Instructors are trained in intensive two-week courses at the Marshall Center and they in turn conduct 40 hour courses within the company to train individual workers. 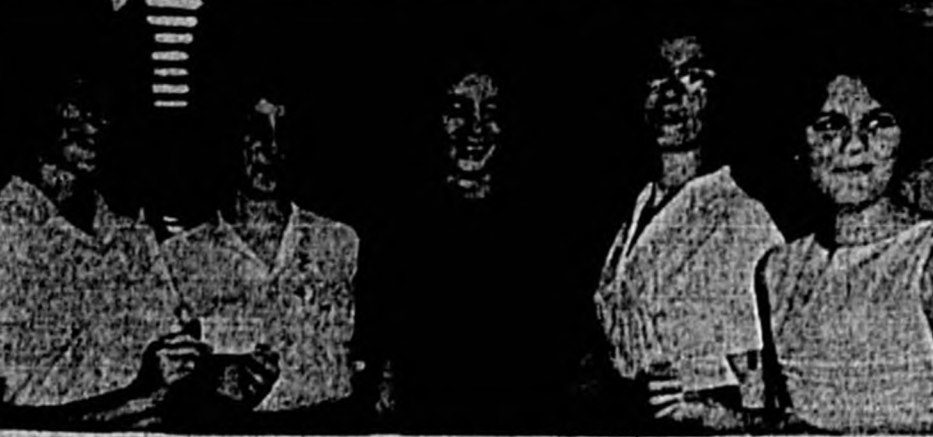

## SHS Students Hear Railroad Safety Official

W. F. Wingate, Supervisor of Safety on the Atlantic Coast Line told 400 students at Seminole High School, Thursday. "Prudent driving on the part of all persons operating highway vehicles is the only sure way to eliminate accidents at highway-railroad crossings." Wingate was introduced by L. R. Miner Jr., Freight Agent for Coast Line at Sanford. In presenting a highway safety program before the students, Wingate urged them as drivers and future drivers to join in the nationwide drive to cut down on traffic accidents by carefully observing all traffic signs and signals. Failure of drivers to obey traffic signs, signals and pavement markings is a big factor in our annual toll of nearly 40,000 traffic deaths, Wingate said. He noted that while train-vehicle crash deaths have dropped from 6.1 per cent of the total traffic deaths in 1945 to an estimated 2.8 percent in 1961, the severity of such accidents is so much greater than other types of traffic casualties that the public must be made to realize "how fatal it is to try to beat a train to a crossing." A film entitled "Last Clear Chance," produced in cooperation with the National Safety Council, was also shown to the group.

## India Appeals For Aid 2,500 Die, Missing

NEW DELHI (UPI)—India appealed for U. S. arms to help battle invading Chinese Communists today and announced it has lost up to 2,500 troops killed and missing in 10 days of fighting. Disclosure of the first overall casualty toll came shortly after the U.S. embassy here announced that India had asked for arms and the United States immediately agreed to supply them. Shortly afterward, an Indian spokesman confirmed that the American have offered "full sympathy and support by the United States for India's present situation."

## 'Double-Crossed', Cuban Says

Editors Note: With the news of the Kennedy-Khrushchev agreement over the dismantling of the Red missile sites and the return of the missiles to Russia, it seemed to us that a Cuban reaction to the news would be interesting. So we had another chat with our anti-Castro source, Jose. "We have been double-crossed," declared a disillusioned Jose Sunday night, when asked about the Khrushchev offer to withdraw missiles and bases from Cuba, and President Kennedy's tentative agreement. "This is the most massive deception that has ever been put over on the Western World," said Jose, and continued, "The supposition that Khrushchev will remove the missiles and their sites without our paying a big price for the favor, is pure foolishness. The Reds have never done us any good yet, and they aren't going to start now."

### Sincere Love Said Delinquent's Greatest Need

Dr. J. W. Wright, chief guidance counselor for Hendry and Glades Counties, in speaking at the annual meeting of the Juvenile Council Thursday said that "more things were wrought by love than you could believe possible."

Reluctating the age-old proverb, Dr. Wright said that in dealing with unhappy, defiant, hostile, delinquent children their most desperate need is for love—real, sincere, unselfish love.

This cannot need for love, and all the facets that love provides results in negative reactions, and the rejection of responsibility for their own actions and behavior.

"If you cannot sincerely love these children, leave them alone, for you just do more harm. There is no such thing as a born delinquent, they are all products of their environment and society. Parents are not always completely to blame," Dr. Wright said.

