We could not have asked for a better day to be on the water. The "Slobberknocker" trout was the fish of the day.

All but a few fish were caught on artificial baits. The Rip Tide Flats Chub rigged on a Daiichi 4/0 circle hook landed the majority of fish. We used the "Stupid Rig", which is simply running the hook a 1/2 inch down the nose of the bait through the side. We caught a few on the Rip Tide 3 inch mullet on the 1/8 Rip Tide Pro Jig head. We were fishing in 2-to-4 feet of water and the fish were going nuts.

WAL-MART FISH REDFISH SERIES TO VISIT TITUSVILLE

The \$1.9 million Wal-Mart FLW Redfish Series - the most lucrative redfish tournament trail in the world - is headed to Titusville Aug. 19-20 for the circuit's seventh event. Up to 150 teams will be competing in the Eastern Division's final tournament of the regular season, which features a \$200,000 cash purse.

Anglers, competing in two-man teams, will fish for a top award of as much as \$50,000. Competitors will also be vying for valuable points that could earn them a berth into the no-entry-fee \$300,000 Wal-Mart FLW Redfish Series Championship in Mobile, Ala., Oct. 27-29 for a shot at as much as \$100,000.

A stone's throw from the Kennedy Space Center, some of the nation's best redfish anglers might find the Titusville waters and the popular Moequito Lagoon a bit low when the tournament arrives in late August. "Probably 130 of the 150 boats will be fishing in Mosquito Lagoon, but the water is very low right now," resident redfish pro Michael Cisco said. Cisco has been fishing the lagoon and surrounding waters for 30 years.

"This will be primarily a sight fishing tournament with most competitors fishing extremely shallow water," Cisco said. "The redfish here are very spooky." Cisco predicts that 13 or 14 pounds a day will have a team in the hunt for the first-place prize.

Sand Point Park will host daily takeoffs and weigh-ins at 7 a.m. and 3 p.m., respectively. Takeoffs and weigh-ins are free and open to the public.

Teams will compete for two days to determine the winner based on accumulated weight.

The winning team earns \$25,000 cash. If a member of the winning team is the original owner of a Ranger, Champion, Aquasport, or Welcraft boat or a Hydra Sports 1900, 2000 or 2300 Bay Bolt that is used during the tournament, the winners also receive a \$12,500 bonus. Additionally, if a member of the winning team is the original owner of a Yamaha outboard that is used during the tournament, the winners also receive a \$12,500 bonus from Yamaha for total award of \$50,000.

Every team that receives weight credit in a tournament earns points that determine angler standings.

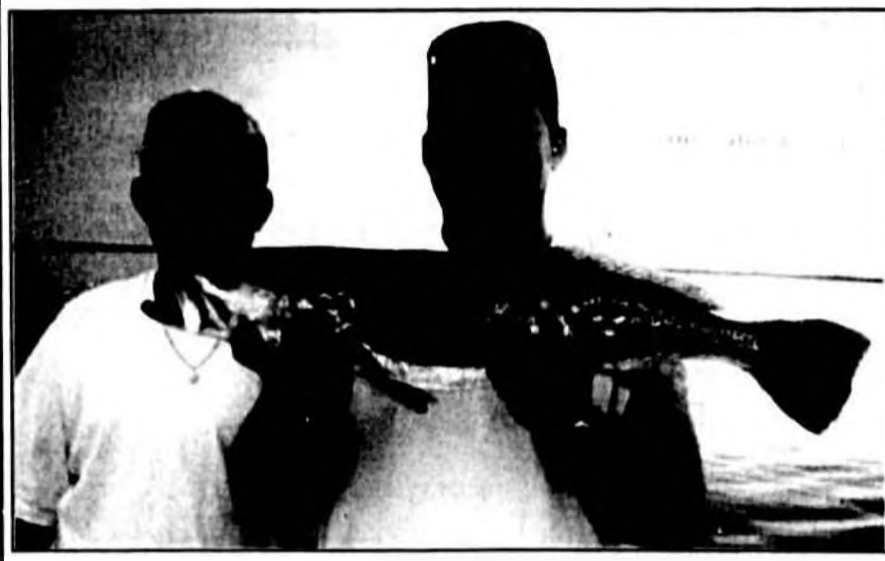

# Waterfront vice chair contests break up

SANFORD — A decision made by the Sanford City Commission this week had one member of a deleted city board scratching his head and accusing the commission of renegeing.

As early as June 27, the commission had decided to disband several of the city's boards that were either inactive or no longer needed. Many of the functions of those boards that were deemed important were handed off to staff to absorb or to another active board.

The only board that openly voiced concern for the deletion of their group Monday was the Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee through Vice Chairman Ron Fraser. He continually fought for the right to stay a board, even down to the final vote.

The commission had charged the Steering Committee with finishing Fort Mellon Park, which was later narrowed down to two tasks: finishing surveys that were sent out in residents' water bills last month, and having three select members of the committee help choose a landscape architect.

Fraser asked the commission at Monday night's meeting when this deletion of the Steering Committee would go into affect if they voted to disband all of the boards on the list that night.

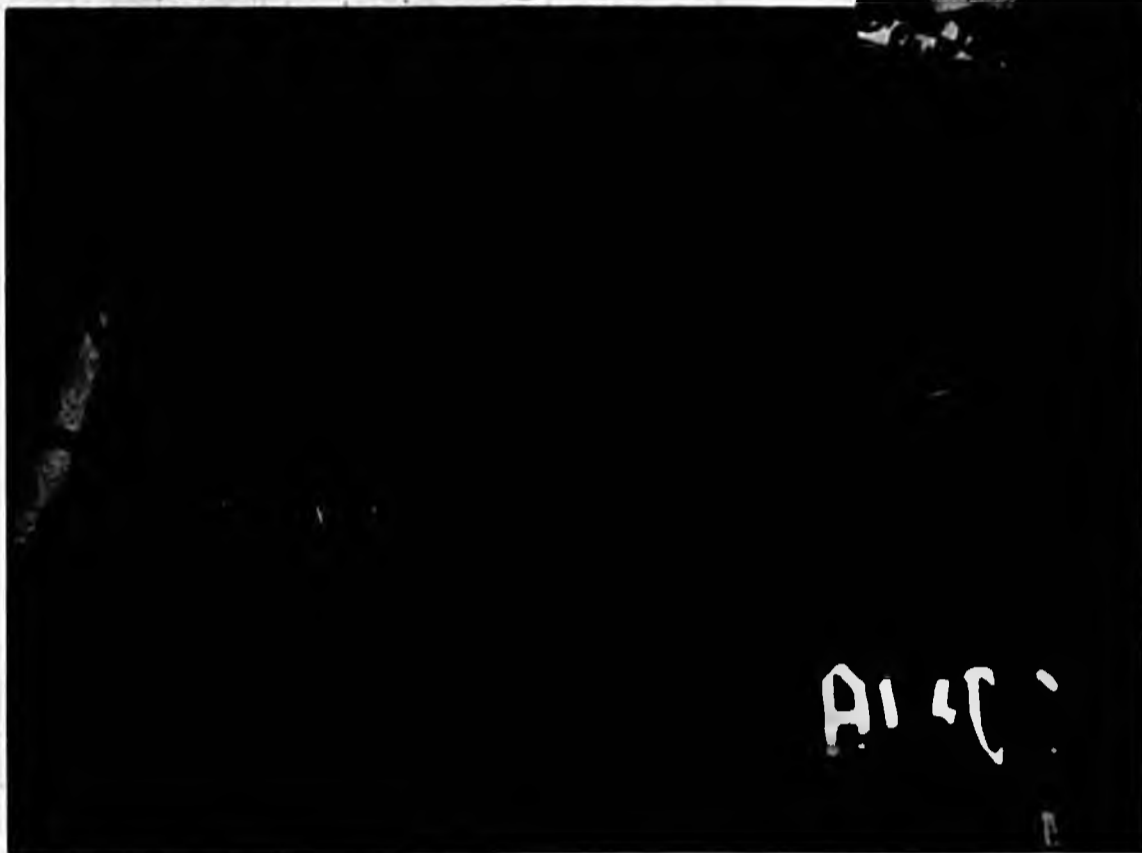
There are also several televisions set up with Nintendo Game Cubes for waiting children.

