OUR 1940 PAYROLL MORE THAN \$2,800,000

As of December 31, 1940, our company had 1,542 employees on its payroll, which totaled more than \$2,800,000 for the year. The 40-hour week working schedule is now operative throughout our company. Our employees are citizens of Florida. Many of them own their own homes. Many take active part in civic organizations and maintain active interest in community welfare. All are good neighbors. Some are stockholders in our company. Their wages are spent principally in the communities where the money is earned. Their savings are put into local banks. Recreational activities sponsored by our company for employees include bowling, diamond ball, golf, ice skating and various social occasions, such as dances, picnics, lectures and dinners. An annual show, Sunshine Picnic, in which about 150 company members participate, has become an outstanding Miami event. Every year Christmas parties are held for employees' children throughout the company's territory and for the children in Kendall Home, Dade County. A large orchestra, composed of musicians employed in the company's various departments, gives hourly of live music and takes part company events and outside charitable activities.

EXTENSIVE CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

Florida's rapid growth in recent years has required additional facilities to serve the demand. Anticipating future demands, our company started an extensive construction program in 1940. The principal addition was the 20,000 kilowatt generator at the Leuderdales steam-electric station. Construction work at the Miami Beach station is now under way for the installation of another 20,000 kilowatt unit. Capacity of this station is 40th Street, Miami Beach, has been increased and a new substation has been built near Shreve to serve Camp Blanding. In 1941 more than 214 miles of electric lines were added to the company's inter-connected system, to serve new developments and rural communities in various parts of Florida.

SUMMARY OF 1940 OPERATIONS OF THE FLORIDA POWER & LIGHT COMPANY

Operating revenue increased \$1,741,226, or 17%, reflecting increases of 18% each in electric and gas revenues, and a decrease of 32% in gas revenues due to the loss of our gas property on June 1, 1940. Operating expenses excluding taxes were \$4,631 above 1939. Average cost of residential electric service dropped 5% to 2.3 cents per kilowatt-hour in 1940. Average annual use of electricity by residential customers rose to 1,331 kilowatt-hours for the year, an increase of 133 kilowatt-hours, or 10.4%, over 1939. Electric customers increased 13,284, or 7%, to a total of 184,107 at the end of the year. Gas customers increased 428, or 7%, to a total of 26,214. More than 214 miles of electric lines were added. Provision for property retirement reserve was \$489,000. Construction of a new 20,000 kilowatt generator unit at the Leuderdales steam-electric plant was completed in 1940. Another 20,000 kilowatt generator is being added to the Miami Beach steam-electric station and will be placed in operation late in 1941.

Longer Service For Draftees Will Be Asked

Roosevelt Discloses He Will Send Message To Congress Requesting Change

Act Would Halt Army's Break-up

Chief Executive Will Not Seek Service Out Of Hemisphere

WASHINGTON, July 18. — (AP)—President Roosevelt declared today it was the policy of the United States to defend Iceland and also to afford protection for the American garrison there.

Therefore, he told a press conference, it was what he termed A-B-C staff to keep open the sea lanes to that North Atlantic island. Orders, he said, are to provide protection against attack or any threat of attack.

WASHINGTON, July 18. — (AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today he would send to Congress next week a message urging extended service for selectees, reservists and National Guardsmen.

He spoke to a press conference of the necessity of avoiding complete disintegration of the Army and said the burden was very definitely on Congress.

The service of these men is now limited to one year.

Asked whether he recommended that draftees and Guardsmen be authorized to serve outside the Western Hemisphere, Roosevelt replied in the negative.

President Roosevelt yesterday blacklisted 1899 Latin American persons, firms and agencies judged guilty of jeopardizing hemisphere defense by aiding Germany and Italy.

He proclaimed the list "in the interest of national defense" under authority vested in him by his unlimited emergency powers.

He has the effect of cutting off all United States trade relations with, or through, the prescribed agents which, in any way, will help Germany or Italy and marks intensification of Roosevelt's economic warfare against the two nations.

