Secrecy And News

The Department of Defense has given a single director of information control over all news and information to be given to the public by the three armed services.

But other purposes could be served by this control of information. One of the safeguards for the integrity of government is the ability of the people to know what the government is doing.

In some nations, newspapers and the radio are told what they can print. We call that censorship, and we don't like it.

The excuse for putting the order into effect was congressional concern over possible violations of secrecy in published reports that the Air Force has made up a list of strategic bombing targets in Russia.

What Makes A Leader

"All of us can be good leaders some of the time if we learn to be good followers most of the time," declares Dr. Henry C. Link, psychologist and author, in The Reader's Digest for April.

Leaders are made, not born, Dr. Link contends. They attain leadership not by inherited talents but through habits and skills acquired by practice.

Dr. Link notes, however, that "high scholarship may or may not contribute to leadership. The scholar who is also a good leader is doubly equipped, but the two do not necessarily go together."

Most people, no matter what their inheritance, can acquire some of the habits of leadership, the author states. "Almost any skill which a person develops to the point of competence can give him a sense of confidence and a degree of leadership."

Competitive sports and creative work rank high among the activities which produce leadership, Dr. Link says. "Anyone interested in developing his capacities as a leader might well begin with an inventory of how many hours a week he spends in such static pastimes as watching the movies, listening to the radio and just plain sitting."

Warsaw—The Social "freeze" is on in Poland. Both Americans and Britishers are getting the brush-off from the Poles.

But not only are not coming to parties, cocktail affairs and other social events organized by members of the American and British colonies. Many times they don't even trouble to answer "H. S. V. P." invitations.

The answer to anything the government doesn't want to talk about is: "We don't know anything about it. We never heard of it." That is the reply of the government's official spokesman to any inquirer about the social "cold war."

Those of the American embassy who like to entertain complain that it is not a question of setting date and inviting Polish friends. If the American host hopes to attract a Polish guest the procedure is to telephone the Pole and ask him to not the date.

The government's official spokesman says that the Polish military officials in Warsaw are required to get official clearance to attend any Anglo-American affair.

Nevertheless, the brush-off goes on. Colonel Nelson Dingley, the new American military attaché, invited Polish military officials to a cocktail party to meet new members of his staff. Not a single Pole showed up.

Dingley now has been waiting months to meet Marshal Michal Zymierski, minister of national defense. It is supposed that Zymierski is to be in New York for a half-dozen days of the 20th or more invited.

American Ambassador Waldemar J. Gildeman invited representatives of the "young Poland" group to a "get-together" cocktail party at his home. A half-dozen came of the 50 or more invited.

The U. S. Information Service asked students and professors of political science—74 of them—to see a film on how American industry and machinery works. Only seven showed up, and they were not impressed.

The social "freeze" is not confined to the Poles. Sadly lacking are contacts with the personnel of the Russian and other embassies in the "young Poland" group.

The social "cold war" obviously is an outgrowth of the strained international situation. No one doubts that all this would be changed if Generalissimo Stalin were to announce that permanent peace is here and relations with the United States were just dandy.

Poles seem to believe everything they hear from their radio and government chiefs. Virtually everything they hear is anti-American and anti-British.

James Byrnes Lays World Unrest At Russia's Doorstep

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Mar. 24 (AP)—Calling for strong national defense, James F. Byrnes last night laid the world's unrest at Russia's doorstep.

The former Secretary of State spoke at ceremonies awarding him the Veterans' of Foreign Wars National Citizenship Medal.

"Our efforts to make the peace have been futile," Byrnes declared. He urged America to adopt some form of universal military training, continue the production of atomic bombs and quickly ratify the North Atlantic Pact.

"It is regrettable we must talk of war, but it is nearly four years since the cessation of hostilities in Europe. Today there is no peace," Byrnes said.

He said the Soviets have "violated many solemn agreements with us," and added: "The present government of the Soviet Union will keep the peace as long as it is in their interest to do so. It will be in their interest to keep the peace as long as American stands firm and keeps strong."