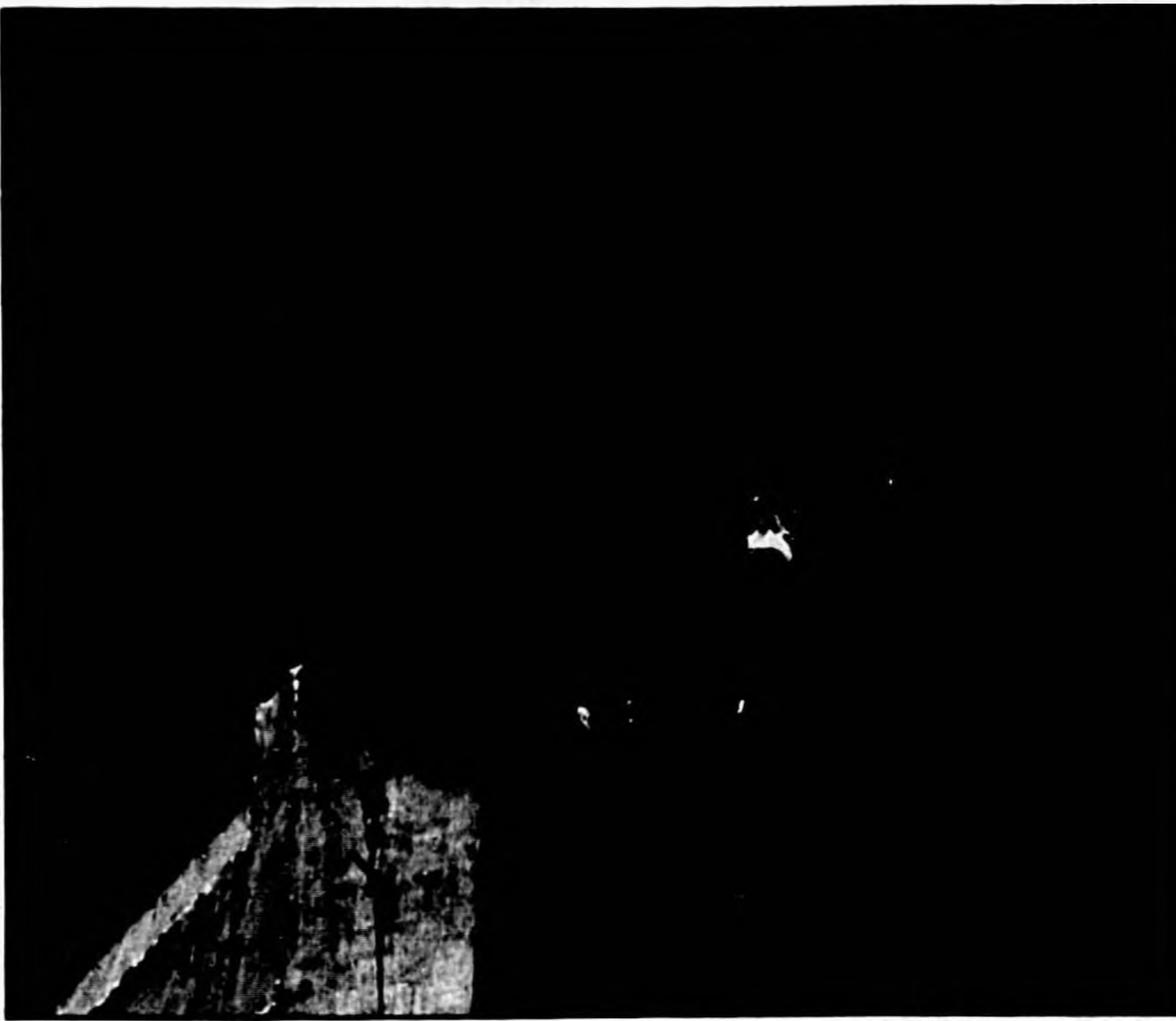
According to the news release, both groups share many goals.

He was told immediately, and although he said he agreed that there needed to be a reduction in the boards, he found it odd that the Steering Committee was the only active board on the list of deleted boards. The board was also the only one in the middle of a project, he said.

Fraser claimed that not long ago the commission voted to allow the Waterfront Steering Committee to finish out Fort Mellon Park, as its last task before it disbands.

"If this goes into effect immediately, then basically the commission is renegeing on that, so I'm a bit confused about that," Fraser said.

Fraser wanted that section of the ordinance to state that they were to continue with their task of Fort Mellon Park before being completely disbanded. Fraser insisted to the commission that their next task was to narrow down the RFQs the city receives for landscape architects and to pass those recommendations along to the commission.

Mayor Linda Kuhn explained that the Steering Committee was asked to do the survey, which was complete, and that they selected three members of the committee to help select the landscape architect.

She told Fraser she believed he was one of three chosen for that committee.

"You're correct," Fraser told the Mayor.

Mayor Kuhn said that this ordinance would not interfere with the final task those three members were asked to complete.

"Well, if the Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee no longer exists after you take your vote tonight, how can we complete our task," Fraser asked?

Mayor Kuhn said that the task he was charged with by the commission was limited in scope, but that they were part of a sub-committee that has been asked to review the RFQs to help narrow down the choices for a landscape architect for Fort Mellon Park. "All right, well, this is all

## Do You Pay Attention?

Having recently been on international air flights, the crash of the Air France Flight 358 on Tuesday, Aug. 2, in Toronto, Canada, got my mind to thinking about safety matters. The aircraft, coming in from an overseas flight, skidded off the runway and burst into flames upon landing.

