SANFORD — A decision made by the Sanford City Commission this week had one member of a deleted city board scratching his head and accusing the com-

mission of reneging.
As early as June 27, the commission had decided to disband several of the city's boards that were either inactive or no longer needed. Many of the functions of those boards that were deemed important were handed off to staff to absorb or to another active board.

The only board that openly voiced concern for the deletion of their group Monday was the Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee through Vice Chairman Ron Fraser. He continually fought for the right to stay a board, even down to the final vote.

The commission had charged the Steering Committee with finishing Fort Mellon Park, which was later narrowed down to two tasks: finishing surveys that were sent out in residents' water bills last month, and having three select members of the committee help choose a landscape architect.

Fraser asked the commission at Monday night's meeting when this deletion of the Steering Committee would go into affect if they voted to disband all of the boards on the list that night.




According to the news release, both groups share many goals.

He was told immediately, and although he said he agreed that there needed to be a reduction in the boards, he found it odd that the Steering Committee was the only active board on the list of deleted boards. The board was also the only one in the middle of a project, he said.

Fraser claimed that not long ago the commission voted to allow the Waterfront Steering Committee to finish out Fort Mellon Park, as its last task before it disbands.

"If this goes into effect immediately, then basically the commission is reneging on that, so I'm a bit confused about that," Fraser said.

Fraser wanted that section of the ordinance to state that they were to continue with their task of Fort Mellon Park before being completely disbanded. Fraser insisted to the commission that their next task was to narrow down the RFQs the city receives for landscape architects and to pass those recommendations along to the commission.

Mayor Linda Kuhn explained that the Steering Committee was asked to do the survey, which was complete, and that they selected three members of the committee to help select the landscape architect.

She told Fraser she believed he was one of three chosen for that committee.

"You're correct," Fraser told the Mayor.

Mayor Kuhn said that this ordinance would not interfere with the final task those three members were asked to complete.

"Well, if the Waterfront Steering Master Plan Committee no longer exists after you take your vote tonight, how can we complete our task," Fraser asked?

Mayor Kuhn said that the task he was charged with by the commission was limited in scope, but that they were part of a sub-committee that has been asked to review the RFQs to help narrow down the choices for a landscape architect for Fort Mellon Bark.





Do You Pay Attention?

Having recently been on international air flights, the crash of the Air France Flight 358 on Tuesday, Aug. 2, in Toronto, Canada, got my mind to thinking about safety matters. The aircraft, coming in from an overseas flight, skidded off the runway and burst into flames upon landing.

Yet the 309 passengers and crewmembers managed to escape from the aircraft in less than two minutes. No one was killed, and

persons receiving what were called minor injuries, numbered 22 to 43, depending on which source gave out information.

Considering previous large aircraft crashes when dozens of people were killed because they couldn't exit the craft, this one was amazing, and the crew, which helped the passengers escape, are, in my estimation, true heroes. Prior to a commercial aircraft leaving the

ground, crew members always give a brief talk on where the escape hatches or doors are located, how to escape (slide) down those shoots and the location of oxygen masks should air pressure be lost. If the aircraft will be going over water, instructions are given on the location of

flotation equipment, life jackets, and how to use them. In addition, pamphlets are usually contained in the pocket behind the next seat, giving the same information. In one large aircraft I was in, TV monitors came out of the top rack and the information came through that means.

Time after time however, I see my fellow passengers ignoring the possible life-saving information that is being given. I have even heard people commenting that they wish the stewardess would shut up, that they have flown before and know all of the informa-

They don't even bother to look around to locate the nearest escape hatch.

Apparently, the passengers on Flight 358 paid attention, because their escape reportedly went smoothly and most everyone knew what to do when the plane crashed.


Persons who refuse to keep their seatbelts fastened at all times are also one of my pet peeves. No one knows when air turbulence may hit the craft and folks will be jostled around. Even though most airlines will tell you to keep them fashioned at all times, even though the flight is at normal altitude, many folks unhitch them. This is a not a good practice. It could be dangerous and even more so if you have small children who don't have their weight keeping them in the seat like many adults.

Of course aircraft crashes, especially when they involve commercial airliners are always big news. But it seems as though every time we have an aircraft involved in a mishap, folks panic and, for a time, refuse to fly. Yet look at the comparison between the number of people who fly versus those who drive their cars. The typical motorist driving on I-4 or some other highway, is in a much greater danger. The per-mile per-person average is not good for the motoring public, compared to air miles.

