Polk receives visitors

GAINESVILLE — Sheriff John Polk, hospitalized in Gainesville for tests and evaluation of his heart condition related to an earlier bypass surgery, greeted four visitors Thursday afternoon.

Seminole County Undersheriff Duane Harrell, Lt. Donald Falkner, Jail Administrator Duane Rutledge and former Maitland Police Chief John Erwin drove to Shands Hospital for the visit.

Polk's Administrative Aide Sherry Clark said police told her about the visit this morning via phone. "They all went up and stayed about one hour. They had a nice visit," she said.

Polk's tests continue with a heart catheterization planned for today or Monday. Testing will determine if he is a candidate for a heart transplant, Clark said.

Lotto jackpot up to \$11 million

TALLAHASSEE — Ticket sales have pushed the Florida Lotto jackpot to \$11 million, following last week's record payout of \$106.5 million, Lottery Secretary Rebecca Paul says.

The state usually starts a new jackpot at \$7 million, but after record sales last week officials decided to begin at \$9 million.

"This week's sales so far are surprising," she said. "We expected some of the excitement to carry over so we began with an estimated \$9 million jackpot.... Our guess is that many first-time players from last week enjoyed the fun and excitement and decided to play Lotto again."

Last week, Florida recorded the highest sales ever for a single lottery drawing in North America. This week's ticket sales totaled \$4.3 million through Wednesday, with sales for the week up 69 percent compared to the last time the jackpot was a similar size.

Annual United Way campaign resumes

Seminole County chairpersons were announced today as the 1990 United Way Campaign officially kicked off. Gary Earl, executive director of the Private Industry Council, will serve as chairman and Bob Hughes, superintendent of Seminole County schools, is this year's deputy chairman.

Although the Seminole County involvement in the campaign is part of a joint effort in cooperation with Orange and Osceola counties, many local organizations are United Way agencies which are wholly or

partially funded through contributions from the drive. Among them are the Seminole Work Opportunity Program (SWOP), Visiting Nurses Association, Lake Mary YMCA, The Salvation Army in Sanford, Rescue Outreach Mission of Sanford, Seminole Community Mental Health, the RSVP program, Better Living for Seniors, the Grove Counseling Center, West Sanford Boys & Girls Club, Central Florida Community Clinic and a number of others.

Jeanne Daly, area director for Seminole County, said some of the organizations in Seminole County which are served by United Way are area-wide or spanning over county

lines, which precludes establishing specific dollar amounts or numbers of agencies for this county alone.

This year's goal of the United Way, announced at this noon's kickoff luncheon, is \$10,350 million for a total of 86 agencies and organizations in the three-county area.

Daly also announced that Stromberg Carlson in Lake Mary has donated the services of Bob Poignant. "He will be our loaned executive," Daly said. "It's a very difficult job, but we know he will be able to do it." Poignant will serve for three months, through one week

Lake Mary budget breezes through hearing, approval

Millage rate stays same as last year

LAKE MARY — Adoption of the millage rate, passage of the \$10.47 million budget and the adoption of an amended budget for 1990-91 were approved unanimously on second reading with no further input from Lake Mary citizens.

With no change in the millage rate, the owner of a home valued at \$75,000, with a \$25,000 homestead exemption, will pay \$184.95 in city taxes, while the owner of a \$100,000 home with homestead exemption will pay \$292. The actual taxes paid however will be higher when County taxes and special taxing entities are added.

All three money items called

through the city commission last night without so much as a breath of air deterring its course.

Prior to passage, Finance Director Robert L. Lockridge discussed the "Notice of Tax Increase" newspaper advertisement that was required by law to be published, with the law even stating how large the ad must be and the size of the lettering contained in it.

As a copy of the ad was presented on the commission chambers viewing screen, Lockridge called attention to the first paragraph of the notice which said, "The City of Lake Mary has tentatively adopted a measure to increase its property tax levy by 6.43 percent."

"What this actually means," he commented, "is that the amount of money that will be raised through the established 3.8991 millage rate is 6.43 percent more than the same millage rate raised during this

Florida murderer executed

STARKE — James William Hamblen was executed in the electric chair this morning for the 1984 killing of a lingerie shop owner during a robbery.

Hamblen, 61, was declared dead at 7:12 a.m. at the Florida State Prison.

The Supreme Court had refused to block Hamblen's execution after the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta rejected Hamblen's argument that he should not be executed because he was mentally ill when he pleaded guilty to the killing of Lauren Jean Edwards.

Hamblen became the 140th person executed in the United States and the 23rd in Florida since the Supreme Court lifted its ban on capital punishment in 1976.

Hamblen was condemned for killing Edwards April 24, 1984, during a robbery at the ladies' boutique she ran in Jacksonville. Court records say he forced her into a changing room and shot her in the head after seeing her trip a silent alarm.

Hamblen drove to Florida from Texas after murdering his ex-girlfriend there, court records say.

Hamblen was one of three condemned prisoners whose executions

Disease reports prompt mosquito warning here

SANFORD — Local public health officials remain on alert for an increase of St. Louis encephalitis findings in chickens, although no cases have been reported in humans.

Since July, only five of the 40 chickens in the monitoring program have developed the disease, which can be fatal to humans, said Dewey DeLoach, assistant Seminole County public health director. The number is far below what would trigger a mosquito spraying program, DeLoach said.

To order emergency spraying, eight of the 10 chickens in section of

the county would have to develop the disease, DeLoach said.

"We have asked hospitals to be on alert for patients with the disease," DeLoach said. "We had two people last week with some of the symptoms, but when they were tested they didn't have it."

State epidemiologists have recorded 24 laboratory-documented cases of infected humans since July 28, and were investigating another 67 suspected cases, including two deaths.

"The only deaths were in two suspected cases, both of them in people over 55 and we have not confirmed that they were actually

Reaction mixed on transportation summit

SANFORD — Local reaction varies from optimism to skepticism to a proposal by Orlando-area officials and businessmen for a "transportation summit" to discuss mass transit needs in Central Florida.

"It could be good, I'm not against it," said A.K. Shoemaker, a Sanford builder and member of the Orange Seminole Osceola Transportation Authority (OSOTA). Shoemaker is also chairman of the Sanford Airport Authority.