Yet the 309 passengers and crewmembers managed to escape from the aircraft in less than two minutes. No one was killed, and persons receiving what were called minor injuries, numbered 22 to 43, depending on which source gave out information.

Considering previous large aircraft crashes when dozens of people were killed because they couldn't exit the craft, this one was amazing, and the crew, which helped the passengers escape, are, in my estimation, true heroes.

Prior to a commercial aircraft leaving the ground, crew members always give a brief talk on where the escape hatches or doors are located, how to escape (slide) down those shoots and the location of oxygen masks should air pressure be lost. If the aircraft will be going over water, instructions are given on the location of flotation equipment, life jackets, and how to use them.

In addition, pamphlets are usually contained in the pocket behind the next seat, giving the same information. In one large aircraft I was in, TV monitors came out of the top rack and the information came through that means.

Time after time however, I see my fellow passengers ignoring the possible life-saving information that is being given. I have even heard people commenting that they wish the stewardesses would shut up, that they have flown before and know all of the information.

They don't even bother to look around to locate the nearest escape hatch.

Apparently, the passengers on Flight 358 paid attention, because their escape reportedly went smoothly and most everyone knew what to do when the plane crashed.

Persons who refuse to keep their seatbelts fastened at all times are also one of my pet peeves. No one knows when air turbulence may hit the craft and folks will be jostled around. Even though most airlines will tell you to keep them fastened at all times, even though the flight is at normal altitude, many folks unhitch them. This is a not a good practice. It could be dangerous and even more so if you have small children who don't have their weight keeping them in the seat like many adults.

Of course aircraft crashes, especially when they involve commercial airliners are always big news. But it seems as though every time we have an aircraft involved in a mishap, folks panic and, for a time, refuse to fly. Yet look at the comparison between the number of people who fly versus those who drive their cars. The typical motorist driving on I-4 or some other highway, is in a much greater danger. The per-mile per-person average is not good for the motoring public, compared to air miles.

When that stewardess begins her (or his) lecture on aircraft safety, PAY ATTENTION. You may never be involved in making an emergency escape from the plane, on land or in the water, and that oxygen mask may never come down because of a failure in air pressure. But wouldn't it be better to know what to do in an emergency and where the escape route is.

P.S. Regarding last week's column on what (I was told) were called "Drunk Cars", in Italy. Sandra Taylor of Longwood sent me a similar photo of the car she took in Paris during a tour of Europe in June. She said they were called "Smart Cars" and produced by Mercedes Benz. She says they are available in Canada but not the U.S. She also said that Andy Rooney featured the Smart Car on the "60 Minutes" TV show recently. Thanks Sandra.

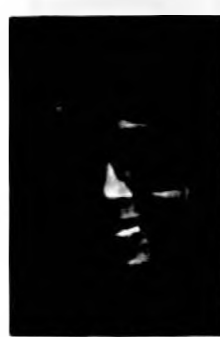

## The Way We Were:

### 60 years after World War II

August 15, 2005, is the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II, and is officially named V-J (Victory over Japan) Day. There was much celebrating on that date in 1945 in this country, including here in Sanford. The following is an account of the celebration in Sanford as edited from the August 15 and 16 editions of the Sanford Herald.

#### PROCLAMATION

Divine Providence has crowned the armies of our country with victory over an enemy seeking to destroy the liberty of men and countries.

In our moment of joy for this victory, let us pause to revere and honor the brave men and women, many of whom made the supreme sacrifice to protect our way of living. May we be worthy of their sacrifice and suffering and pray that their sacrifice has not been in vain. Our country has emerged from the conflict the mightiest nation on earth and assumes a grave responsibility of leadership of the world. May God make us worthy of that trust and assist us to instill in all mankind the principles of peace and liberty.

The task of reconversion from war to peace will be tremendous and will try the souls of men, but if we approach it without fear, unselfishly and with confidence, we will emerge from this period as victoriously as our armies did from the armed conflict.

At approximately 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 14, 1945, the air raid siren, formerly used for blackouts, sounded, notifying the city of Sanford that the war was over. Most people had heard the news over radio that Japan had surrendered and when they heard the siren, whole families jumped into their cars and headed downtown. Horns were blowing, people were cheering and singing, ACL engineers blew engine whistles, and Mr. McAlexander's portable loudspeaker added to the din. Hundreds of sailors joined in the celebration later in the evening.

The next morning, there was a special victory gathering in front of the Sanford Naval Air Station administration building led by Capt. William T. Easton, station commander. The NAS orchestra played "Anchors Away" to open the program.

It was announced that the base would be closed both Wednesday and Thursday and that there would be a Victory dance at the armory that evening. Thursday, there would be a dance at the USO.

Captain Eastman said that SNAS had done an excellent job of training flyers, that pilots would be needed for the future and he hoped that the station would remain open to continue this work.

August 15 was an official holiday so stores and offices were closed all day. First Methodist Church was filled that evening for a union thanksgiving service.

Some of you may remember being a part of this celebration either here in Sanford or elsewhere.

I well remember, as a nine-year-old, the end of World War II. My parents and I had spent the summer of 1945 in New Smyrna Beach and that particular night, August 14, we were eating in a restaurant on U.S. 1. I've forgotten the name. While we were eating, the siren sounded and the end of the war was announced over the radio. Everyone there cheered.

We had planned to go to Daytona that evening and my parents decided to drive over there anyway. My dad was able to find a parking place on a main street on the beach side and as we got out of the car, a sailor grabbed my mother and kissed her. There were throngs of people on the sidewalks and streets, all sorts of noisemakers and much revelry. It was exciting.

After enjoying this for a while, we decided to go to a movie to get away from the noise. While we were in there, a group of merrymakers came in from outside and shouted, "Don't you people know that war's over?" Everyone in the theater cheered to show our acknowledgement and excitement.

Yes, we knew and were overjoyed. War, rationing, air raids, etc. were about all I had known as I was only five years old when the war began in 1941. I had helped fill Red Cross boxes, bought defense stamps, participated in air raid drills both in the basement lunchroom at Southside School, and a home, and been deprived of many toys and other things because of the war. My dad, too old for the draft, was in the Florida State Guard and served as an Air Raid Warden. We were unable to travel to visit his family in Tennessee because of gas rationing. When his dad died in 1942, he had to go up on the bus by himself. While at New Smyrna Beach in the summers, there were air raid drills and blackout curtains, since there might have been submarines close by. I had two uncles, Bill Stemper and Carl Stinecpher, who served in the military.

After four long years of war and sacrifice, it was finally over and a new era was just beginning.

