BULLETIN SAYS BRITISH RULER DISPLAYS GAIN

**Optimistic Report Is
Given Out By Royal
Physicians After Ex-
amination Of King**

LONDON, Dec. 15.—(INS)—A more optimistic bulletin on the condition of King George was issued at Buckingham Palace this morning. The King had several hours' sleep. The local condition is so far satisfactory. There is no increase in exhaustion. The pulse remains steady. The bulletin said Sir Stanley Hewit, Sir Hugh Highbury and Lord Dawson of Penn signed the bulletin. It was timed 11:50 A. M.

The latest bulletin served to dispel some of the pessimism which had been spread in England since the onset of last evening's disturbing bulletin.

The fact that the royal physician this morning noted no increase in the condition was regarded as an especially good sign. It is generally believed that so long as the King continues to maintain his strength the hope of a complete recovery will remain good.

All England was in suspense, to say the least, when the bulletin was issued. The fact that the royal physician noted no increase in the condition was regarded as an especially good sign.

Palace officials were reluctant to admit that the King had actually offered a relapse yesterday. It was felt that if such unsatisfactory fluctuations persisted, the chances for the King's ultimate recovery would be gravely endangered.

Both the morning bulletin which said "continued improvement" and the disturbing evening bulletin signed by Sir Hugh Highbury and Lord Dawson left at about 9:15 P. M.

The Duke of York, his duchess, Prince Edward and the Prince of Wales joined Queen Mary at a luncheon yesterday which was the only celebration of the King's thirty-third birthday.

The two younger sons of the King are both aboard steamer headed for Gloucester, where they will remain in the hospital. The Duke of Gloucester is aboard the Balmoral Castle from Cape Cod. New York last night about 7:30 P. M.

