# Deputies Probe Shooting Of Student On School Bus

An 11-year-old girl was slightly injured when a loaded school bus was apparently fired upon Wednesday afternoon on busy SR 498, south of Casa Alma Way, Sheriff John Polk revealed today.

Deputy D. R. Beavers said Seminole County bus 110, driven by Esther Manon, was north-bound when the incident occurred.

Cynthia Horrobin, 11, of 2029 Nottingham Drive, Winter Woods, was sitting in the back of the bus and suffered a superficial abrasion on her left shoulder, according to Beavers' report.

Beavers said the slug, described in his report as coming from a .22 caliber gun, sent slivers of glass spraying over other children who weren't injured.

Det. William Hogan, who was called in to handle the investigation, said the slug, which was recovered, was either from a .22 caliber or a large pellet gun.

The slug apparently traveled through aluminum siding around the window, and Hogan said this was responsible for slowing the projectile and saved possible serious injury.

Polk said the investigation will continue, commenting that this was apparently the work of "a sick person," or that it was a stray bullet from a hunter or someone else shooting in the area. "I hate to think someone would intentionally shoot into a school bus," he added.

A four-year-old boy was pulled from a pool by his mother, revived with mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, and flown to Florida Hospital by

# War Critics Seeking To Bar Involvement

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some longtime war critics in the Senate are discussing a new effort to prevent U.S. involvement in the Vietnam war flares up again.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said Wednesday the senators want "insurance against the future" by barring funds for U.S. military activities, including bombing, in Indochina.

He said any new legislation would be similar to the 1970 amendment, passed after the U.S. invasion into Cambodia, which barred the return of U.S. combat ground troops and military advisers to that Indochinese country.

But Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., and Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., both predicted the question of U.S. involvement won't arise.

"We're not going back in," said the 80-year-old Aiken, who has periodically criticized U.S. war policy.

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., told reporters he favors a cutoff in U.S. military aid to the Saigon government and a channeling of future assistance through multilateral agencies such as the United Nations.

Other senators, however, seem more inclined to concentrate on the war-powers bill, a measure that would set limits on presidential power to commit U.S. troops overseas. It passed the Senate in the last Congress, but failed in the House.

# Double Sessions Decreed

Double sessions have been implemented at Forest City Elementary School to grades four and five, effective Feb. 5, the School Board decreed at Wednesday night's session held at Lyman High School.

Seminole County Superintendent William Layer recommended the doubling-up due to rapid heavy population growth at the facility. (Related stories on page 1B)

The superintendent said other alternatives were explored, such as portable classrooms, but enough of these could not be found.

Under the new arrangement, the morning classes will start at 7:40 a. m., and the second session will conclude at 5:10 p. m. Layer said no additional staffing of the school would be required.

Board member Davy Sims told the board he opposed double sessions, and opined this should serve as a warning to the board to make the right decisions to forego double sessions at the schools in South Seminole County.

John Bryant, vice chairman, said he was voting against the Layer recommendation because he was not given sufficient time to "check it out."

He explained she was just handed the proposal and was not yet ready to vote, but Layer remarked he had suggested at an earlier board work session that the double sessions at Forest City was an alternative.

# 'Missing' Pilots Killed

SAIGON (AP)—No Americans were reported killed in action in Indochina fighting last week but four fliers listed previously as missing were changed to killed in action, the U.S. Command said today in what should be its next-to-last weekly casualty summary.

Six U.S. Servicemen were reported wounded, none of them seriously, and two deaths from nonbattle causes were reported.

Command spokesmen said the four fliers were last over Laos, but were listed as killed because they did not know when.

The South Vietnamese command reported 358 government troops killed in action last week, 140 wounded and 32 missing, about the average since the beginning of December. The command claimed 1,643 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed.

The allied commands now have announced these total casualties for the war.

American—45,837 killed in action, 300,822 wounded, 10,200 dead from nonbattle causes and 1,925 missing or captured.

