

Japs Threaten Lunghai Railway In Central China

Unexpected Air Power Shown By Chinese; British Planes Used

SHANGHAI, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Eight Japanese columns were almost within reach of more than 500 miles of the Lunghai railway which stretches across central China.

Japanese troops renewed the offensive against the vital east-west line after their forces had routed the Chinese in Southern Shensi Province and pushed to ward mountains where the Chinese Red army was holding forth. Reports from battlefronts told of consistent Japanese gains.

Meanwhile Charles Healy Day, of New York, was reported to be directing the assembly of British and American planes for China's rehabilitated air force.

China's unexpected challenge to Japan's overwhelming aerial supremacy is due to recently imported British fighting planes of high speed, according to reliable reports.

The planes, now employed in bombing as well as dog fighting, apparently are chiefly Gladiators. Apparently are chiefly Gladiators, with possibly a few new fast American pursuit planes. It was difficult to estimate their number, but figures for the Gladiators ranged from 50 up.

Results have been quickly apparent. Besides the Chinese air raid on Formosa Island, Japanese raids on Nanchang and Canton have been repulsed and the Japanese advance on the North China front has been slowed down by the Chinese planes.

The new development of the Chinese air force began last fall with the arrival of more than a dozen American and British pilots and aeronautical engineers in November at least four plants scattered in Kwangtung Province began to assemble machines.

