Humphrey And Muskie Will Stump Florida

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Democratic presidential nominee Hubert H. Humphrey is scheduled to campaign in Florida this week. His running mate, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, will be right behind him.

Humphrey is scheduled for a rally, news conference and television taping in Jacksonville Wednesday. Thursday will find him in Tampa.

Muskie is scheduled to visit Miami Oct. 8 for what campaign workers called a major policy address. Earlier that day Muskie plans to campaign in the Tampa-St. Petersburg area.

There are tentative plans for Muskie to attend a reception and rally at War Memorial Auditorium in Fort Lauderdale.

In a speech prepared for delivery at the Miami Tabernacle here, the vice president criticized both ends of the political spectrum.

"There are people today who made their basic appeal to the baser instincts—to fear, to racial prejudice, to escapism, to the darker side of the human character. They are dangerous."

"These are the words he has used repeatedly to describe the Wallace campaign, though he did not name the former Alabama governor in his text."

Then Humphrey went on to denigrate youths "who are preaching the doctrine of opportunity, progress and justice." He concluded that "America shall prevail."

He barely mentioned his Republican opponent, Richard M. Nixon, in his text.

Tonight Humphrey will deliver his first nationally televised speech, a major foreign policy statement, including Vietnam.

"The Democratic party has purchased 30 minutes of prime time on all television stations of the National Broadcasting Co.—at 7:30 p.m. locally except in the Central Time Zone."

Crime Fighting Ideas Proposed By Nixon

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. (AP)—Richard M. Nixon has entered a new phase of his presidential campaign, spelling out the details of his programs for the first time and emphasizing the attack on his foes.

The Republican nominee announced Sunday his crime fighting proposals, calling for creation of a national academy of police and a high-level national crime fighting council.

The day before, he dealt with the problems of the aged, pledging cost-of-living increases in Social Security benefits.

In both statements, Nixon, his hard at his Democratic opponent, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. And he is now dealing openly in speeches with his other foe, George C. Wallace, the American Independent party candidate.

"We are picking up in both fire and substance," said an aide. "We are now filling out the programs. You'll also notice the tempo of the attack picking up."

In the future, he said, Nixon will be announcing the details of his proposals on taxes, inflation, veterans problems and other issues.

On Vietnam, the aide said, Nixon's plans "depend on what happens in the negotiation."

"Under the stewardship of the present administration," he said, "crime and violence have skyrocketed in America."

He attacked Humphrey's recent white paper on crime, saying it advocated programs that are already in the law.



Battleship New Jersey In War

SAIGON (AP)—The New Jersey, the first American battleship to see action since the Korean War, entered the Vietnam conflict today by bombarding North Vietnamese positions in the northern half of the demilitarized zone.

The 56,000-ton vessel, three times as long as a football field, turned her 16-inch guns on enemy gun positions and bunkers, three bunkers and scattered supplies.

"The battleship burst her 2.75-pound missiles into the enemy positions from her battle station in the Tonkin Gulf."

During her first mission, an aerial reporter reported that four automatic weapons sites that were firing at his aircraft were destroyed. Thirty yards of trenchline were collapsed and a road was cut in two places as the huge projectiles, which can penetrate 30 feet of reinforced concrete, slammed into the positions.

A Navy spokesman said that on her second mission of the day, the New Jersey destroyed an enemy artillery position and three bunkers and scattered supplies.

"Apparently the New Jersey's chief mission will be to try to knock out heavily fortified North Vietnamese gun emplacements along the demilitarized zone that have withstood counterfire from the allies and aerial attacks."

These emplacements, some dug deep into hillsides, contain big Soviet-built artillery pieces which have been harassing allied camps along the frontier including Con Thien, Gio Linh, and Dong Ha, headquarters of the U.S. 3rd Marine Division and a vital operational base for the DMZ.

The DMZ is 37 miles long, but most of the enemy's artillery emplacements fall within the 25-mile range of the New Jersey's nine 16-inch guns.

Within minutes the New Jersey can lay down a nine-gun broadside roughly equivalent to half the bomb load of a B-52 bomber.

On her first day in action the New Jersey fired 20 rounds of 2,700-pound shells from her 16-inch guns and 45 rounds of smaller shells from her 5-inch guns into targets eight miles inland. The Navy declined to disclose the results.

HHH Sounds Warning

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Hubert H. Humphrey pictured the nation today as facing potential destruction from extremists of left and right and declared, "No democracy can stand for it."

The Democratic presidential candidate, who flew here Sunday after two noisy confrontations with organized hecklers in the Pacific Northwest, made it clear that his denunciation of extremism applied not only to them but to the forces of third party candidate George C. Wallace and to Negro revolutionaries.

Humphrey, faced with speech-disrupting shouts from some 200 young antiwar activists in Seattle Saturday night, tried to quiet them by letting one of their leaders address the clearly pro-Humphrey audience. The tactic failed, and in the end, the demonstrators were ejected from the packed Civic Center by a police force of 4,000.

