesville and Jacksonville Child Protection Teams. The districts they serve encompass 20 counties, stretching from south of Orlando, east to Putnam County, west to the Gulf coast and north to the Florida-Georgia state line.

Whitworth, nationally known for his expertise in the medical care of abused children, helped to conceive the tele-health project along with Children's Medical Services of the State Department of Health and the Florida Developmental Disabilities Council. The disabilities council is now funding evaluation of the project, which Whitworth hopes will later be extended statewide to all 23 Child Protection Teams.



Please solve the mystery


WELL, I

Today's deal occurred during the match between Northern Ireland and Scotland in December 1997. Looking at the North-South hands, would you prefer to be in either four hearts or

four spades?

In the other room, West started with one diamond. After that, a confusing auction resulted in North's declaring four hearts. (North overcalled one heart, which is the modern style. Then South had to advance with two diamonds, the cue-bid showing at least a game-try in hearts, because he couldn't bid a sensible, forcing one

After a diamond to the ace and a diamond to the king, declarer thought he was on easy street, until he played a trump to dummy's (South's) king and saw West discard. Declarer drew three rounds of trumps, then finessed the spade jack. However, West won with the king and returned a diamond, which promoted a trump trick for East. A moment later, the club ace




killed the contract.

Here, West's four-diamond opening (not my style) silenced North. Yet South bid four spades, of course.

West started with the diamond ace, and another diamond to dummy's bing. Declarer called for the spade. king. Declarer called for the spade jack, but when it wasn't covered, he correctly won with the ace and turned his attention immediately to hearts. South lost only three tricks: one spade, one diamond and one club.

Note that if declarer finesses in spades, West can lead a club to his partner's ace and receive a heart ruff

to defeat the contract. No problem, except that the re-

There are aesthetic advantages, too. Once construction is complete, the new stacks on the plant property will be lower than the current ones and landcurb appeal of the plant.

Finally, repowering will mean an increase in FPL property taxes paid to local municipalities, counties and schools.

DOING IT RIGHT

Throughout all phases of the project we will continue to create dialogue opportunities with our neighbors. We'll listen closely so that we fully understand people's needs, interests and priorities. We'd like to keep the communication channels open at all times.

> With approval, construction could begin as early as February 2000 and continue until the end of 2002. When the repowering project is complete, the Sanford plant will double its output making it capable of serving about 486,000 homes and businesses.

Today, FPL serves more than seven million people in Florida and is the principal subsidiary of FPL Group Inc., one of the nation's largest providers of electricity-related services.

FPL ASKS COMMUNITY FOR IDEAS

The best way to fearn what's on people's minds, or to simply have them share their ideas on a topic, is to invite them over for a chat. In effect, that's what FPL did when company managers met with community representatives on two recent occasions.

In January this year Roxane Kennedy, FPL plant manager, and Bob Coleman, external affairs manager, met with a dozen neighbors. The group represented a broad range of community interests and a well-balanced mix of backgrounds including health professionals, business people, clergy, educators, retirees and environmentalists. This first meeting started a process designed to help FPL get ideas from local residents about the Sanford repowering project.

The community advisory panel was asked to develop a list of recommendations on how FPL could work with the community to maximize the benefits of the repowering project for the community and how best to communicate with local citizens about the project. FPL is carefully reviewing all the ideas CAP members offered.

Subsequently community panel members have recommended that FPL:

Sponsor and participate in community events.

■ Establish learning opportunities to encourage environmental awareness and demonstrate responsible stewardship between industry and the community, and

Do whatever it can to ease traffic disruptions during construction.

"We've learned a great deal from this experience, not least of which is that we can't guess what's on people's minds. We have to keep asking our neighbors for their thoughts, and we're going to continue to find ways to listen to them, " said Coleman.



FAQS - FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. Is this FPL's first repowering project?

A. No. FPL's Fort Lauderdale power plant was successfully repowered in 1992. Its output was tripled to help contribute to the growing demand for power in Southeast Florida. Currently, FPL's Fort Myers power plant is getting ready to repower to meet the growing need for power in Southwest Florida. Fort Myers will begin construction this summer.

