Sanford Favored In Water Decision

Decision in favor of the City of Sanford has been returned by the Florida Fourth Court of Appeal in a suit brought by the Leffer Company seeking to restrain the city from laying water mains across its property on Celery Avenue. City Attorney William C. Hutchison Jr. said the decision was returned yesterday afternoon by the Appellate Court at Vero Beach.

The State of Florida and the City of Sanford had entered into an agreement whereby the State would deed 6.47 acres of land on Celery Avenue to the City for water service at the Central Florida Experiment Station farther out on Celery Avenue, near Cameron Avenue.

Deed for the 6.47 acres of land, adjacent to the Sanford Naval Academy at Melville and Celery Avenues and formerly occupied by the Central Florida Experiment Station, was delayed for more than two years by the state because of the pending litigation.

Only recently the Sanford Herald published an item the deed of transfer for the 6.47 acres had never been received by the City from the State. It was learned today that the deed was received by the City shortly after that recent item in the Herald.

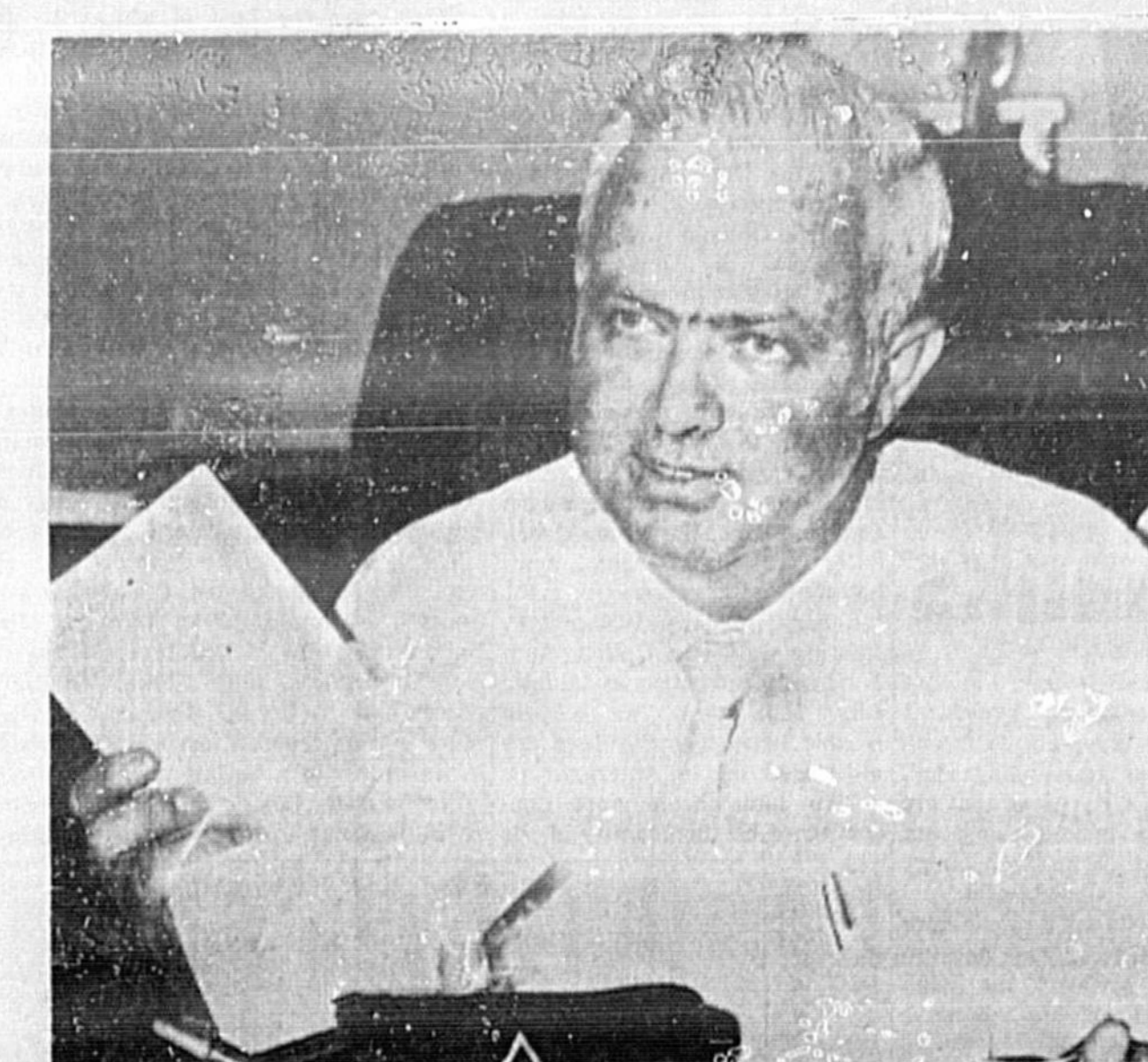

Altamonte Funds In Jeopardy

Federal funds earmarked for construction of water and sewer facilities at Altamonte Springs were placed in jeopardy at the County Commission meeting this morning.



