Death Of GI Home Loans Predicted

WASHINGTON—A housing industry spokesman today predicted the death of the GI home loan program if Congress passes pending legislation easing down payment requirements on government-backed loans.
The spokesman for the National Association of Home Builders also said that unless Congress raised the GI interest rate "it means the end of the GI loan."
The administration recently hiked the FHA interest rate from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent but Congress thus far has balked at passing a similar increase in the GI interest rate.
Bills Differ
The Senate and House have both passed slightly different bills easing down payment requirements, and a conference committee composed of members of both chambers is trying to hammer out a compromise acceptable to both.
However, whatever form the compromise takes within the framework of the two bills, it will signal the end of the GI loan.
The NAHB spokesman said the GI interest rate of 4 1/2 per cent "just cannot compete" with the higher FHA rate at present. He said any further liberalization of FHA terms will sound the death knell of the GI loan.
In addition, he pointed out that next year is the end of eligibility for World War II veterans who make up the majority of potential GI loan takers. Korean veterans have about seven more years of eligibility.
Expect Big Spurt
Under the Senate FHA down payment liberalization, housing officials expect a big spurt in the \$15,000—house buying bracket. Most new houses are in this category. The bill calls for a 3 per cent down payment on houses up to \$10,000, 10 per cent on the next \$6,000, and 20 per cent on the next \$4,000.
The House bill differs only in the second, \$6,000 category. Here the down payment need would be 15 per cent instead of 10 per cent.
Under the Senate bill, a \$20,000 house would require a \$210 down payment. A \$15,000 house would call for \$550 down.

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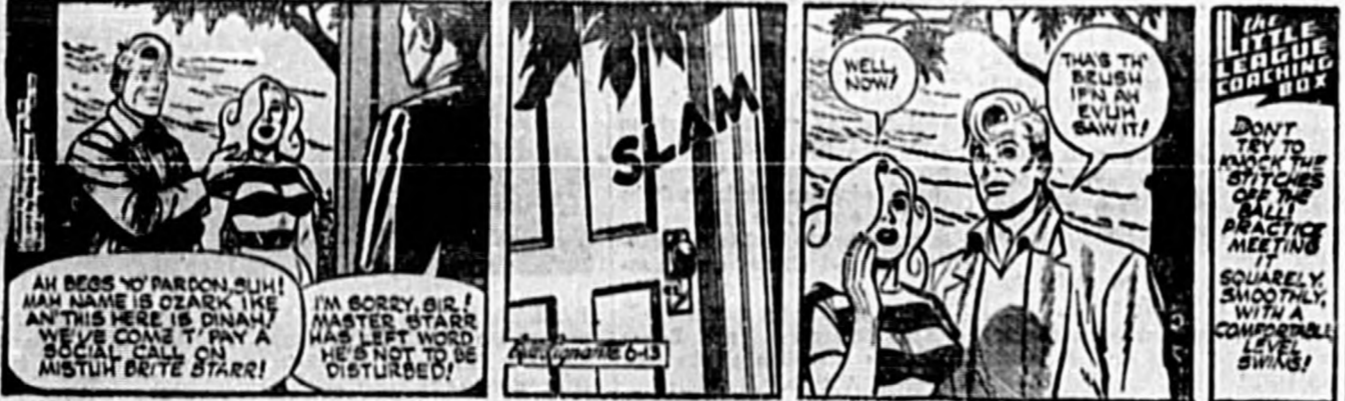

Clothes Help Make TV Commercial

By GAY PAULEY United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK (U.P.)—Clothes which make the woman also help make the television commercial.

Just ask a feminine team of fashion experts, who dress hundreds of models smiling everything from hair rinses to refrigerators via the home screen.

The clothes help create the mood, the setting for the commercial, said the team of Maxwell Gray. But they must never steal the show from the producer.

"Television is acquiring a real fashion sense," the two added. "Here is where the women can be taught, as well as sold."

The two believe today's TV salesgirl is better dressed than a few years ago. The industry has lifted the level of taste along with the neckline.

