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## Millions Lost In Cape Jobs, Probers Find

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate investigators said today the Air Force could save \$3 million by having plugs stuck on electric cords at the factory instead of letting workers do it at missile sites.

But workers at Cape Canaveral and other missile bases have walked out when such equipment was used, resulting in heavy overtime bills.

The Senate investigations subcommittee today called spokesmen for several unions at Cape Canaveral to answer contractors' charges that the workers refuse to turn out eight hours of work a day.

According to previous testimony, they make so much overtime that they occasionally earn more money in a week than Cabinet officials.

The subcommittee's staff presented an estimate that more economical factory terminations for electric cables would save nearly \$250,000 at each of the 12 proposed Titan missile squadrons. Each missile has thousands of the soldered connections in its many plugs.

The question of whether the multi-connection plugs should be put on the cables by missile builders or on-site construction workers has been cited as one of the disputes that has caused strikes at the bases.

## Dry Spell Taking Serious Toll On County Groves

County Agent Cecil Tucker said today that approximately five percent of the county's \$4 million citrus crop has wilted because of the dry weather and reported that growers in South Seminole have already started irrigating their groves to prevent heavy damage.

Tucker called the situation "serious" and urged all growers to take the proper precautions to see that their groves are watered.

At the same time, forest rangers in the south end of the county have been on alert through the driest April since the early 1940s. Some citrus from next season's crop is dropping from the trees because of the drought. The dropping is not extensive yet but is increasing as the dry spell hangs on.

The forestry service reported that dry weather is increasing the danger of fires. Already, fires are above average for this time of year. An average of one fire per day was reported.

## Castro Willing To Seek Settlement With U. S.

MIAMI (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime said today it is willing to seek a negotiated settlement of its differences with the United States, despite what it called U. S. plans for "direct armed aggression" against Cuba.

Radio Havana said President Osvaldo Dorticos handed the latest Castroite charge of "U. S. aggression" to foreign diplomats summoned from their beds to a pre-dawn meeting at his official residence.

The broadcast said that Dorticos made the charge through diplomatic channels because of the "exceptional and dramatic circumstances."

Dorticos said the Castro regime is willing to try to negotiate a settlement with the United States "but we will fight . . . to the last drop of our blood . . . if they attack us." The radio reported.

The broadcast quoted a note signed by Castro and Dorticos citing "American press reports" as the basis for the charge that the "ruling circles of the United States" are openly preparing for war against Cuba.

It mentioned reports of U. S. "consultations and soundings" of other Latin American nations for "seeking aid for direct armed action against our country."

The broadcast charged that last week's invasion of Cuba by anti-Castro refugees was "organized, equipped, directed and militarily aided by the government of the U.S.A."

The official papers of Gen. Sanford, who founded the city, have been placed in the vault of the Florida State Bank for safe-keeping. The papers were sent to the University of Tennessee to be microfilmed.

## No Politics In Plan, Commissioner Says

County Commissioner James P. Avery today said that politics will never have any bearing on any proposed redistricting movement in Seminole County.

Avery was critical of a statement by City Manager W. E. Knowles and said "how anyone can call any redistricting proposal dirty politics is beyond me."

Earlier this week, Knowles called the proposed redistricting, which would realign Sanford, "dirty politics."

Avery said "redistricting is recommended every 10 years, or after every census. If the county commission districts are out of proportion."

Avery pointed out that this problem was given to an impartial committee comprised of County Zoning Director Robert Brown, County Engineer Carlton Bliss and Supervisor of Registration Camilla Bruce.

"These three have done a commendable job," Avery said. "At no time was any influence displayed to the committee after the preliminary sketches were presented to the board."

The County Commission by a 3-2 vote today refused a request by Commissioner John Fitzpatrick that Knowles be put on the committee studying redistricting the county.

Fitzpatrick said "since the city manager has been critical of the committee he should be asked to work with them on the solution."

Voicing against Fitzpatrick's request were Commissioners James P. Avery, Vernon Dunn and Chairman J. C. Hutchison. District 2 Commissioner Ted Williams, who represents the city district on the board, voted with Fitzpatrick.

### Educator Elected

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — Dr. Wallace M. Alston of Decatur, Ga., president of Agnes Scott College, was elected Thursday as moderator of the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The group opened its 101st. general assembly with the election of Dr. Alston to the denomination's highest office.

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Israeli fighter pilots shot down a Communist-made Mig 17 jet fighter of the United Arab Republic air force near Halutza in southern Israel early today, an Israeli army spokesman announced. Halutza is in the Negev Desert of southern Israel, near the Gaza Strip. It is about 16 miles south of Beerseba.

### Line Sues Pilots

ATLANTA (UPI) — The Air Line Pilots Association, on strike against Southern Airways since June 5, 1960, was sued for \$7 million Thursday by the airline. Southern, in a 157-page petition, asked damages for what it charged was "a calculated attempt by ALPA to destroy good will, honesty and integrity" built by the company.

### Students Riot

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) — Harassed city police, outnumbered more than 100 to 1 by rioting Harvard students, resorted to tear gas Thursday night to break up a demonstration aimed at preserving Latin on Harvard diplomas. Eight shells were pumped into the crowd of 5,000 students in Harvard Square when police began getting the worst of what sometimes was hand-to-hand fighting.

### Liquor Scheme Cited

ST. PETERSBURG (UPI) — St. Petersburg authorities have notified Gov. Farris Bryant they have uncovered an alleged scheme to obtain state liquor license that could involve personnel of the State Beverage Department. Police Chief E. Wilson Purdy and State Atty. Clair Davis revealed the scheme Thursday with the arrest of Dr. J. C. Benefield, a prominent chiropractor, whom they charged with grand larceny. No details were disclosed.

## Witness Tells Of Nazi Brutality

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI) — A Jewish woman told today of watching the Nazis take her father away in a truck. She said she followed on the run and found his bullet riddled body in a forest.

Mrs. Ethel Lichtman testified against Adolf Eichmann, charged with the mass murder of six million Jews. She is a stout, middle-aged woman, wearing glasses, and by a special ruling of the court was allowed to testify in Yiddish rather than Hebrew.

She stood in the witness box, directly across the courtroom from Eichmann, and told her story in a flat, unemotional voice. On Sept. 12, 1939, Mrs. Lichtman said, the Nazi army entered the small town near Cracow, Poland, where she lived with her family.