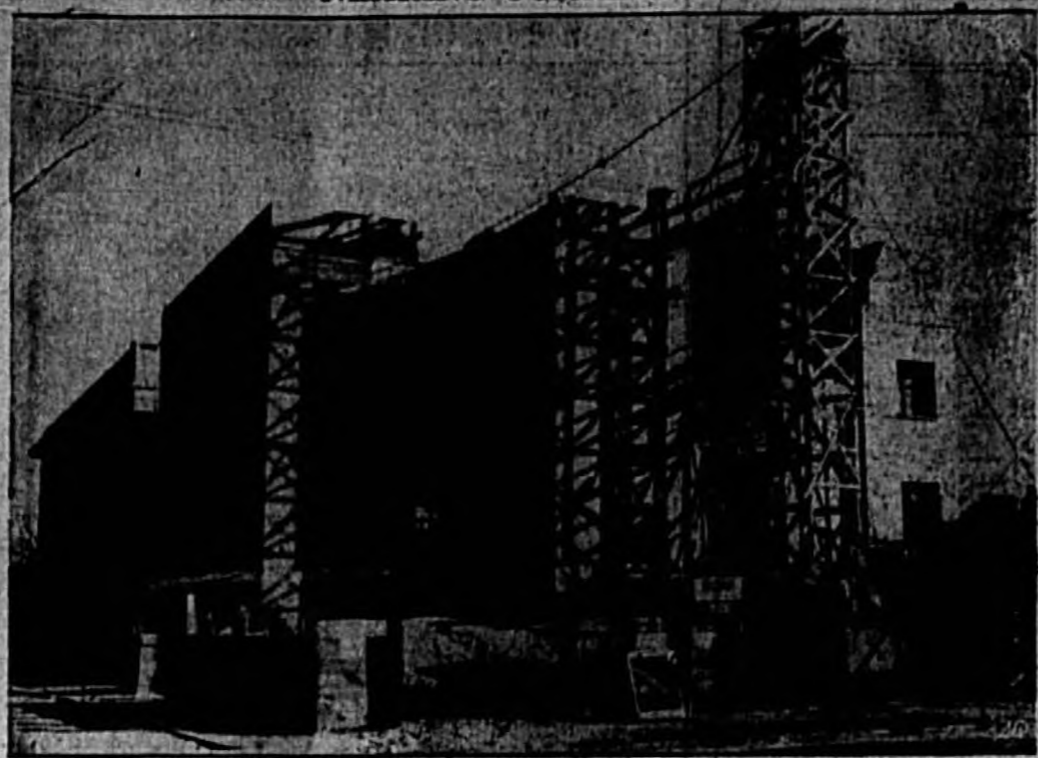

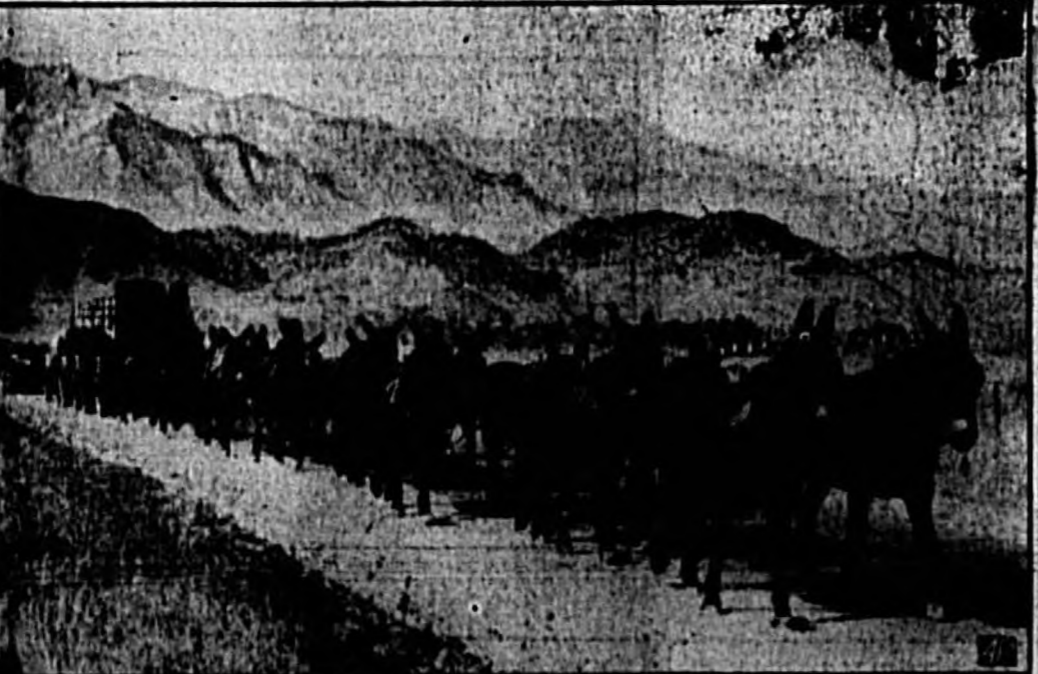
NEARING COMPLETION

Uncle Sam Goes To The Dogs To Find About Intelligence

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Fly and Sylvia and Alice are smart canine prima donnas on whose offerings the Department of Agriculture has taken a mortgage. The department figures the trio's pups are going to be extra smart.

Fly is a sleek border collie, Sylvia is a tan German shepherd, and Alice is a care-free funn—a Hungarian pull.

They're part of a colony of 89 dogs at the Beltsville, Md., experimental farm run by the Department of Agriculture.

Under the kindly, blue eye of young Dr. W. M. Dawson, the dogs are being bred in an effort to discover how animals inherit intelligence.

"They're a sheep fold handy because one of the more intelligent things dogs do is to herd sheep, Dawson not only is testing these dogs for herd-herding, he'll test their pups and their pups' pups."

The dogs go through six tests. When they're four months old, they learn to lead on a leash. Some do it right away. Some would rather lick Dawson's boots.

Second, Dawson takes them to see some sheep to see if they show any interest. Some don't like old Ben, a chow, who's bored with sheep but gets all excited about pigs.

Then Dawson trains the pups to sit down when he blows his whistle once and to stand up and come to him when he blows it twice.

Some of the dogs have a natural instinct for bringing in sheep. Those that don't are trained to do so.

Then a dog is introduced to a stranger, just to see how he reacts.

Finally, he has to think. He's put into a pen that has four alleys, each with a swinging door. The latch on one door is left open. The trick is for the dog to find which one.

