#### American Education

When we read the other day that only ten percent of the 300,000,000 people of India can read and write, we realized how great is the task of spreading democracy throughout the world, and how far superior to other countries is the American system of free enterprise. Here over 97 percent of the people can read and write, and their education is provided largely, if not entirely, at the taxpayer's a .m expense.

As this is American Education Week, it might be a good time to consider some of the advantages and disadvantages of our public school system. We have in this country an enrollment of some 35,000,000 pupils, but there are also at least four million children between the ages of five and seventeen who are not attending any school. We have 25,000 trained elementary school teachers who are doing a good job, but 75,000 more are needed.

These are but a few of the figures which come to mind when we consider American education. We have the finest public schools in the world. They are doing a grand job. But they are not good enough; not good enough for Americans who demand perfection in everything. During this week parents all over America will be finding out more about their public schools and will be thinking and planning for the future so that they may know what can be done to improve the schools of their children.

But American education should not stop with the public school system or with the earning of a high school diploma. It should go on through college and through life. The person, who thinks he is educated because he has graduated from college and can hang a diploma on his wall. is not educated. Education is a continuing process which goes on year after year throughout life. Once the struggle for more knowledge is abandoned, ignorance sets in, and education is lost.

Listening on the radio the other night we heard three adults fail to win a valuable prize because 1) One didn't now who the Chief Justice of the United State Supreme Court is, 2) Another didn't know who the Postmaster General is, and 3) Another didn't know who the Republican iominee for President was in 1940. A recent nationwide soll showed that 59 percent of the people questioned had never heard of the Hoover Commission Reports, and only 18 percent of them knew what their purpose was.

Such figures prove clearly there is much still to be lone in the field of education right here in this country ven though Americans are the best informed people it the World.

#### On Self-Government

One of the basic ideas for which the United Nations tands is that every people should have the right to selfovernment. But it is no easy matter to draw the line beween a people entitled to this right and a people who are imply part of a larger nation, and bound irrevocably to it. he Chinese Communists have invaded Tibet. They have dso told India, seeking to intercede, that Tibet is a part of hina and the affair is strictly Chinese. In this they are jot original. The Dutch said amuething of the same sort shout Indonesia, and the French would probably say it to unyone who sought to intercede now in Indochina,

Is the argument sound? Tibetans are not Chinese, and fillet was brought under Chinese rule only in 1720. The easy for some of us Democrats to cut was accomplished by the Manchus, who less than a entury before had taken over China after being asked for ielp in putting down a revolt against the Ming dymosty. Vhen the Manchus were overthrown in 1911, Chinese garisons were driven out of Tibet, and only in the past two teendes had Tibet shown any inclination to accept a reewal of the tie with China.

Does this history make Tibet a part of China, as the leds and other Chinese rulers have claimed? The Tibetans hemselves are divided on the question. Similar questions vill arise wherever the doctrine of self-determination is adranced, and America is pledged to advance it. We need a asis for deciding what is a domestic affair and what an aternational one.

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