When that stewardess begins her (or his) lecture on aircraft safety, PAY ATTENTION. You may never be involved in making an emergency escape from the plant, on land or in the water, and that oxygen mask may never come down because of a failure in air pressure. But wouldn't it be better to know what to do in an emer-

gency and where the escape route is. P.Ś. Regarding last week's column on what (I was told) were called "Drunk Cars", in Italy. Sandra Taylor of Longwood sent me a similar photo of the car she took in Paris during a tour of Europe in June. She said they were called "Smart Cars" and produced by Mercedes Benz. 60 years after World War II

August 15, 2005, is the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II, and is officially named V-J (Victory over Japan) Day. There was much celebrating on that date in 1945 in this country, including here in Sanford. The following is an account of the celebration in Sanford as edited from the August 15 and 16 editions of the Sanford Herald.

PROCLAMATION

Divine Providence has crowned the armies of our country with victory over an enemy seeking to destroy the liberty of men and countries.

In our moment of joy for this victory, let us pause to revere and honor the brave men and women, many of whom made the supreme sacrifice to protect our way of living. May we be worthy of their sacrifice and suffering and pray that their sacrifice has not been in vain. Our country has emerged from the conflict the mightiest nation on earth and assumes a grave responsibility of leader-

ship of the world. May God make us worthy of that trust and assist us to instill in all mankind the principles of peace and liberty.

The task of reconversion from war to peace will be tremendous and will try the souls of men, but if we approach it without fear, unselfishly and with confidence, we will emerge from this period as victoriously as our armies did from the armed conflict.

At approximately 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 14, 1945, the air raid siren, formerly used for blackouts, sounded, notifying the city of Sanford that the war was over. Most people had heard the news over radio that Japan had surrendered and when they heard the siren, whole families jumped into their cars and headed downtown. Horns were blowing, people were cheering and singing, ACL engineers blew engine whistles, and Mr. McAlexander's portable loudspeaker added to the din. Hundreds of sailors joined in the celebration later in the evening.

The next morning, there was a special victory gathering in front of the Sanford Naval Air Station administration building led by Capt. William T. Easton, station commander. The NAS orchestra played "Anchors Away" to open the program.

It was announced that the base would be closed both Wednesday and Thursday and that there would be a Victory dance at the armory that evening. Thursday, there would be a dance at the USO.

Captain Eastman said that SNAS had done an excellent job of training flyers, that pilots would be needed for the future and he hoped that the station would remain

open to continue this work. August 15 was an official holiday so stores and offices were closed all day. First Methodist Church was filled that evening

for a union thanksgiving service. Some of you may remember being a part of this celebration either here in Sanford or

I well remember, as a nine-year-old, the end of World War II. My parents and I had spent the summer of 1945 in New Smyrna Beach and that particular night, August 14, we were eating in a restaurant on U.S. 1. I've forgotten the name. While we were eating, the siren sounded and the end of the war was announced over the radio. Everyone there cheered.

We had planned to go to Daytona that evening and my parents decided to drive over there anyway. My dad was able to find a parking place on a main street on the beach side and as we got out of the car, a sailor grabbed my mother and kissed her. There were throngs of people on the sidewalks and streets, all sorts of noisemakers and much revelry. It was exciting.

After enjoying this for a while, we decided to go to a movie to get away from the noise. While we were in there, a group of merrymakers came in from outside and shouted, "Don't you people know that war's over?" Everyone in the theater cheered to show our acknowledgement and

Yes, we knew and were overjoyed. War, rationing, air raids, etc. were about all I had known as I was only five years old when the war begun in 1941. I had helped fill Red Cross boxes, bought defense stamps, participated in air raid drills both in the basement lunchroom at Southside School, and a home, and been deprived of many toys and other things because of the war. My dad, too old for the draft, was in the Florida State Guard and served as an Air Raid Warden. We were unable to travel to visit his family in Tennessee because of gas rationing. When his dad died in 1942, he had to go up on the bus by himself. While at New Smyrna Beach in the summers, there were air raid drills and blackout curtains, since there might have been submarines close by I had two uncles, Bill Stemper and Carl

Stinecipher, who served in the military. After four long years of war and sacrifice, it was finally over and a new era was just beginning.

'Celery Crate' great for social gatherings above City Hall

Stetson's Corner Park's original vision

Part 1 of 2: Park history and Commission meetings

A park is probably not going to happen for Geneva, at least in the form that Deputy Eugene Gregory envisioned.