"Modesty now prevails," said the two. "Today's typical actress-model on TV is fresh faced, well groomed, natural looking—someone the woman at home, who does the buying, can identify herself with."

Breezy-Talking Pair Maxwell Gray, 33-year-old firm composed of Muriel Maxwell, former model, former buyer, former fashion magazine editor, and Jane Gray, former secretary, former buyer and former fashion magazine executive. They make a breezy-talking, hard-working combination.

"We started this business because I broke a leg," said Miss Maxwell. "Jane and I had known each other from our Vogue days. One day, while I was nursing a plaster cast, she dropped over to see me. We got to talking about starting our own business. Next day, Jane rented an office and had stationary printed."

The two call themselves freelance fashion consultants and the outfitting of the girl in the TV commercial is just part of their operation.

"We'll take on just about any job if there's a fee," said Miss Gray. "We plan fashion advertisements, brochures, and even design sketches for a summer uniform for the female personnel of the Navy."

One of two designs the top brass in Washington is considering adopting.

TV Best Fees But their best fees are in TV commercials. The partnership gets anywhere from \$350 to \$1,200 for each assignment. They don't even line up the model—the advertising agency does that.

"We beg, borrow and sometimes buy a model," said Miss Maxwell. "Actually the pair has numerous resources in New York's garment industry, and when clothes are borrowed, it usually means a plug for the designer."

What Maxwell-Gray says doesn't always go in a commercial. "We just suggest to the producer, who has the final say," explained Jane. "On second thought, it's the sponsor who really has the last word."

A broad grin swept over the battle-scarred features of the welterweight champion and, looking up at the "admiral" and his sword, Basilio quipped: "Just like all these fight managers. Ready to take his cut."

Which may explain in part why the one-time onion farmer is hoping today to get an opportunity to destroy a long-time idol.

Carmen Basilio needs a "big pay-day."

Even when you're the champion of the world, it is no guarantee that you are financially "loaded."

And to it is with Basilio, an iron-hard terror in the ring but a butter-soft "touch" on the outside. He has had his share of lucrative fights but the circle of pleading palms is large and Basilio is too nice for his own good.

Basilio Has A Plan
Bringing him face to face with the necessity of blasting aside the man who long has been his fistic idol, Sugar Ray Robinson, another of the mighty who found that the riches of the ring are difficult to retain.

Basilio thinks he can do it, too. "Robinson was one of the great fighters," Basilio analyzed with the admiration of a crowding slugger for the master boxer. "But he has got to be over the hill and I know I can beat him."

There were those who thought that Robinson should never have come back. But he, too, needed money and the old-time hunger revived a certain amount of the ancient talents so that he twice fought his way back to the middleweight title, the last time against another Basilio — type crowd-er named Gene Fulmer.

"He was lucky," Basilio says. "Coming off the ropes he threw a desperation hook and caught Fulmer coming in. Anybody had to go when hit with such a lucky combination. But I saw him in the dressing room 15 minutes later and he still was huffing and puffing."

Five Rounds Of Danger
So Basilio has it worked out in his mind just how he will eat Robinson—if given the chance. "He's dangerous only for four