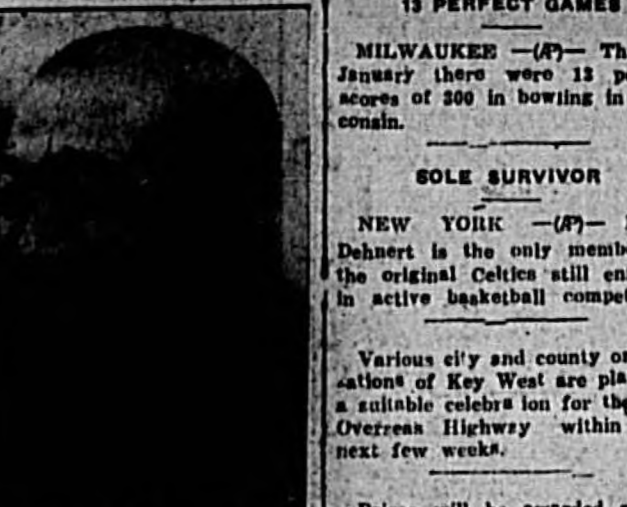

Efforts Made To Find Lost TWA Airliner

Raging River Halts Searchers Temporarily In Attempt To Find Lost Ship

Flares Reported To Have Been Seen

Woman Claims Hearing Plane Flying At Low Altitude

FRESNO, Cal., Mar. 3.—(AP)—Searching parties blocked yesterday and last night by flood waters, renewed their efforts today to reach a great mountainous scar 60 miles east of here in hope of locating the airliner which vanished with nine persons aboard Tuesday night.

A raging river, an outgrowth of the storm that engulfed the plane, prevented searchers from reaching the 200-foot scratch in the high Sierras at dusk yesterday to investigate mysterious lights and an undistinguishable white object nearby.

The Fresno county sheriff's office said it had checked, and believed, authentic reports that the plane set off a flare which lighted up the area near the scar about 10:40 Tuesday night.

This was 10 minutes after the wife of a power company official reported she heard a plane at only 500 feet altitude in that vicinity.

Insurgents Plan New Offensive In Eastern Spain

HENDAYE, France, (At the Spanish Frontier), Mar. 3.—(AP)—Rebels in eastern Spain pointed yesterday for the launching of a new offensive.

Under orders from General Franco, border detachments of officers and men in rear guard training camps moved into the front lines to relieve thousands of trained troops for the projected drive.

Government forces were reported to have destroyed a rebel depot near Toledo, provincial capital 41 miles southwest of Madrid, and freed their lines in the sector from rebel fire.

Rebels, regarded as a military secret the point supposed for starting the drive though one of the main objectives in the task of cutting down from Teruel to the Mediterranean coast to sever Catalonia from the rest of government-held Spain.

In London, headquarters of the international "hands-off" committee, Soviet Russia accepted a British-sponsored plan for removal of foreign volunteers from the Spanish civil war armed-Italy, France and Germany previously had accepted.

Reports Show Slight Gain In Celery Market

SCC To Purchase 65 Cars Of Surplus To Go For Relief

With an increase in f. o. b. celery purchases and with f. o. b. sales for the first time in several weeks as high as \$1.50 per crate, the demand for Florida celery, according to reports of the Federal State Market News service, has taken another upward trend during the past week even though price levels have been approximately the same as leading celery markets.

As a further incentive toward an upward boost of the celery market, the Surplus Commodities Corporation has agreed to purchase 65 cars of the surplus at \$1.10 per crate. At the meeting of the Celery Control Committee meeting last Friday night, the SCC was requested to purchase 65 cars on a graduated scale ranging from \$1.25 per crate for U. S. No. 1 grades to \$1.05 per crate for U. S. No. 2 grades.

The SCC had originally planned to purchase 60 cars at \$1.05 per crate but following the request of the Control Committee members, the quota was increased to 65 and the price was raised five cents per crate. Although the total celery purchases allotted by the SCC last week were not bought, J. C. Lottice, secretary of the Control Committee, stated today that it was probable the entire 65 cars will be purchased for relief distribution during this week.

According to reports of celery movement over the nation, California celery movements were considerably lighter than for last week. However, truck holdings in 14 of the principal markets were 23 yesterday as compared (Continued on Page Two)

3 Chicago Boys Are Arrested Stealing

Diked out in new outfits from boots to caps, three Chicago lads who gave their names as Douglas Huff, 15; Francis Milbron, 14; and Andrew Lambros, 14; were caught in the act of robbing Benjamin's clothing store on First Street late Wednesday night, Chief of Police Roy G. Williams stated today.

Patrolman G. C. Fellows first noted the lads in the store building and called the Police Station for additional help to make the arrest. When arrested the boys had discarded their travel-dirty clothing and had attired themselves in the best of boots, breeches, belts, jackets, caps, handkerchiefs and socks from the stock in the store and had also filled traveling bags with additional wearing apparel. Storms Leave Trail Of Dead And Homeless

18 Persons Known Dead And 18 Still Missing In Surging Storm Waters

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 3.—(AP)—The fury of a death-dealing storm abated today in Southern California, leaving a hundred stricken communities fighting the ravages of floods and counting the mounting loss of lives and property.