County Commissioners at a recent meeting requested Commissioner Greg Drummond, Consulting Engineer, B. C. Conklin and County Sanitarian Val Robbins to review the plans of the Altamonte Springs sewer system relative to charges by Drummond that according to a report by James Van Hoy of the

East Central Florida Regional Planning Council that the plan would utilize a type of "pop off" valve which could release sewage directly into a moving stream on days of heavy rain. Drummond said that the stream concerned would be Spring Lake, which, in turn, flows into the Little Wekiva River.

Drummond alluded to the application for funding from the office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) by Altamonte Springs in which it states that during periods of prolonged or heavy rainfall an overflow weir from percolation-evaporation ponds will be provided to carry off the overflow through a water course which runs to the northeast.

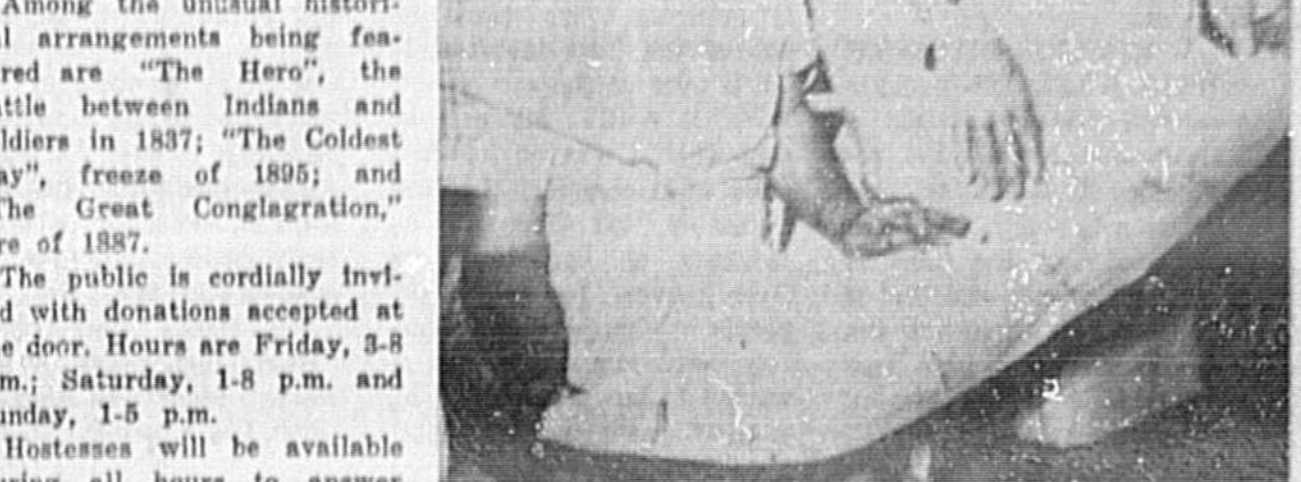

Nixon Shuns Senate On Blackmun

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, ignoring the suggestions of a number of Senate Republicans, made no effort to clear with them the Supreme Court nomination of Judge Harrold Carswell before making a final decision on it.

To seek advance clearance would have been highly unusual, as one Republican senator noted. "The defeat of two successive court nominees was fairly unusual, too. If the choice is between being unusual and being embarrassed, I'd rather be unusual every time."

Following the defeat April 8 of G. Harrold Carswell, Nixon's second choice to sit on the Supreme Court, there was a groundswell of sentiment among Senate members that further embarrassment might be avoided if Nixon consulted with them before deciding on a third nominee.

It's going to be a rough road ahead for the Raiders. They will have to play their best and get some top-notch performances from their pitching staffs to have any hope for a state championship.

It will be like overcoming the impossible, but the Raiders have the spirit and the desire to do just this. Betting any other way, the Raiders should still hold their own in tournament competition.

Listening to soft taped music we watched intently as the stands surrounding us became packed with humanity. And from what I could see, these individuals were just as excited as I.