HENDRICK DIES NEW YORK, Mar. 24 (AP)—Burton J. Hendrick, 77, author who won Pulitzer prizes in biography and history, died yesterday at Roosevelt hospital.

Hendrick's writing career began toward the end of the last century when he served as editor of the New York (Comm.) Morning News. Later he joined the staff of the New York Evening Post and McClure's Magazine. For 11 years he was associate editor of the magazine World's Work.

(Continued From Page One) Stephen Liebtbau, river forecaster of the U. S. Weather Bureau in New Orleans, said:

"I don't understand it (the break). The river has been higher than it is now every year, at least since 1943. In 1945 it went over 40 feet at that point."

Port Allen is a town of about 3,500. The area being flooded is occupied almost entirely by sugar plantations. It is sparsely populated.

Rate of the advance of the water was difficult to determine immediately. Sheriff's officers said nothing could be done to check the spread of the flood until it reached comparatively higher ground. At 7:00 A. M. the water was about 2-1/2 miles from Port Allen.

The U. S. Army engineers rushed men to the scene.

Estimates of the size of the break varied. Three hours after the break, deputies reported water going through a gap 200 feet wide, with the levee crumbling on either side.

Sheriff Sidney C. Dubroccas of Baton Rouge Parish (county), with Sheriff Bryan Clements of East Baton Rouge and their deputies, were patrolling the roads and helping evacuate residents.

A number of persons were seen walking along the roads carrying belongings.

Frank McClure of Baton Rouge, R. A. Cross field representative in charge of the mid-state area, was supervising relief activities along with Mrs. Lila Brown, executive secretary of the West Baton Rouge chapter.

Damage to the sugar cane crop, livestock and other property was expected to run into hundreds of thousands of dollars. Army Engineers said it would take at least a week to close the gap.

Governor Earl K. Long called upon all state departments to render every possible assistance and went to the scene himself. Col. John R. Hardin, district U. S. Engineer at New Orleans, came up to supervise the repair work.

The Coast Guard sent 20 boats to the area from New Orleans, Galveston, Tex., and Biloxi, Miss. It also dispatched a communications truck to facilitate radio contact. Army helicopters were reported enroute from San Antonio, Texas.

(Continued From Page One) that destroys and corrupts, the doctrine that assails both the dignity of man and the morality of God."

He took note of some earlier talk of cutting funds for Britain, commenting:

"We must conclude that any substantial cut in dollar aid to Britain would be a tragic mistake. It would seriously retard British and European recovery. The estimated British requirements for dollar aid next year already represent a 24 per cent cut over last year, compared with a 15 per cent reduction for ERP countries as a whole."

He also tried to calm any Senate fear that aid to The Netherlands might contribute toward military operations in Indonesia.

"According to our information," he said, "the Dutch have not incurred heavy military expenditures, either in dollars or in other resources, in excess of their expenditures in that area prior to Dec. 31."

Daughters Should Know 'What's Cookin'

If you want your daughter to know "what's cookin'" when she's



a teen-ager, you'd better show her the way around the kitchen when she's a very little girl.

According to Miss Mary Agnes Davis and Miss Natalie K. Fitch, home economics experts at Teachers College, Columbia University, children display their first interest in the culinary arts at an early age. If mothers don't take advantage of this childish curiosity, older years may be too late to awaken enthusiasm for cooking.

"Even a small boy or girl," Dr. Fitch points out, "can help to scrub potatoes before baking and can lay the next step might be to break eggs that are going to be scrambled or to grease a pan for a cake. A five-year-old girl can follow a simple muffin recipe side by side with her mother and compare the finished products. Boys should not be discouraged from cooking on the ground that it is for 'sissies' since this type of activity may provide a very happy outlet for their energies, and develop an appreciation of their mother's role in the kitchen."

It is a mistake to give a child too many kitchen responsibilities too early, these authorities agree. "Children will easily learn how to set the table and clear away the dishes in their early years through a sense of orderly accomplishment is a great satisfaction."