"The Germans went from one house to another," she said, "and took men without any consideration for age, my father among them. They were all put in the market place and ordered to hold their hands behind their necks.

Thirty-two Jewish men were taken that day."

Q. Did they take the males on a truck?

A. They were first photographed and the names recorded and then they were marched to the market place and forced to cry out "We are traitors to the people" in the German language.

Q. Did you see this with your own eyes?

A. Yes.

Q. What happened to those males?

A. They were put onto trucks and taken away. With a young lady who was to be my sister-in-law, we ran after the trucks. Her father, two brothers and a brother-in-law were taken from her house. We ran as far as a small forest at Kaschitz.

Q. All the men were dead on the ground. Among them was your father. He was shot in many places in his body. All were stretched out on the ground in groups of five men.

Q. What did you do?

## Opinion Asked On Tax Errors

The County Commission today, meeting in a special session, asked Acting County Attorney Harold Johnson to get a written legal opinion on what constitutes a clerical error on a tax roll.

The board took the action after a one hour conference with Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker on

certain clerical errors on the 1960 tax roll.

The board called the meeting after they rescinded some 18 tax roll corrections earlier in the week after District 3 Commissioner James P. Avery said that it "appeared that some of the errors were more than clerical."

Mrs. Walker went over each of

the errors this morning and cited that the majority were made by not allowing enough for developers' discounts, front footage prices and calculating machine failures.

"They are strictly clerical errors and not changes in any valuation," Mrs. Walker said.

District 4 Commissioner Vernon Dunn said "these changes seem to come up on the 11th hour. Why

were't they made when the board of equalization met?"

"What's the purpose of the equalization board," Dunn queried.

Chairman J. C. Hutchison asked for a legal opinion to guide the commission on future policies.

Johnson said he would study the matter and ask the attorney general's office for some guidance.

## Bryant Undecided On Race Track Bill

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant is still trying to make up his mind whether to approve or veto bills authorizing harness racing tracks in Seminole and Broward counties.

Bryant said Thursday he is against extending legalized gambling in the state and that the bills "seems to me to be an extension. But my mind is open and my staff will study them before I make a decision."

Pinellas each a congressman, and Dade County two, was introduced today by Republican Sen. W. C. Young of St. Petersburg.

The bill went to the Government Reorganization Committee for a hearing Monday.

The bill splits Congressman Bob Sikes' big Northwest Florida district to form two districts, and makes a district for Seminole, Or-

ange and Brevard. Volusia would go into a district with Clay, St. Johns, Putnam, Flagler, Levy, Marion, Citrus, Sumter, Lake, Hernando and Pasco counties.

Also introduced today were bills to hike the sales tax on beer and whisky and put a highway commissioner in charge of the Road Department — both opposed by Gov. Farris Bryant.

Sen. Ed Price of Bradenton tossed in the bill raising the beer and whisky tax from three to 10 per cent. Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland presented the highway commissioner measure.

Sen. Charley Johns of Starke, a member of Kelly's Interim Roads Committee, put in a bill making it a crime for any Road Board member or employee or firm in which they have an interest to do business with the Road Department. The bill set a fine and jail sentence for any board member or employee knowingly permitting a contractor to build a road contrary to specifications.

Under Kelly's bill, the highway commissioner would be appointed by the governor and Cabinet. The bill contained a provision to make present Road Board Chairman John R. Phillips the first commissioner.

## Spacecraft Passes Tough Test Flight

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Mercury spacecraft was blasted aloft today in a tough and apparently successful test of its escape system, although the rocket did not reach the expected altitude.

The test, last of a series before an American astronaut is to be rocketed into suborbital flight next week, was conducted at the federal space agency's experimental station at Wallops Island, Va.

The agency reported that the rocket reached only 14,000 feet, instead of 40,000 as planned. But a spokesman said the escape system designed to enable an astronaut to escape from a rocket failure appeared to have worked well.

"The escape was triggered under much more severe conditions than will occur during either the manned Mercury-Redstone suborbital or Atlas-boosted orbital flights," the space agency said.

The capsule fired at 9:01 was recovered at 9:14 a. m. and appeared to be in good condition.

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## Why Not? A Herald Editorial

Governor Bryant was reported today trying to make up his mind whether to sign the bill passed by the legislature approving a harness track permit in Seminole County.

It looks like he would go ahead and sign the bill, which we believe expresses again the wishes of a three-to-one majority of the voting residents of the county, who approved it at the polls when the question was put to them before.

The Seminole County legislators supported it strongly on the basis of public interest in its passage. They told the committees that the people had voted for it and still manifested that favor. They told the House and Senate the same thing and the committees and the legislature passed the bill on their recommendation.

The only opposition was from the greyhound racing interests, which also operate in Seminole County. That is a natural opposition, but not one to sway the public desire.

We say to Gov. Bryant: The harness training track in this county is attracting more horsemen and more attention to the county than ever before. Why not give it a chance to become a real Central Florida attraction by growing into a full-fledged harness track?

And as for the betting—if it's legal on the dogs, why not on the pacers and trotters if the people want it?

## Amendment Introduced Changing State Elections

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Senate received a series of amendments today that would switch state election to odd years to avoid holding them in presidential election years.

Ben. Dewey Johnson of Quincy, who threw in the bills, said he wanted them considered along with a package revision of the state Constitution soon to be introduced.

Purpose of the switch would be to prevent candidates, particularly Republicans, from riding into state office on the coattails of a popular presidential candidate.

The bill would affect all elections for state and county offices. The first election under the new proposal would be held in 1964.

with officials elected for only two years. The next election, including those of the governor and Cabinet officials, would be in 1966 when the regular four-year terms would start again.

It would enable the governor elected in 1964 to seek re-election to a full four-year term and, if re-elected, give Florida its second six-year governor. Thereafter the ban against a governor succeeding himself would go back into effect.

The proposed new constitution, which would go before the voters in 1962 if passed by the Legislature, would give the state a lieutenant governor and give all 87 counties a limited amount of "home rule."

He played varsity football for three years for Seminole High, was captain of the team during his senior year and received the trophy for the best blocker on the team that year.