The original vision for the park began years ago as Deputy

Gregory and fellow Geneva deputies dealt with partying, drinking, speeding, drug use, and fights that often occur at the end of Lake Harney

Road. Deputy

Gregory saw

a solution. If the County acquired the land, they would have more control of the ingress, egress, and might deter crime, while providing the community with a safe place to gather and play. He had been quietly looking into the ownership and uses of the land when his life ended

tragically July 8, 1998. In 1999 friend and colleague, Deputy Todd Moderson looked into the possibility of a memorial park and discovered from Deputy Gregory's family that he had been looking at land for a park as well. Deputy Moderson started talking to one of the landowners, and also explored additional lands adjacent to the site. Todd's expanding vision took the park to another level with not only the goal of crime control, and recreation, but also natural land preservation and the addition of a substation.

The original letter of intent from one of the landowner partners included only a 20 acre donation, but when other partners and their attorneys became involved, they offered to sell the County an additional 44 acres north of the park site at the 2003 appraised value of \$187,608. This acreage would have Natural Lands designation and while it was not fully "usable" land, it did have trail potential and would have increased the park state to 64 acres.

Commissioners at the February 8, 2005 meeting when the Board realized the landowners would not donate the 20 acres unless the County first purchased the 44 acres. The Commission was unhappy that the deal had changed. According to Commissioner Henley, "the 44 acres had never been on our radar screen." The Commission had been interested in the 20 acre

a financial ultimatum "at the 11th hour." Sheriff Eslinger reminded the Board that 11th hour changes are often discussed and executed by the Board itself. At the end of the Feb 8, 2005 meeting, the Board debated about whether to continue the project. With Sheriff Don Eslinger's Commissioners Carey, Van Der Weide, and Dallari actively stated that they would like to move forward by investigating whether the county could purchase the 20acre site, and the Board agreed.

I must stop here and point out that the 44 acres had been discussed with the Seminole Natural County Lands Acquisition committee in 2003, and that committee had agreed to the purchase of this land subject to Commission approval. This was documented in an update from Deputy Moderson on July 27, 2003 in this very colump. So it was on the Natural Lands radar screen two years

The park initiative was placed in the hands of Suzy Goldman, Director of Library and Leisure Services for Seminole County who told me that the issue of the land purchase for the park would be reviewed by the Board of Commissioners Tuesday July 26, 2005. Goldman explained to me that the landowners and their attorneys changed the terms of the negotiations to make the donation of the 20 acres for the park contingent on the county's purchase of 44 acres north of the park site. The Board voted against the land purchase, originally to be donated, and gave a directive to "cease negotiations with the landowners."

spoke Next I Commissioner Morris. He told me that the Board could not justify spending \$187,608 on land and a park that no one would go to and only a handful of people would use. And that although the idea was noble and inspiring, he added, it didn't make sense to build a park for people, that for the most part already live in a natural setting. The County's position is that for parks to be funded by the county, usage factors must be considered, in other words, parks with facilities are built for urban areas that really need them. Wow.

Commissioner Morris had also long felt that a proper memorial for fallen deputies, highway patrol officers, and first responders should be located in an area more accessible and central to the county, where many people could come and reflect and truly honor their sacrifice. I think most would see the wisdom in this and might even say such a memorial is overdue.

When I reviewed the minutes and tapes from the July 26th meeting, the Commissioners were told that the purchase of the 20 acres would now cost approximately \$350,000, which they were not willing to spend. Yes, they could have had 64 acres for \$187,608, then the price went up to \$350,000 for 20 acres. Now they have nothing.

Oviedo made short work of the Winter Springs nine, winning 11-1 and 15-0 in the Best-of-Three Series.


That earned the squad a trip to the State Tournament in Flagler County, and once again, it proved to be 'no contest' as Oviedo won four games by a total run differential of 49-2.

The team then closed out the tourney with a pair of shutouts, 9-0 over Creek and 10-0 in a rematch with Normandy in the final.



Junior forward Josh Peppers recorded a game-high 19 points as the UCF men's basketball team had seven players finish with double-figures in scoring as the Golden Knights ran past MSV, 101-56, in an exhibition game in Noordwijk, Holland on Wednesday evening. UCF improves to 2-0 on its six-game

European tour. Sophomore guard Dave Noel added 16 points, eight assists and seven rebounds. Behind 7of-9 shooting from the floor, senior forward Anthony Williams scored 14 points and also blocked three shots.

UCF started the game strong, shooting 9-of-12 (75 percent) overall in the first quarter and led 25-13 after 10 minutes. The Golden Knights raced out to a 13-2 advantage with 7:20 to go in the opening stanza after sophomore guard Mike O'Donnell recorded a steal and found Williams for a wide-

open layup. MSV is one of Holland's eight second-division squads. The Golden Knights pulled away in the second half, leading by as many as 47 points on

its way to the win. On the boards, UCF dominated, holding a 38-20 edge. For the game, the Golden Knights shot 60 percent overall from the field and also hit nine treys.