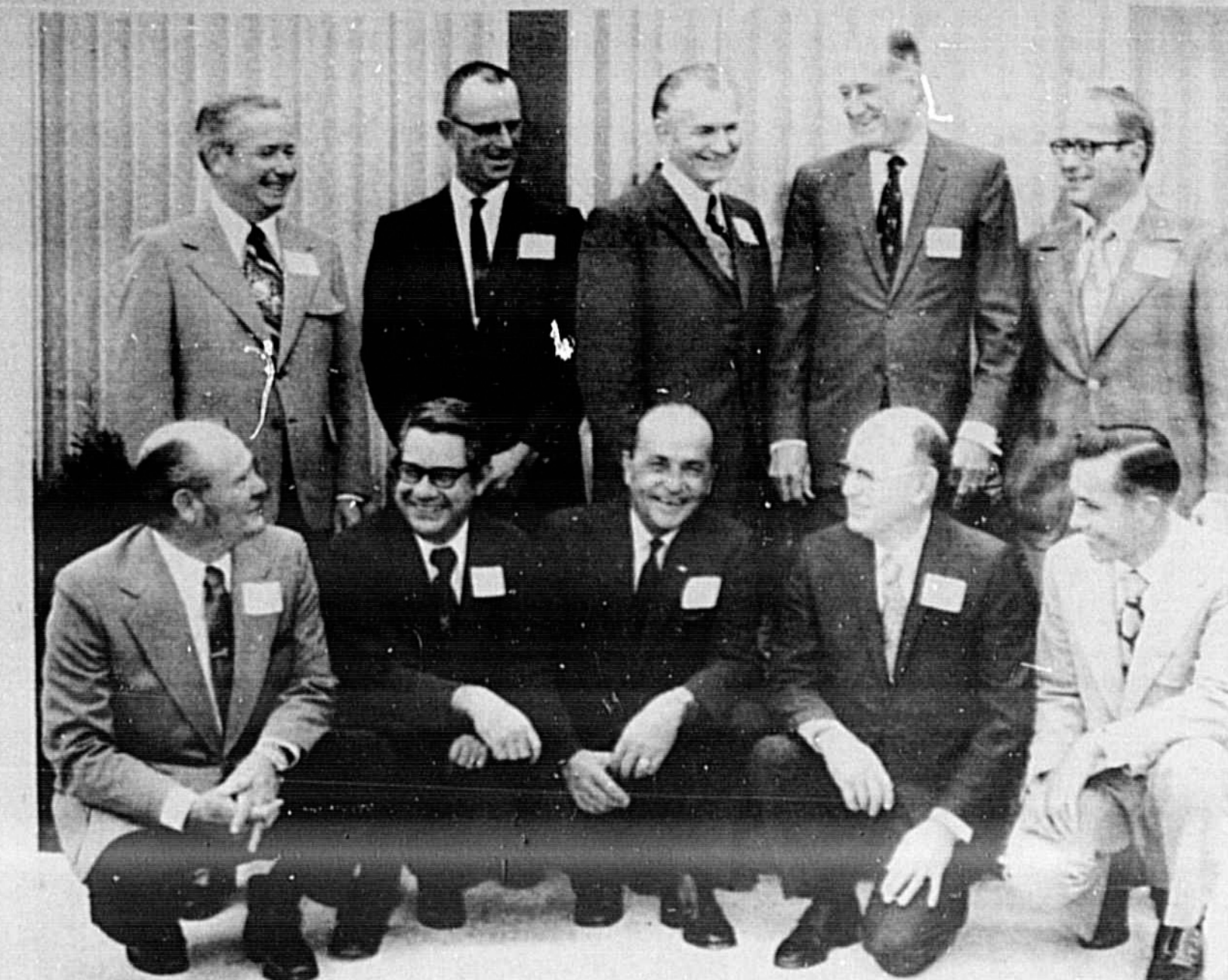
South Vietnamese—183,260 killed in action, 437,491 wounded.