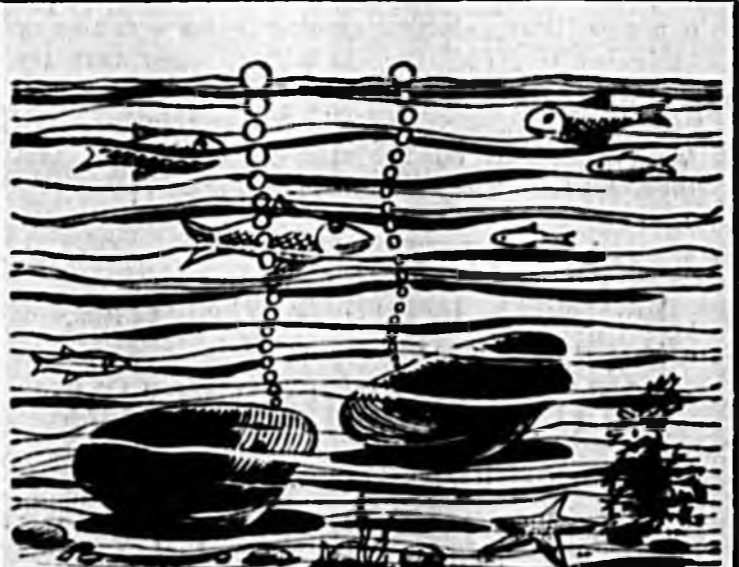

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# Why They Did It

When Cuba's Fidel Castro took power less than two and a half years ago, much of the free world hailed what seemed then an authentic revolution.

Today, as new revolutionaries storm his harassed and shaken regime, that sympathy has vanished almost everywhere.

The exception may be those numerous quarters in Latin America where any movement taking the label "revolution" is viewed with more than ordinary tolerance.

Among chief reasons observers cite for the turn-about:

Castro quickly proved himself a professional revolutionary incapable of governing, and either connived with or tolerated Communists in his government.

Partly to cloak his inadequacy, he chose the demagogue's cheap route to enhanced support, aggravating U. S.-Cuban relations needlessly and finally making us the scapegoat for all his failures.

Having deliberately exiled Cuba from the U. S. and some Latin lands, he completed the corruption of his revolution by throwing himself wholly into the arms of Moscow and Peking.

The Cubans in mounting numbers who have shared the world's disillusionment have long been planning a strike at Castro. Why did they choose this time?

Recent rebel comment suggested preparation through sabotage and manufactured chaos might go on for weeks or months. Late accounts indicate, however, that leaders might have decided time was not on their side.

They may have seen peril to their cause in reports of crated Soviet jets at Cuban docks, of the first Red-trained Cuban jet pilots back from Czechoslovakia.

Steadily Castro's store of Red arms grew and these plus training put more backbone in his alleged 300,000-man militia, with its core of 25,000 toughened, last-ditch Fidelists.

On the other hand, defections from the air force had begun, the navy was stamped untrustworthy by Castro, and even the army was said to be rebel-infiltrated.

Refugees poured from Cuba, fleeing the closer grip of Red tyranny and economic turmoil Castro inflicted on his people after seizing nearly \$1 billion in U. S. assets.

The rebels therefore may have tried to pick that strategic hour when an increasingly frustrated, desperate Castro still lacked the military means to convert his desperation into a final snuffing out of Cuba's still vibrant free spirit.

Men everywhere who realize what he has done already to betray that spirit must wish his rebel challenges all success.

### Your Pocketbook

The nation's annual dental bill totals around \$3 billion. It takes about 11 cents out of each of our medical dollars. And yet the growth of dental insurance has lagged behind that of hospital and medical insurance.

Most of the existing coverage is union-sponsored, but there are some community-wide plans. Usually they are group arrangements open to workers of a specific company.

In New York City, a family can join Group Health Dental Insurance, Inc. and pay a premium of \$4.88 a month regardless of how many children they have. For this, they receive allowances for such basic services as X-rays, prophylaxis (professional cleaning), fillings, inlays, gold crowns and extractions.

If a family enrolls before its children are six years old, each child is entitled to up to \$405 worth of orthodontic work. If higher premiums are paid, the family is covered for part of the cost of dentures and bridgework.

But most Americans still have to handle the cost of their dental work on a person-to-person level with their dentists. The May issue of Redbook magazine presents some useful tips on meeting the

dental health problem as an individual. Here are some highlights: Discuss all costs with your dentist, asking when necessary, whether he might be able to substitute a less expensive material or method. But remember that the cheapest way of repairing teeth is seldom the best.

If you discuss your finances frankly with your dentist, you're likely to find that his fee varies according to your ability to pay. Most dentists—like most doctors—feel that this is as it should be.

Dental costs vary widely by geography. Bills can be considerably higher if you live in a western or southwestern state, lower in New England or the deep South. You'll pay more if you live in a city or a suburb, less if your home is in a rural area.

A dentist starting his career generally charges less than one at the peak.

The key to dental health and lower bills is preventive dentistry. This means regular X-rays and prophylaxis. Fortunately these are among the least expensive of dental procedures. The magazine estimates the cost for such care should average around \$100 a year for a family of two adults and two children.