### 'Celery Crate' great for social gatherings above City Hall

This picture from the 1946 Seminole High School Salmagundi is of what the students had named the Celery crate. It was their meeting place for socializing and fun. It was located on the second floor of Sanford's city hall, a space that had originally been an auditorium. There is a 1925 picture of this auditorium hanging on the wall of the Sanford Museum.

There was a student organization that helped plan the activities at the Celery crate, and its officers in 1946 were Dorothy Crumley, Walter Smith, Bobby Jones and Alvin Kilpatrick. Marjorie Cogburn Tepsic was director.

The very first "The Way We Were" on July 17, 1994, was

about the Celery Crate. I told its history and added some reminiscences of mine from the early 1950's.

The Crate was in existence 1944-53 and those SHS students at the time have fond memories of fun times there. It was open every Saturday night during the school year for students to gather for ping-pong, pool, dancing, and quite games. Special events held there included talent shows, Halloween and Christmas parties and square dancing.

In the fall of 1953, the city declared the second floor of city hall unsafe so a new place was found, but this did not really live up to its potential. The Civic Center was built soon afterward, and student social activities began to be centered there.

This picture shows only a small area near the stage. The room extended quite a large distance. In the 1950's, it contained three pool tables, three ping-pong tables, spaces for dancing, quite games, reading, and a snack bar.

Notice the chandelier - when the city hall was demolished, several of these were placed in the Civic Center. When that building was renovated, three of the chandeliers were saved.

Two are hanging in the Sanford Museum and one in the Bettye Smith Cultural Arts Center.

The original vision for the park began years ago as Deputy Gregory and fellow

Geneva deputies dealt with partying, drinking, speeding, drug use, and fights that often occur at the end of Lake Harney Road. Deputy Gregory saw

a solution. If the County acquired the land, they would have more control of the ingress, egress, and might deter crime, while providing the community with a safe place to gather and play. He had been quietly looking into the ownership and uses of the land when his life ended tragically July 8, 1998.

In 1999 friend and colleague, Deputy Todd Moderson looked into the possibility of a memorial park and discovered from Deputy Gregory's family that he had been looking at land for a park as well. Deputy Moderson started talking to one of the landowners, and also explored additional lands adjacent to the site. Todd's expanding vision took the park to another level with not only the goal of crime control, and recreation, but also natural land preservation and the addition of a substation.

The original letter of intent from one of the landowner partners included only a 20 acre donation, but when other partners and their attorneys became involved, they offered to sell the County an additional 44 acres north of the park site at the 2003 appraised value of \$187,608. This acreage would have Natural Lands designation and while it was not fully "usable" land, it did have trail potential and would have increased the park size to 64 acres.

The 44 acres became a sticking point with the County

Commissioners at the February 8, 2005 meeting when the Board realized the landowners would not donate the 20 acres unless the County first purchased the 44 acres. The Commission was unhappy that the deal had changed. According to Commissioner Henley, "the 44 acres had never been on our radar screen." The Commission had been interested in the 20 acre donation, but was unhappy with a financial ultimatum "at the 11th hour."

Sheriff Eslinger reminded the Board that 11th hour changes are often discussed and executed by the Board itself. Additionally Sheriff Eslinger and Deputy Moderson reminded the Board that the original intent of the project was to deter crime in this place and provide a needed park for Geneva. The memorial piece of the project was added in light of Deputy Gregory's death.

At the end of the Feb 8, 2005 meeting, the Board debated about whether to continue the project. With Sheriff Don Eslinger's support, Commissioners Carey, Van Der Weide, and Dallari actively stated that they would like to move forward by investigating whether the county could purchase the 20acre site, and the Board agreed.

I must stop here and point out that the 44 acres had been discussed with the Seminole County Natural Lands Acquisition committee in 2003, and that committee had agreed to the purchase of this land subject to Commission approval. This was documented in an update from Deputy Moderson on July 27, 2003 in this very column. So it was on the Natural Lands radar screen two years ago.

The park initiative was placed in the hands of Suzy Goldman, Director of Library and Leisure Services for Seminole County who told me that the issue of the land purchase for the park would be reviewed by the Board of Commissioners Tuesday July 26, 2005. Late that afternoon I heard from Richard Creedon, President of the Geneva Citizens' Association, that the purchase had been denied.

men do hate to shop," Rowland said.

Coover started out purchasing suits, sport coats, ties and shirts for work from Tom James Clothier, but now he's expanded to more casual clothing, also.

"It's convenient and good quality," Coover said.

According to Coover, you can always get better deals at the stores, but you can't get the custom shirts that fit well.

Rowland said that once someone tries a custom fit shirt, they won't go back. Custom shirts start out at \$70 and then go up depending on fabric.

Because Tom James Clothier has 500 suit fabrics, 250 shirt fabrics, 200 ties and 200 shoes, the possibilities are endless.

A sales professional can perform an analysis free of charge on a customer's wardrobe just by taking a look in their closet. Rowland said that many times he will make an appointment with a husband and wife, so that she can be a part of the decision.

Often times Rowland will give the wife ultimate veto after presenting the husband with a multitude of choices. Most department stores and other clothiers would charge a fee to perform such an analysis.

label. It's because of this, that a lot of the company's suits are 30 percent less than those bought in a department store.

Ready-made suits start at \$359 and go up to \$1,000. Their custom made suits start at \$600 and go up as high as \$12,000 depending on fabric and stitching.

Tom James Clothier has introduced a vast line of women's professional clothing, which includes an array of styles in suit jackets, pants and shirts.

A woman can even choose what type of buttons she wants on her jacket or blouse.

After a sales professional comes to a customer's home or office and sales are made, the clothes are hand delivered in approximately four to six weeks. From then on, a sales professional generally will contact the client at the beginning of each season to see what they may need to update their wardrobe.

Vincent Howard, a managing partner with Sanford CPA firm Howard, Howard and Hodges, said he's been buying from Rowland for a little over a year.

Right now, he is just buying work clothes from Rowland, but is considering branching out to casual clothes, too.

"I'm pretty hard to fit," Howard said. "I'm like a 37, it's a pretty odd size to find, with a 29-30 inch waist."

with the game called, "Travel Quest: A Journey Back in Time."

The game takes viewers back in time when a new county is formed in Central Florida. Its name is Seminole County. The new county broke away from the larger Orange County on April 25, 1913.

The icons of the horse, car, steamboat and train move along a map of Seminole County. It stops and gives a fact about a place. The steamboat, for example, stops first at Wilson's Wharf on Lake Monroe. In 1870, James Wilson built the wharf on the west end of the lake as the first permanent structure. It served river boats bringing supplies and mail into the area.

A special feature for young children is vocabulary. Words that young children might not understand are highlighted in yellow. Moving the cursor

over them brings up a definition. A quiz question follows at each stop.