"We are all a part of the problem, therefore we all have to be a part of the solution," said Dave Farr, executive director of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce.

"It's an effort by downtown Orlando to put in place a mass transit system and get the suburban areas to pay for it," said Bob Lewis, executive vice president of the Greater Seminole County

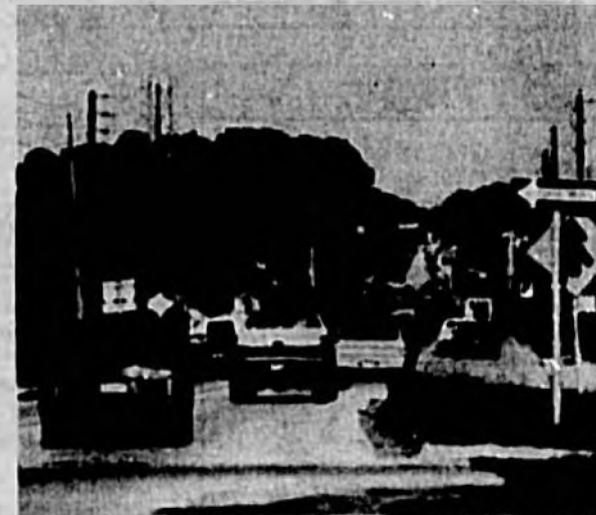
Chamber of Commerce. "If we have more big businesses in Seminole County, you'd have fewer people driving to Orlando and less transportation problems."

Tuesday, Seminole County commissioners will consider whether to participate in such a summit, tentatively scheduled for later this year.

The proposed summit is an outgrowth of a Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce proposal last year to develop a "multi-modal" planning organization to coordinate planning of all forms of transit in Central Florida, including roads, buses, commuter rail and airports. The proposal failed to gain substantial support.

The transportation summit proposes to develop a plan to coordinate mass transit throughout Seminole Orange Osceola and Brevard Counties. Under a plan developed by OSOTA, operators of the Tri-County Transit bus system, the summit would bring together 140 leaders of government

Judge rejects jail guard's sentence as too lenient

SANFORD — Circuit Judge Kenneth Leffler, scheduled today to sentence a former Seminole County jail guard who has pled guilty in connection with the introduction of alcoholic beverages into the county jail, said the recommended sentence was too light.

Leffler directed the prosecutor and public defender to come up with a stiffer sentence plan or take the case to trial.

Leffler said 40 weekends in jail

and five years of probation, along with a letter of apology to Sheriff John Polk, are not acceptable punishment for Eddie Reed Williams, 26.

"This is a very serious offense. I'm surprised at the plea argument acceptance of guilty, with only 40

weekends in county jail and five years probation," Leffler said. Leffler added that despite his guilty plea, Williams still denies complicity in the case, making an apology meaningless. Leffler cited Williams' position of trust and responsibility as a jail guard as a factor in the

seriousness of the offense. Williams is accused of taking orders to bring liquor into the jail for cash paid by a federal prisoner, Seminole County Sheriff's Lt. Greg Barnett arrested Williams Dec. 19, 1989, on charges of official misconduct and introduction of contraband into a county jail.

Williams was fired from his post as a jail guard.

Leffler ordered either a new, stricter sentencing plan or, he said, the case will go to trial. Williams is scheduled to return to court in Sanford Oct. 16. He remains free in the meantime.

Teacher union alams Martinez

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martinez claims to have substantially boosted education funding are a "blatant, arrogant misrepresentation of the truth," one of Florida's major teachers' unions said Thursday.

Martinez, a former teacher, claims in a statewide television commercial to have "boosted our state's investment in education 56 percent in the past four years."

Jeff Wright, president of the Florida Teaching Professional National Education Association, which has endorsed Democratic nominee Lawton Chiles, acknowledged during a news conference that the state's contribution to the schools has increased by the amount Martinez claims.

But counting inflation and the growth in the student population, the increase in state aid during Martinez' term shrinks to 3.45 percent, Wright said.

And deducting the \$100 million being cut from kindergarten through 12th grade programs because of the current budget crunch, the increase shrinks to .84 percent, he said.

A newspaper poll published Thursday indicated that Chiles' lead over Martinez, which had been around 15 percent in a July poll, has about evaporated, and that the two candidates would each receive about 45 percent of the vote if the general election were held today. Ten percent were undecided.

Abducted 1-year-old found safe

A mother whose 1-year-old baby was kidnapped last month by a newly hired babysitter flew to Miami Thursday to be reunited with her son, found safe by police, authorities said.

Marta Perez, 34, of Hollywood, had hired a babysitter she knew only as Rosa to care for her two children, 1-year-old Raul and a 5-year-old, while she and her husband, Miguel, were at work, detective Mike Fina said.

Mrs. Perez had befriended the babysitter at a garment factory where they worked and the woman visited the couple at their home a couple of times before she moved in to care for their children, police said.

When Mrs. Perez returned home two days after she hired the sitter, she discovered Raul and the sitter missing, along with the babysitter's clothes and a large number of diapers, police said.

Los Angeles police traced the babysitter to Florida. Miami police located Raul Tuesday, Fina said. The boy appeared to be in good condition, he said.

Launch delayed at least until November

CAPE CANAVERAL - NASA will delay a fifth launch try for the lunar shuttle Columbia until at least late November, after the Oct. 5 launch of the shuttle Discovery and after a flight by the shuttle Atlantis around Nov. 7, NASA announced Thursday.

Space agency officials also are debating the possibility of delaying another fueling test for Columbia until after Discovery's takeoff because of problems obtaining a fuel line valve to replace one that malfunctioned during Columbia's aborted launch Monday.

"Both Discovery and Atlantis are operational orbiters with no known or suspected defects," said William Lenoir, NASA's associate administrator for space flight. "Our highest priority is going to be to resume flights with Discovery and Atlantis as scheduled."

Florida National Guard recruitments up

JACKSONVILLE - Florida Army National Guard recruitments have soared to the highest level in five years, reported in part by the presence of the National Guard's 1st Airborne Division at the base.

St. Catherine's Catholic High School and another joined the Guard in August. On a good month, the Guard typically recruits about 150. Most of the new recruits are in their teens, he said.