The list, believed prepared in collaboration with the British who have issued similar dossier, was published immediately in the federal register and in pamphlet form by federal agencies and federal reserve banks.

In addition to blacklisting agents known to be serving in dubious capacities for the Axis, it becomes a guide for United States firms in obtaining Latin American commercial representation of unquestioned rectitude.

In a statement announcing his action the President warned that "anyone serving as a check for a person on the list will have his name added therewith."

He has had a taste of army life from three years with the local National Guards. Mr. Humphrey, an employe of the K and W Fruit Company, did not know that he held the first drawn draft number in the county until he was called by a U. S. A. I. reporter this morning. As he explained, he had worked until about 1:30 o'clock last night and had had time to listen to the radio broadcast of the drawing, and had not been out of bed long enough to learn of it this morning.

The draft registrant was not perturbed or impressed about the fact he was the "first" in the county. He just grinned when told of it and said nothing.

Not a native of Sanford, Mr. Humphrey was born in Georgia "just south of Tennessee" as he put it, but he has lived here for the past 12 years. He has been married for two and a half years and has a pair of boys. Elwin (Continued on Page Three)

Fuel Shortage Faces Reich, London States

Continuation Of Russian War Through September Seen As Threat To Supply

LONDON, July 18. — (AP)—Official quarters said today that the fuel shortage in Germany is threatening to curtail the German campaign against the British through September. Already it was said, Nazi supplies have been severely curtailed by the cessation of the U. S. R. and Soviet bombardment of the British air fields in Germany, and supplies captured in the Nazi sweep across western Europe have been used up. Evidence that a similar pinch is being felt in Italy was seen in a Fascist government order today cancelling all gasoline rationing for private automobiles, effective August 1.

The Royal Air Force was reported officially last night to have scored its most successful attack of the entire war in a bold day's operation on Rotterdam where 23 ships totaling 14,000 tons were sunk or badly damaged.

Authoritative commentators said the havoc wrought at Rotterdam was revealed only by the German air bombing of Dierkerke and Crete.

By such blows as that struck at Rotterdam the British claimed to be catching up with the Germans in the rate of shipping destruction. Admiral Sir Louis Mountbatten said in a radio speech that British planes and submarines in the past month had sunk 85 Axis ships, a toll which he said was "nearly equal" to British losses.

The new peak of the growing air offensive against Germany coincided with claims of the destruction of four more Nazi ships amounting to 13,000 tons by British bombers ranging along the French and Norwegian coasts.

Another man says he is selling silverware and displays an attractive set at an unusually low price. After making a sale, he collects down payment and never heard from again, the chief declared.

Refiners Asked To Maintain Maximum

WASHINGTON, July 18. — (AP)—Administrator Leon Henderson yesterday asked all petroleum refiners in the Gulf coast area to maintain a maximum price of six cents a gallon for Gulf coast gasoline.

Henderson said prices quoted for gasoline in the area have gone from 5.8 cents per gallon on the first of the year to six cents on June 19, when the industry was requested to maintain prevalent prices until they had consulted with the office of Price Administration and Civilian Supply.

More Funds For PWA Are Sought By Trade Group

JACKSONVILLE, July 18. —(Special) — An urgent plea was addressed to Washington officials by the Florida State Chamber of Commerce today asking that more money be made available to the PWA to meet the "distressful" public works needs of military areas. Congress on July 1 appropriated \$150,000,000 for this purpose. "It now appears that Florida's military areas cannot receive more than \$5,000,000 of this fund," Harold Cole, executive vice president of the State Chamber, declared, "whereas \$50,000,000 will be required to meet even the priority needs of the state's counties and municipalities, and school districts. The fund, in which from 18 to 25 states will share, was voted to assist military areas in providing schools, water works, sewers and sanitary facilities, water supply, increased hospital facilities, recreation mechanics, and access roads and streets. "Army and navy establishments, 18 of them, are now present in Florida localities which, for the most part, were sorely pressed by the state's rapid population increase before these defense measures were found necessary," Mr. Cole added. PWA officials are now holding meetings in the state's military areas to determine these needs, many of which were surveyed and certified to Washington from six to eight months ago, especially near highways. "Nearly 100,000 men, thousands of them with families, are stationed in Florida's Army and Navy posts," continued Mr. Cole. "Moreover, thousands of their relatives are constantly visiting them from nearly every state in the Union. It is apparent that these people will be in Florida for several years, and our city and county officials are keenly aware of the public needs as

