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A Message To Moscow

The Reagan administration has chosen, quite deliberately, to begin its tenure with some very blunt talk about the Russians.

In his first press conference as President, Ronald Reagan was asked his view of the long-range intentions of the Soviet Union.

As observations of demonstrable fact, the Reagan-Haig remarks are beyond dispute.

Marxism-Leninism, the official, secular religion of the Soviet state, requires its adherents—which surely include each and every member of the ruling Soviet politburo—to promote the international proletarian revolution at every opportunity.

As for the means to this end, the writings of Lenin especially are permeated with contempt for "bourgeois morality," a contempt manifestly shared by every Soviet leader since.

And what of terrorism? The Soviets, believing as they do in their historical duty to abet the destruction of non-communist governments and societies, had been funding, arming, training, and encouraging selected terrorist organizations for decades.

At present, the Palestine Liberation Organization is by the most notable of the terrorist groups receiving open or clandestine assistance from the Soviet Union or from such Moscow clients as East Germany, Czechoslovakia, and Cuba.

Granted, then, that President Reagan and Secretary Haig spoke the truth. But do such statements from an American president and his secretary of state serve such a constructive purpose?

We think so. The Reagan administration has sent a message to Moscow in vivid, unmistakable terms: The government of the United States entertains no illusions whatsoever about the nature of its chief adversary.

Putting the Soviet leaders on notice of this fact diminishes the prospects for the kind of miscalculation that prompted Leonid Brezhnev's predecessor, for example, to precipitate the Cuban missile crisis of 1962.

The Russians, fond of testing the mettle of each new American president, now have less reason to risk a truly reckless opening probe against Mr. Reagan.

Tough talk alone will not, of course, be sufficient to restrain the Soviets during the next four years. The Reagan administration must begin quickly to restore American military strength and to revitalize badly frayed alliances.

In the meantime, however, the President and his chief foreign policy spokesman have rendered the world a slightly less dangerous place by giving Brezhnev and company a whiff of verbal grapeshot.

School Cocaine Use Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A nationwide survey shows that cigarette smoking among high school seniors appears to be declining and marijuana smoking may have peaked, but cocaine use has doubled since 1975.

While the kinds and amounts of such substances used shift from year to year, the five-year survey showed that the kinds of young people most likely to use them remain the same.

"Above average drug use occurs among those less successful in adapting to the educational environment, as indicated by truancy and low grades, those who spend many evenings out for recreation and those with heavy time commitments to a job and/or (have) relatively high incomes," said the report published in the latest issue of the American Journal of Public Health.

"Drug use is below average among seniors with strong religious commitments and conservative political views."

More girls smoked cigarettes than boys, but males averaged more alcohol and marijuana use than females. There was little difference among sexes in other drug use.

Blacks reported lower drug use than whites, but the report said this might be because of a higher school dropout rate than whites and black seniors may have had less trust in researchers asking them to report drug use.

The most dramatic shift in drug popularity, the survey found, involved cocaine with its use among high school seniors increasing from 5.6 percent in the class of 1975 to 13 percent in the class of 1979. However, the study found that most of those who reported using cocaine did so only a few times a year.

Cigarette use among high school seniors appears to have reached a peak in the classes of 1975 and 1977 and is now trending downward, the report said. Girls surpassed boys in 1978 among those who smoked at least a half pack daily.

In 1979, about 17 percent of the senior females reported smoking that much daily compared to about 15 percent of males while those reporting any use ranged from about 32 percent for males to about 37 percent for females.

Daily marijuana use averaged about 7 percent for females in 1979 and about 13 percent for males. Those reporting any use of marijuana ranged from about 32 percent for females to about 43 percent for males.

After a dramatic rise in the 1960s and early 1970s, the report said the trend continued to 1978 but started leveling off in 1979.

"It remains to be seen whether these rates will now begin to decline along with cigarette smoking rates," the report said.

Daily use of alcohol ranged from about 4 percent for females to about 9 percent for males. Those reporting any alcohol use jumped from about 68 percent for females to 77 percent for males.

Negotiators Ignored Expert's Advice

WASHINGTON—To help get the hostages back from Iran, the Carter administration called upon Herb Cohen, an internationally respected lawyer, whose specialty is negotiating. He not only told Jimmy Carter's people what they were doing wrong—while they were doing it—but he predicted the release of the hostages almost to the exact hour.

