Howey Makes Plea For Support Upon Pledge Of Economy

Republican Candidate For Governor Forecasts His Election In Poll Next Month

Says State Costs
Must Be Reduced

Rebukes Opponent For
Playing Politics On
Trip To Storm Area

Declaring that he is opposed by the professional politicians, that state newspapers are refusing to publish his speeches accurately, and that recently the use of courthouses for speech-making purposes had been denied him, William J. Howey, Republican candidate for governor, speaking last night in Sanford for the second time in four weeks, pleaded for support for the prediction of his election in November.

Opening his address, which was cut short because of a severe throat irritation, Mr. Howey pleaded that he is not a first-time speaker, but that he is running on a platform of efficiency and economy in state government. With scarcely more than a million and a half population, Florida paid last year for state expenses \$16,000,000, Mr. Howey said. Such a situation, he declared, cannot long exist because it is not economically sound.

Pointing to another example of what he described as "extraneous expenditures" of public money, Mr. Howey declared that the state has too many circuit judges. From seven in 1914 the number has grown to 40 at the present time. While the population has not jumped proportionately, he declared.

These are some of the reasons, he said, why he is making this plea for support. He said that he is not a politician, but that he is a citizen who is making his plea in behalf of the economy of the state.

AL SMITH WILL START TOUR IN SOUTH MONDAY

Finishing With West Governor Plans To Carry His Campaign To Doubtful Border

Carolina Appears
To Be Unfriendly

Nominee To Exert His
Best Effort To Put
State Back In Line

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 3.—(INS)—The new brown derby which Governor Al Smith brought to Rochester to replace the one he "swapped" for a new dog in Milwaukee was paraded today on the familiar hall car of the executive mansion in Albany.

It will remain there until next Monday when, barring upsets by the national committee, the Democratic nominees will take to the road again—going this time into the border states that are considered doubtful, if not actually inimical to his candidacy. Governor Smith has finished with the West. Win, lose or draw in November, he has made his last appearance by the corn and wheat country during this campaign. The 6,000 mile trip which the Governor completed here last night, reflects the Smith bid for the electoral college, which he will leave behind him on Friday.

His first public statement since his election as chairman of the County Democratic Club, Mr. Howey today addressed his plea to party members in this county.

SARGENT RULING ABOUT POLITICS STIRS INTEREST

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—A ghost came out of the closet of the Justice Department today in the form of an order issued by Attorney General Sargent on Sept. 1, 1932, limiting the political activity of officials and employees.

Also it was learned that Oscar R. Lubring, of Indiana, assistant attorney general at former member of Congress, will be active in the campaign. United States attorneys in Missouri, New Jersey, Montana and Virginia are candidates for public office and none has resigned.