"There are many situations in our environment and society which in themselves contribute to latent delinquency. If you haven't managed to teach a child to relate to positive values by age 18, it is not much use after that."

Dr. Wright agreed with new council president John Angel who said that the very young child, in the first three grades who may be regarded

as potentially delinquent, should be diagnosed and treated at an early age to prevent overt anti-social behavior.

"I don't like the term, 'rehabilitated,'" Dr. Wright said. "These children were never 'rehabilitated' in the first place

so they can't be re-habilitated."

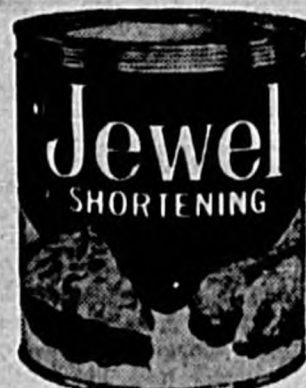

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# Cuba Is Big Issue

The United States is set upon a course whose ending no one can foresee. Yet there will be vast relief among Americans and others that it is a course of action, after long months of frustration over Cuba's conversion into a Russian Communist stronghold.

In acting to meet the now clearly established Soviet nuclear threat posed from this island just 90 miles off our shores, President Kennedy has wisely and swiftly put the peril in its proper perspective.

We have said that any missile fired from Cuban bases against any Latin land would be taken by us as an attack from Russia upon the United States and we would respond with full retaliatory nuclear power.

This makes it clear we have no fear of a Cuba left to itself. It is in truth no threat to anyone except itself. But a Cuba which is a willing tool of the mighty Soviet Union is something else. And we do not propose to view a puppet's actions as anything but the work of the master string-pullers in Moscow.

Though we have used the term "guerrillas" to describe our first forerunner step to interfere with the Soviet build-up of Cuban bases, it has all the earmarks of an act of war. We are ready to sink any ship bearing arms or other vital cargoes to Cuba which refuses our orders to defect its courses elsewhere.

Obviously such interferences on our part has its risks. But Kennedy made plain we are prepared for much bigger risks.

He has committed this nation to the hard business of nullifying the Soviet missile bases in Cuba. For the moment, we are simply increasing our surveillance to watch whether build-up continues. If it does, says the President, then "further action will be justified" and the Armed Forces are alerted for any eventualities.

Here is the real crux of danger in this hemisphere. For it is now our

declared purpose to see that these bases are never used. We are determined also to see that they are either withdrawn or "eliminated."

Short of a grudging dismantling of these bases by Cubans and Russian "technicians," this stated goal would seem ultimately to require heavy use of force by us.

We cannot, of course, overlook the prospect that Moscow will yield. It would not be the first time it has done so when challenged.

It is unlikely this would take the form of a humiliating open acceptance of defeat. Denials by Moscow of having created an offensive nuclear threat could simply be underscored by a destruction or concealment of the evidence and a subsequent invitation to the United Nations to come and take a look.

But we and our Latin neighbors are interested in the achievement of the goal—not in the devices Moscow might use to cloak defeat.

Many diplomats and observers appear to fear that in this Cuban build-up Russia seeks to lay a trap for the United States—to drive us to just such stern measures so that Moscow in its turn may try to justify similar crackdowns in Berlin or elsewhere.

The President flatly asserts that we are ready for this strategy and will counter it in full. It is one of the risks we have to take.

But we could not, because of grave dangers elsewhere, refuse to deal with the hard fact of the threat-in-being in a Cuba so close to the shores of this country and our Latin neighbors.

President Kennedy plainly is thoroughly convinced of this hard fact. No one on earth is in better position to know—except the Cubans and the Russians. We in this nation, and all friends of freedom everywhere, therefore have a duty and a responsibility to support him totally in the hazardous path he has chosen to help preserve our liberties.

## Important Changes Asked

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — An amendment enlarging the size of the Florida legislature is drawing the most attention among nine changes in the state constitution being proposed to the people Nov. 6.

This legislative reapportionment amendment is being attacked and defended by various groups from Key West to Panama City. However, it is the balance of the campaign has triggered much interest on the part of the average voter.

Hub of the controversy is a big county-little county struggle for control of the lawmaking body.

Florida's apportionment has not been changed since 1845 and rural areas have held on to the balance of power in both houses, while the population has shifted to the cities. Thus, a resident of tiny Jefferson county has 40 times the senate vote and 13 times the house vote of a resident of metropolitan Hillsborough county.

