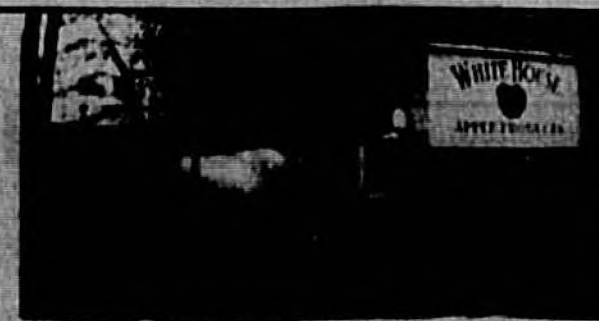

Smoke gets in your skies

Concern grows for safety of bike paths

Instructor arrested
LAKE MARY - The Florida Department of Law Enforcement has charged Gordon Lesley Barkley with official misconduct, a third degree felony, and falsifying records, a first degree misdemeanor, for his connection with fraudulent criminal activities at Seminole Community College.

Barkley, 49, a former SCC instructor, was arrested Wednesday night by Lake Mary police at his residence, 176 Franklin Road.

The charges against Barkley stem from his alleged attempts to inflate student enrollment numbers at SCC in an effort to fraudulently receive additional program funds from the U.S. Department of Labor, U.S. Department of Education and Florida Department of Education.

He has been taken to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility pending the FDLE's continued investigation.

Thick smoke wafts from Volusia, state bans fireworks

SEMINOLE COUNTY - A thick shroud of smoke blanketing Seminole County Thursday prompted the Public Safety Department to issue a statement concerning the number of 9-1-1 calls regarding smoke. The smoke is actually coming from Volusia County fires but struck Seminole and Orange counties because of a change in the wind direction.

The department statement urges people to take extra caution, and only phone 9-1-1 if an actual fire is seen.

Fire update

CENTRAL FLORIDA - The Florida Division of Emergency Management, along with the FEMA, the Division of Forestry and the U.S. Forest Service have released the latest information on the fires which continue to plague several areas of the state. The report says new fires are starting daily, primarily from lightning.

As of 10 a.m. today, statistics reported 62 new fires from midnight June 24 until midnight June 25. Since June 1, there have been 1,110 fires. Please see Fire, Page 2A

WINTER SPRINGS - With all the positive work and talk lately on recreational areas such as Trails and Bikeways, it's hard to believe there could be any negative aspect to them, but indeed there is, according to the Metroplan coordinator.

There is a growing concern among cyclists and others that some of these bikeways are located too close to roadways, causing an increasing number of associated accidents.

Such is the belief of Mike Wilson. He is a bicycle pedestrian coordinator with Metroplan, the regional authority on transportation, coordination and planning. Says Wilson, "It's a misguided attempt to provide for bicyclists."

Though planners and engineers mean well in trying to get cyclists out of harm's way, they may be putting them in it, according to Wilson. To put it simply, when a bike path is put next to a roadway, especially one with many cross streets and driveways, there can be a visual problem for both motorists and cyclists.

"When you put a facility next to a roadway, you are encouraging half of the cyclists to travel facing traffic. That places cyclists outside the normal scanning patterns of motorists. A roadway in the paved surface for vehicles, a sidewalk is not part of the roadway," Wilson said.

Because the engineers and planners don't often think of bike paths as a facility for vehicles, they can Please see Briefs, Page 2A

Cybermom linked to outstanding warrants, vanishes after delivery

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County Sheriff's Office has a particular interest in the lady known for her worldwide broadcast on the Internet last week. The Sheriff's Office has reason to believe that the "Internet Mom" could, in fact, be Elizabeth Oliver, 40, a woman with 5 misdemeanor warrants for her arrest in Seminole County.

"Elizabeth Oliver and the Internet Mom could be one in the same," said Chief Deputy Steve Harriett of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Harriett said there are certain consistencies between the 2 females.

Warrants could be coming out of other counties but nothing is certain as of yet. "None of this can be confirmed at this time," said Harriett. The chief deputy also said that Oliver's husband, Gilberto, 43, is also wanted on a warrant. Seminole County has assigned a detective on the case full time.

When asked why Oliver, if she is the Internet Mom, would risk being discovered, Harriett said that "either she forgot that she was a wanted person or it didn't concern her very much." The Internet mother gave birth to a baby boy named

Sean. The birth was called "historical" as the baby was delivered live on the Web at the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women.