The hosts recovered from a turnover-filled first quarter, using eight second quarter points from Gerald Robinson to keep the score respectable at the break, as UCF led 44-30 at halftime.

The visitors ran away from MSV in the third. With seconds remaining in the quarter, Noel recorded a steal and found senior guard Justin Rose beneath the basket for an easy dunk as time expired to put UCF up, 71-40, with 10 minutes to play.

Senior guard Troy Lindbeck connected on four triples and finished with 12 points. Senior forward Marcus Johnson also totaled 12 points. In addition to tallying seven assists, O'Donnell had 10 points.

Edwin Engelhart paced MSV with 13 points. The hosts shot just 38.2 percent for the game.

Been Hit - Now What?", Associate Editor Chuck Fort reviewed five years of lightning strike claims data from the BoatU.S. Marine Insurance claims files. What he found might surprise or confirm your suspicions about lightning strikes.

The feature reports that in any one year the odds of your boat being struck by lightning are about 1.2 in 1,000. Breaking it down further, the rate of lightning strikes for sailboats was about four boats per 1,000, while motorboats averaged only 0.5 per 1,000. A surprise finding was that multi-hulled sailboats were struck more than twice as often as monohulls.


Thirty-three percent of all lightning claims came from Florida, largely due to the sheer number of vessels. But the sunshine state also has a large number of sailboats, which helps explain why the second most struck area in the country was the Chesapeake Bay region, followed by relatively small state of Rhode Island. Both of these areas have a high percentage of sailboats. States where small powerboats predominate, such as Iowa and Nebraska, reported no lightning-related claims.

boats equipped with lightning dissipaters were also nit, questioning their effectiveness. Most electronics aboard a boat were found not damaged by a direct hit but rather from surging electrical current created in the wiring by the strike.

Oftentimes boaters don't know their unattended vessel has been struck or suffered collateral damage as the result of a nearby strike. The article reviews a claim in which lightning damage was found only after an amber LED light lit up on a battery charger - a light the owner had never seen before - and his depth sounder quit. Sometimes a damaged or missing VHF antenna is the only clue that an unattended boat has been struck. Fort also mentions that most vessels are not electrically bonded according to American Boat & Yacht Council lightning protection standards. Boats built to these construction standards offer a more direct pathway for lightning to exit a vessel.

scholarship fundraising arm of UCF athletics, brought in a record \$1.2 million in unrestricted gifts, an increase of 25 percent from a year ago. It's the first time that annual giving has topped the \$1 million mark and this year's total is nearly double the \$619,000 that was

collected just two years ago. "We could not have done it without the hard work of the GKC board and GKC staff," said Sean Helton, assistant director of the Golden Knights Club. "We topped our goal of \$1.2 million this year and will celebrate that achievement. Ultimately, our desire is to raise the funds annually to cover all of the scholarship costs for our student-athletes, which now

exceeds \$4 million. We will continue to grow our donor base and increase our annual support for these students."

In terms of capital giving, donations for the building and expansion of athletics facilities, the largest gifts during the year came in for football-related projects. Of those, one of the leading commitments was from Tony Nicholson; whose pledge is earmarked for the indoor football facility, which was subsequently named the Nicholson Fieldhouse. Also, an anonymous donor gave a sizeable gift to fund the work being done to design and study the feasibility of an on-campus football stadi-

"The magnitude and scope of capital projects with a proposed football stadium and the plans for the new convocation center have stimulated considerable interest among our donor base," said Tim Leonard, assistant vice president for athletics development and annual giving. "Additionally, the excitement of the hiring of George O'Leary as football coach had and continues to have a huge impact on giving."

The amount of capital giving from the 2004-05 fiscal year was more than triple the capital gifts received just a year prior and overall giving to UCF athletics was doubled from the 2003-04 fiscal year.

History tells of some fantastic sports achievements in our country. One of the most interesting, I believe, was a softball game on Aug. 14 and 15, 1976. Why write that it took place for two days? The reason was that the game between teams representing the Gager's Diner and Bend'n Elbow Tavern, in Monticello, N.Y., lasted 365 innings. It started at 10 a.m. on the 14th, and may have lasted longer but it was called because of rain and fog at 4 p.m. on Aug. 15th.

It took 70 players, including 20 women, on the two teams to last for the 30 hours, non-stop.

The game was created to raise money for the Community General hospital in that city. A total of \$4,000 was raised. The final score was, Cagers, 491, and the Elbows, 467, a close game even considering the time it took. To this day, the game is considered the longest softball game on record.