Despite the popularity of the Guard, other military branches have not reported the same high numbers. Army recruiting officers in Jacksonville says recruiting levels are about average.

Referendum on garbage won't be held

JACKSONVILLE - A citizen-driven referendum on the city's 999 garbage fee will not be held, despite the 25,000 signatures collected to get the controversial issue on the ballot.

City general counsel James L. Harrison said the referendum is "legally flawed" because the city charter does not allow voters the right to repeal ordinances.

Brevard firm fined by DER

ORLANDO - A Brevard County company that trucked drums of flammable chemicals to an employee's home days before a state inspection has been fined more than \$400,000 for dozens of violations.

The state Department of Environmental Regulation has charged Precision Fabricating and Cleaning, a subcontractor for Kennedy Space Center, with 36 environmental violations.

NCAA places Florida basketball, football programs on probation

GAINESVILLE - The NCAA leveled a two-year probation Thursday on the University of Florida's football and basketball programs, barring the school from appearing in a 1990 bowl game and ordering the return of money earned in the 1989 NCAA basketball tournament.

Four months after charging the university with 10 rules violations, the governing body for inter-collegiate athletics issued sanctions against Florida's major athletic programs in a decision handed down to UF President John Lombardi.

Because of sanctions ordered against the football program in 1984, the NCAA had the authority to impose the "death penalty," and shut down both the football and basketball programs.

The Gator basketball program, now under the guidance of new coach Len Kruger, was stripped of two scholarships next season and one in 1992-93. The NCAA Committee on Infractions ordered the records of six basketball players and the team's performance in the '88 NCAA Tournament deleted due to the player's ineligible status.

Publication reports have identified the ineligible player as Vernon Maxwell, a third-year guard with the NBA's Houston Rockets and Florida's career scoring leader with 2,450 points.

The school's football and basketball programs were collectively charged last May with 10 NCAA violations, including a lack of institutional control, improper cash payments to players and improper salary supplements to two football coaches.

In July, the university admitted culpability to seven charges in an 1,110-page response, but persuaded the NCAA's enforcement staff to drop the most serious allegation - lack of institutional control - during a hearing in August.

Two of the coaches named in the allegations, basketball coach Norm Sloan and football coach Gene Hall, resigned under pressure last October. Hall, a graduate assistant coach at Penn State, admitted to making improper payments to two assistant coaches and aiding former Gator player Jarvis Williams, now a defensive back with the Miami Dolphins, in paying child support.

Hall has denied allegations he provided cash to Williams, now a defensive back with the NFL's Miami Dolphins.

Sloan, coaching a professional team in Greece, has denied breaking any NCAA rules. He was charged with improperly providing an airplane ticket for Maxwell to attend a Boston Celtics summer camp and arranging payment of an airline ticket for the mother of a recruit.

Florida's football program was found guilty of 50 NCAA rules violations in 1984, prompting a two-year probation and leaving the Gators subject to a shutdown of one or both sports for up to two years.

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Miami lottery winners claim their fortune

TALLAHASSEE - A hospital cafeteria worker from Miami and her two grown children came forward Thursday with a winning ticket for part of Florida's \$106.5 million Lotto jackpot, leaving three winning tickets still unaccounted for.

Margaret Karis, 62, said she will share her \$17.75 million portion of the jackpot with her daughter Laura Pfeil, 37, a dental hygienist from Davie, and son Peter Karis III, an instructor in industrial engineering at Louisiana State University.

Karis said she and her husband, Peter Jr., will hasten their retirements, which they had planned to begin next June. She works at South Miami Hospital.

The winning numbers from Saturday night's drawing were 5, 6, 31, 34, 35 and 45.

Two linked to bombing plead guilty to drug charge

Two men linked to the bombing of a DEA field office in Fort Myers pleaded guilty Thursday to their part in a southwest Florida drug trafficking ring.

John Ciganek and Kelly Susskind pleaded guilty in Fort Myers federal court to conspiring to possess with intent to distribute more than 11 pounds of cocaine.

They were named in a federal indictment as co-conspirators of Jeffrey Matthews, who pleaded guilty in July to the bombing. Matthews also pleaded guilty to operating a drug trafficking ring, cocaine possession and homicide in furtherance of drug trafficking activities.

A fourth co-conspirator, Kenneth Bird, also previously pleaded guilty to the drug trafficking charge.

All four face life in prison without the possibility of parole. Matthews is scheduled for sentencing before U.S. District

Judge Elizabeth Kovachovich Oct. 1, while Bird will be sentenced the following day.

Matthews, Ciganek and Susskind are charged with conspiring to possess with intent to distribute more than 11 pounds of cocaine.

A bomb tossed through the window of the DEA field office in

Fort Myers destroyed the 6,000-square-foot structure, causing \$4 million in damage. No one was injured.

Matthews and the others were indicted on the federal drug charges two days before the bombing.

Prosecutors said Matthews operated a Fort Myers cocaine distribution ring for at least five years, and was linked to the January slaying of federal witness Stephen Franken. Matthews pleaded guilty to his part in Franken's death.

Florida man arrested in Winnebago raid

NEWARK, N.J. - Investigators found 250 kilograms of cocaine in a Winnebago motor home and arrested a California woman and three men, including one Fort Lauderdale man, state police said Thursday.

The motor home had been under surveillance in an ongoing investigation by the Statewide Narcotics Task Force, said Lt. Robert Touw.

The cocaine, which was found in the living section of the Winnebago, has an estimated wholesale value of \$7.5 million, Touw said. He believes was the largest in New Jersey since agents of the Drug Enforcement Administration and U.S. Customs found 1,000 pounds in a shipment of apples last October, DEA spokesman Victor Fontaine said. The cocaine and apples were in a truck parked at a hotel

near the airport.

Those arrested were Juan C. Marroquin, 24, of Fort Lauderdale; Sharon A. Herrold, 43, of San Jose, California; and Jose Gomes, 27, an illegal alien from Bogota, Colombia, who has been living in a Miami hotel. All were charged with conspiracy to distribute cocaine and possession with intent to distribute.

Superior Court Judge Robert Falcone set bail at \$2.5 million for Herrold, \$3 million for Bandoval and \$4 million for Gomes.