"We hoped that maybe teachers could give their students extra credit or a project using the site," Jacobs said. "But it's not just for kids because adults can learn too."

A survey at the end of the Web site game asks viewers what they think.

The technology will continue, she said, as the site adds history jigsaw puzzles. People will have to move the puzzle pieces on the screen to form an historic photo from Seminole County. The program allows the museum to divide a photo into 10 up to 45 pieces.

It is all part of an effort to teach the history of Seminole County and well as make people aware of the museum, Jacobs said.

"We want teachers to know that we will come to any school to talk about the coun-

ty's history," she continued. She even goes to the jail to educate young people there. She will talk to church or service groups as well, she said, just about anyone who will listen.

The museum itself can handle up groups of up to 25 to 30 students, she said. The museum also now has audio tours in English, Spanish, and German. The collection includes rooms filled with artifacts from early county inhabitants, including those here before settlers came to grow citrus and vegetables.

The Seminole Board of County Commissioners established the Museum of Seminole County History in 1982. The facility, located at 300 Bush Blvd., (just off State Road 17-92) is open six days a week. Admission is free.

Operating hours are: Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

both of Jacksonville. Jj's mom, Jill Sturdivant, herself a promoter of Bike Week in Daytona and the Zellwood Corn Festival will also be along for the ride.

"We're really excited to be opening for the Back Street Boys," Sturdivant said. "The Backstreet Boys have been wonderful to us. They've made us feel like we're a part of them."

Seminole County will open for the Backstreet Boys starting Sunday, Aug. 14 at the Tweeter Center in Mansfield, Mass., southeast of Boston.

"It's important that we're the only opening act," Jj said during a rehearsal break in a warehouse on Power Court near Interstate 4. She is wearing a black T-shirt with her signature light skirt. Her muscular arms show she works out regularly, a habit formed with the football team.

"We will have about 20 minutes," she said of the opening show.

The tour plays some very large venues such as the Target Center in Minneapolis. The schedule ends for Seminole County Sept. 2 in Ridgewood, Wash., just up the road from Portland, Ore.

Sturdivant said there is a possibility of extending the tour as the Backstreet Boys play in Canada.

At first record executives balked at this young, blond rapper from the suburbs, but when Dave McPherson, the executive who signed the Backstreet Boys to a big label in the 1990s heard her, he was convinced they had potential.

McPherson and Sturdivant are executive producers of Seminole County's self-titled CD. The CD was recorded at The Compound in Sanford, according to the jacket. The songs were mixed by Joe Smith at Parc Studios in Altamonte Springs.

All 10 songs on the CD were written by Byron and Jj, including one ballad written during a period last summer when many people in Central Florida had a little extra time on their hands.

"We wrote one of the songs during Hurricane Charley," Jj said. "Life In Me," was composed in the storm's after-

math one year ago when electricity and hot water were scarce for many people.

"We had to shower in the lake for a week," Jj recalled. "It's a slow song, a ballad, so it fits."

People have compared Seminole County to a cross between Evanesence and Linkin Park. Evanesence because of Jj's female voice, and Linkin Park because rap mixes with metal. Jj and Byron, however, balk at the comparison.

They said they like both groups, but they don't want to be pidgin-holed.

"We don't want to be categorized," Byron J said. They want to perform their own music with their own style. The first track on the CD is titled "Pieces". It seems to be a hit with fans. One online reviewer said she hoped it is their first release. Another said Seminole County is the sound of the future.

Sturdivant said more than 15,000 people have signed up as online fans of Jj and Byron J, many from Japan and the United Kingdom.

The pair met four years ago when Byron was producing a song for another artist who didn't show up for recording. Jj offered to record the song.

"Jj started rhyming," Byron said, and their musical relationship has grown from that point. Their music has been played on local rock stations and they have performed at local venues.

The duo also teamed up to record a song written by members of the Who, Rod

Stewart's band and Bad Company as well as Ronnie Wood of the Rolling Stones. The song was part of a charitable effort to help bring technology to Africa to help with problems there.

The song, called "All About the Children," was released in the United Kingdom. Rolling Stones producer Chris Kempsey said he loved everything about it, after receiving the new mix forefronting Jj's talent.

Still the Backstreet Boys tour is the big break that the band has sought. Sturdivant admits she was unsure how far her daughter could go, but one person who remained convinced was Jj's grandmother, Joyce Sturdivant.

Joyce sits quietly in the dark on a couch in the smoky rehearsal room with only purple stage lights illuminating the black curtained walls. On the album jacket, Jj thanks God and her "granma".

"You always believed in me and supported me 1000 percent," Jj wrote to Joyce. Jill Sturdivant said her mother has supported Seminole County financially to see their dreams come true. Jill also has two sons, Bud Thacker, who plays football at Seminole High, and C.J. Thacker, 14, who is into NASCAR.

The band will be featured on MTV later this year, according to Jill. All this for a group called Seminole County.

Why did they choose to name themselves after Jj's home county. Byron is from the Panhandle in Milton, a self-described military brat.

"We kicked around a bunch of names," Jj recalled. In the end, the duo met in Seminole County, they live here and the name kind of stuck.