More Priority For Needs Of Navy Is Asked

Threat To Shipbuilding Program Seen By Vinson, Chairman Of Naval Body

Spending More Funds Possible Schedules Can't Be Met Without More Money, Solon Says

WASHINGTON, July 19. (AP)—The United States shipped aboard 811 planes valued at \$40,743,631 in May, a decline of 50 craft and \$6,533,374 in value from April, the Commerce Department revealed today.

The Department no longer discloses the destination of exported planes, but presumably most of them went to England.

WASHINGTON, July 19. (AP)—Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House Naval Committee complained today that although the country regarded the Navy as its first line of defense, "other things" are given prior call to defense materials.

He added that despite the widespread belief that the Navy was expanding fast, his committee had found that scheduled spending could not be met without spending an extra \$685,000,000.

Vinson said he feared a definite threat to the Navy shipbuilding program unless priority ratings were changed to accelerate the flow of supplies to it.

United States shipbuilding yards will complete and make ready for sea about 6,000,000 tons of merchant ships during 1942, and will produce 2,000,000 tons this year, Harry L. Hopkins, supervisor of the U. S. lend-lease program, told interviewers yesterday.

These warnings came after the new strongly militaristic cabinet of Prime Kooyu-in which Toyoda replaced Yokusaku Matsuoka who arranged Japan's pact with Russia and the Axis—had been inaugurated last night at Kooyu's residence.

He made these other statements about the war role of the United States:

Shipping: "The United States will build enough ships to bring goods into the United Kingdom and into every theater in the world where democracy is fighting Hitler."

Foreign Minister Hints Japan May End Soviet Pact

TOKYO, July 19. (AP)—Japan's new foreign minister, Admiral Toyoda, hinted broadly in a statement today that Japan may abrogate her pact with Russia and a foreign office organ warned in a sharp editorial that Japan should immediately take "forceful measures" to ward off a "dreadful" encirclement by the United States.

These warnings came after the new strongly militaristic cabinet of Prime Kooyu-in which Toyoda replaced Yokusaku Matsuoka who arranged Japan's pact with Russia and the Axis—had been inaugurated last night at Kooyu's residence.

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Defense Called Small Aid To Rural Poverty

Half Of FSA Borrowers Are Located In South, Farm Official Asserts

WASHINGTON, July 19. (AP)—C. B. Baldwin, Farm Security Administrator told a congressional committee today the national defense program, with its re-employment of millions, has not yet made substantial inroad into rural poverty.

Baldwin said that while about 11 percent of all FSA borrowers were concentrated in the south, only about 10 percent of all defense contracts have been placed there.

On the other hand, 45 percent of such contracts were said to have been placed in northeastern states where less than 3 percent of FSA needy rural families live.

George Meany, secretary-treasurer of the American Federation of Labor, asserted last night that only one twenty-fourth of 1 percent of defense work time has been lost as a result of an A. F. L. work stoppage.

"Taking all defense work from the point of view of the program," he said in a prepared address broadcast by CBS, "only one man-day work has been lost by an American Federation of Labor strike of only 2400 man-days of work performed."

Particular emphasis with observance of aid British labor week, Meany said that "the doom of Adolf Hitler and the Nazi scourge is sealed. It seems to me because every week—in the minds of the 5,000,000 members of the American Federation of Labor and likewise in the minds of the overwhelming majority of the American people—is aid British labor week."

