During the past hour, about 5,000 babies were added to a world population which now numbers approximately two billion 700 million souls. By this time tomorrow, there will be about 120,000 brand new babies on hand. By this date next year, some 43 million will have been added to the great mass of humanity. By the year 2,000 the present world population will have been approximately doubled

These rather startling figures have just been set forth in the United Nations Democraphic Yearbook. They reflect the worldwide reduction in the human death rate, the birth rate has remained stable. The impact of this shift in the birth-death ratio is just beginning to be felt. Its implications for the future are tremendously important.