Q. How will the natural gas get to the site?

A. Natural gas is already delivered by underground pipeline to the plant. Natural gas has been safely and reliably used as part of the this site's fuel mix since 1959. Repowering will add new power plant technology that will allow greater use of clean, natural gas. It will require that the pipeline capacity be expanded. We will expect our natural gas supplier to share their plans with the community and to listen to your careful plan for pipeline expansion.

Q. Will repowering add jobs?

A No new permanent jobs will be created at the plant site. Central Florida customers as needed.

However, there will be in excess of 600 temporary construction jobs added over the 3-year project. We anticipate that some of the construction workforce will come from surrounding communities, while others may be specialists from other in-state and out-of-state locations.

Q. Will repowering create

extra traffic during construction?

A. There will be some additional traffic during the construction period. FPL will work closely with the Florida Department of Transportation to coordinate activities in order to minimize the disruption of traffic flow due to our repowering activities.

Q. Will you have to shut

down the plant to do the repowering?

A. We expect to be producing some power at the site ideas, just as we're doing, and to provide a thoughtful and throughout the repowering process and to be adding new power in stages. Just as we do today when we take a power plant out-of-service for maintenance or repairs, we will use other power plants to supply the electricity needs of our

SANFORD PLANTRESEARCH

Florida Power & Light Company is proposing to significantly increase the electrical output of its Sanford plant by "repowering" it. Repowering means that FPL would add state-of-the-art, natural gas-fired, combined-cycle equipment to the two largest generators at the plant. A smaller, dual-fuel generating unit at the plant will remain capable of using either oil or natural ms.

FPL plant manager, Rosane Kennedy, and her team wanted to learn through research about how to help align the company's efforts on this proposal with priorities and interests of people in the surrounding communities. In January 1999, FPL asked Decision Partners, LLC. to conduct such research and recommend approaches to community dislogue and outreach that would best address citizens' interest.

The report reflects the perceptions of the people in the Senford-DeBery area.

Research Method

DP conducted confidential, one-on-one interviews by telephone with a representative group of 40 citizens in Senford, DeBary, and surrounding communities. An interview was designed that offered each interviewee an agenda of topics in a way that would allow researchers to understand people's views and their underlying rationale. The questions allowed for free expression on the part of interviewees and encouraged their elaboration on topics in order to reveal Individual perspectives at depth.

Study participants included people from the health, health services, and environmental communities; business, industry, and technical professionals; and people active in the community (community actives). The 40 interviewees who perticipated in the research resided in towns located both north and south of the Volusia-Seminole border where the FPL plant is located.

GENERAL PERCEPTIONS

The Community

The majority of people said that they enjoyed the lifestyle offered by their community. Features such as natural resources and local amenities were also noted as positive aspects of their respective communities. Many study participants commented that the area was convenient to Deytona and Orlando. The pleasant climate and nice weather were also commonly referred to as positive features.

By far, the most common complaint was traffic. A quarter of all study participants mentioned traffic as a problem. Growth management and urban sprawl were also seen as drawbacks to the area. Other common complaints included crime, litter, and a lack of cultural and religious diversity.

Florida Power & Light

When asked about FPL, half of all participants described the company as solid, knowledgeable, and well-run. Others commented on the necessity of the power company because it produces comfort, lights, and air conditioning. FPL's quick response time was also noted by a number of interviewees.

Customer service was by far the most frequently mentioned opportunity for improvement at FPL. People raised issues including FPL's automated phone system and a perceived lack of local representation.

Many of the participants said that they would like to see FPL more involved in the community. They suggested that the company should host meetings and develop environmental and educational programs. Interviewees also com-

Overall, the interviewees had a positive impression of FPL. Over half of those interviewed felt that the positives of having FPL in the community were greater than the negatives.