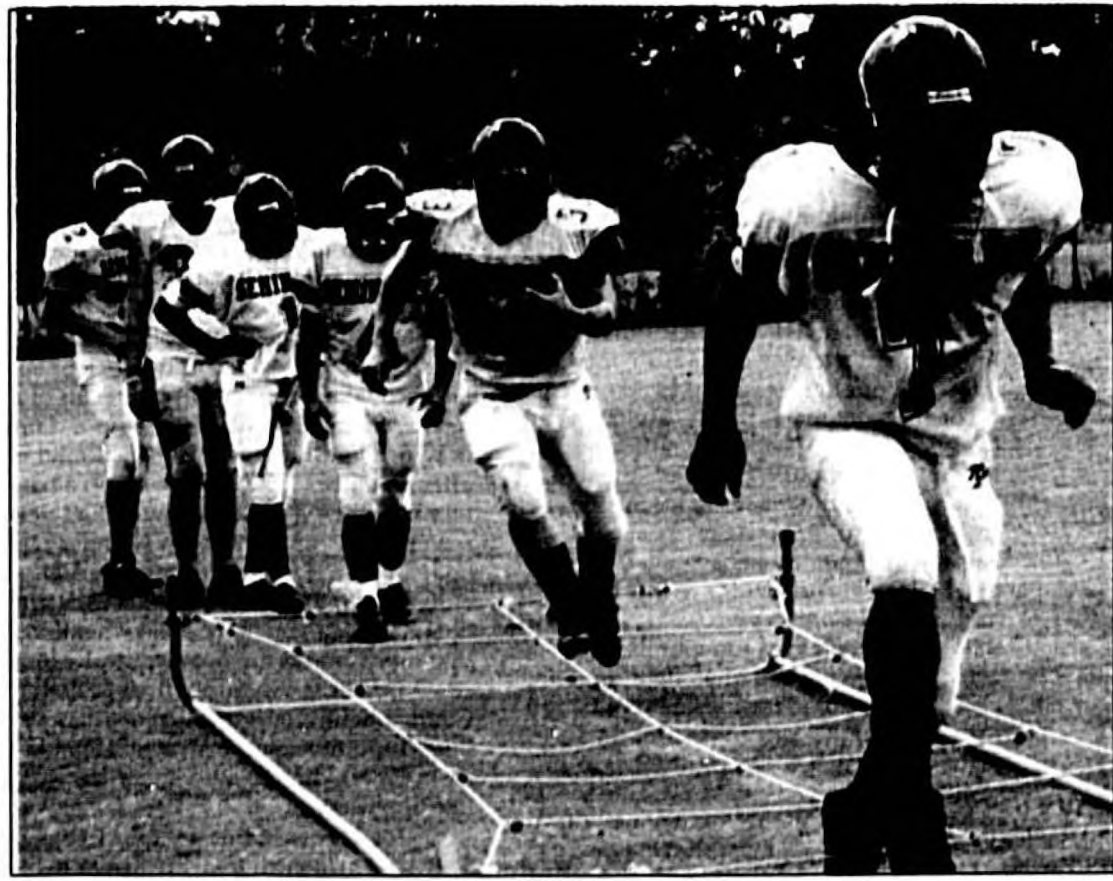
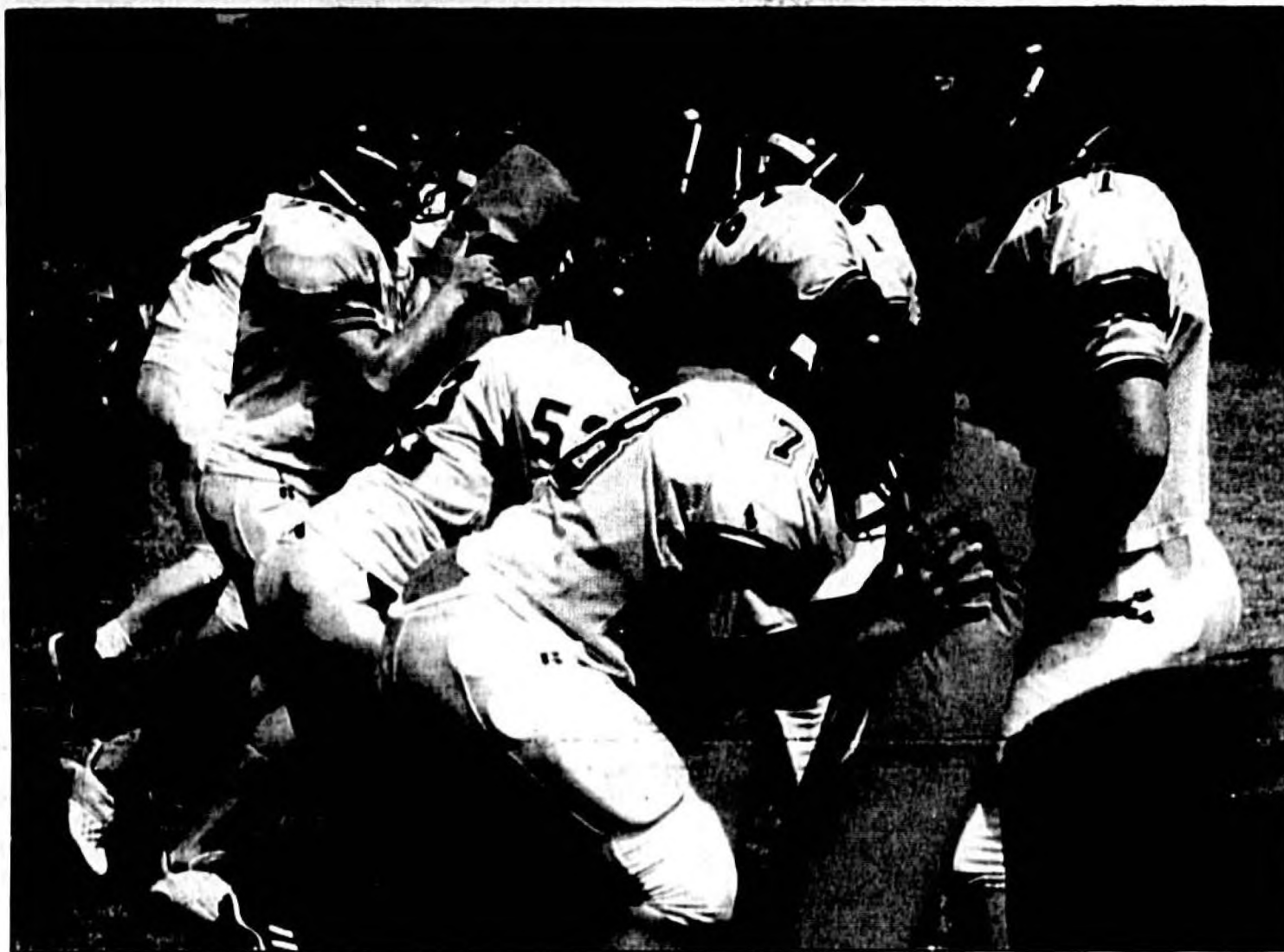

## The stinky trout

**MOSQUITO LAGOON** — The sweltering heat greeted us last Sunday as we departed the boat ramp. The day began with high hopes as we glided across the slick calm waters of the Mosquito Lagoon.

I was joined by Greg McElhery and his father. Just as the sun peaked the horizon a school of redfish popped up in front of the boat. Both anglers fired numerous shots at the school but no one was interested. Another boat came around the corner and the school began to move. That was not a good thing. Redfish become more challenging when they move.

The next two hours was spent making cast after cast to these crazy fish. They just would not eat. Time to head

to our next stop with hopes of finding fish that would accommodate my guests.

We began throwing Rip Tide 3 inch Mullet on 1/8 ounce jig heads and finally the trout decided to eat. After boating a few trout we were off to find more redfish. Our journey was short, as we turned the corner a school of monster redfish lifted and pushed the water like a battleship. After two dozen casts at the school it was clear these fish would not eat.

Destination number three would prove to be a stop I will never forget.