The warrants are for worthless checks ranging from 1990 to 1991, according to Harriett. Orange County Sheriff's Office Police Information Officer, Jim Solomons, said that there are 9 warrants for Sara Oliver, which could be an alias for Elizabeth Oliver. Solomons said that Sara Oliver has a record in Orange dating back to May 5, 1991, where she was charged with knowingly writing a worthless check. Gilberto Oliver also has a record with a contempt of court and 3 cases of obtaining property by worthless check.

Both agencies have had no luck in locating the Olivers. When asked if Orange County checked into hospital records for the Internet Mom, Solomons said "As far as we could go". Solomons said that the National Enquirer tabloid newspaper tipped off police. The tabloid had been supposedly tipped by an ex-wife of Gilberto.

Judging between the video of the Olivers and the mug shots, Solomons said, "The resemblance is uncanny. I'm 90% sure that it's them." Harriett said, "It's one of the most unique scenarios I've heard of since I've been in law enforcement."

Environmentalists host country barbecue, live entertainment

CHULUOTA - Hot fun is scheduled for Saturday as the Coalition for Responsible Econlochatchee Development, Inc. presents its second annual country barbecue.

Chicken, slow beans, and beverages are on the menu and organizer Mike Rich said fans will cool the large "creek" tents that will be erected in the parking lot of the Fishing Pier, located at State Road 418 and Lake Mills Road, 1/4-mile east of Chuluota.

C-FED is sponsoring the

barbecue to raise funds to support the mission of the not-for-profit organization. The group promotes responsible long term planning and development in the Econ River basin, to better balance environmental and growth issues.

"This is kind of an annual thing," said Rich. More than 400 meals were served last year and Rich anticipates a better turnout this year despite the heat and the rain.

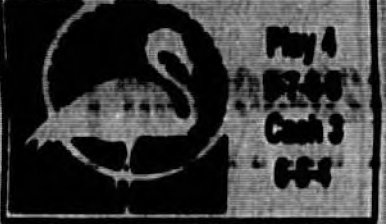

There are 2,500 varieties of apples grown in the U.S.

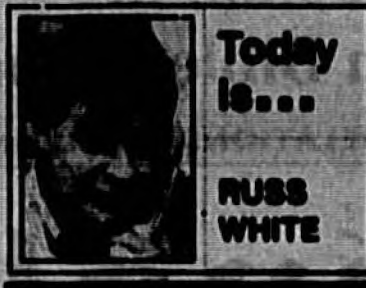

The Miracle Worker, a play celebrating Keller's life, will be performed during the festival and on the 5 weekends to follow.

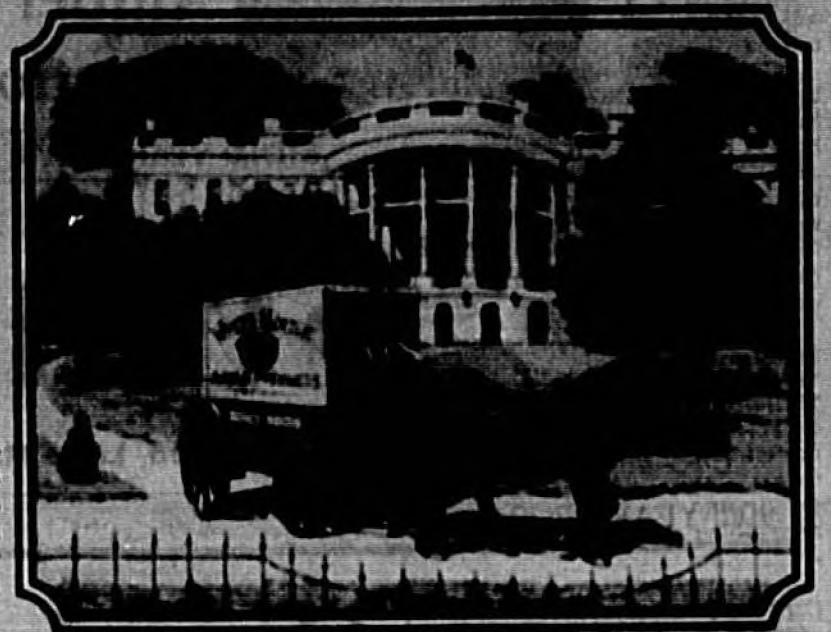
Helen Keller was born in 1880 and died in 1968.

ments such as Live Oak Reserve, on the south side of S.R. 419, and Flying Seminole Ranch/River Oaks, on the north side of the road.