There was only one problem: The Carter strategists paid no attention to him. They sought his expert views, then excluded him from their deliberations. Not until Ronald Reagan's advisers consulted Cohen, ironically, did anyone listen to him.

He submitted his conclusions in writing to Reagan's campaign manager, William Casey, on Oct. 25 — 10 days before the election. "Khomeini and his mullahs know that they are selling to an anxious buyer," advised Cohen. "Therefore, the maximum price that they can extract from this administration will be just prior to the election."

"To put it bluntly, any experienced negotiator or bazaar vendor knows that on Nov. 5 the Iranians will have to put their 'illegally obtained merchandise' on sale at a cut-rate price."

Although the anxious Carter might be willing to pay the maximum price, Cohen predicted, there would be little to be gained before Election Day. The release of the hostages would come too late, therefore, to

Politics, Diplomacy Do Mix

Whatever you may have heard to the contrary, don't believe it: Politics and diplomacy do mix.

In the case of President Reagan, he has provided it in abundance with his masterful move in keeping Ambassador Mike Mansfield on as our man in Tokyo.

It is a decision that has stirred ovations — literally from Japanese groups Mansfield has subsequently addressed and figuratively in government ministries that have reason to know what a good thing they have going for them in the American ministers plenipotentiary.

Even given the special circumstances of the Japanese-American relationship, Mansfield is something very special in that line. He not only represents his country to the Japanese, but takes a sympathetic and factual position on their behalf in communicating with his own government.

He has worked diligently to lessen economic differences and to heighten political cooperation, reiterating at every opportunity to both Japanese and American listeners his conviction that the United States must look to the future and that Japan is the indispensable American ally.

Mansfield's performance has done more than flatter the Japanese. It has reassured them as to the dependability and durability of the special relationship as they take an increasingly assertive international role, a role that, as much as \$7 billion in annual trade and a sympathetic and factual position on their behalf in communicating with his own government.

Thomas D. Morris, the man who assumed that job, pursued precisely the type of governmental waste, corruption and inefficiency that Reagan has cheating against for more than a decade — invading by welfare beneficiaries, student-loan recipients and Medicare-Medicaid providers.

When Morris announced that his office had identical figures as much as \$7 billion in annual losses, Reagan instinctively picked up that figure and inserted it in his standard speech as another example of corruption and ineptitude in Washington.

What Reagan didn't tell his audiences, however, was that HEW itself had voluntarily canceled as part of its no-nonsense campaign against waste that the department was committed to a full-scale effort to rectify the situation.

If the president had chosen to retain or remove the IGs on a case-by-case basis, their offices would be functioning normally today. Instead, he has left all of their staffs leaderless and damaged the continuity of their work.

The 1978 law that created most of the IG positions specifies that they must be appointed "solely on the basis of integrity and demonstrated ability and without regard to political affiliation as part of its no-nonsense campaign against waste that the department was committed to a full-scale effort to rectify the situation.

But Reagan also dumped some highly regarded professionals, including Charles L. Dempsey at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, J. Kenneth Mansfield at the Energy Department, Thomas F. McBride at the Agriculture Department and Allan L. Reynolds at the Veterans Administration.

There also is some question about the standards he has established for the job. "Being vicious and savage won't get the job done," says one insider. "Analytical ability, intelligence and persistence are far more important skills."

Reagan's administration's admission that it may have acted impulsively and unwisely came in late January, when the senior Republican on the House Governmental Operations Committee, Rep. Frank Horton of New York, visited the White House.

He said the Carter administration had failed to grasp—and explain—the key point in the hostage seizure: It was a criminal act, and the Iranian mullahs were kidnappers. Cohen faulted Carter for having "no coherent and consistent strategy," commenting: "This uncertainty and impetuosity have given even ineptitude a bad name."

HEADLINES AND FOOTNOTES: Intelligence reports warn that the Kremlin has lost patience with Priland and will send in troops. They are expected to cross the border, however, not as invaders but as "allies" on "maneuvers."

Advisers have warned President Reagan to treat Egypt's mercenary President Anwar Sadat delicately. They believe Sadat is edgy and may make another dramatic move to distract Egypt from his frustrations. On an impulse, he might even tear up the Israeli-Egyptian accords, the experts fear.

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Sanford To Name Charter Revision, Code Boards

Two new advisory boards are to be appointed by the Sanford City Commission at its Feb. 23 meeting. The commission agreed Monday night to appoint an 11-member charter revision committee and a six-member code enforcement board at its second meeting of the month.