At the bail hearing, Herrold's lawyer said that she owns an automotive paint store in Windsor-Somona and that Bandoval, a native of Chile who has been living in the United States for more than 20 years, works there. Gomes told the judge that he entered the country from Mexico without a passport, while

Baby born after mother dies in traffic accident

"Her child was delivered by Caesarian section, emergency C-section," she said.

"She had no trauma to her, therefore, we're not sure what happened," said Frather.

The Florida Highway Patrol reported today that Eastridge lost control of her 1980 Ford pickup truck at about 6:25 a.m. while traveling east on Wayside Drive, just south of State Road 44, west of Sanford.

An autopsy was scheduled Friday at the Seminole County medical examiner's office.

Her truck veered to the left, ran into a ditch and hit a fence. There was no damage to the vehicle, the FHP said. Eastridge was not wearing a seatbelt and apparently hit the steering

The highway patrol said her car had suffered no damage.

Garbage rate to increase in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — The city commission last night approved a request from Western Waste Industries to raise their prices for garbage collection in the city effective next month.

The company requested a 55-cent per month increase per residential household to keep in line with projected landfill and fuel costs. Commercial rates will also be going up accordingly.

With this price increase, the cost of garbage pick-up beginning in October will increase from \$6.95 to \$10.40 for curbside pickups.

DAYTONA BEACH — The American Civil Liberties Union has taken over the defense of a video store owner who is challenging State Attorney John Tanner's crackdown on pornography.

On lawless Liberia

Samuel Doe, the army sergeant who took over Liberia in a bloody coup 10 years ago, has suffered the same fate he inflicted on countless others during his years of bloody misrule. Unfortunately, his death at the hands of a rebel group that captured him after a gunfight offers little hope to Liberians that their misery will end soon. Quite the contrary.

What started as a rebellion by a disgruntled Liberian government official has become a vicious three-cornered civil war in which no quarter has been given and in which trial sentences have led to horrible crimes, many of them against innocents. Even if there's some kind of settlement, violent score-settling could go on indefinitely.

No settlement is in sight. Two factions are still fighting to take over what has become a lawless country: a remnant of Doe's presidential guard is waging a last-ditch struggle to survive, and a neo-national West African armed force that set out to restore order occupies only a part of the port area in the country's capital, Monrovia. All four of these groups either claim to be the legitimate new government, or seek to decide who will govern, whichever that becomes possible.

When there's some compromise, the bloodshed and the deterioration of what's left of the country's economy will continue. The United Nations has condemned the violence and called for negotiations to end it, but has done little else and seems unlikely to intervene militarily at least in West Africa because that responsibility belongs to the United States. The only real solution may rest with the Liberians. Based on the country's recent history, that's a terribly unsettling prospect.

High tax a low blow

Advocates of high taxes can always find someone to connect figures they claim "prove" that high taxes are better for the country than are lower taxes.

A new study released by the congressional Budget Committee claims that cutting capital gains taxes, which President Bush says is a top priority, would not be a shot in the arm for the economy.

The study said lower capital gains taxes would "create a tax incentive for corporations to retain earnings rather than pay dividends and would provide an impetus to tax shelters that does not exist under current law."

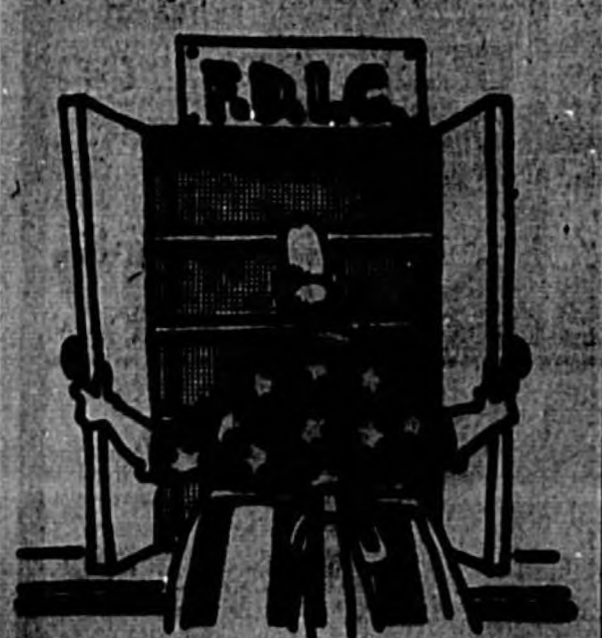
Thus, the study said, "It is uncertain whether cutting capital gains taxes would cause capital to be allocated more efficiently. For these reasons, cutting taxes on capital gains could not be counted on to significantly boost output and increase economic growth."

Even if there is a silver lining, the study insists, it is inside a very dark cloud.

The authors of the study conveniently are forgetting that the capital gains tax cut and other tax cuts made during the first term of the Reagan administration were followed by the biggest, longest economic expansion in recent history plus a huge increase in federal revenues.

Maybe they think that was just a fluke.

How Souter dodged the Democrats

The Senate Democrats have just about tossed in the towel on their attempt to find some champion for refusing to confirm President Bush's nomination of Judge David Souter to the Supreme Court. The Democratic subcommittee chairmen have already given the go-ahead for such a nomination, but Kennedy and

For example, the latter inquired whether Souter had ever had any personal experience with the divorce of an unloved mother in desperate need of an alibi. Since Souter is a bachelor who has lived a highly uneventful life in a small New England town, it seemed likely that the answer would be "No." Souter could then be portrayed as unfamiliar with the gritty facts of life in late 20th century America.

But Souter (who had obviously prepared for these hearings with great care) had the perfect answer. He told the subcommittee that, as an upper-class student at Harvard, he had been designated to serve as an adviser to covering freshmen. One of those had consulted him, in deepest confidence, about his girlfriend, who was pregnant and contemplating a dangerous self-abortion.

Souter described, with the understated tension of a great actor, how he had spoken with the girl in private for two hours, urging her to follow a different course. But what that course was, he

said he was sure Senator Metzenbaum would not press him to say, in view of his obligation to respect the girl's privacy.

Souter had demonstrated that he was by no means unfamiliar with life's darker side, but Metzenbaum was left as ignorant as before of what Souter would advise a girl to do in such a situation.