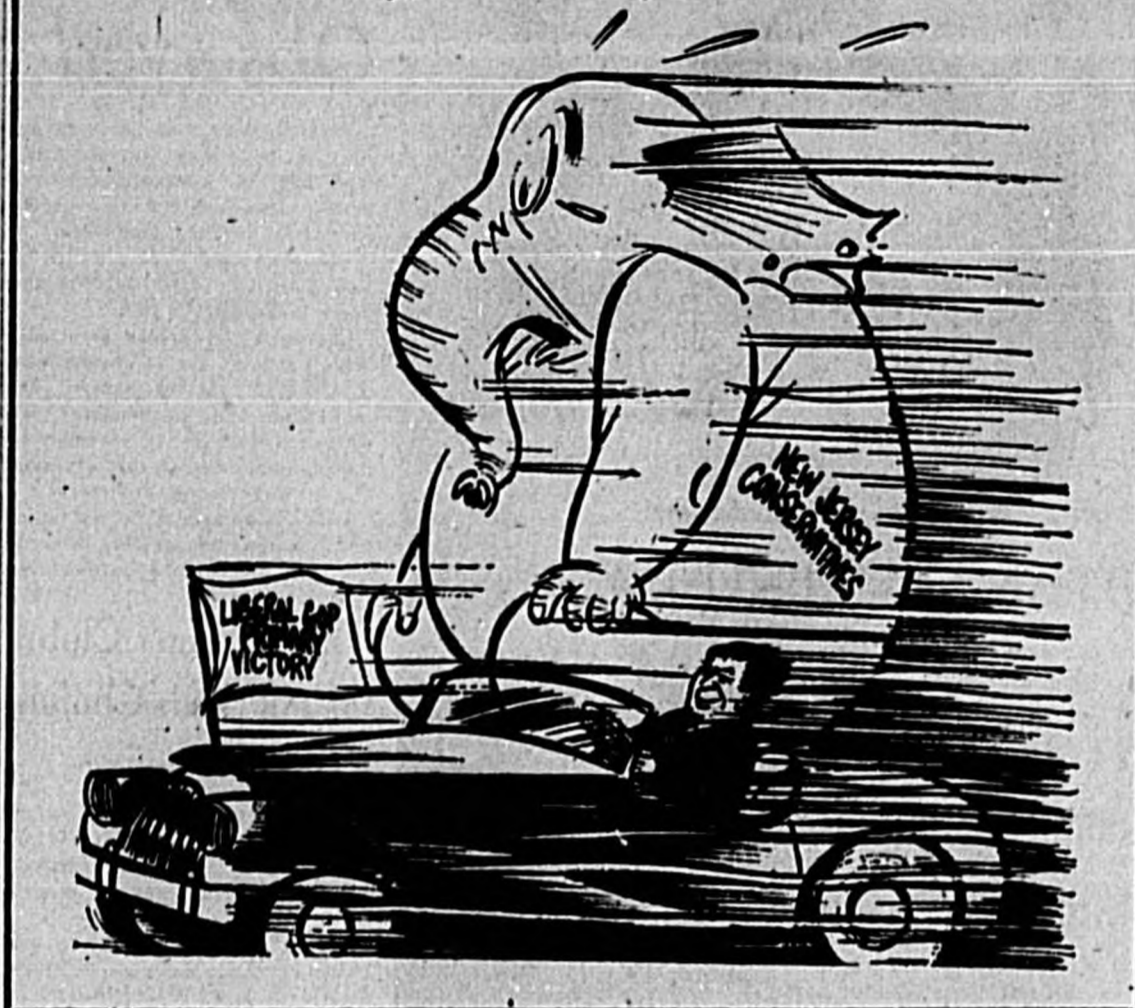

When I get home from the pony ring I am dirty, panting, worn out, and in no shape to receive a new ambassador, with or without portfolio. Or to discuss nuclear energy, unless it involves a little bit of the stuff for myself.

How does the President manage to read all the State papers he does at night? Little girls don't like their daddys to read, but to romp with them. Megan is not above whacking anything Daddy is reading, and how Mr. Kennedy manages to get through a report from Allen Dulles, or a briefing from the Joint Chiefs of Staff, baffles me.

I'd also like to know how President Kennedy is able to stay at his desk more than three or four minutes at a time with a little girl running loose not too far away. What does he do, I wonder, when he hears a thud, then a shriek, and then an anguished call for "Dad-d-dy!"

Does he say "Excuse me, Dr. Adenauer," and tear out with Pierre Salinger on his heels, or shout into the phone, "You'll have to call me back, Rusk. Caroline has fallen off the bookcase."

There's no use telling me he just goes on discussing Berlin with Dr. Adenauer, or continues to chat with the Secretary of State, while Caroline, for all he

knows, is pinned under a bookcase in the Blue Room.

I wish the President would break his own rule of no White House occupants' writing about their experiences, and do a story on how he combines the presidency with fatherhood. It would be a great help to many of us.

When she misbehaves, does he shake the Great Seal of the United States at her to straighten her out? Or does he call in the U. S. Marine band to play her a tune?

I wish he'd tell us.

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## Peter Edson's Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Top planners on the staff of the U. S. Peace Corps being organized under R. Sargent Shriver call up Dr. J. S. Noffsinger, executive director of the eight-year-old International Voluntary Services, Inc., to ask him how he handles problems they face for the first time.

With over 50 years experience in foreign educational, health and welfare projects, Noffsinger is glad to give his counsel. He thinks the Peace Corps has a great potential. But its future contains many pitfalls which he would like to see it avoid.

IVS has learned the hard way, for instance, that no married couples should be sent overseas, with one exception.

That is for the head of a mission, whose wife is expected to create a home away from home for the young volunteer workers. But not even the supervisors are allowed to take large families overseas with them.

The new and larger Peace Corps will not be able to duplicate this, but the young people IVS sends abroad must have been reared on a farm, be agricultural college graduates and know how to work with their hands.

From Selective Service director Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, IVS has had recommendations to local draft boards that educational deferments be granted to its volunteers on a year-to-year basis.

In return, IVS agreed it would pay its workers no more than a buck private. This was originally \$60 a month, but it has now been raised to \$78 plus food, travel and shelter. IVS pays its supervisors \$3,000 a year plus allowances, in contrast to the \$10,000 plus allowances which the government's International Cooperation Administration foreign aid mission chiefs get.

IVS screens its problem children before they are hired, through reports from job applicants' college professors. If one or more from five or six professors who know the student run up a red flag of warning on him, he isn't hired.

IVS hires only college men who have been leaders on the campus. College loafers aren't accepted. A church affiliation—any church—is considered essential.

Voluntary Services, in pilot operations for what is to become the Peace Corps, has found that do-gooders who may have enthusiasm for helping the heathen, but don't know how to go about it, are no good abroad.

The "heathen" Noffsinger points out, often have cultures of their own thousands of years old. Trying to make Americans of them is the wrong approach. People in rural areas of the less developed countries may be illiterate, but

they are shrewd and proud and must be dealt with sympathetically.

IVS formerly trained its volunteers in the United States before sending them abroad, but it doesn't do that any more. Experience showed the young workers learned the wrong things.

Instead, the volunteer worker is now given three months training overseas in the mission where he is to work. Mornings are spent in learning the language and local dialect. Afternoons are spent in field work with experienced leaders.

Young workers going abroad for the first time often get the shock of their lives. They find that the natives often know more than Americans about George Washington's farewell address warning against entangling foreign alliances, Patrick Henry's "Give me liberty or give me death," and Abraham Lincoln's views on democracy, freedom and slavery.