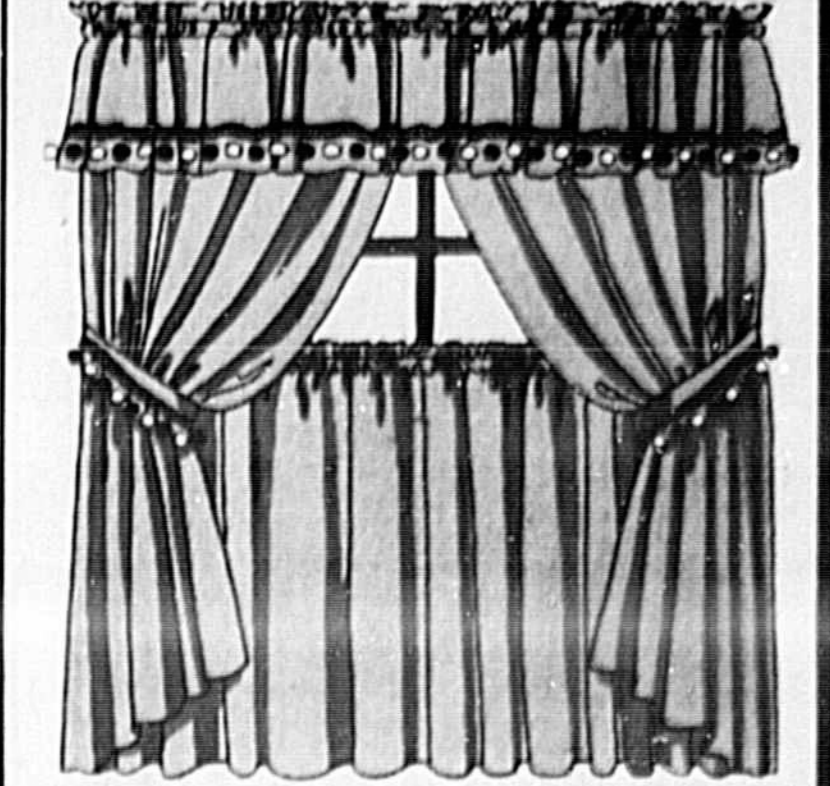

High-Scoring Students Early FTU Graduates

The new program will start in September and up to 100 high school graduates with high academic qualifications and recommendations will be permitted to enroll.

According to Dr. C. B. Gambrell, FTU's Vice President for Academic Affairs, the plan was formulated after a study of several procedures which are in use at many institutions to shorten the time required to complete a degree program.

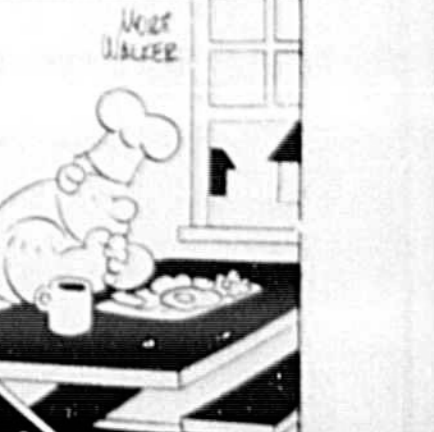

### 1972 Figures Show A Gain

MIAMI — Southeast Banking Corporation today reported a 17 per cent increase in consolidated operating revenues and a 10 per cent gain in net income for the year ending December 31, 1972.

At year-end, consolidated operating revenues reached \$107,125,403 compared with \$91,660,350 last year. Income before securities transactions rose to \$14,259,089, equal to \$1.79 per share, and 13 per cent higher than the \$12,584,218, or \$1.59 per share a year ago. Net income after securities transactions was \$4,321,170, or \$1.80 per share, against \$3,015,153, or \$1.65 per share for the year earlier period.

Per share figures are based on 2,974,342 average common and common equivalent shares outstanding in 1972, and 7,890,568 outstanding shares in 1971. Figures for both years reflect the 2-6-1 stock split announced May 1, 1972, and indicate operations for the full periods of all Southeast affiliates, including those acquired since December 31, 1971, on a pooling of interests basis.

Southeast is a Miami-based registered bank holding company, presently controlling 18 Florida banks and several bank-related service affiliates.

### Atlantic Bancorporation Forms Advisory

Atlantic Bancorporation announced today that it has been authorized by the Federal Reserve Board to form a new investment advisory company. The firm, to be known as Atlantic Investment Advisers, Inc., will have offices in Jacksonville, Florida. According to Edward W. Lane, Jr., President of Atlantic Bancorporation, the firm will render investment advice to clients, including the trust departments of subsidiary banks of Atlantic Bancorporation.

Officers of the firm include J. H. McCormack, Jr., Chairman of the Board, Cyrus M. Norman, President and William B. Bond, Vice President.

Advisory services will be commenced after the firm has registered as an investment advisor with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

### Tel-A-Teller Service

Floyd Cooper, president of American Federal Savings and Loan Association of Orlando, has announced a new savings account service "Tel-A-Teller."

"Tel-A-Teller is for our customers who find it inconvenient to leave their place of business or home to deposit or withdraw money from savings. It is a new electronic concept for Orlando, allowing transactions to be made by phone," according to Cooper.

A phone call to the American Federal Tel-A-Teller number, 423-2300, enables transfers of excess funds to be made from a bank checking account into savings, where it earns daily interest at 5 per cent until withdrawal, which can also be accomplished by phone. This enables business, in particular, to put incoming funds into savings until they are needed later in the month.

American Federal's Tel-A-Teller accounts can be opened at any of the five area offices, with a minimum \$5000 initial deposit. A \$5000 minimum is set on all phone transactions.

### Passenger Increase

Pan American World Airways flew 1,504 million scheduled passenger miles in December, an 11.7 per cent increase over the 1,346 million flown in December, 1971.

Total revenue passenger miles were 1,619 million, an 8.7 per cent increase over the 1,490 million in December, 1971.

Charter passenger miles totaled 115 million, down 13.9 per cent from 144 million in December, 1971. This includes a 35.1 per cent decrease in military charter and a 16.7 per cent increase in commercial charter passenger miles.

Seat factor for all services was 56.0 per cent compared with 62.5 per cent last December. Cargo ton miles for all services were 75,848,000, down 8.8 per cent from the 83,139,000 flown in December, 1971.