It is impossible, though, to feel much sympathy for the Democrats in their frustration. They constructed this dilemma for themselves, and then crawled into it.

First, faced with the prospect of losing control of the Supreme Court when President Reagan nominated Judge Robert Bork — one of America's greatest legal scholars — to the court,

they simply abandoned the defense the Senate had always paid to the wishes of a president whose choice was unassailably competent. Instead, they served notice by their conduct that henceforth the confirmation of Supreme Court nominees was going to be a down-and-dirty business with the Senate ratifying only nominees whose views were at least broadly congenial to their own.

They then burrowed into the long public record of Judge Bork to demonstrate that on many subjects he very definitely did not hold views of which a liberal could approve. The American Bar Association's committee on character and fitness was persuaded to disgrace itself, reverse its own prior findings, and cast doubt on Judge Bork's suitability for the court. A vast national hullabaloo ensued, ending in Bork's defeat.

When a vacancy appeared on the court this year, President Bush succeeded exactly. If the Senate was going to reject a nominee, however highly qualified, just because liberal Democrats disapproved of his views, then give them a nominee (unlike Bork) whose career offered few clues as to what his views might be.

The rest was up to Judge Souter, and he has responded brilliantly.

Women taking back seat in Gulf

BOSTON — The talk-show from the front desk days are of dissension between men and women. There are reports of untidy conversations between Saudis and Americans. Even the military is talking about what they call a "cultural clash."

The old Middle East hands on talk shows say that our differences must be handled delicately. No ideological tests for the engagement, no Saudi lectures, just some understanding of their ways. Warm in Saudi, as in the States. That sort of thing.

Well, I can't sit in a chair to take my head in a shower of international understanding. With luck we've learned something about our days in Saudi Arabia. Our success not only depends on early communication.

Moreover, I can't stand to feel that of moral relativism in the Bush administration. Not a politician has said that our ways are better than the Saudis. They stand as foreign as Mr. Bush. We are each equal in our own way.

It is not that we are not equal, but our differences and world diversity must be valued. Nevertheless, I am wary of the unbridled use of this expression. The most often used is, after all, between the way Americans and Saudis have and perceive each other. The "cultural clash" most mentioned is between American women in uniform and Saudi women in civilian dress. Between a rough conversation and unbridled politeness.

In the desert kingdom that forbids women drivers, our vehicles are "manned" by women.

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An American friend says that female soldiers are being trained to be "manned" by women. This has proved more than unbridled politeness. It is a test.

Sex abuse probe rocks reservation

WASHINGTON — The Havasupai Indian Reservation on the floor of the Grand Canyon looks like paradise to the visitor. But it's hell on Earth for some who live there. Federal agents assigned to monitor the reservation would rather quit than stay there. Some would rather be dead.

Six of the last seven Bureau of Indian Affairs police officers assigned there have resigned their post at Havasupai. Three of them attempted suicide. One succeeded.

The statistics offer a glimpse into the nature of life on Indian reservations where alcoholism, unemployment and boredom are constant companions. The latest tragedy, child sexual abuse, is some of it at the taxpayer-funded schools, including allegations that have recently come to light at the elementary school on the Havasupai reservation.

Source familiar with investigations into child abuse at Havasupai and elsewhere says it is no wonder that the reservations have a problem. Havasupai is a steep eight-mile horse ride into the canyon from civilization or what the Indians simply call "the top." From the canyon rim to the nearest major highway is another 60 miles. The mail comes in by mule. The phones are unreliable. Almost no one polices the 575 members of the tribe who live there.

Despite reports as early as last November that a teacher at the elementary school may have been sexually abusing pupils, it took four months of vintage bureaucratic miscommunication before the FBI took over the investigation. The teacher will go on trial in October on 10 counts of sexual abuse.

Our associate Jim Lynch has learned that the delay was caused by "confusion" between the FBI and the Bureau of Indian Affairs over which agency should take the lead in the investigation.

The FBI agent with jurisdiction over Havasupai reportedly doesn't have enough clerical help. Paper flow is at a standstill, and there is no formal communication between the FBI and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Perhaps the most disturbing thing about the Havasupai investigation is that the tribe was the last to know about the investigation. The community is now questioning the credibility of the Tribal Council. The council has asked for help on the child abuse problem, but the Bureau of Indian Affairs has not responded to the council's solicitation. The U.S. attorney isn't talking about the case. The parents of the alleged victims are confused. And Havasupai is in the dark, ashamed and afraid.

The story of bungled investigations on reservations is an old one. In 1987, Hopi Reservation English teacher John Henry was sentenced to life in prison on child molestation charges. FBI agents found Henry's own shirt dripping with 142 hairs. There had been earlier hints of Henry's crimes, but the FBI and the Bureau of Indian Affairs didn't pick up on those hints.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., thinks the federal government has shirked its responsibilities to police and protect the reservations. The Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs, of which McCain is a member, is holding a series of hearings on child abuse.

As a sign of a hearing in Phoenix, an official from the Hopi Tribal Child Sexual Abuse Project said the situation is getting worse. The last time Hopi police and county prosecutors discussed the case, McCain's committee. She told of abused children who then walked away including a 15-year-old boy who spent five years in jail.

Court overturns fourth death sentence

TALLAHASSEE — A convicted killer whose death sentence had been overturned three times because of procedural errors won yet another sentencing hearing in a Florida Supreme Court decision handed down Thursday.

Harold Gene Lucas was sentenced to die in the electric chair for gunning down his former girlfriend, Jill Roper, in Lee

County in August 1978. She died, but two of her friends who were also shot in the episode survived to testify against Lucas.

The state high court upheld Lucas' convictions on one count of first-degree murder and two counts of attempted murder in 1979. But the justices sent the case back to the trial court three times because of problems they found with his sentencing hearing.

Each time, the problems concerned the way the lower court

weighed aggravating factors against mitigating factors. Florida law limits the number of factors juries can consider which suggest death is an appropriate penalty, but imposes no limit on factors that support leniency.

In Thursday's unanimous decision, the justices said the trial judge did not spell out the aggravating and mitigating circumstances clearly enough for the high court to consider whether they were fairly weighed against each other.

The justices ordered the trial judge to reconsider and rewrite his sentencing order. Lucas' lawyer was ordered to spell out for the judge a list of specific mitigating circumstances he wants the judge to consider.