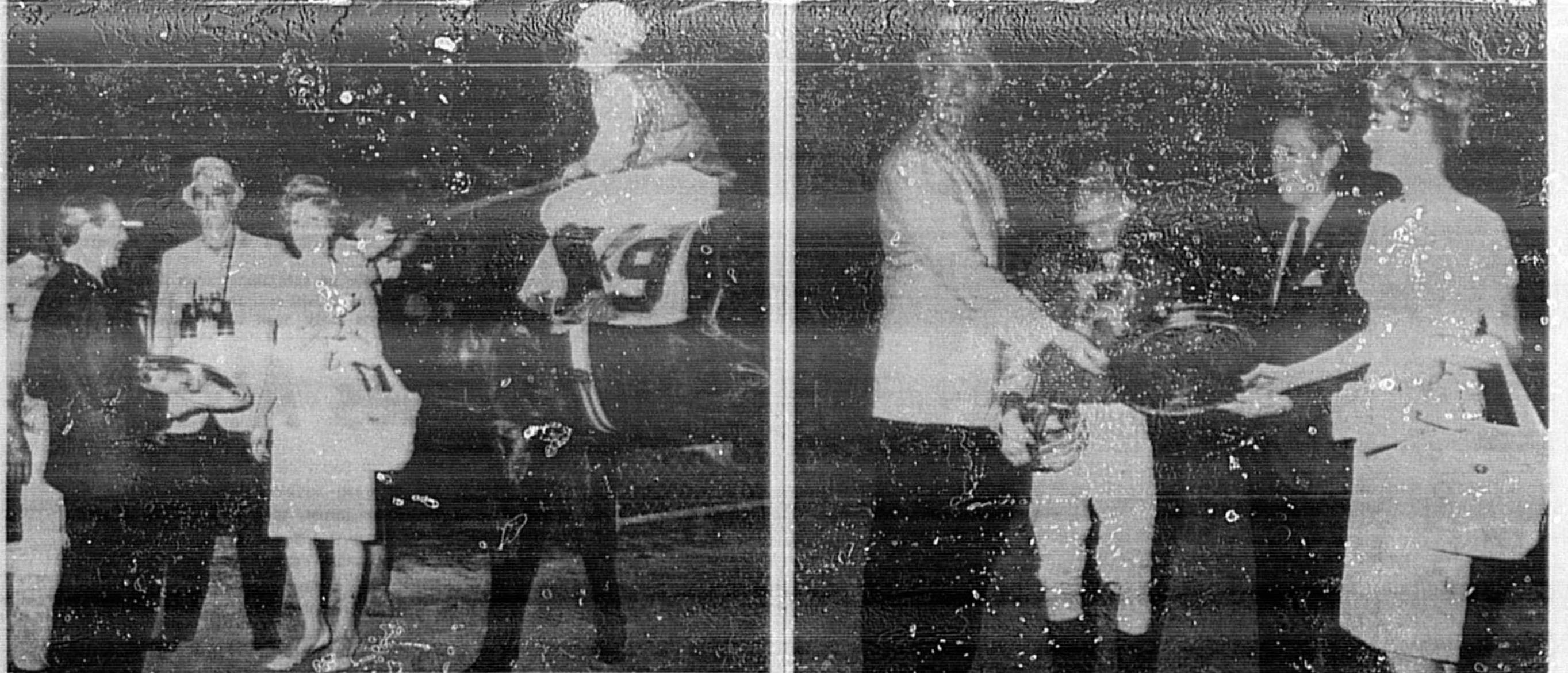

The specks are still biting but are spotty. Don Newsome has been catching his limit of specks while baiting with live minnows.