The legislature now is composed of 85 house members and 33 senators, split among the 17 counties. The proposed amendment would increase membership to 133 in the house and 46 in the senate, with all the new seats going to big and fast-growing middle-sized counties.

Critics, led by the league of women voters, some big county legislators and several large newspapers, concede house changes represent a substantial improvement but that big counties actually lose strength in the senate for an overall unrepresentative body.

Dade county, for instance, now has 1/38th of a vote in the senate compared to 1/46 under the new plan. Proponents, including Gov. Farris Bryant, a majority of the legislature and at least two large newspapers, argue although not perfect, the plan

is an improvement and offers opportunity for still further improvements in the future. Their most powerful argument is that the federal court at Miami, which nullified the present apportionment as discriminatory, has accepted the 46-senator, 133-representative proposal, subject to its approval by the people.

The new plan considers geography as well as population in parcelling out seats. The 11 largest counties, with about 72 per cent of the population, would have 66 of the 133 house seats and the 46 senate seats. Thus, 37 per cent of the population would elect a majority of the house and almost 14 per cent a majority of the senate, compared with the present yardstick of 14.7 per cent electing a house majority and 12.3 per cent electing a senate majority.

According to the compendium on legislative apportionment, published in January by the national municipal league, the new plan percentage wise is inferior to apportionment of the Tennessee legislature at the time the U.S. Supreme Court ruled federal courts could force more representation for city dwellers. At that time, it took 28.9 per cent to elect a Tennessee senate majority and 28.7 per cent to elect a house majority.

Under the Florida plan, Dade County gets 18 house seats, an increase of 12. Duval goes from three to eight and Pinellas and Hillsborough

each from three to seven and Broward from two to seven. Orange would be increased from two to five, Palm Beach from two to four, Polk from three to four, Escambia and Volusia from two to three each and Brevard from one to three.

Thirteen counties would get two each; Sarasota, Leon, Alachua, Manatee, Bay, Okaloosa, Lake, Seminole, Lee, Marion, Monroe, Gadsden, and St. Lucie. The remaining 43 would have one each. Jackson and St. Johns counties each lose one representative but not until 1953 so the next legislature actually would have 137 members.

New senate seats go to Okaloosa, Seminole, Indian River, Monroe, Sarasota, Bay, St. Lucie and Lee counties. These changes, plus consolidations of two previous single-county districts, also give Santa Rosa, Osceola, Manatee, Brevard and Pasco senators by themselves.

The amendment retains the present provision that no county may have more than one senator, but does away with a requirement that counties in a single district be contiguous. This was done so Washington County could be part of a district with Calhoun and Gulf counties.

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — President Kennedy got one of the most encouraging reports he has had in a long time when the Republic of Guinea's President Bokro Toure came to Washington to see with the Russians and communists.

When the former French colony on Africa's west coast voted for independence four years ago, the Paris government reacted brutally. President De Gaulle took it as a personal affront. All French aid was cut off. French administrators and professional people were withdrawn, badly needed doctors and teachers in particular.

The Russians moved into this vacuum by invitation. They thought they could easily take over the country. President Toure himself leaned so far to the left in his policies and public statements that many Americans were ready to write off Guinea as lost to the free world.

In three years the Russians poured in the equivalent of \$60 million in aid. For a country of only three million people in an area about the size of Oregon, that is a lot of money. In the same period, U. S. aid to Guinea has totaled only \$4 million, surprisingly small. But it may not have been too unwisely spent.

The Russian ambassador was asked to leave Guinea at the end of last year. The big embassy staff which numbered over 1,500 at its peak has been cut in half. Most of them are working on uncompleted projects and unkept Communist promises.

The Guineans are reported to have found the Russians unpleasant people. Because none of them spoke French, they were considered uncultured. They ignored the common people. They turned out to be racists and snobs—which is what the Americans were said to be when the Russians first moved in.

President Toure himself embarked on a new program of telling his people about the evils of communism.

This is a good report to have at this time, for many Americans are inclined to panic when the Russians begin a big

build-up in some new nation. Here is proof that the Russians make mistakes, too.

Evidence that the Guineans have swung out of the Russian satellite orbit is considerable. Guinea has joined the World Bank and International Monetary Fund over strenuous Russian objections. Guinea has signed a private investment guarantee agreement with the United States. Guinea has asked for more U. S. Peace Corps men, which Russia also opposed. Guinea's vote in the United Nations have not supported Russia on the Cuban situation or on UN reorganization.