LONDON, July 19. (AP)—The British propaganda service issued a call early today for "mobilization" in German-occupied territory Sunday to launch an underdog fight against the Germans enlabeled by the Germans.

"First, take a vow on Sunday, July 20, to continue faithfully this fight the best way you can for your country's independence and honor and that of other nations enslaved by the Germans."

"Second, take every opportunity this Sunday to demonstrate to the Germans the mobilization of V's on walls and every-where you can and by doing so the V you send (three dots and a dash) whenever you get a chance. Let V be splashed from one end of Europe to another."

Legal Notices For Bond Vote Are Published

Registration Books Opened At Office Of W. J. Thigpen

Legal notices calling a special election on Aug. 19 to approve or disapprove a bill authorizing the Seminole County Commission to call a second election to vote a \$100,000 bond issue.

At its recent session, the Legislature approved an act to authorize the Board of County Commissioners of Seminole County to issue and sell hospital bonds not to exceed \$150,000, and providing for the submission of the issuance of the bonds to qualified freeholders, the notice states.

If the act is approved in the Aug. 19 election, the Commission will have the authority to decide the amount of bonds it will be necessary to issue, and to call another election to approve the issuance of these bonds.

Meanwhile, efforts are being made to secure aid from the PWA in building the hospital through a grant of \$150,000. The project was presented yesterday by PWA Engineer W. C. Tompkins by City and County officials at a meeting at the City Hall.

FWA funds are expected to be allocated primarily to areas whose facilities are crowded because of defense development in their vicinity. It has been pointed out in this connection that a hospital will be even more urgently needed should the new Municipal Airport be expanded by the government, or should an air training school be located here.

Nazis Thrust Within 230 Miles Of Moscow, Capital City, Cross Dnestr River

Reserve Force Is Massed By Soviet

1,000,000 Reported Prepared To Begin Counter-Offensive

Moscow has been made vulnerable to the German offensive by the forcing of Smolensk, Nazi military commentators asserted tonight.

LONDON, (Sunday) July 20. (AP)—Britain claimed today at least a third of the German cities of Meunster and Aachen have been destroyed or seriously damaged by the R. A. F.

The Air Ministry reported more than 120 raids had been made on Germany and Nazi-held territory in the past few weeks.

"Germany's boast is shattered," the ministry said. "The premises made by the prime minister in being fulfilled, and the German people are beginning to appreciate that the war which they hoped to wage on territory other than their own is being brought to their doorstep."

Rounding out the fourth week of the giant offensive against Russia, the German High Command today reported the widening of the Smolensk breach in the Stalin Line facing Moscow.

The Russians, perhaps significantly, omitted the usual claim that they were holding their ground.

While the Nazi armored might thus thrust within 230 miles of the Russian capital from the southwest and part of the United States embassy left Moscow for Kazan in the Tartar Republic, word came from Istanbul that the Russians are holding 4,000,000 men in reserve for the defense of the city.

The source of this report was an Axis diplomat stationed in Moscow until the outbreak of the war. He said this huge reserve force is ready to roll against the Germans in a carefully timed counter-offensive.

The Russians said the full fury of the blitz offensive is concentrated in Smolensk and related sectors.

Berlin announced the crossing by German-Rumanian troops of the Dniester (Dniest) river in a satellite into the Ukraine. The air aid came from Russian Headquarters also claimed an advance on the northern front toward Leningrad.

A dispatch from Vichy said the French had begun parleys with the British over the removal of women and children from French Somaliland, East Africa. This was taken as an indication that Vichy has virtually given up hope of holding that outpost of the Empire against the Allied blockade.

The left wing of a German thrust moving in a great arc on Moscow has reached a point 78 miles northeast of Polotsk, a center of earlier fighting, Moscow acknowledged early today while the Nazis themselves were claiming a sharp continuing advance at the Red center.