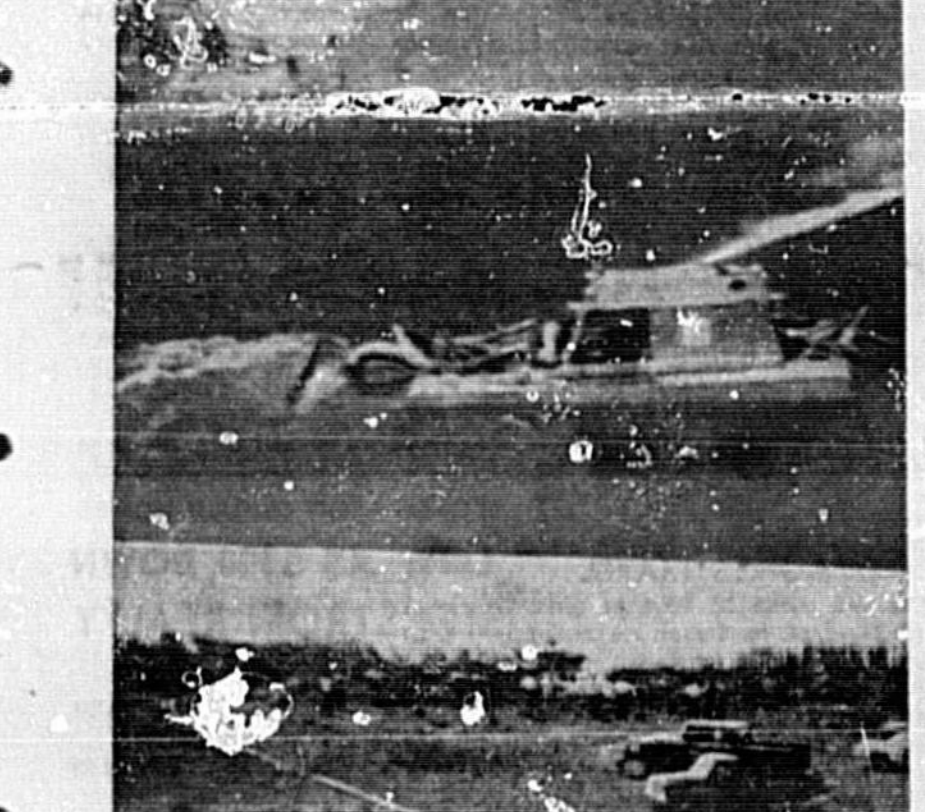
On the north shore line of Lake Jessup the gizzard shad are schooling in masses. There must be millions of these rough fish in that area and the white pelicans are having a real feast with these rough fish.

The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission repeatedly has backed the proposal, contending the \$3 license fee is needed to maintain fresh water lakes.

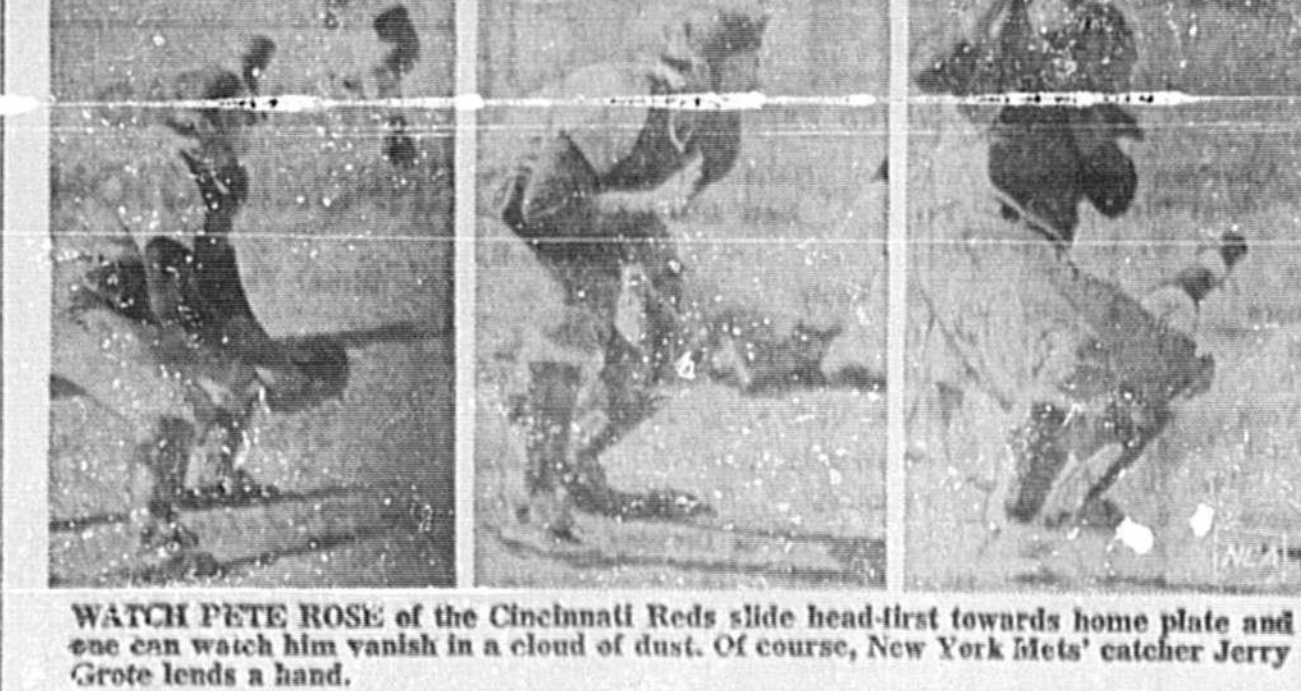
The bill would exempt welfare recipients, children under 15 and the over-65 group.