Some of the credit for this turn-around by President Toure is given to American officials like Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs G. Mennen Williams and Peace Corps director Sargent Shriver. In their visits to Guinea they have talked the line that all the United States wants for Africa is what the Africans themselves say they want—freedom and independence.

Taking a tip from a Russian failure, all members of the U. S. embassy staff in Guinea, except three clerks and a young Ambassador William Atwood—who was in Washington while President Toure was here—speak French fluently.

On top of these fine points, the Guineans have found that the Americans keep their promises and get things done, which the Russians did not do. Guinea has big bauxite deposits and other metals in which American companies are interested.

All this favorable development is by no means taken as an indication that Guinea is going to become a western al-

ly. President Toure is still trying to run a socialist government.

The U. S. Information Center was closed last year because Guinea didn't want any foreign cultural influence. The French Catholic church has been nationalized. The Mohammedan school has been closed, though the country is 90 per cent Moslem. But the Communist bookstores have also been padlocked.

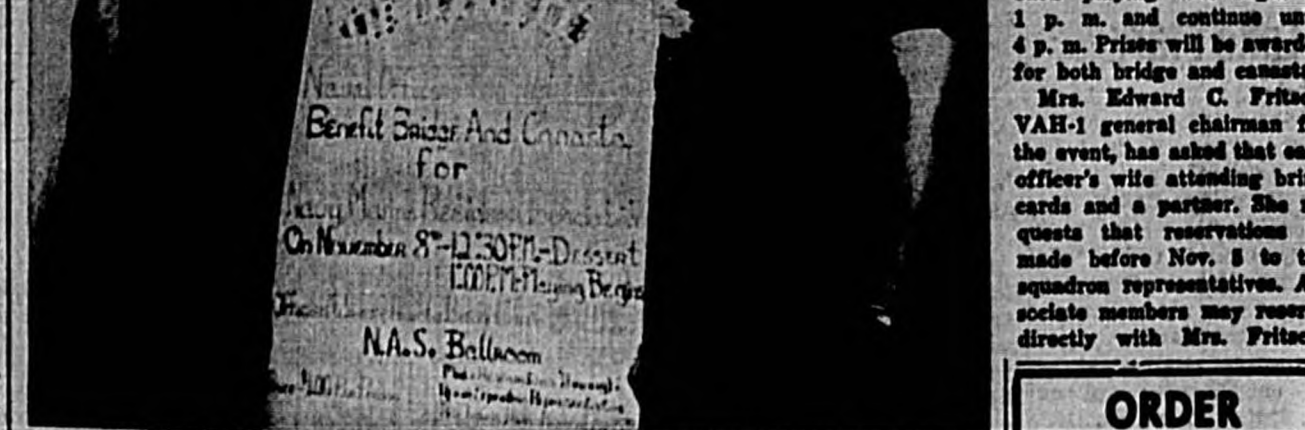

Speaking before the group on the subject of just how the Soviets go about taking over a country, Baltrusis described how Soviet Russia "liberated" Lithuania from Poland.

He said that after Soviet troops had marched into Lithuania on their "liberation" mission they charged the minister of external affairs with allowing Lithuania civilians to "attack" their "liberators" and said that it would be necessary to send in more troops to defend themselves against the civilian population.

The president of the country fled to Germany, Sweden and later to the U. S., and Soviets "appointed" a new president. Arrests began immediately, Baltrusis said, with all government, army, teachers, professors and police officers being charged with various crimes and imprisoned, many executed.

New officials were "appointed" to fill all the vacated posts and the arrested ones were denounced as "enemies of the working people."

An election was held with everyone forced to vote, but

the vote was only yes or no. Baltrusis said that everyone he talked to said that they had voted "no," but with the Communists counting the votes, they announced that it was unanimously "Yes."

Soon after the election, Baltrusis, a delegate of the "new Lithuanian Government" went to Moscow and "thanked the Soviets for saving their country and begged to be admitted to the Soviet Brotherhood of nations."

In Lithuania, arrests continued, and anyone with any property or goods was denounced as a "capitalist" and his lands and goods taken away, and divided among other people. Immediately, high quotas were set up for the people to donate to the government and when the cartloads of grain and supplies began to arrive at the government warehouses, pictures were printed showing how the "grateful people of Lithuania had voluntarily delivered their grain in gratitude for their liberation."