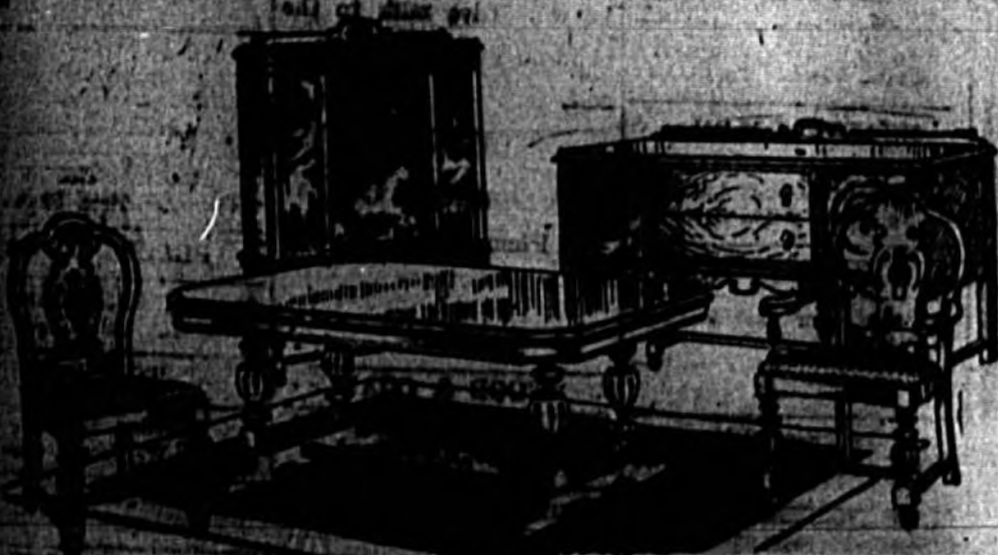

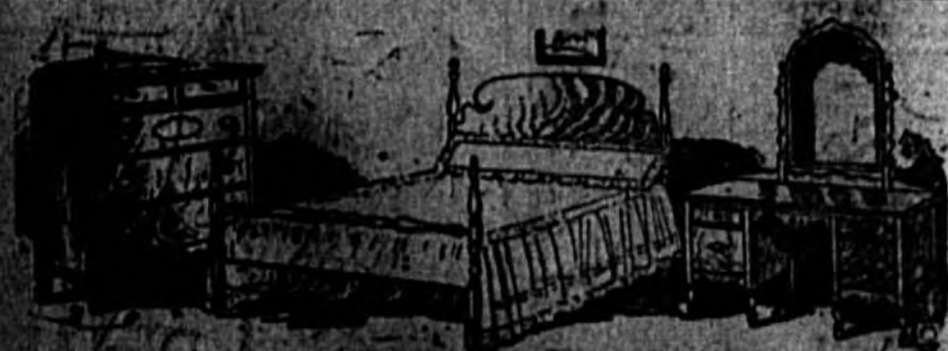

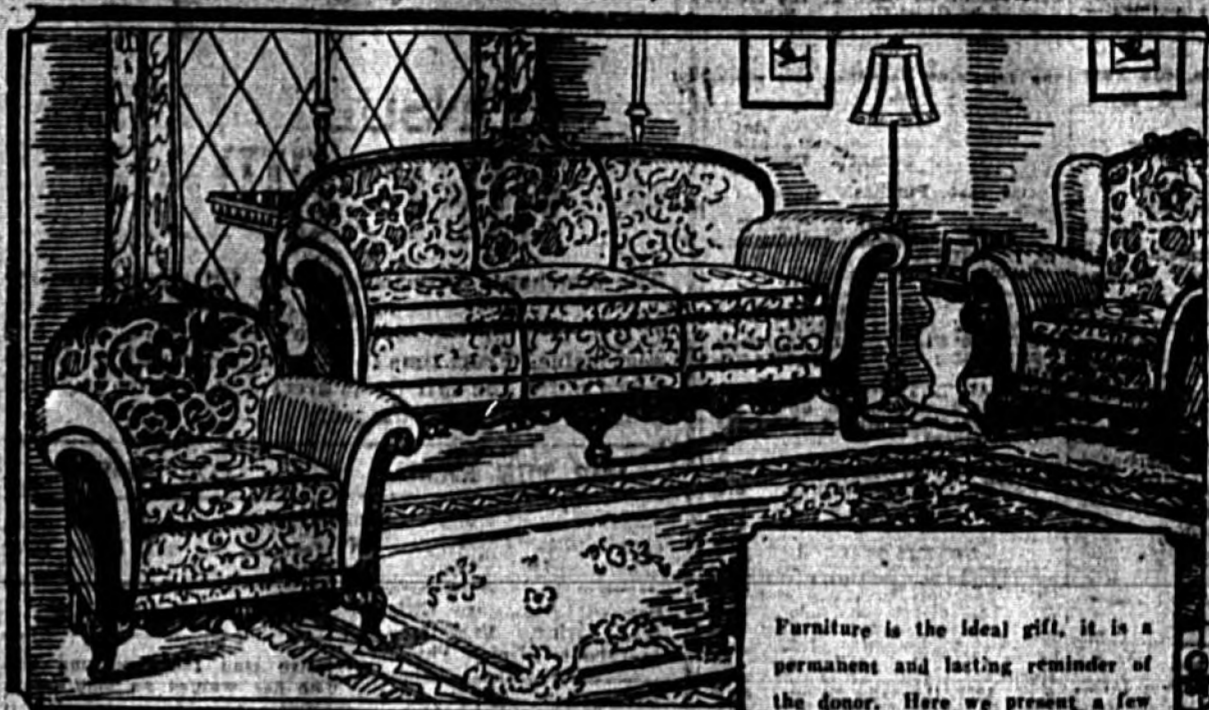

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School Taxes

Anent recommendations made recently by the Florida Survey Commission with reference to the public schools of this state, the Orlando Reporter-Star offers some comments that are worthy of serious consideration.

Some of the suggestions, the Orlando paper notes, merit the support of every citizen interested in the welfare of the schools, but adds that "there is one cold, outstanding fact that school men are apt to overlook."

Both Dr. Englehardt and Dr. Mort, in their addresses before the recent State Teachers' Association, made frequent use of the phrase, "the state's obligation to educate its children."

These men told us facts quite generally known before the survey was made—namely, that our school system is far from perfect, that in some counties in the state inadequate school facilities are provided and the school term is too short.

But the real question that confronts the people of Florida is, how to get the revenues with which to remedy these deplorable conditions.

In several counties the school term has not only been shortened, but school officials cannot get the revenues with which to pay teachers' salaries even for the short term.

Until some means is found for reducing public expenses to a point where people can afford to pay their taxes instead of letting their lands go back to the state, we cannot see how revenues are going to be available for the increasing of school terms and bettering of educational facilities.

Reform must begin at the very root of the situation. First, by the cutting out of every unnecessary board and commission now in existence and the reducing of state expenses. And secondly, a uniform system of valuation for real estate will have to be worked out before backward counties will make their valuations where they will bring sufficient revenues into the county treasury without preying upon the more progressive counties.