Eighteen persons were known dead and at least 18 others were missing in surging storm waters. At least 10,000 persons were homeless. Property damage ran into millions of dollars as bridges broke, highways sank, homes collapsed, stores ran brimming and gardens and ranch acreages were submerged.

The stricken area extended from Ventura on the north to San Juan Capistrano on the south; from the ocean to the San Bernardino mountains which divide Southern California's coastal plain and desert.

Flooded and washed out traffic arteries and toppled utility lines isolated wide sections. The rain, the heaviest ever recorded here, subsided into showers. Landslides added to the damage caused by the flood waters.

Northern and Central California also felt the effects of the storm but conditions were not so serious as in the southern part of the state. Floods last month caused heavy damage in Northern California.

Last night Los Angeles prepared for a major flood disaster after torrential rains caused at least six deaths and property damage estimated as high as \$5,000,000.

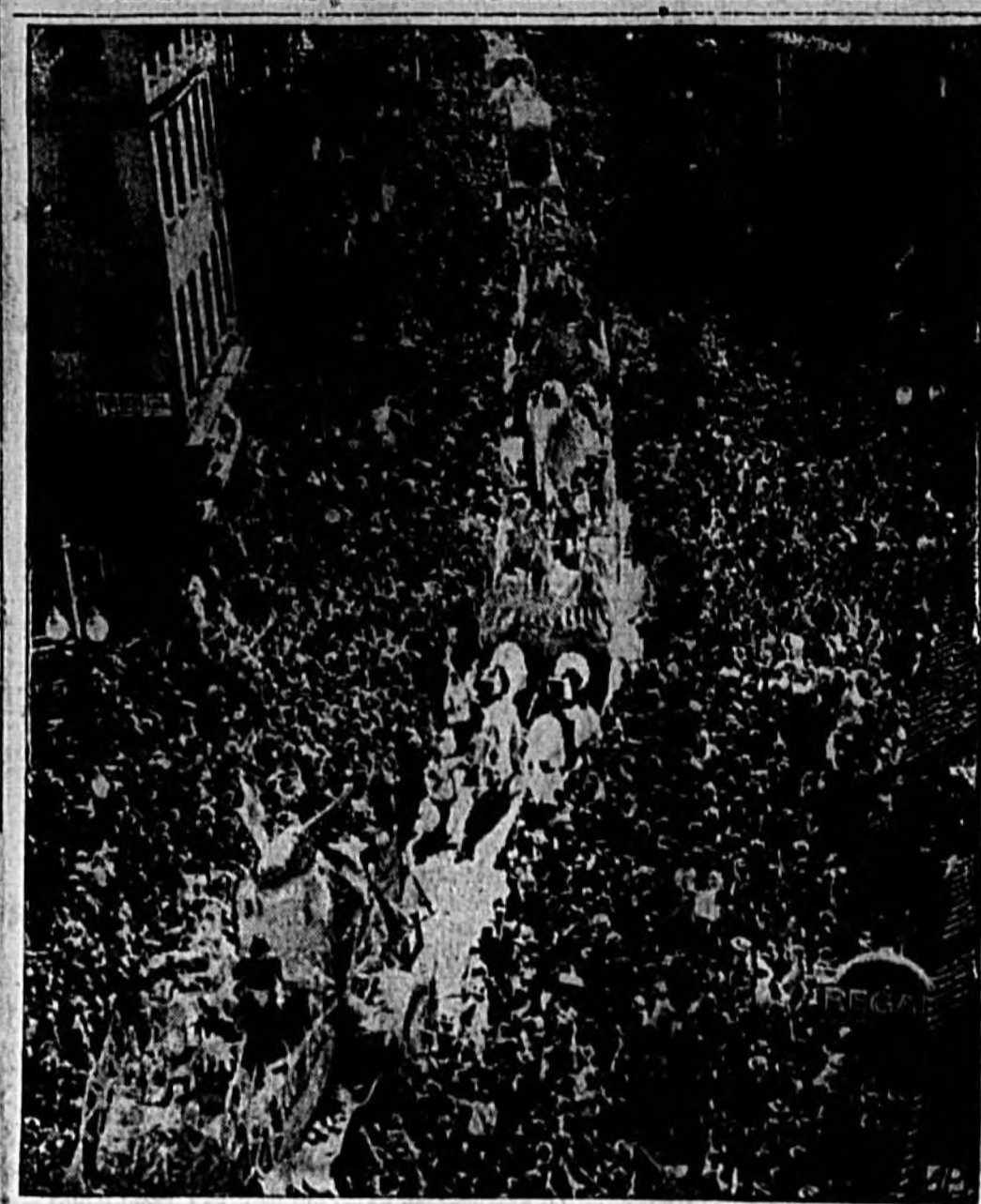
A flood poured through the city streets. Ten inches of rain had fallen in four days—almost half of it today—and more was predicted. Five thousand or more were homeless or marooned in flooded homes, and additional hundreds were imperiled by the possibility of flood dams giving way.