Among the aggravating factors raised against Lucas were prior convictions for violent felonies and the heinous, atrocious and cruel nature of the crime. The

judge was not clear on whether he also found the crime to have been committed in a cold, calculated and premeditated manner, the justice said.

The court also raised the issue of mental disturbance and the fact that Lucas was high on alcohol and PCP when the shootings occurred.

In an separate unanimous decision, the Supreme Court upheld the death sentence given Ernest Charles Downs in the April 1977 contract slaying of Jacksonville bank executive Forrest Jerry Harris Jr.

Court records say he was paid some \$8,000 by Ron Gerstich, who wanted to collect on an insurance policy. Gerstich died in a plane crash two days after Harris' body was found.

Downs was a new sentencing hearing from the high court in 1987, but was again sentenced to die.

Dade County preschoolers at 'high risk' for measles

MIAMI — Dade County's refugee influx and lax immunization practices have made its youngest children dangerously vulnerable to measles epidemics that health officials say are entirely preventable.

A decade ago, measles had been virtually eradicated in the United States and health officials expected to find no more than 500 cases nationwide in the year 1990.

But measles rates are up all over the country and Florida alone has already exceeded the 1990 goal.

Statewide, there were 478 indigenous cases of measles through Sept. 8, and 69 more cases where the infection was imported from outside the United States, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control.

Inner-city preschoolers have

been hit hardest, especially in Dade County, which is one of 30 counties nationwide designated by the CDC as "high risk" for children under 5.

Dade County had nearly 300 measles cases among preschoolers between 1985 and 1990, primarily among children from poor families.

The biggest outbreak occurred in the last half of 1988 when 262 cases were reported among children aged 16 months to 4 years, with the highest rates among blacks, Haitians and Hispanics.

Only 40 percent to 65 percent of Dade County's 3-year-olds have been immunized, according to a study by the Children's Defense Fund.

"While UNICEF is making progress with Third World children, our own immunization rates are sliding backward for children," said Marian Wright Edelman, president of the Children's Defense Fund.

St. Louis encephalitis," said Dr. Diana Wells, assistant state epidemiologist.

The disease has been found as far south as Palm Beach and as far north as Volusia County, but most of the cases were concentrated in Indian River, Brevard and Orange counties, Wells said.

The virus is found in a wide variety of birds and is transmitted to humans through mosquitoes, who feed on the birds' blood then pass on the virus when they bite humans.

The virus can cause an inflammation of the membranes that surround the spinal cord and the brain. Symptoms include headache, fever, light sensitivity, stiffness in the neck, disorientation, tremors and weakness.

"It can progress to a coma. It tends to be less severe in young children and most severe in those over 55," Wells said.

"There is no antibiotic that will treat it. For most who become ill, if you're a healthy 30-year-old, you're going to feel really bad for a week, and be back to normal by the second week," Hill said.

"The more severely ill you are, the longer it can take to recover. Especially in older persons, you can have symptoms up to the following year — trouble with memory, tremors and weakness."

During the last outbreak, in 1977, 110 cases were documented in the same region and eight people died.

Tests among chickens indicate a high level of viral transmission in nature and a

potential for epidemic transmission," according to a report by the federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Epidemiologists track the virus by testing domestic chicken flocks, but the chickens themselves cannot infect humans.

"You can eat the eggs, you can eat the birds. You can only get it from an infected mosquito," Wells said. "Humans don't pass it back and forth between each other."

Health officials recommended that central Florida residents take extra care to avoid mosquito bites.

"Stay indoors at night when mosquito feeding usually occurs. If you do have to go out, you can spray mosquito spray, wear long clothing and don't go out with exposed areas of the bodies," recommended Kirk Hudson, a research assistant for state epidemiologists.

Government misses fluoride goal

ATLANTA — The government will not reach its 1990 goal of having 99 percent of Americans who use public water supplies drink fluoridated water to curb tooth decay, officials said.

By focusing on freedom of choice issues, those who don't have access to care and resources are losing out.

States with the lowest proportion of the population drinking fluoridated water include California, Hawaii, Nevada, New Jersey and Utah, where traditions of resistance to government intervention are strong.



Feds spent billions to aid Hugo victims

WASHINGTON — The government will spend about \$2.6 billion in federal disaster aid to help the victims of Hurricane Hugo, which caused widespread destruction last year when it stormed across the Caribbean and the Carolinas.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency, marking the first anniversary of the hurricane, said some \$1.19 billion of the federal money was needed to supplement the long-term recovery needs of residents and business owners hurt by the storm.

The projected FEMA figure includes \$725 million in family grants and housing assistance, \$446 million in loans to cover uninsured private and business property losses, and \$15 million in unemployment payments and counseling services.

FEMA said the storm caused more than 304,000 people to seek federal assistance, the most ever to register for disaster aid as a result of a single incident. Of the total, 144,713 people were furnished with housing, and 187,259 received grants to help pay for disaster-related expenses.

In addition, some \$413 million was paid in federal flood insurance proceeds and approved projects for reducing the risk of future hurricane damage, the agency said.

Custody battle brews

ORANGE, Calif. — A newborn boy lies in the nursery at St. Joseph Hospital without a name or legal guardian, the victim of a custody battle between his genetic parents and the surrogate mother who carried the child for nine months.

Mark and Cristina Calvert, genetic parents of the 6-pound, 10-ounce boy want to name him Christopher Michael. The surrogate, Anna Johnson, 29, prefers Matthew.

The spaces on his birth certificate for his name and the names of his parents remain blank.

At a Friday hearing, an Orange County Superior Court judge is expected to rule on interim custody arrangements for the infant until the case can be tried. Johnson and the boy are scheduled to be released from the hospital Saturday.

The case is likely to pave new legal ground into the emotional area of motherhood, surrogacy and parentage. At issue is whether a woman who bears a child conceived by another couple can claim any parental rights.

'Winter blues' patients react to light

WASHINGTON — Patients who suffer from a mood disorder that causes a severe case of the "winter blues" appear to react abnormally to light, British researchers reported Thursday.

The findings offer new evidence patients with Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD, have a biological abnormality that affects how they respond to seasonal changes and are not simply suffering from psychological problems.