The commission is to appoint two members each to the charter committee with the 11th member to be named by all the commissioners. The committee is to have a period of nine months to study the entire document and make recommendations to the city commission on what changes, if any, it wishes to make.

The code enforcement board, according to city ordinance and state law, will have the power to enforce occupational licenses, fire, building, zoning, sign and related technical codes within the city.

BERLIN (UPI) — East Germans have a rough time getting through the Berlin Wall to the West, but it's no problem for bargain alcohol and cigarettes.

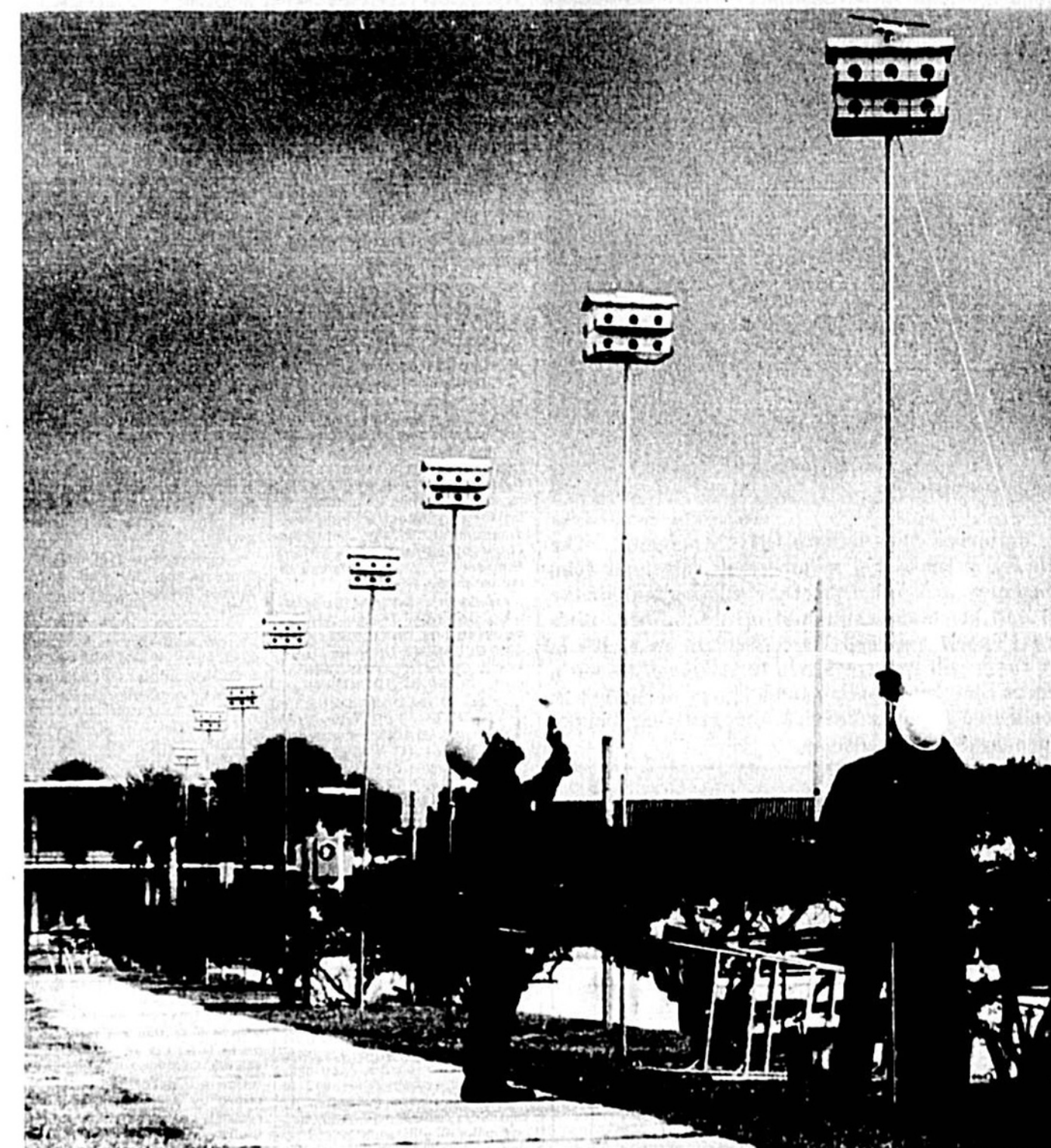