Recently C-RED settled with the city of Oviedo, the Florida Department of Community Affairs and the developer, Richland Properties, prior to an administrative hearing on a future land use amendment for the Flying Seminole Ranch property. The amendment would allow for a 10-acre residential subdivision on the 100-acre site. The amendment also would increase the density and intensity of development in violation with county planning laws. The

Rich wrote in the recent C-RED newsletter that the settlement "is significant in that it is one of the few examples where additional restrictions have been imposed upon a project."

The group of environmentalists and homeowners continues to challenge the development of Live Oaks Reserve and filed for a hearing regarding the planned expansion of Florida Water Services' water treatment plant. The plant is located on the north side of the road. "We feel that the expansion will increase the density and intensity of development in violation with county planning laws. The

East Rural Area was designated, as part of Seminole County's comprehensive land plan, in 1991 and states that Chuluota is an area of "specific rural character, rather than an area intended to be urbanized."

In planning the barbecue, Rich said, "The biggest thing, of course, is to get the community involved." Besides purchasing a meal and possibly a C-RED T-shirt, Rich said the public needs to show up to voice their support.

"This is a long term process," Rich said. "We'll be doing this for years. We've spent thousands of dollars and we'll continue to spend thousands of dollars."

cue will be provided by the rock and roll band, Wide Open. There will also be free children's entertainment, pony rides, face painting, a bake sale and raffles.

On the T-shirts is a picture of 4-week-old Florida panther cubs, featured recently at several library programs, born in captivity at a compound in Christmas. C-RED mugs, tote bags and other items will also be available.

The barbecue at noon and 6:00 p.m. is \$5.00 for adults and \$4.95 for children under 12. Beer and wine will be sold separately.

When washing with an antibacterial soap, a very small amount of antibacterial ingredient is deposited on the skin that keeps the number of germs at a significantly reduced level for an extended period of time. Washing with plain soap initially removes some germs, but the germs left on the hands can quickly re-grow and increase in number.

Q. What germs do antibacterial soaps kill?
A. Antibacterial soaps kill or inhibit bacteria that cause odor, skin infections, food poisoning, intestinal illnesses and other commonly transmitted diseases. Their effectiveness depends on the antibacterial ingredient, its concentration, its contact time on the skin and other product formulation.

Q. Who should use antibacterial soaps?
A. Antibacterial soaps provide extra protection against bacteria that may cause many common illnesses. Consumers looking for additional protection before preparing and eating meals, after using the bathroom, diapering a child, after playing with a pet or when caring for the sick may want to use an antibacterial soap.

Q. Are deodorant soaps the same as antibacterial soaps?
A. No. A Deodorant soap is a cosmetic product intended for washing the body to eliminate odors. A deodorant soap may not contain an ingredient that kills or inhibits the growth of odor-causing bacteria.

Q. Why are so many antibacterial soaps on the market now?
A. Soaps intended to kill or inhibit the growth of odor-causing bacteria have been marketed since the 1920s. Greater consumer concern over

health risks from germs has generated increased demand for new antibacterial hand and body wash products.

Q. What is the purpose of a combination dishwashing liquid and antibacterial hand soap?
A. Dishwashing liquids that are also antibacterial hand cleansers provide protection to consumers who use a hand dishwashing liquid to wash their hands at the kitchen sink.

Q. What is triclosan?
A. Triclosan is an antimicrobial ingredient that is used in many hand and body wash products. In antibacterial soaps, it is regulated by the Food and Drug Administration as an over-the-counter (OTC) drug. Triclosan has been used safely in personal care products for more than 30 years.

Q. What other active ingredients are used in antibacterial soaps?
A. Triclocarban, chloroxylenol (also known as PCMX) and alcohol are three other commonly used ingredients.

Q. Is there a link between the use of antibacterial soaps and increased resistance to antibiotics?
A. A group of experts convened by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently looked at this question and found no evidence to support it.

Baptist convention addresses issues of the family

SALT LAKE CITY-Messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention (composed of 15,891,514 members-the largest Protestant denomination in America) in their annual meeting added a statement on the family to their 35 year-old statement of faith.

The news scene exploded with the NBA playoff (Utah Jazz), and the Baptists invading the Mormon-dominated city where the world headquarters of the Mormon Church is located.

Many and sundry issues were worthy of "news releases." Among them were the Disney boycott and "the dark side of Disney," prayer for President Clinton's moral leadership, Mormon beliefs, criticism of the national Endowment for the Arts and the Public Broadcasting System for using "tax dollars...to ridicule, attack, debate and undermine" evangelical Christianity and others.

The issue, however, which drew almost immediate national attention came from the proposal on "The Family"-specifically the biblical teaching that a "wife is to submit...to her husband." The proposal on "The Family" outlines the roles of husbands, wives and children. The "wives submission" came to the forefront in national news.