Later on a girl may be given the responsibility of planning and executing an entire meal by herself, including the marketing, food preparation, serving and cleaning-up. Both Mrs. Fitch and Miss Davis stress that cleaning-up should be part of the learning process. They feel that children should learn to keep the kitchen tidy as they go along, peeling vegetables into a paper, immediately putting saucers to soak, using crumpled paper to wipe out the frying pan before washing it, and employing other household "shortcuts."

Both experts urge families to look upon mealtimes as social events. They frown on the "out-and-run" and "installment" method of serving meals. Children should be encouraged to observe simple table etiquette as early as possible and on occasion teenagers should be given an opportunity to act as host and hostess.

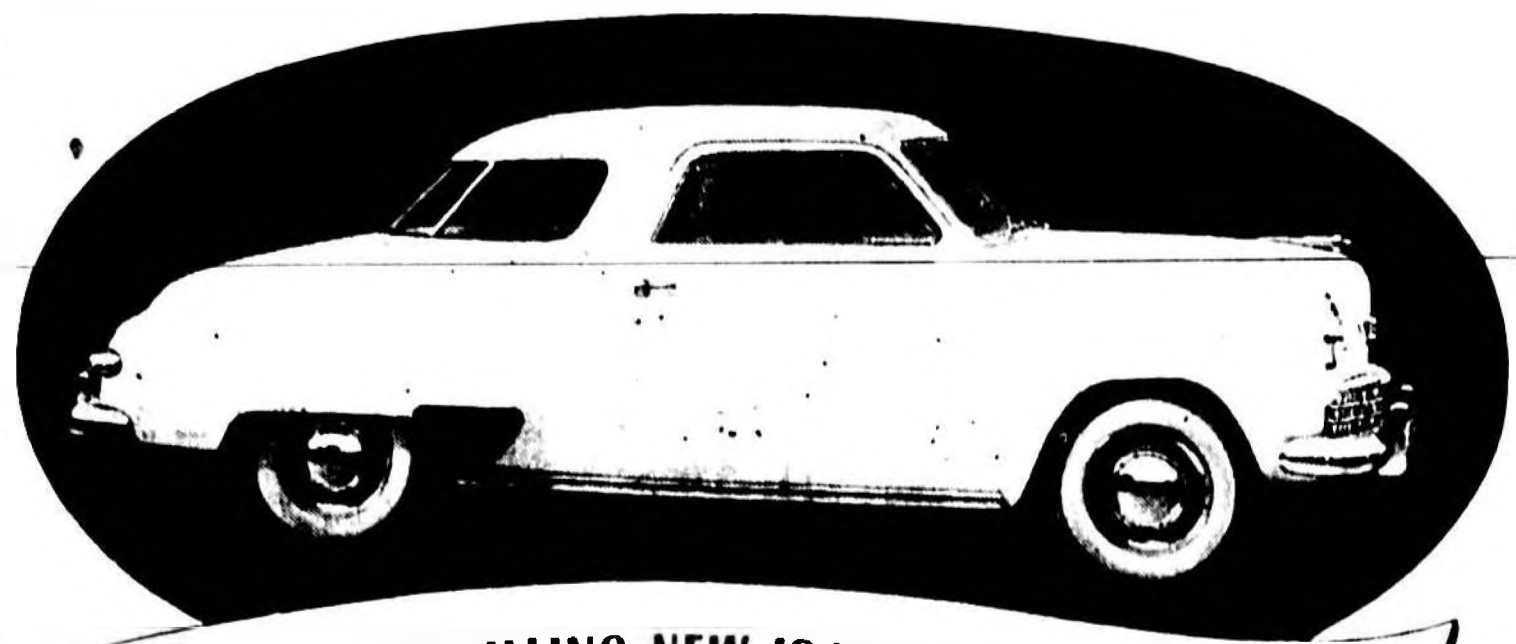

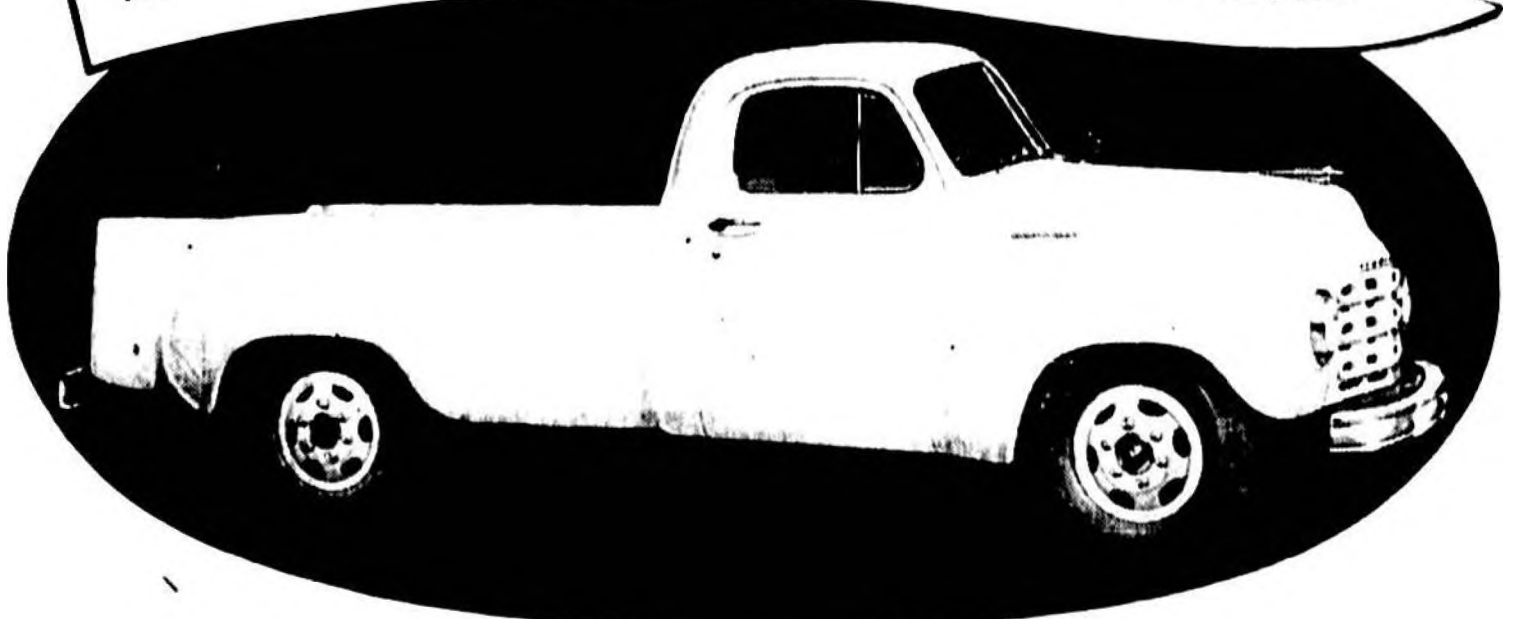

(Continued From Page One) then the Secretary of Defense's control over the military establishment. Forrestal said the chief objection likely to be raised is that it would concentrate too much power in the Secretary.

Recalling that when the unification act was before Congress in 1947 he had doubts on the same score, Forrestal said that experience has changed his mind. He went on:

"I am now convinced that there are adequate checks and balances inherent in our governmental structure to prevent misuse of the broad authority which I feel must be vested in the Secretary of Defense.

"I am also convinced that a failure to endow this official with sufficient authority to control effectively the conduct of our military affairs will force upon us far greater security risks than will be the case if singleness of control and responsibility are achieved."

Forrestal said the proposed bill would give the Secretary of Defense no powers which the President does not already have.

Although Forrestal is leaving government service, President Truman said last night that he had promised to come back in case of emergency.

Tallahassee Approves Hooded Groups Ban

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 24—(AP)—Tallahassee's anti-Klan ordinance became effective today, less than two weeks before Governor Warren is expected to ask the Legislature for a state-wide ban on hooded organizations.

The Capital City law does not mention the Klan specifically. It prohibits masked or hooded persons from appearing on city streets or other public property. Only children wearing masquerade costumes are exempted.

Enactment of the ordinance stemmed from a southern Klan motor parade past the state Capitol Jan. 27.