The Voluntary Services has found that supervisors must not be too old—not as old as some of the ICA mission chiefs have been. People who have been school administrators, vocational teachers, agricultural extension agents, and state 4-H club leaders make the best supervisors.

Supervisors must give the volunteers under them sympathetic handling and direction. If they don't the young workers become either dominated by the foreigners or too cocksure in their own approach to the natives. Either way, they're useless.

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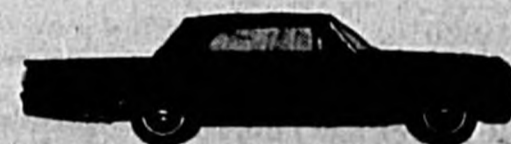

# Cage Scandal 'Spreading'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dist. Atty. Frank S. Hogan, whose investigation of "fixed" college basketball games already has netted 11 players from six schools, said today the inquiry is moving full steam ahead amid growing speculation it may reach massive proportions.

Thursday, Hogan revealed the names of nine more players in addition to the two named on March 17 when the current investigation was first announced. The D. A. said the nine players from schools in the East and South were paid more than \$23,000 collectively to shave points in a total of 25 games during the past two seasons.

In revealing their identity, Hogan also named five go-betweens who worked with gambler Aaron Wagman in soliciting the aid of the nine players to rig the outcome of games in which their schools were involved. Wagman, a 28-year-old New Yorker, first was brought in and charged with helping six weeks ago along with Joseph Hacken, also of New York. Wagman was arraigned Thurs-

day and pleaded innocent to 37 charges of bribery and attempted bribery plus a charge of conspiracy. Each count carries a prison sentence of one to 10 years plus a fine of \$10,000.

One of Hogan's first moves after the indictment was handed down was to ask for the continuance of the grand jury's life until June 30. The jury, which has been hearing the testimony of the players involved plus that of the go-betweens, was scheduled to end its work today.

According to a source close to the D. A.'s office, the continuance was asked because "our work is far from over."

The players named Thursday by Hogan, eight of whom have been dismissed from their schools while the ninth has been suspended, were: John Egan, Villanova; Frank Majewski of St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia; Edward Bowler of La Salle in Philadelphia; Jerry Graves of Mississippi State; Peter Kelly and Glen Cross of the University of Connecticut; and Richard Fisher

and Ed Test of the University of Tennessee.

Wagman's bribe offers ranged from \$750 to \$1,500 per game and were handled in most cases by go-betweens Jerry Vogel and Daniel Quinazzi, both formerly of the University of Alabama; William Minnerly, former Connecticut football captain; Lou Brown of North Carolina and Joseph Green, an associate of Wagman's. Graves, who has been drafted by the new Chicago entry in the professional National Basketball Association, said he took \$4,750 in bribes but "didn't throw any games."

Hogan said that none of the players has been charged with a crime and they have been granted immunity for testifying before the grand jury. They will, however, be brought back as "witnesses for the people" in Wagman's trial.

Thursday's blanket indictment did not mention Seton Hall players Art Hicks and Hank Gunter, who were disclosed earlier to have dumped a game with the University of Dayton in which

the Flyers routed Seton Hall. They were accused of taking bribes from Hacken, who was not referred to in Thursday's indictment.

The one bright note in Hogan's latest revelation into the fix scandal, which may rival the original scandals of 1950-51 when five players and 13 fixers were convicted and suspended, centered on Lowery Kirk of Memphis State University. Kirk was offered a \$1,000 bribe to "dump" a game against Villanova and promptly reported the offer to his coach, Bob Vanatta, and Memphis police.

**Proves Big Help**

Hogan lauded Kirk for his honesty and promptness and said it proved a big help in the investigation.

"His name should be honored," Hogan said. "He acted as all the others should have after the illumination of this business during the last college basketball scandal of 10 years ago."

## Twins Roar Into 1st; Even Cobb Surprised

Cobb tossed out the first ball in Los Angeles Thursday and then cut back and watched Cookie Lavagetto's surprising Twins ruin the Angels' home debut with a 4-3 victory that catapulted them into first place in the American League.

The crowd of 11,831 was considerably below expectations but the Twins, whom Cobb last saw as the old Washington Senators, certainly weren't. They spotted the Angels a two-run lead in the second inning and then took over to register their ninth victory in 18 starts.

Hari Batley, a native of Los Angeles who played his early baseball there, was the local boy who came home to run the Angels. His three-run homer off Bill Garba in the sixth inning clinched the outcome and sent the new AL entry down to its eighth loss in nine games.

Then in the ninth, with two out and a Cleveland runner on first, made a brilliant one-handed, knee-sliding catch of Bubba Phillips' liner that looked like a sure triple.

The victory boosted the Yankees to within a game of the second-place Tigers, who ran amok of the Red Sox.