No sooner had I turned off the motor when on top of the sandbar a huge trout was tailing. Greg took several shots and could not get her to chew. I decided to try and made a cast in the sand hole next to this monster and sure enough See Outdoors, Page 2B

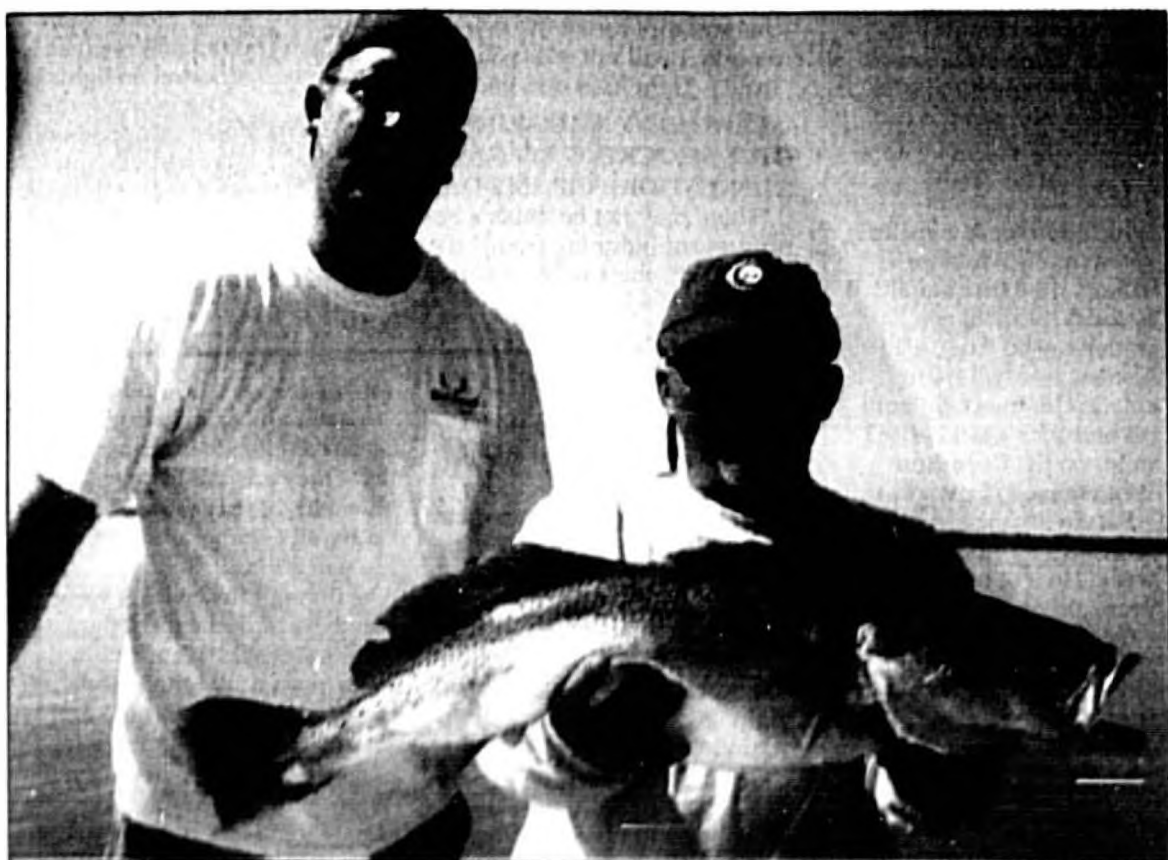

## MEN'S BASKETBALL 2-0 IN EUROPE

Junior forward Josh Peppers recorded a game-high 19 points as the UCF men's basketball team had seven players finish with double-figures in scoring as the Golden Knights ran past MSV, 101-56, in an exhibition game in Noordwijk, Holland on Wednesday evening. UCF improves to 2-0 on its six-game European tour.

Sophomore guard Dave Noel added 16 points, eight assists and seven rebounds. Behind 7-of-9 shooting from the floor, senior forward Anthony Williams scored 14 points and also blocked three shots.

UCF started the game strong, shooting 9-of-12 (75 percent) overall in the first quarter and led 25-13 after 10 minutes. The Golden Knights raced out to a 13-2 advantage with 7:20 to go in the opening stanza after sophomore guard Mike O'Donnell recorded a steal and found Williams for a wide-open layup.

MSV is one of Holland's eight second-division squads. The Golden Knights pulled away in the second half, leading by as many as 47 points on its way to the win.

On the boards, UCF dominated, holding a 38-20 edge. For the game, the Golden Knights shot 60 percent overall from the field and also hit nine treys.

The hosts recovered from a turnover-filled first quarter, using eight second quarter points from Gerald Robinson to keep the score respectable at the break, as UCF led 44-30 at halftime.

The visitors ran away from MSV in the third. With seconds remaining in the quarter, Noel recorded a steal and found sen-

ior guard Justin Rose beneath the basket for an easy dunk as time expired to put UCF up, 71-40, with 10 minutes to play.

Senior guard Troy Lindbeck connected on four triples and finished with 12 points. Senior forward Marcus Johnson also totaled 12 points. In addition to tallying seven assists, O'Donnell had 10 points.

Edwin Engelhart paced MSV with 13 points. The hosts shot just 38.2 percent for the game.

Playing its first contest of a six-game European exhibition tour, the UCF men's basketball team had little trouble with its first professional opponent, easing past host Omniworld, 91-57, on Tuesday evening in Almere, Holland.

Peppers connected on four treys for the Golden Knights and registered a game-high 25 points. Behind a 7-of-12 performance from the field, Rose chipped in with 15 points. Noel had a well-rounded contest, totaling 11 points, nine boards, six assists and five steals.

UCF raced out to a 48-20 lead at the half and never looked back. The team shot 47.3 percent from the field for the game, compared to only 28.6 percent for the hosts. The Golden Knights also forced 23 turnovers.

Williams finished with 12 points and eight boards. Lindbeck and O'Donnell both nailed three treys. Lindbeck closed the game with 11 points and O'Donnell had nine points and three assists.

Barry Entius paced Omniworld with 17 points. Off the bench, Pieter Bas de Wilt added 12 points.