The exclusive movie beach colony at Malibu was isolated from all communication. A number of motion picture residents, including Madeline Carroll, were believed marooned and a coast guard cutter was sent to their rescue.

George Marshall, film director was reported missing after leaving his Malibu home yesterday morning for work. His studio said he had failed to appear, and his home announced, just before telephone communications failed, that he had not returned.

Rain still was falling when Mayor Shaw ordered the city's major disaster emergency relief council to coordinate relief efforts, and Chairman Jessup of the county supervisors mobilized the county's council to assist in the work.

Former Inmate Of Chattahoochee Slays His Father

Police Asked To Aid In Search For Youth Who Flees Killing

JACKSONVILLE, Mar. 3.—(AP)—Duval county authorities asked police and deputies between here and Miami today to look for the recently released inmate of the State Hospital for the insane who last night killed his father and mother with an axe, took his father's pocketbook and sped away in the family car.

Deputy Sheriff M. H. Gurganilo identified the fugitive as Roy Ridenour, 32, a resident of suburban Mandarin. Charles Ridenour, 72-year-old contractor, died this morning from wounds which Gurganilo said the son inflicted. Mrs. Matilda Ridenour, 60, the fugitive's mother, was said to be in "fair" condition at the hospital.

County Judge J. Ollie Edmunds said Roy Ridenour was "very dangerous." He said he had committed Roy to the state institution three different times.

At Chattahoochee state hospital officials said Ridenour was released to Ohio officials last November because he was listed as a resident of Cincinnati. Judge Edmunds said Roy's mother had (Continued on Page Two)

Bartholomew Shot To Death This Morning

Officers Scout Suicide Theory, While Unable To Cite Motive For Murder

Dies On Stairs Of Federal Building

15 Persons Wait In Collector's Office To Interview Him

ORLANDO, Mar. 3.—(AP)—Frank K. Bartholomew, 52-year-old deputy collector of internal revenue, was found shot to death today on a narrow iron stairway leading up the outside of the Federal Building to his offices on the third floor of the building here.

Deputy Marshal Howard Brown said Bartholomew was killed by a pistol bullet which entered the left side of his head, came out the right side and tore a hole in his hat.

"I doubt if there is any chance that it was suicide," Brown declared. He said a pistol with two bullets fired was found on the stairway. He said the gun was under a batch of office papers which Bartholomew was carrying as he ascended the stairs.

About 15 persons who were waiting in the Collector's office told Brown they heard two shots. A second bullet was found in the wall beside the stairs.

Bartholomew had lived here for years, Brown said he knew of no reason why anyone would want to kill Bartholomew or why the Collector would want to take his own life. Federal agents took charge of the case since the death took place on government property. An inquest was set for later in the day.

Two Negroes Are Nabbed For \$225 Theft In Chuluota

With the arrest of two negroes in Daytona Beach yesterday who confessed to the robbery of approximately \$225 from the Chuluota agent for the Florida East Coast Railroad several days ago, Sheriff C. M. Hand stated that he believed the mystery of a number of breaking and entering cases which have occurred recently in the vicinity of Chuluota was solved.

The negroes, Nathaniel Whitley, of Orlando and Arthur Frank of Weeohooles, were nabbed by Deputy Sheriff Jack Hickson as they were riding bicycles purchased with the stolen money, at Daytona Beach.

Mr. Hickson stated that they had confessed to the theft and had been lodged in the County Jail on charges of breaking and entering and grand larceny. About \$150 of the stolen money was recovered, Mr. Hickson added.

Members of the Sheriff's Office have been investigating several robberies in Chuluota during the past few weeks, it was intimated, and although the arrested negroes did not confess to any other thefts, it was generally believed by members of the Sheriff's Office that the negroes were responsible for the stealing.

