

Quake Jolts California

in Central America and El Salvador." . *

EUREKA, Calif. (UPI) - A severe earthquake jolted coastal northern California early Saturday along an extension of the San Andreas fault, damaging buildings, toppling store goods and snapping a major highway overpass. Two cars spilled over the lip of the broken roadway, injuring ve occupants, but there were no fatalities reported from the

The temblor shook a 500-square-mile area from southern Oregon to the San Francisco Bay Area and measured between 6.6 and 7.1 on the Richter scale. A U.S. Geological Survey reading of 7.0 made it the strongest temblor to hit the continental United States since a quake of

the same intensity struck near El Centro, Calif., on the Mexican border Oct. 15, 1979. Saturday was the largest quake in the earthquake-prone Eureka area since a 7.2 quake struck in 1923. But Jim Marrone of the University of California Semismograph station in Berkeley fixed the estimate of magnitude to 6.6 and placed the center about 10 miles southwest of Eureka, barely in the Pacific Ocean and about 250 miles north

A nuclear power plant near the quake's center, shut down four years ago due to concerns about earthquake safety, apparently weathered the temblor without damage.



Garbage Firm Franchised

Herald Staff Writer Free enterprise was given a pat on the back at this past week's Seminole County Commission meeting as Willie C. Moore of Sanford was granted a franchise to

collect garbage in the county. Several area garbage haulers complained that there is no need for an additional garbage firm in the county. Jack Schuder, Seminole County director of public works, said the county's franchise ordinance is nonexclusive, but new certificates of convenience and necessity are to be granted based on unmet needs. "We don't feel a need has been demonstrated in this

case," Schuder said. Moore presented a list of 36 potential customers, but the other haulers said they could easily accommodate that many people between them. One rival firm representative complained that Moore might entice customers away from other haulers by cutting rates.

"Providing a good service and cutting rates is called competition," responded Commissioner Richard Williams. "This country is based on competition." Williams recommended to his colleagues that they vote to support free enterprise and ignore the protests "I'm sure they'd like two or three of themselves t drop out, also," he said. Moore's franchise was granted unanimously.

Fired Worker Drops Appeal

Seminole County commissioners voted 4-1 this past week to approve the appeal withdrawal of a county sign shop employee who was fired for having marijuana on the job.

Leland Jackson told the commission he wanted to withdraw his appeal of the Personnel Board decision because "you've already made up your mind." He said he would take his case to court. But County Attorney Nikki Clayton, County Administrator Roger Neiswender and Commissioners Bill Kirchhoff and Bob Sturm all warned Jackson that if he does not take his case through all the available administrative channels first a court may refuse to

Jackson said he was warned for having marijuana, but was then dismissed for the same offense, which he but said it was in his lunchbox not on county property. After not appearing at two hearings scheduled by the county's Personnel Board, Jackson said he couldn't attend because he was working at a new job and couldn't risk taking the time off. He said the board refused his request for an evening hearing.

Jackson told the personnel board he would drop his appeal if the county would agree to give him about \$200 for 66 hours of accrued leave time. The personnel board declined the offer. Kirchhoff voted against the motion to accept