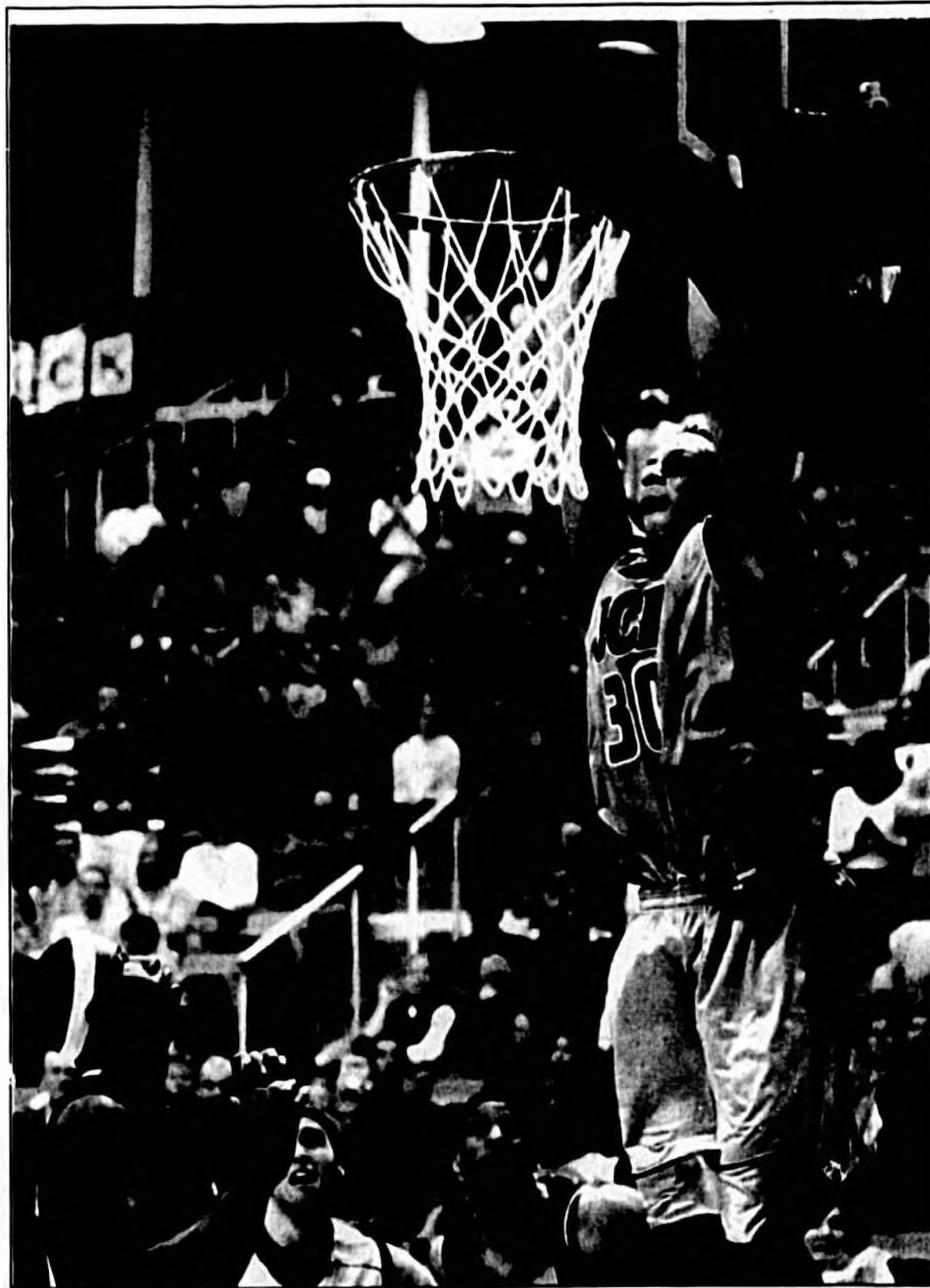
The Golden Knights continued their tour on Friday, traveling to Brussels, Belgium to face the Gent Dragons.

## CONTRIBUTIONS TOP \$3.5 MILLION DURING 2004-05

scholarship fundraising arm of UCF athletics, brought in a record \$1.2 million in unrestricted gifts, an increase of 25 percent from a year ago. It's the first time that annual giving has topped the \$1 million mark and this year's total is nearly double the \$619,000 that was collected just two years ago.

"We could not have done it without the hard work of the GKC board and GKC staff," said Sean Helton, assistant director of the Golden Knights Club. "We topped our goal of \$1.2 million this year and will celebrate that achievement. Ultimately, our desire is to raise the funds annually to cover all of the scholarship costs for our student-athletes, which now

exceeds \$4 million. We will continue to grow our donor base and increase our annual support for these students."

In terms of capital giving, donations for the building and expansion of athletics facilities, the largest gifts during the year came in for football-related projects. Of those, one of the leading commitments was from Tony Nicholson, whose pledge is earmarked for the indoor football facility, which was subsequently named the Nicholson Fieldhouse. Also, an anonymous donor gave a sizeable gift to fund the work being done to design and study the feasibility of an on-campus football stadium.

"The magnitude and scope of capital projects with a proposed football stadium and the plans for the new convocation center have stimulated considerable interest among our donor base," said Tim Leonard, assistant vice president for athletics development and annual giving. "Additionally, the excitement of the hiring of George O'Leary as football coach had and continues to have a huge impact on giving."

The amount of capital giving from the 2004-05 fiscal year was more than triple the capital gifts received just a year prior and overall giving to UCF athletics was doubled from the 2003-04 fiscal year.

## SEAWORTHY MAGAZINE LOOKS AT FIVE SHOCKING YEARS OF LIGHTNING STRIKE CLAIMS DATA

There may not be much a boater can do to prevent lightning from striking their vessel, but there is an important step to

take immediately after a jolt hits, according to the July 2005 issue of *Seaworthy* magazine, the quarterly BoatU.S. Marine Insurance and damage avoidance report. In "Lightning! Flash, BANG! Your Boat's Been Hit - Now What?", Associate Editor Chuck Fort reviewed five years of lightning strike claims data from the BoatU.S. Marine Insurance claims files. What he found might surprise or confirm your suspicions about lightning strikes.

The feature reports that in any one year the odds of your boat being struck by lightning are about 1.2 in 1,000. Breaking it down further, the rate of lightning strikes for sailboats was about four boats per 1,000, while motorboats averaged only 0.5 per 1,000. A surprise finding was that multi-hulled sailboats were struck more than twice as often as monohulls.

Thirty-three percent of all lightning claims came from Florida, largely due to the sheer number of vessels. But the sunshine state also has a large number of sailboats, which helps explain why the second most struck area in the country was the Chesapeake Bay region, followed by relatively small state of Rhode Island. Both of these areas have a high percentage of sailboats. States where small powerboats predominate, such as Iowa and Nebraska, reported no lightning-related claims.

Interestingly, the files also showed that boats equipped with lightning dissipaters were also hit, questioning their effectiveness. Most electronics aboard a boat were found not damaged by a direct hit but rather from surging electrical current created in the wiring by the strike.

While the story explains that some vessels can have little or no damage after a strike, an immediate short-haul is a must. The reason is that when lightning exits your boat, it can go through the hull itself or via a through-hull fitting. This may cause a gradual leak that could go unnoticed.

Oftentimes boaters don't know their unattended vessel has been struck or suffered collateral damage as the result of a nearby strike. The article reviews a claim in which lightning damage was found only after an amber LED light lit up on a battery charger - a light the owner had never seen before - and his depth sounder quit. Sometimes a damaged or missing VHF antenna is the only clue that an unattended boat has been struck. Fort also mentions that most vessels are not electrically bonded according to American Boat & Yacht Council lightning protection standards. Boats built to these construction standards offer a more direct pathway for lightning to exit a vessel.