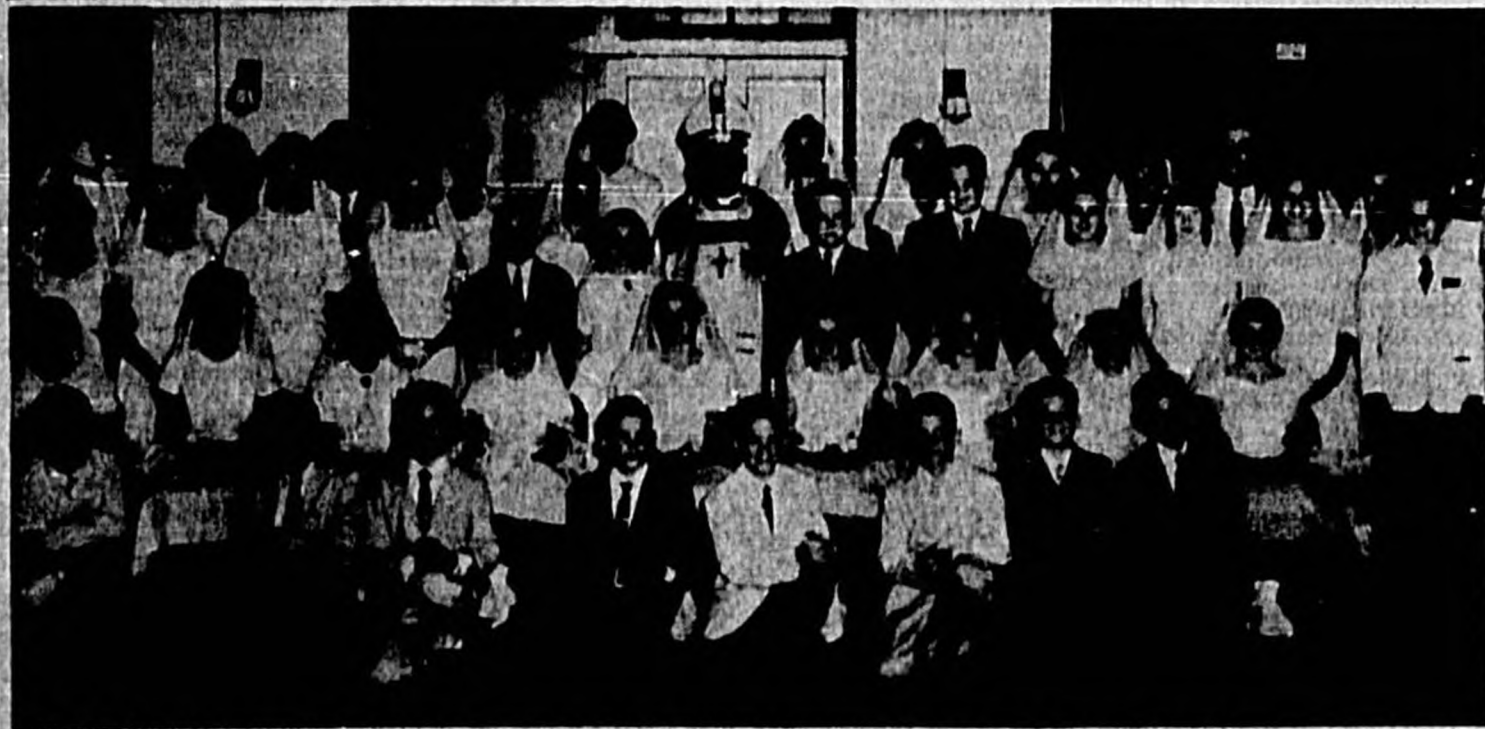

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court meets today with observers on the watch for evidence that a feud is smoldering between Chief Justice Earl Warren and Justice Felix Frankfurter.

The court will announce opinions in some of the 50 or so cases now under advisement. Then it will start another week of arguments.

Last Monday for the second time in recent weeks Warren ad-

ressed some highly acid off-the-cuff remarks at Frankfurter, who sits at his left on the bench.

Some sniping among disagreeing justices has been a fact of life at the court over the years. But it has usually been confined to written opinions.

Soon after Warren took over as chief justice in 1953, it became evident that he and his peppery little colleague from Massachusetts were at opposite philosophical poles. The court's 5-4 votes

## Kefauver Asks Justice Men To Study GE Case For Perjury

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Estes Kefauver, (D-Tenn.), asked the Justice Department today to study the testimony of General Electric executives before his Senate antitrust subcom-

mittee for possible perjury action.

Kefauver sent the department contradictory testimony given Thursday about whether GE vice president Arthur F. Vinson condoned or authorized price-rigging by men working under him.

Testifying under oath, Vinson said he never even knew that \$125,000-a-year division chiefs and \$75,000-a-year department managers met with competitors to agree on prices they would charge for heavy electrical equipment.

Former executives who accused him of pressuring them into price-fixing either lied or were laboring under an "honest misunderstanding," Vinson testified.

The heavy-set, \$200,000-a-year GE vice president did not appear disturbed by testimony from a surprise witness, Raymond W. Smith, who as chief of the company's huge transformer division worked under him.

Smith, who has pleaded guilty to criminal charges of price-fixing, said the president of GE and the president of Westinghouse Electric Corp. met in Boston in 1958 to discuss a sharp drop in transformer prices.

Smith said Vinson gave him details of the meeting and that he interpreted Vinson's account as a cue to meet with Westinghouse and other competitors to seek agreement on stabilizing prices.

Vinson insisted that Smith misunderstood him completely.

Later, spokesmen for the two companies said GE president Robert Paxton and Westinghouse president Mark W. Cresap Jr. had merely exchanged greetings and held a "general and proper" discussion at the Boston meeting.

Vinson pictured himself as a man who believed in price competition and who delegated responsibility for determining prices to his division chiefs. Under questioning, Vinson said he could not reasonably have known about price-rigging by subordinates.

He was asked whether former division chief George E. Burens and three department managers under Burens fabricated testimony about a luncheon in 1958 at which Vinson allegedly authorized them to meet secretly with competitors.

"That is my belief," Vinson replied.

Burens and the three managers all were convicted of price-rigging and all have been fired. They have said they disliked price-fixing arrangements but became involved on orders from company higher-ups, including Vinson.

## Hearing Testimony Brings Out Some Weird Answers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — One thing I like about my work is that it keeps me in contact with the House military appropriations subcommittee.

The subcommittee, in turn, keeps informed about such matters as the Defense Department's one-man task force and the Air Force planes that have "hot and cold running WAP's."

These are a couple of the more eye-catching items that turned up today in a volume of testimony compiled by the subcommittee during hearings on the defense budget for fiscal 1962.

I often have heard the phrase "one-man task force" used as a figure of speech, but I never knew that one actually existed until I read the testimony of Maj. Gen. Robert H. Booth, chief of the defense atomic support agency.

This revelation came in the following exchange between Booth and members of the subcommittee:

**Q. What is Task Force 7?**  
**A. Task Force 7** was a logistic, or supporting, agency for the conduct of the atomic tests that were held in the Pacific.

**Q. Is it out of existence now?**  
**A. There is one man left now, sir.**

**Q. How could you have just one man left?**  
**A. He is the one man who was the last head of Task Force 7...**

**Q. He is not going to be forgotten?**  
**A. No, sir. He is doing another job.**

Unfortunately, the personnel of the task force was not identified. However, it is comforting to know that it is standing by, ready for action.

The other topic I mentioned came up during the testimony of Lt. Gen. Joe W. Kelly, commander

of the Military Air Transport Service.

It was introduced by Rep. Daniel J. Flood, (D-Pa.), who complained that MATS was putting too much emphasis on passenger service and not enough on military affairs.