"It's very gratifying to realize that what they have been suffering from all these years has solid biological underpinning," said Dr. Norman Rosenthal of the National Institute of Mental Health in Bethesda, Md. "This kind of thing should settle any kind of lingering skepticism."

Researchers are uncertain how the sensitivity is related to SAD but the findings should help scientists get a better understanding of the disorder.

"It's another step towards the cause and better treatment. But a comprehensive understanding is still a long way off," Rosenthal said.

Jury recommends death for cult leader

PAINEVILLE, Ohio — A jury Thursday recommended cult leader Jeffrey Dean Lundgren be put to death for killing a five-member family in a cult ritual.

Defense lawyer Charles Orinhammer had asked the jury to spare Lundgren's life, saying Lundgren believed he was following God's will when he shot to death the Dennis Avery family, which included children ages 15, 13 and 6.

The prosecution argued strongly for the death sentence. A Lake County judge is to sentence Lundgren at 10 a.m. Friday.

Lundgren, 40, a one-time lay minister in the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, was convicted Aug. 29 of aggravated murder for the 1989 killings.

The family was killed in April 1989 but the bodies were not uncovered in a Kiriland barn east of Cleveland until Jan. 3, after a member of Lundgren's cult went to subscribe.

American soldiers learn natural laws, enemies in hot, sandy Saudi desert

Troops wage war against heat, grit

EASTERN SAUDI ARABIA — American troops are learning the laws of the Saudi Arabian desert as they try to keep their military machine functioning in an environment of debilitating heat and penetrating grime.

Many soldiers mastered the basics of desert warfare at the National Training Center in California's Mojave desert, but Saudi Arabia has its own natural edicts that must be followed if personnel wish to succeed, and survive, in the rigorous theater.

The most formidable enemy so far has been grit, which if left unchecked can bring multimillion-dollar weapons systems grinding to a halt.

U.S. personnel have found during more than one month in the sands that defeating dirt is vital.

"I keep thinking 'what if'..." said Sgt. William Bradberry, a

resident of Chino, Calif., now leading a platoon of Marines in the wastes of northeastern Saudi Arabia on guard against Iraqi adventurism. "What if I didn't clean my weapon properly? What if I didn't do enough training? What if they come tonight?"

Soldiers scour their weapons daily and use minimal lubricant, which catches sand. Bullet belts for heavy machineguns are kept pristine because grit-infested ammunition jams firing mechanisms.

Moving aircraft suck in particles when moving through the dust-laden air, and engines demand more maintenance.

Desert war requires great mobility, and vehicles must keep rolling.

Formidable M1 tanks may sputter and stop if crews do not clean air filters, a task that is done every two days but was monthly back at Fort Stuart, Ga., the base of the 24th Infantry Division (Mechanized).

The procedure involves parking two M1s together, and connecting a hose to an air-exhale

nozzle of the turbine engine of one of the 60-ton behemoths.

The tube is then linked to the adjacent tank's air filters and hot air is blasted through the filter, which is an improved model installed after earlier equipment failed to prevent sand entry in the Mojave.

Tank treads become worn, especially the 80 connecting teeth that bite onto the massive driving sprocket wheel in a constant frictional meeting that grinds down the robust steel.

"Everything is holding up good, but the sand is going to start taking its toll," predicted Sgt. Harold H. Helms, 32, an M1 commander from Concord, N.C. "It's just like sand blasting."

High-technology weaponry and aiming devices are sealed well from dust inside the M1s and M2 Bradley fighting vehicles, and random interviews yielded little evidence of major breakdowns.

Override manual facilities would be used in an emergency if sophisticated electronic components ceased, soldiers said.

Gay ex-Scout wants to be troop leader

In a suit filed in 1981, Timothy Carrera, 38, a freelance news videotape editor now residing in Hollywood, is seeking an injunction allowing him to become a troop leader.

Police: Kidnappings linked to drugs

BOGOTA, Colombia — The recent kidnapping of three people related to prominent Colombian drug traffickers, police said.

Francisco Santos, news editor of Colombia's largest circulation newspaper, El Tiempo, was kidnapped Wednesday night by armed men who killed a bodyguard. Santos is the son of Hernando Santos, publisher of the paper owned by the prominent Santos family.

Also kidnapped Wednesday was the sister of a former top government official. Others still missing were Diana Turbay de Uribe, daughter of former President Julio Turbay, and five journalists who disappeared Aug. 30.

Gen. Natan Yanine Dias, National Police commander for Bogota, said officials were working on the assumption the cases were related and part of a plan to pressure the government to negotiate with cocaine cartel leaders.

Hussein says battle is imminent

Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein donned a field marshal's uniform and appeared on Iraqi television while a statement broadcast on his behalf lashed out at Arab efforts to bring peace to the Gulf and said Iraq would go ahead with its battle of honor against U.S.-led forces.

Saddam's statement — described by some analysts as his toughest since Iraqi tanks rolled over the Kuwaiti border Aug. 2 — warned every Iraqi that a battle for his country's honor was looming.

The Iraqi president was shown on Iraqi television late Thursday chairing joint meetings of the Revolution Command Council and the ruling Baath Arab Socialist Party.

Two parliaments ratify unification

BRONN, West Germany — The two German parliaments ratified as anticipated — a crucial bilateral treaty that settles the legal, financial and technical details of Oct. 3 German unification.

Both parliaments Thursday approved the pact with the required two-thirds majority, shortly after the West German government assured its neighbors and allies that a unified Germany will never repeat the atrocities of Nazism and that unification will be "an investment" in a European future.

Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher made the remarks in a statement to parliament at the beginning of the session to debate the bilateral unification treaty signed by the two German governments Aug. 31.

In West Germany's 519-member Bundestag, 442 parliamentarians voted in favor of the treaty, 47 against and three abstained.

Those who voted against included members of the left-leaning, environmentalist Greens party, as well as arch-conservative politicians opposed to a clause in the treaty which formally recognizes the loss of former German territories ceded to Poland after Germany lost World War II.

Deputies in East Berlin burst into applause when the document was accepted, while parliamentarians in Bonn sang the national anthem upon ratification — a rare occurrence in the West German parliament.