# Cuban Arms Blockade 'Lifted' By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States at dawn today lifted its Cuban arms blockade for 48 hours while United Nations Acting Secretary General Thant will be in Cuba arranging for removal of Russian missiles.

Thant and a party of UN military and diplomatic experts were due in Havana today to work out with Premier Fidel Castro plans for admitting UN observers to verify dismantling of the Soviet weapons which produced a near-war crisis last week between the United States and Russia.

The United States halted aerial surveillance flights over the island for a two-day period at the request of Acting UN Secretary General Thant.

Castro, his angry demands to the contrary, appeared to have little choice but agreement with any plan approved by Russia. The Kremlin seemed unimpressed by Castro's insistence that the United States would have to give up its Guantanamo Bay naval base.

The naval blockade was suspended by the White House at Thant's request. No mention was made in the White House announcement of aerial surveillance which continued through Monday.

# India Troops On Offense; Reds Meet Heavy Artillery

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—Indian troops went on the offensive today for the first time since the Communist Chinese stepped up their invasion of the border regions 10 days ago.

A government spokesman announced the switch in Indian tactics by saying the New Delhi forces had moved into a limited offensive action in the Northeast Frontier Agency.

"In the NEFA our troops are probing forward in the vicinity of Jang and have engaged the Chinese positions with artillery fire," he said. "Jang is about five miles east of the important town of

Tawang, which fell to the invaders last week.

The spokesman said that in the Lohit division of the NEFA "our troops engaged Chinese positions with heavy mortar fire."

This was the first mention of Indian forces using heavy mortar fire since the undeclared war started.

The spokesman also announced that in the Siang frontier division in the central NEFA Indian troops withdrew from one forward post following a third Chinese attack. The outpost had withstood two previous assaults, but was forced to yield on the third.

Elsewhere in the NEFA and in Ladakh on the northwestern

border, the spokesman said, "There has been no change in the situation since Monday."

Previously, the Indian army chief of staff told his embattled forces that the invaders were being held "on all fronts."

In a special order of the day, Gen. P. N. Thapar promised the hard-pressed front

line troops: "You will get everything necessary to resume the offensive."

The order was India's first official announcement that its troops have been able to stop the Chinese Reds in both the eastern and western sectors since their mid-October breakthrough. It also contained the first promise of stepped up firepower along with a pledge to take the offensive.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru suspended his neutralist policy Monday long enough to send the United States an urgent plea for infantry supplies that could be rushed to the northern border area.

Officials in London said two Royal Air Force Britannias loaded with small arms were dispatched to India during the weekend. Reliable sources said Nehru also appealed for arms from France and Canada.

An embassy spokesman said Monday that U. S. military equipment would be flown in before the end of the week.

Thapar's special order said: "In the last week, forces guarding our mountain frontier have been attacked by a treacherous enemy. You have been greatly outnumbered by an opponent who was able to bring more firepower on you than you could muster. In spite of this, you have all recovered quickly from the first shock and rallied."

# Kerr 'Shocked' At Mayfair Sales Talk

Everett Kerr, manager of the Mayfair Inn on East First Street, said today he was taken completely by surprise by the New York Times notice that the hotel, motel, country club and baseball installation were on the verge of being sold.

He pointed out that over \$50,000 is currently being spent to remodel and redecorate the famous hotel, and "you don't spend this kind of money if you are going to peddle the thing."

With regards to the winter uses of the ball park and training facilities, Kerr said owner Griffith of the Minnesota Twins ball club has been quoted as saying he wanted to keep the major league club and the training groups together and are negotiating with Stoneham, president of the Giants on a lease for next year to use the Sanford facilities.

# Town Purchases Water System

A delegation representing Allamonte Springs Town Council made a pilgrimage to Miami Thursday and negotiated the purchase of the water system owned by Southern Gulf Utilities Corp., that serves 97 families in the south end of the town.

The Southern Gulf system was the big hurdle that had to be taken to insure a municipal water system for the town, said Mayor Lawrence Swofford, who with Harold Radcliffe, engineer of Grace Engineering Corp., City Attorney Sylvan J. Davis and Fiscal Agent Kirk Gumbly, DeLand, made the trip.

The city had made a previous offer of \$27,000 for the system, and the company had countered with a demand for \$40,000. Swofford says when they sat down around the table a compromise figure of \$32,000 was quickly arrived at and an agreement reached on the purchase.

Atty. Davis says the agreement means that there is a possibility of construction beginning within three to four months.