Total revenue cargo ton miles flown increased 9.9 per cent over 1971.

### Property Acquired

Other outstanding features are complete recreation facilities, luxury water front apartments, and more than one thousand palm trees.

### New Name Approved

DELTONA — Southeast Bank of Deltona, the new name approved at the annual stockholders' meeting of the former First Bank of Deltona, had a healthy year of growth in 1972.

## Business Mirror Signs Show Of Credit Strain

NEW YORK (AP) — It is predictable as the phases of the year: When the economy is vigorous lenders are amiable. They might even plot little schemes to encourage you to borrow.

Most families don't need a great deal of encouragement to borrow when times are good and the future looks even better. It is then that they have the confidence to go into debt.

And while the debts built up, the rapidly expanding economy packs more income into the wallets of borrowers, who though pressed from time to time — that is, every month — are therefore able to pay the bills.

But then comes another predictable phase: Some borrowers and lenders begin to have a few financial scrapes. This is the debt more frightening to the lender, when a businessman delays paying a bill within

### Consider resilient flooring instead of wall-to-wall

In some areas of the house, you may prefer to have resilient flooring instead of wall-to-wall carpeting.

Manufacturers will replace or repair defective materials; but if the fault of the damage lies in the installation, you'll have to deal directly with the installer.

Buy only from a reputable dealer who is known for the quality of his work. To insure you are getting the best buy and that the tiles will wear well, stick to well-known brands.

Price reflects quality in resilient flooring. Inexpensive floorings may have attractive patterns but their reduced cost means less-expensive and less-durable materials were used in the production of it. This is especially true in sheet vinyls.

One of the lowest cost resilient floorings is the loose-lay type. It's also among the types most prone to cuts, abrasions, and indentations.

If you're replacing a flooring, inquire about the possibility of having the new resilient material installed directly over the present flooring. There are some installation techniques that allow the new flooring to be installed over one layer of old material that is wax-free, smooth and in good condition.

Wood floorings may be in poor structural condition. This is the case if the boards are warped or uneven and can't be repaired. A new sub-floor can be installed.

If the subfloor should need replacing, be sure you purchase the proper type and grade of material needed for use with the resilient flooring you have chosen. The most common types of subflooring are particleboard, hardboard, and plywood. Ask the installer which flooring you should use.

Saving pennies on subflooring material or installation could result in it being improperly installed or of poor quality. Either of these can create problems with the resilient flooring.

Don't rely on your memory. Colors change under different lighting conditions. Because of the fluorescent lights used in stores, a flooring sample will be one color there and another color in your home under sodium lights.

Before you make a purchase, have the salesperson come to your home with actual color samples. This is the best way to insure you're getting a color and pattern that blends well with your furnishings.

### Higher Food Prices Boost Living Cost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Higher prices for eggs, fresh vegetables and household services pushed up the cost of living by 0.3 per cent last

month, giving the nation a 3.4 per cent rate of inflation in 1972, the same as 1971.

The Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today the consumer price index went up to 127.3 per cent of the 1967 average, meaning that it cost consumers \$12.73 to buy the same basket of goods that \$10 bought in 1967.

consumer price index. The BLS said price information for two indices is collected at different times of the month, adding that there is generally a time lag between wholesale price increases and their reflection at the retail level. In addition, it said, not all wholesale price increases are passed on to the consumer.

The report showed the Nixon administration went over its 1973 target of trying to cut the rate of inflation to three per cent or below at the end of the year. During Phase I and Phase 2 economic controls, which were abandoned by President Nixon early in January, consumer prices went up 3.2 per cent, the report said.

The BLS issued an indirect warning that the January index will show sharply higher food prices. Wholesale prices of food went up sharply in December, but not all of the impact was reflected in the December Consumer Price Index.

### RETIREMENT VA insurance now at \$15,000

Q. I am 57 and still have my Veterans Administration term life insurance in the amount of \$10,000. What would you advise me to do with it could it be converted? I have other insurance with the company I now work for. — C.H. A.

Q. My husband is retired on disability Social Security and my question is, will I receive half of what he gets when I reach the age of 62? I have not worked under Social Security. — Mrs. L.M.

A. In no case will it be effective prior to July 1, 1973.

Q. I receive a military newsletter each month and I read that Social Security now gives some extra credit for military service. I'd like to know more about it. — Mr. C.P.D.

A. The new law grants additional Social Security credits of \$100 for each month of active military service from 1952 through 1967. The \$100 per month credit has been applicable to military service from 1968 on, based on prior amendments.

If you are getting benefits and you were in the armed forces between 1957 and 1967 or if you are a survivor of someone who served in those years, get in touch with your nearest Social Security office.