Members of the state Legislature can well afford to work for the adoption of most of the recommendations made by this Commission, but only in connection with the general idea of tax reform, and with a determination to avoid anything that means the creation of additional boards and commissions at state expense.

To this end, some of the recommendations may well be omitted.

Influenza

Influenza, a word which in 1918 earned for itself a dreadful connotation because of the widespread and devastating ravages of the disease, has again raised its sinister head and is making itself felt throughout the nation.

Although the present epidemic is declared to be of much milder form than the one which swept the country during the closing period of the World War, it is nevertheless considered serious enough to prompt the surgeon general of the United States to issue a set of rules for the prevention of the malady which we are printing herewith:

- 1. Avoid needless crowding. Walk to work when possible. 2. Take advantage of sunshine. 3. Sleep with windows open. 4. Avoid people who are coughing, sneezing or sniffing. 5. Wash your hands before eating, and do not put your fingers in your mouth. 6. Do not use napkins, towels, spoons, forks, knives and drinking cups unless they are clean. 7. Use plenty of clean water, both inside and outside. Eat wholesome food. Sleep at least seven hours. 8. Keep away from houses with influenza. 9. Avoid undue chilling of the body. 10. Avoid dust and overheated rooms. 11. In case you do contract the disease go to bed as soon as symptoms develop, and remain there until thoroughly recovered. Public health officials at the same time warned against so-called "specifics" for influenza.

GLOOM SARASOTA TIMES

Recently while travelling into Tampa on an A. C. L. Railway train, the writer engaged in conversation with a Tampa man, and one of the main topics of conversation was the "gloomy talk" heard in various cities in Florida about business conditions.

The gloom dispensers we knew were getting in their work in Sarasota, and we asked the Tampa man if the pessimists existed in any large numbers in his city. His reply was that they were numerous and, unfortunately, on the increase each day, and that they were doing untold damage to Tampa as well as to other cities in Florida where they were to be found.

Getting back to Sarasota—the pessimists are endeavoring to strip the city of its possibilities. Surely Sarasota is as great a city today as it was four years ago, or three years ago, if anything it is a greater city, with brighter prospects than boasted three years ago.

IT CAN'T GO ON TAMPA TRIBUNE

The state of Florida, on its general fund account, received for the fiscal year ending July 30, 1927, a total of \$4,664,715. For the same period, it expended a total of \$4,664,715.

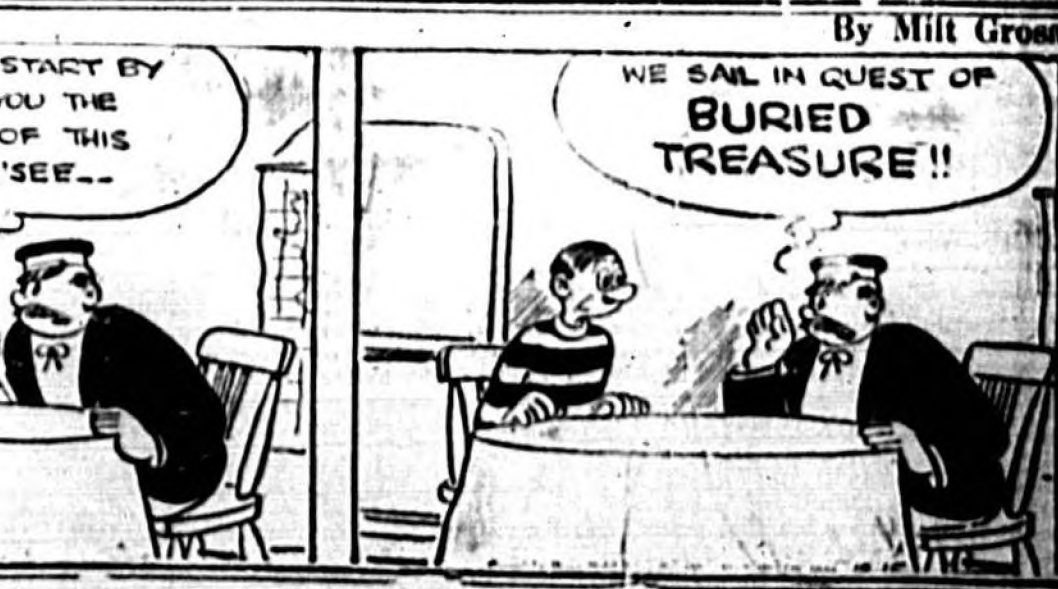