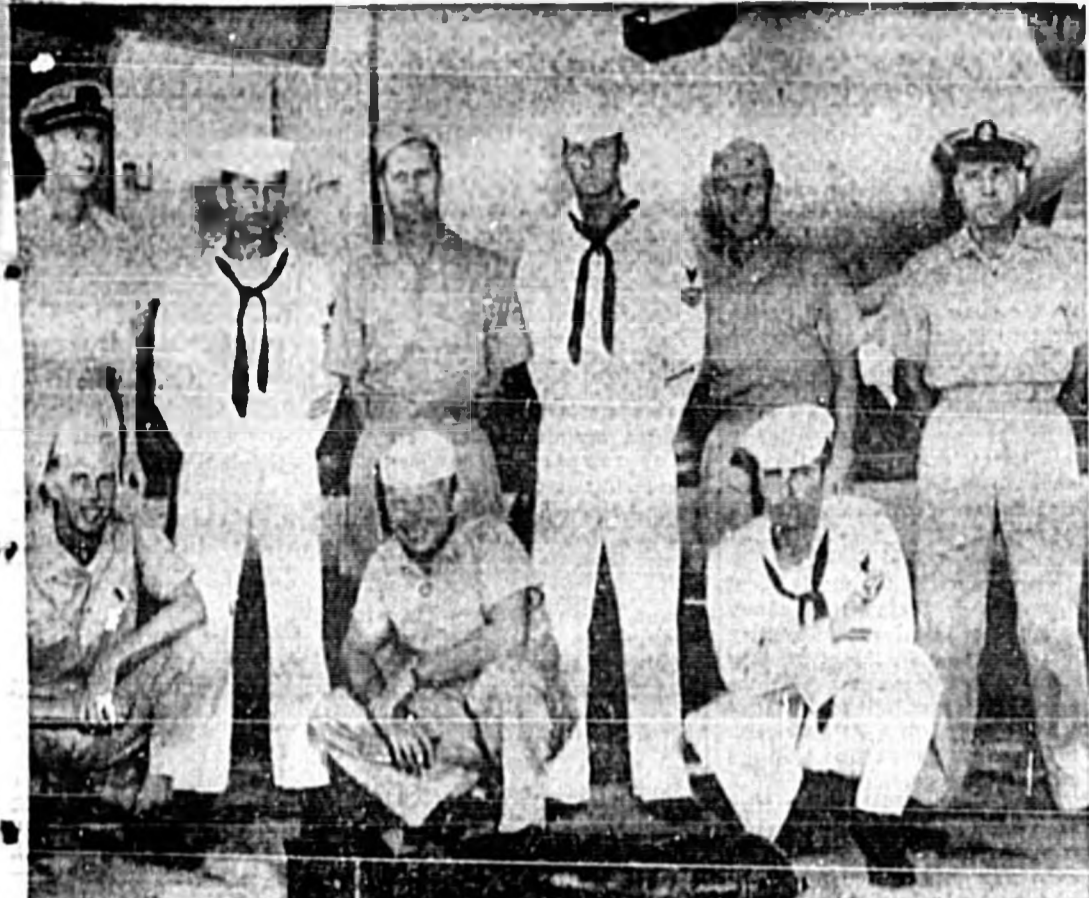

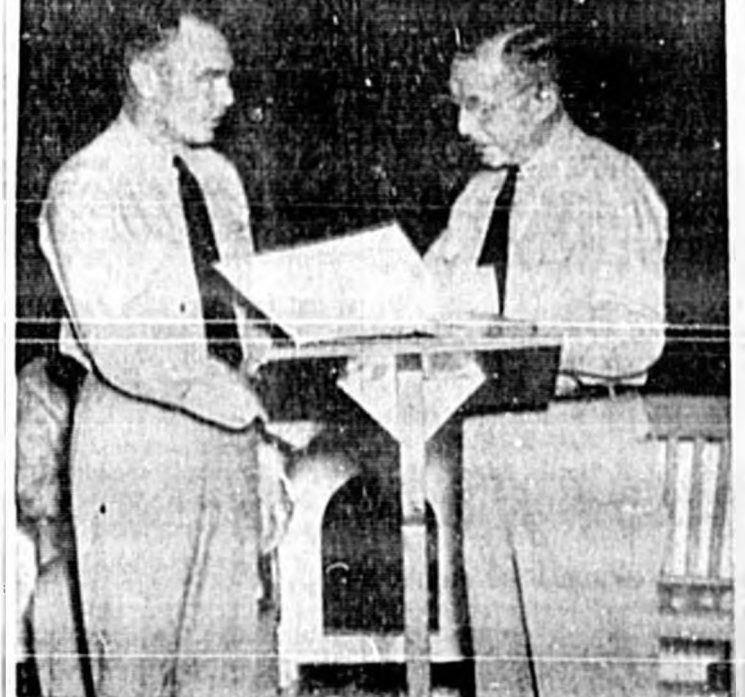