Dr. Niemoeller Is Held By Police In Spite Of Release

Protestant Preacher Is Placed In Concentration Camp By German Gestapo Plot To Murder Stalin Revealed Defendant In Blood Purge Trial Testifies On Conspiracy

The mysterious disappearance of Dr. Martin Niemoeller, militant Protestant minister, recently convicted of anti-Nazi attacks, and a disclosure in Moscow of a plot to kill Joseph Stalin and seize possession of the Soviet government caused widespread alarm throughout the chancelleries of Europe today.

Dr. Niemoeller, a Protestant opponent of the Nazi regime has been placed in a concentration camp of the Gestapo, the German state police. The wife of the World War submarine commander collapsed when she was told that the militant Niemoeller had been sent to the Sachsenhausen, Saxony, camp despite his previous release.

He was sentenced to seven months in jail on charges of attacking Nazi leaders and using his pulpits to denigrate the party. After his release by the court he was immediately arrested by the Gestapo and except for a brief interview with his attorney has not been seen since.

A plot to seize the Kremlin and kill Joseph Stalin and other Soviet leaders in May, 1937, with Marshal Mikhail Tukhachevsky as leader, was described today by one of the 21 defendants in Moscow's greatest blood purge trial. Marshal Tukhachevsky was one of the eight leaders of the Red army executed as traitors on June 12. A. P. Rosenberg, former Communist Party foreign trade agent and one of the defendants in this trial, told of the plot and declared that the exiled Leon Trotsky had sought the assassination of Stalin and his colleagues in revenge for the execution of Gregory Zinoviev, one of the 18 alleged followers of Trotsky executed after the treason trial of 1937.

Roy Holler's Father Dies In Carolina I. C. Holler, father of Roy Holler of this city, died at his home in Davidson, N. C. late Thursday afternoon according to word received here today.

Mr. Holler was 75 years of age at the time of his death and was known to many in Sanford since he has visited his son here a number of times. Funeral services and interment will be made in Davidson on Saturday afternoon.

Japs Say 100,000 Chinese Trapped By New Advances

SHANGHAI, Mar. 4.—(AP)—Japanese army dispatches said today that a Chinese army of 100,000 men had been caught in a virtual "death trap" in southwest Shansi province while Chinese asserted Japan's central China advances had been halted by guerrilla raids.

The Japanese accounts said the Chinese, pursued by columns attacking from the north and east, were fleeing toward the Yellow river, but that detachments of the Chinese central army with machine-guns were posted at the main ford to halt the retreat of their compatriots.

Search For Victims Begins As 11 Inch Rain Storm Passes And Waters Recede

Fear Of Disease Felt By Officials

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 4.—(AP)—A grim search through silt and debris for the bodies of flood victims began in storm-ravaged southern California where 95 persons were known to be dead or missing.

The steadily mounting list of dead from the \$10,000,000, five day rain storm rose to 70. Twenty-five persons were known to be missing. Between 25 and 50 others were feared lost. Officials said it would be days before the exact casualties and damage would be known. Unofficial estimates of the damage soared well above \$10,000,000.

Damage to Los Angeles city property alone—a relatively small part of the five county area swept by floods—was estimated by City Engineer Lloyd Aldrich at \$3,025,000. Fears of disease grew as the swirling yellow flood waters receded—almost as rapidly as they came, and the main outfall sewer of Orange county serving a dozen populous towns gave way and threatened widespread pollution.

The receding waters left a panorama of mud-covered houses, debris-laden highways, washed out bridges, damaged orchards and farms, and torn railway tracks. The rain, pouring relentlessly across beleaguered counties, which include some of the state's richest agricultural land is a great metropolitan, piled up a five-day total of 11.06 inches in Los Angeles and exceeded even that figure in some foothill suburbs.

Dates Announced For Tally Summer School

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 4.—Dates for the 25 annual summer session at Florida State College were announced today as the eight-week period between June 13 and Aug. 5. The summer session, which is co-educational, offers regular work for a degree, courses for teachers wishing to satisfy the state certificate requirements and graduate work for those continuing their work beyond the bachelor's degree. Approximately 850 persons generally attend the summer session.

Former Asylum Inmate Arrested For Slaying

JACKSONVILLE, Mar. 4.—(AP)—The Sheriff's Office announced today that its deputies captured Ray Hidenow, 32-year old former inmate of the State Hospital for insane, who was sought for the slaying of his father and wounding his mother with an axe.