He wanted to know how long it could take to make troop carriers out of planes "with all the lace curtains and plush and all the hot and cold running WAP's which we have in some of these things."

Kelly assured him that special mission aircraft, including the planes used by the President, could be used to carry troops, if the need arose.

Flood then inquired about "these

planes where the high heels of certain females on board have gone through the floor... and they have had to take their shoes off."

The general said he was not aware of that having happened. Although there may be some question in Flood's mind about its overall military capabilities, I think it is safe to assume that MATS would have no difficulty in airlifting Task Force 7.

# Vote Provision Needed In Urban Renewal Bill

Seminole County legislators said Saturday they would consider introducing urban renewal legislation this session if the bill included a referendum provision and if the City Commission approved the bill.

Reps. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Gordon Frederick earlier were on record as "basically opposed" to the principles of urban renewal.

The city last month by a 3-2 vote tabled action on the proposed legislation until a joint meeting could be held with the legislators to discuss the bill sponsored by the Downtown Improvement Committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

At a joint meeting between the chamber group, city commissioners and delegation Saturday Frederick said he would not consider the bill unless a referendum was included.

Frederick also said he would prefer a project by project referendum so the people could decide on projects which could affect their own areas in any kind of slum clearance or condemning of private property.

Attorney Kenneth Leffler, who drew up the proposed legislation modeled after the Tampa bill, said he would include a referendum provision and would have it ready for the commission's consideration at its next meeting May 8.

The legislators then agreed to hold another joint meeting with the chamber group, city commissioners and delegation Saturday Frederick said he would not consider the bill unless a referendum was included.

# Weather May Delay U.S. Spaceman

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—A prediction of bad weather today raised doubts whether America's first man-in-space shot will go as planned Tuesday morning.

The National Space Agency has set fairly rigid minimum conditions for the launching. The astronaut and the Redstone rocket apparently were ready to go.

But if the forecasts hold, the weather may not be suitable in all respects until the last half of the week.

The nation's No. 1 astronaut was less than 24 hours away from his scheduled leap into space when the adverse forecast came in. The main countdown had started Sunday.

A postponement would be a disappointment for the pilot and the thousands of men who have been working toward a shot time of 7 a. m. (est) Tuesday.

But they were certain not to let disappointment push them into a hazardous venture in unfavorable weather.

Seven Navy ships headed into the Atlantic today to pluck America's first spaceman from the waves. Crews had orders not to speak to him unless he says something first.

Psychologists and doctors want the first astronaut to tell his own story in his own way, without having it colored by words and thoughts conveyed to him after his return from flight.

So, from the first retrievers, who probably will be Marine helicopter pilots, to all others of the 3,000 men aboard the flotilla who may come in contact with him, the orders are: Address no words to the astronaut right after recovery unless he asks a question.

This 40,000-ton carrier and six destroyers headed for positions down the Atlantic missile range from Cape Canaveral, Fla., calculated to put them in the right place to pick up the astronaut as soon as possible after he hits the water.

All ships go on "ready alert" at 2 a. m. Tuesday for the expected shoot from the Cape a few hours later.

# Countywide Drainage Bill Ruled Out?

A countywide drainage bill for Seminole County was just about ruled out this session of the legislature and the County Commission Tuesday will consider a special law making it legal to set aside road and bridge funds for drainage purposes.

District 3 County Commissioner James P. Avery, in a special meeting of the county commission and State Rep. Mack Cleveland Jr. Saturday proposed that the county enact special legislation using funds from the road and bridge fund for drainage and water management projects after Cleveland said he saw no merit in a countywide bill.

In a meeting to bring the commission up-to-date on legislative matters, Cleveland said that he studied the Orange County drainage bill and it gives the same authority that Seminole County now has—including setting up special districts for drainage levies and exempting all municipalities from any drainage tax.

Avery then proposed that perhaps up to \$30,000 could be set aside out of the road and bridge budget for drainage purposes or that 15 per cent of the total road and bridge budget be used for that purpose.

Avery said he would draw up some sort of recommendations and present it to the commission Tuesday for consideration.

Cleveland said that if the county approved the bill, in an official meeting, he would introduce it.

# Kennedy Facing Decision On Laos

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy and his top advisers today approached the moment of decision on whether to send Allied troops into Laos to prevent a Communist takeover of that country.

Kennedy was scheduled to meet with the National Security Council at 4 p. m. It seemed likely that no major action would be announced until after the council meeting, the fourth in nine days.

But the United States and its allies clearly were confronted with the mounting danger of Communist-backed Pathet Lao rebels overrunning Laos despite a British-Soviet call for a cease fire.

The president cut short a weekend visit to his Middleburg, Va., estate to fly back to Washington for conferences late Sunday with Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and other officials.

Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr. and Building Inspector M. H. Yelvington have started an extensive inspection of all buildings in the downtown area in an effort to help "spruce up" the commercial section of the city.

Roy Holler Junior Baseball Field will be dedicated today in ceremonies starting at 7 p. m. and Mayor Joe Baker will throw out the first ball to open up the junior baseball league program.

The Seminole High School band will perform during the ceremonies and County Commission Chairman J. C. Hutchison will give a brief biographical sketch of Mr. Holler who died last year.

One small independent reported a line of more than 80 persons waiting an hour before its opening time, 8 a. m. Small stores which remained open Sunday said their bread supplies were exhausted before noon.

# Weather Is All Kind Except Good

A huge storm struck the southern Great Plains with giant hailstones, gale winds, tornadoes and cloudburst as the week began. Damage was widespread in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri. People were slashed by flying glass and bruised by falling tree limbs, hailstones and wind-driven debris.

A pilot who scouted the storm for the U. S. Weather Bureau said it was one of the largest storms he had ever seen.

Chunks of hail seven inches around were reported at El Reno, Ark.

Winds of 80 miles an hour ripped Denton, Tex., and more than a dozen persons were injured.

Tornadoes smashed homes in the Oklahoma towns of Minco and Hominy. A house trailer was ripped apart by a twister near Fayetteville, Ark., minutes after its occupants fled to safety.