More than a dozen resisters protested who steered them out, with a brief but violent uproar ensuing.

CHICAGO (AP)—George C. Wallace pointed his presidential campaign at the North this week, aiming at industrial states and Democratic and Republican voters.

An open-house march there on Sept. 4, 1966, drew police, National Guardsmen and crowds of brick and bullet hurlers.

Cicero officials first denied them granted Wallace a permit to speak there. However, they denied him use of City Hall property and limited his parade route.

Fortas Given Little Chance

WASHINGTON (AP)—Abe Fortas' bruised and battered nomination to be chief justice is being given little chance for Senate confirmation, even by some supporters.

Sen. Joseph Tydings said Sunday an attempt to kill a filibuster against Fortas' appointment will fall when it comes up Tuesday.

"The filibuster will succeed" in keeping the Senate from voting on the nomination itself, the Maryland Democrat said.

Tydings' assessment came in a week of drawing support from both major parties in Chicago, workers' suburbs and industrial communities downtown.

Wallace, resuming his vote wooing after a week of rest and conferences with advisers in Montgomery, Ala., plans to proceed from Chicago to Cicero to Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey.

Study Set For Sub Teachers

Prospective and present substitute teachers in the elementary schools in Seminole County are being offered a course of study in orientation and training which is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. Thursday in the library at Pine Crest School in Sanford.

The text will be "Engineering-Technical Drafting and Graphics," by Giachino and Bestema, published by American Technical Society. A wide range of equipment and reference books will be available for student use.

Jax, Duval Becomes U. S. Biggest City

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Two local governments will be detailed in ceremonies Tuesday to make Jacksonville Florida's most populous city and the most sprawling in the nation.

The consolidation of Jacksonville with Duval County will be marked with fireworks and a barbecue.

"We are going to eliminate two complete layers of government — department heads and the mayor and all the duplication and lack of planning inherent in them," said Mayor Hans Tamm, who will head the combined administration.

"We will replace this with what we feel will be a more streamlined, sensitive, responsible form of government where the responsibility can be clearly traced and the buck cannot be passed."

Tamm believes the consolidation will increase efficiency through central purchasing, data processing, a professional team of department heads and the "intangible asset of a new birth of enthusiasm and pride; a willingness to become involved in the average citizen's part."

The combining of the city and county took 36 years. The effort began in 1931 when the Better Government Association was formed. In 1932 a constitutional amendment authorized the move, but county voters turned it down.

The original state authorization, however, formed the basis for Tuesday's action. Grand jury indictments against 23 public officials prompted formation of the better government group in 1931. Last year voters in the county — except residents of these small cities and one town — approved consolidation after 10 more city and county officials were indicted.

The combining of administration and territory makes Jacksonville the largest city in Florida with half a million residents. In addition, it becomes the largest in land area ahead of Oklahoma City which claims 632 square miles and Los Angeles with 453 square miles. Jacksonville now will cover 706 square miles. The Swedish town of Kiruna covers the largest land area of any municipal city in the world.

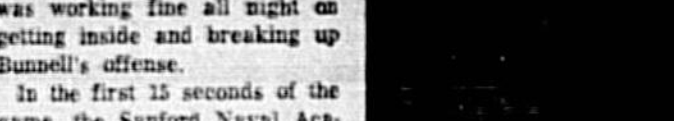

How do you tell the difference between "wild" leather and "tame" leather? According to the Leather Industries of America wild leather has a soft gloved or waxy feel to it and is found in natural colors, tan, brown, beige and black. In addition, the original markings of the hide are highlighted. Very often the natural leather is antiqued for variety and drama. Artfully stained browns have great eye appeal and off-white and light-tan suggest parchment-like shading.

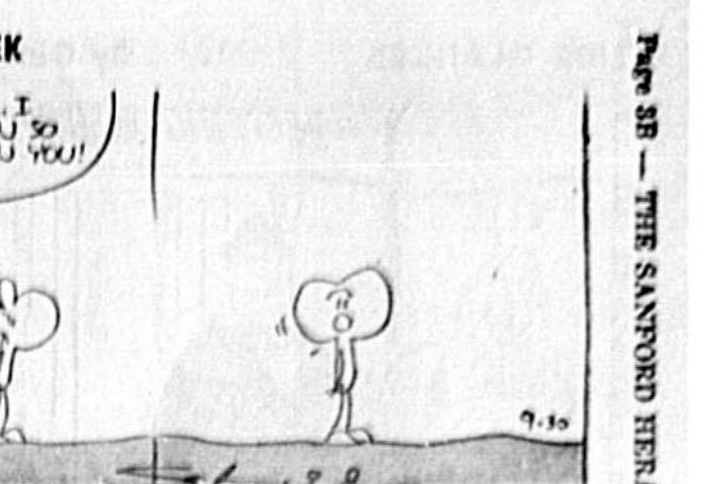