The Repowering Proposa

Slightly over half of those interviewed were aware of the repowering project before the interview. When the repow

mented that FPL needs to improve its communications with the community.

ering project was described, many thought that the project would result in cleaner air, less visible emissions, and less acid rain. Others shared the following thoughts about the project:

- · A positive or excellent idea.
- . The plant's efficiency would be increased.
- · FPL would not need any additional land.
- · Barne traffic would either be reduced or eliminated. · Smokestacks at the plant would likely be removed. When asked who will benefit from the repowering project, interviewes responded that homeowners, property owners, and residents would benefit most. They would benefit because of decreased rates and less pollution. Businesses were also seen to benefit from the repowering project. Specifically, the housing industry, retail industry, and construction were named. It was felt that these businesses would benefit because of decreased utility rates and additional employment opportunities for the community. ployment opportunities for the community.

· Rates might be reduced.

Perceived Benefits

The interviewees believed the repowering project would offer the following benefits:

- Employment opportunities for the community. · A reduction in power rates.
 - · Improved plant efficiency.
- A reduction in pollution. • A reduction in barge traffic.
- · Increased power supply.
- The elimination of brown outs and black outs. Improved physical appearance of the plant, namely the removal of the smokestacks.
 - · Fewer power outages.

The main concern people raised regarding repowering the Sanford facility related to the use of natural gas. Interviewees were concerned about the volatile nature of natural gas and the location of the gas pipeline. Overall, most people did not know that a gas pipeline was already in place (to fairl some existing electricity generation equipment at the site).

Interviewees from all sections of the community expressed concerns about the risks of natural gas leaks and explosions, and exposure to natural gas if the line was near residential areas. Interviewers also reised concerns about disturbing land during installation of the pipeline. Other issues raised included increased traffic from construction activity, the potential that project costs might be transferred to the customer, power outages due to construction, and the possibility of people losing their jobs.

Overall Perceptions of the Repowering Project

Nearly half of all the study participants felt that the overall impact of the repowering project was positive. Interviewees identified the following positive features of the project: fewer emissions, less pollution, improved air quality, employment opportunities, cheaper power, elimination of oil shipped by harges, removal of smokestacks, access to gas pipeline, and meet future power needs.

Environmental, Health, and Safety Effects of Resources

Over half of all interviewees said that fewer emissions, fewer particulates, reduced air poliution, or improved air quality were positive environmental effects of using natural gas to produce electricity. Other positive environmental effects identified by interviewees were a reduction in barge traffic, the removal of smolastacks, and less land use for increased canacity.

Some people perceived that the negative emironmental effects of natural gas could include explosions or leaks, nat ural gas adding to the greenhouse effect, and acid rain.

Over half of all study participants mentioned fewer emissions, fewer particulates, and improved air quality as health benefits of using natural gas. They believed that these features of natural gas would most benefit people with respiratory problems.

FPL in the Community

Community involvement and communication were believed to be the most important activities that FPL should emphasize in the future. Half of the research participants recommended that FPL become more involved in community activities. Interviewees recommended that FPL sponsor school education programs and provide tours of the Sanford plant in order to help FPL become a corporate citizen."

Others commented that the company's employees helped to build community confidence in FPL. Study participants pointed to the capable, reliable, and professional staff employed by FPL as to why they had confidence in the company. The people I see in the field are tremendous assets. They are ambassa-dors for FPL and I think they do a wonderful job."

d that FPL o about the project's safety measures, its environmental performance, and provide a complete explanation of the plant's repowering including the project's pros and cons. Others said that FPL was doing a good job and that the company should "keep doing what they have been doing."

Information About the Repowering Project

Almost three-quarters of those who participated in the study said that they would seek additional information about the repowering project directly from FPL. Others suggested the Internet, county permitting offices, the Florida Public Service Commission, or government environmental agencies as possible resources for project information.

The types of information that they would be interested in included the project's purpose, economic impact, environmental impact, and time line. Others said that they would seek Information about the project's safety measures, its impact on children's health, and specifics about bringing natural gas into the community. (They would be interested in the location of the pipeline, type of gas, and information on the gas supplier).

In closing, all interviewees were asked "If they could give one piece of advice to FPL about the repowering project or anything else, what would that advice be?" Many replied that FPL should keep the community informed and be sure to communicate about the Repowering Project's safety, environmental impact, and economic impact. Also of importance to many research participants was that FPL listen to local residents. "Involve people in the decisions - don't shut them out."