A portion of the statement reads: "Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel for sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race."

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God. Both bear God's image but each in differing ways. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to his people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church

willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being 'in the image of God' as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing their household and nurturing the next generation."

Women speak

"While some women recoil at the idea of submitting to their husbands, respect for God's Word and trust in his wisdom should convince them to follow God's plan for the family," said the two women who helped draft the statement on family adopted by messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting June 9 in Salt Lake City.

"It doesn't take a scholar to be able to interpret what is clearly laid out in God's blueprint for the family," Mary Mohler, a homemaker from Louisville, Ky., whose husband, Al, is president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. "Submit is not a negative word. It may be a politically incorrect word. It may not be a popular word. But it is a biblically correct word and that is what counts."

"One reason you find rejection and animosity toward the term is that few people understand what biblical submission is," Dorothy Patterson, a homemaker from

Wake Forest, N.C., whose husband, Paige, is president of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and the newly elected president of the Southern Baptist Convention.

"Submission is a voluntary thing, a 'lining up under'-that's what the word literally means-so there is no forced aspect to the word in the biblical sense," Patterson said. "And with the husband, too. In headship there is a lot of responsibility in making decisions."

"In a world where couples may find themselves reversing traditional family roles-often because they feel it is a necessity-husbands and wives have to seriously weigh what price they are willing to pay to follow God's guidelines for the family," Patterson said.

"If you come under Scripture, that does limit you," she said. "It gives you a particular set of guidelines. There is a measure by which you just have to trust the Lord, that if He gave you those guidelines He will see you through."

Patterson related that a family that is always trying to decide who is going to make the decision and who is going to submit is headed for chaos.

"I think the Lord knew us very well because he created us," Patterson said. "He gave us a plan that wasn't dependent on perfect circumstances or perfect people. What He did do was just say to us, 'Do it.'"

"Respect for the Bible as God's Word is all a wife needs to resolve the issue of submission, Mohler said.

Because she approaches the topic convinced the Bible is "the infallible, inherent and sufficient Word of God, it's not my prerogative to go through and start cutting and slashing passages," she said. "I accept the entire canon as true."

"I submit to the leadership of my husband in our home, not because it is a command for Al Mohler, but because it is a command from almighty God to me as a Christian woman. My glad acceptance of that role says absolutely nothing about my gifts or my abilities or my intelligence, but it says everything about my willingness to be obedient to the commands given to me in Scripture."