Jack Lassiter, a 41-year-old Sanford Naval Air Station man, was killed early Sunday in a single car accident on SR 18 near DeLand, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

### Farm Sales Gain

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—The State Chamber of Commerce said today cash receipts from the sale of farm products in Florida totaled over \$480 million from August, 1960, to February, 1961. The chamber said the figure was a 15 per cent increase over the same period last year.

### Stocks Irregular

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks staged an irregular advance in a moderately active opening today. The market reacted sharply to the Cuban situation and the revolt in Algeria early last week, but snapped strongly in subsequent sessions to finish the period with only a small loss on balance.

### Tshombe Held

COQUILHATVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—Congolese army commandoes today held Katanga President Moise Tshombe under house arrest pending his transfer to an undisclosed place of detention in Leopoldville, the stronghold of the central Congolese government of President Joseph Kasavubu.

### Strike Threatened

MIAMI (UPI)—National Airlines and its Ground Machinists Union were negotiating today on a new contract for some 1,100 workers in an attempt to stave off a threatened strike scheduled for midnight. If today's mediation fails, the strike could put 875 machinists on the picket line and possibly idle the rest of National's employees.

### Stamps Bill Eyed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A state legislator is considering introduction of a bill that would outlaw the use of trading stamps. Similar moves have been beaten down before by the Legislature. The bill would be based on Wyoming law upheld by the Wyoming Supreme Court in 1960. It ruled smaller merchants might be forced out of business if they could not afford to participate in the trading stamp program.

GAINESVILLE (UPI)—Top officials of the State Bar will gather at the University of Florida Tuesday for Law Day ceremonies. Main speaker will be John Satterfield, Yazoo City, Miss., president of the American Bar Association. ## Urban Renewal For Five Cities Gets House Okay

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The House today passed urban renewal bills for Plant City, Daytona Beach, Fort Lauderdale, St. Augustine and Orla.

The bills, permitting the cities to take advantage of federal funds to clear slums and blighted areas, now goes to the Senate.

Tampa and Tallahassee are the only Florida cities now eligible for urban renewal programs.

The article-by-article revision, which would be presented to the voters in November, 1962 would rewrite 12 of the present 20 articles and make some changes in the preamble and declaration of rights.

Also intended in the House as it returned from a long weekend was the Republican plan for congressional redistricting, identical to that offered by Sen. W. C. Young of St. Petersburg in the Senate Friday.

The congressional redistricting plans are to be thrashed out at an afternoon meeting of a Senate committee.

At an informal caucus just before the House convened plans were made to hold the 1962 House caucus at Daytona Beach. Speaker Designate Mallory Horns of Leon agreed to the Volusia County meeting.

Only one committee met this morning. The House Motor Vehicle Committee held a brief session and delayed action on a bill to require the motor vehicle commissioner to send each sheriff in the state a list of automobile registrations. Tag Commissioner Arch Livingston said it would cost \$13 million in a two-year period to pay for the new service asked by the Sheriff's Association.

## Cuba Official Red Puppet

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro led a giant parade today to celebrate May Day and the defeat of the mid-April invasion. He was expected to proclaim Cuba the first Communist nation in the Western Hemisphere.

Castro, President Osvaldo Dorticos, all Cabinet members and top union officials marched to the presidential reviewing stand where they took positions to watch the other paraders.

In front of the stand was a big sign with the slogan "Workers of the world united."

The massive parade and rally was expected to be capped by an announcement from Castro converting Cuba into the Cuban People's Socialist Republic, the term used by Communists to describe their regimes.

A Havana radio broadcast said ordinary citizens in the parade carried flags of all the peoples of the world who have lined up with the Cuban revolution.

The broadcast said streets leading to the civic plaza, scene of the main speech - making today, had been choked with spectators since early this morning.

The symbol of the Cuban Workers Federation was mounted in front of the monument to national hero Jose Marti in the public plaza, and ashes from the recently burned El Encanto Department Store also were placed before the monument.

A giant picture of Karl Marx was carried by a group of demonstrators. Others carried pictures

of Fidel Castro, his brother Raul, Dorticos and others.

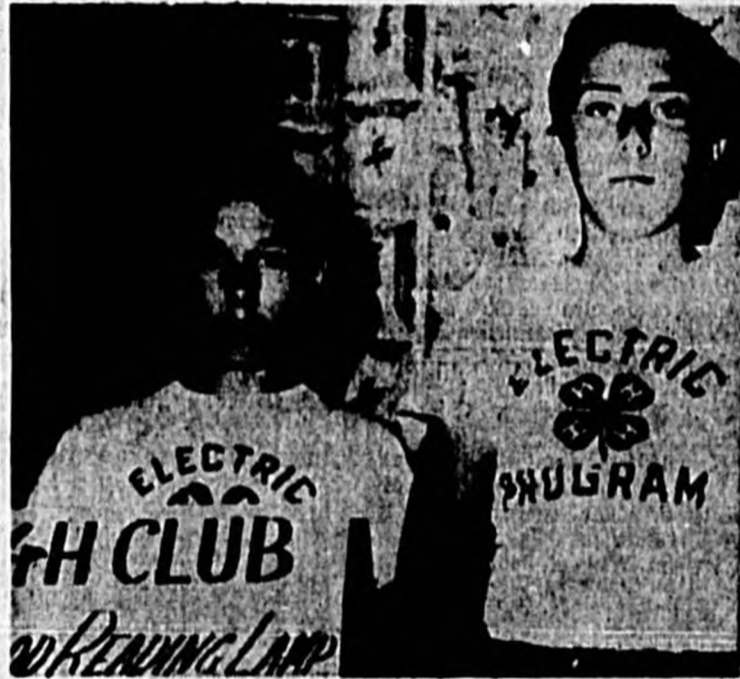
In Washington, the administration sent Secretary of State Dean Rusk to Capitol Hill today to defend its handling of the Cuban situation and the U. S. role in the ill-fated invasion attempt.

Rusk's appearance before a Senate subcommittee on Latin America came amid growing congressional demands for an investigation of the super-secret Central Intelligence Agency and some demands for a sterner U. S. policy toward Fidel Castro.

It also followed a new warning by the State Department for Americans still in Cuba to leave "in the near future." Officials said the step was not prompted by an immediate threat against Americans but it was considered wise to get as many out as possible.

Today was the first day under the plan, approved by U. S. District Judge Frank A. Hooper, for Negro students or their parents to obtain application forms for transfers from Negro to white schools.