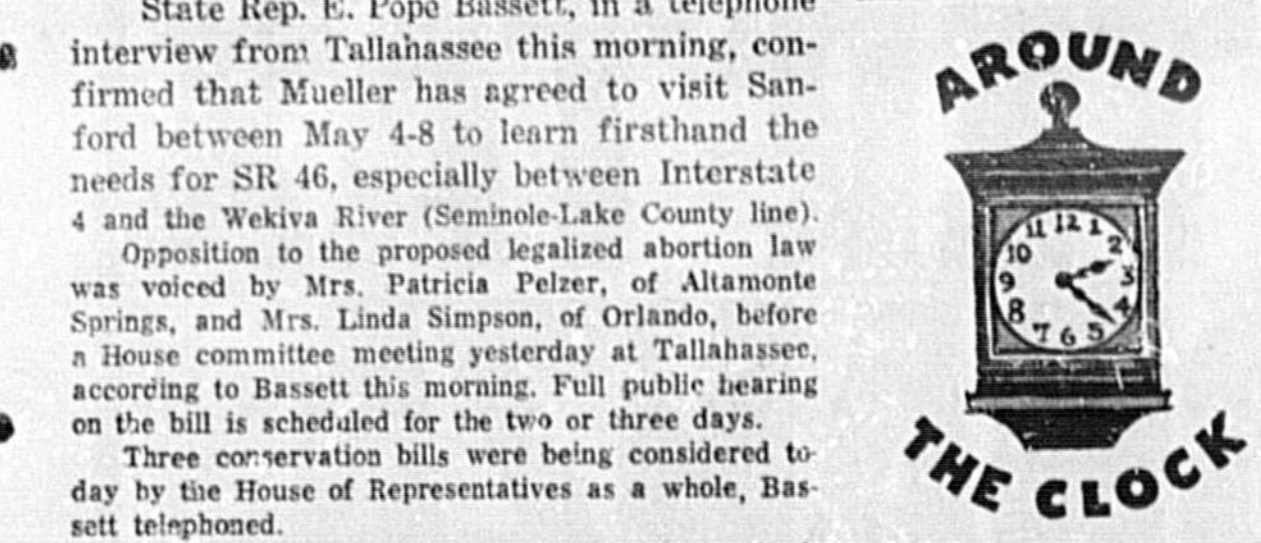

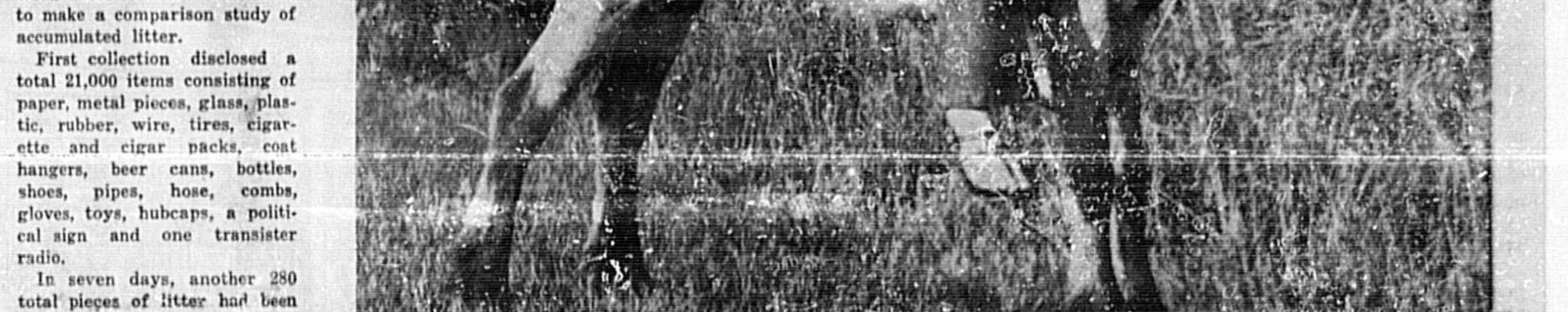