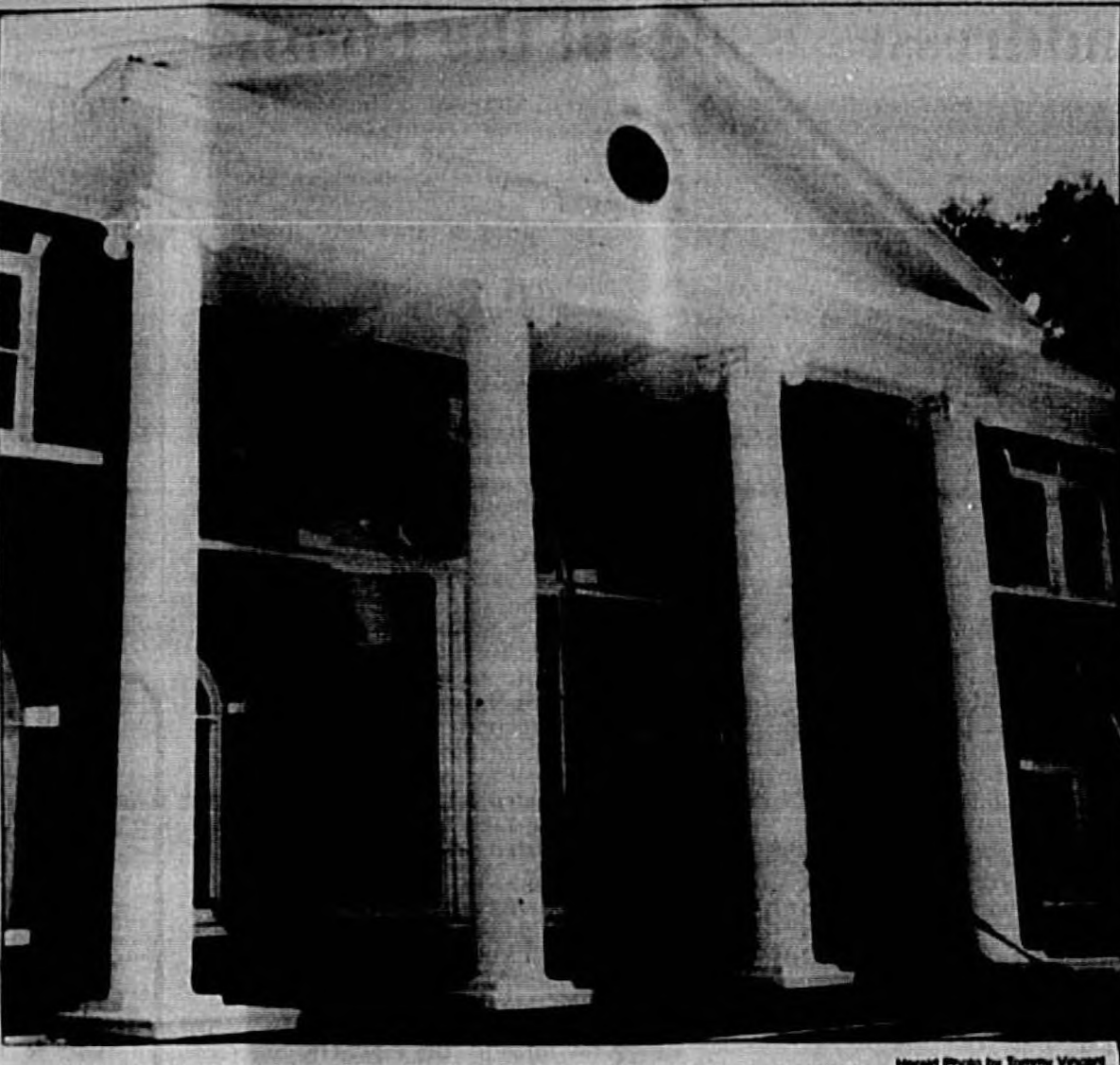

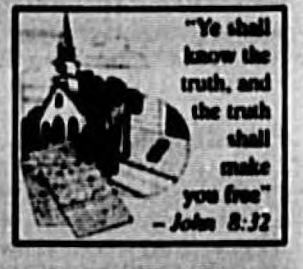

This means there will be NO PUBLIC ACCESS to any of the following areas until further notice. Anyone entering the areas will be asked to leave, except for residents, who may be asked by law enforcement officers to show proof of residency. Refusal to leave a closed area could result in arrest.

The closed areas are:

• Lake George WMA, 25,000 acres located in Putnam and Volusia counties near Seaboard.

• Three Lakes WMA, 25,000 acres located in Citrus County between St. Cloud and Homosassa.

• Tiger Bay WMA, 11,500 acres located in Volusia County east of DeLand.

Other WMAs throughout the state are also being closed to public access and there may be more added to the closure list as it becomes necessary. The areas are being ordered closed for safety reasons and to avoid the risk of additional fires being started accidentally.

and Rey Zimmer also had two hits.

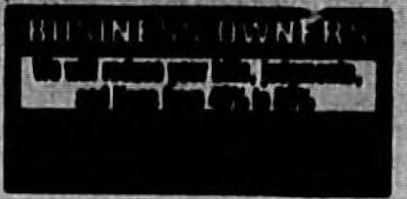

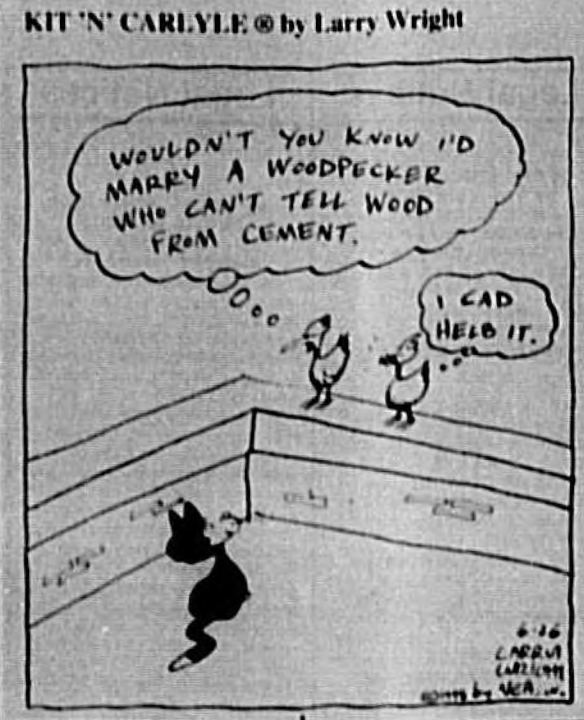