In the 400-seat Volkskammer, the East German parliament, 399 deputies voted for the treaty. Another 80, most of them Communists, opposed it and one representative abstained.

Shortly before the vote in East Berlin, parliamentary President Sabine Bergmann-Pohl said that "the process of German unification is only at the beginning."

"It will need much time, great intuition and courage for possibly unpopular decisions to be made and to avoid creating new ones," she said.

In his address to the Bundestag, Genscher said, "On Oct. 3, the German people will again live in a democratic state — for the first time after 87 years. Our contribution for new Europe is also an investment in our European future."

"Many Germans lost their lives, their health, all their belongings and their homeland. And all of us lost the respect and friendship of the other peoples," Genscher said.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Some of the students at Colorado High School thought the new cheerleader looked a little large.

Members of the football team joked they would never go out with a girl who could lift more weight than they could.

No wonder, because the high school cheerleader was a 55-year-old man.

For nearly two weeks, Charles James Daugherty convinced the 1,200 students and teachers at Colorado that he was an 11th-grade stud, police said Thursday.

Daugherty, using the name Cheyen Weatherly, showed up at the school Sept. 6 purporting to be a transfer student from

Greene and offering a high school transcript. "Cheyen" was a good student and tried out for the cheerleading squad, although "she" apparently never dressed with the other girl cheerleaders, said police Sgt. Otto Bakus.

But, at 5-foot-6 and 180 pounds, some people were suspicious of the newcomer.

"Everyone just looked at her like she was so big and everything," said Gina, a student at the school. "I remember one time she (Cheyen) wanted to go out with some of the guys on the football team, but they said they'd never go out with someone who could bench press as much as they could."

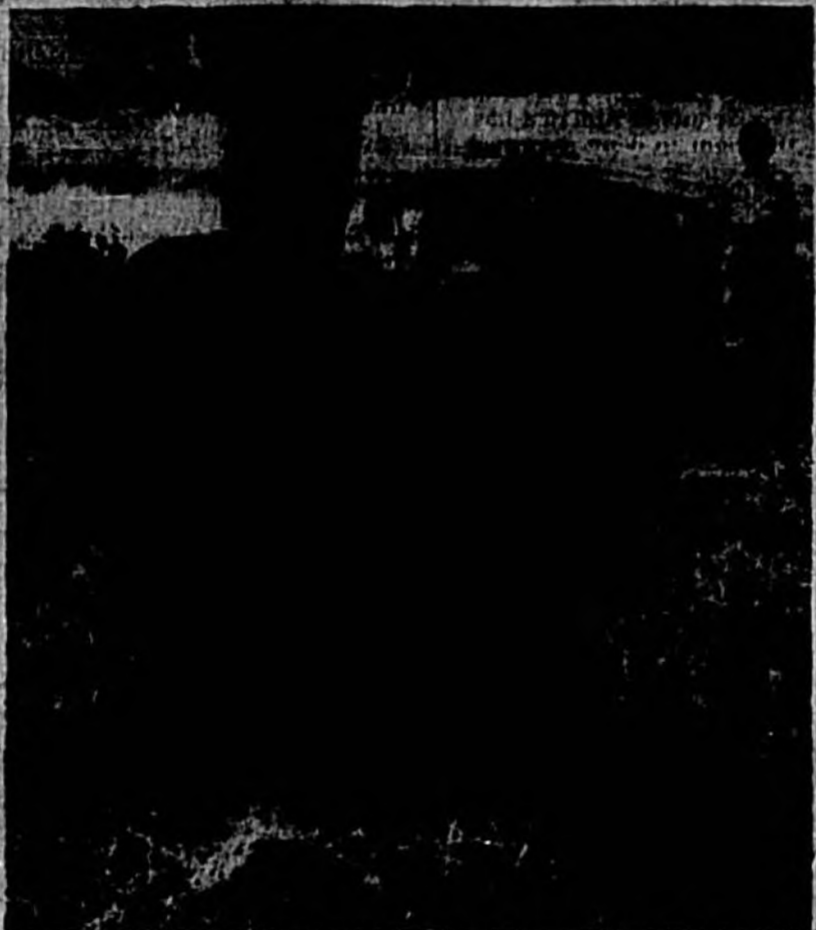

and business other such diverse groups as environmentalists and educators to coordinate mass transit systems in the area. Although originally created in 1973 to develop a mass transit system that could include buses and commuter rail, OSOTA has developed into the area's bus agency, supported by cash contributions from Orange and Seminole counties, Orlando, riders and federal grants. The state-legislated creation of the Central Florida Commuter Rail Authority two years ago only established the bus-rail separation of jurisdiction between OSOTA and the CFCRA. The two organizations openly

bickered before the Seminole County Legislative Delegation earlier this year as the CFCRA attempted to gain support for a revenue source such as a gas tax and OSOTA tried to gain legislative recognition and a gas tax. Both efforts failed. The transportation summit effort is to determine the mass transit needs of "Greater Orlando" by the year 2000 and to seek state approval for a revenue source to help pay for those needs. The revenue would likely come from a sales tax not unlike the defunct metropolitan transportation authority concept of 1980, which would have been supported by a gasoline tax and a property tax had the proposal been approved by voters.

were stayed earlier this summer while the courts considered whether the electric chair was malfunctioning. Defense lawyers claimed the state risked subjecting inmates to a torturous death, violating the constitutional ban on cruel and unusual punishment, after flames and sparks shot out of the headpiece during the May execution of Jesse Tafero. After the state tested the chair using a metal colander and length of tube to simulate a human head and neck and declared it was working properly, the Supreme Court permitted its use in the July 27 execution of Anthony Bertolotti. In seeking to stop his execution, Hamblen's lawyers argued

that he had a long history of mental illness and should not have been permitted to plead guilty and waive his right to a lawyer during his trial.

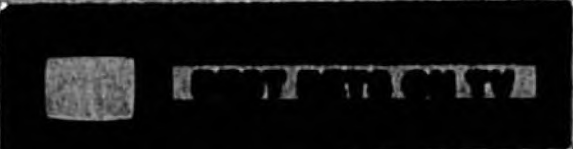

touchdown.

Also having a tremendous night last week was the Seminole defense, which held the Bulldogs to only 25 yards of offense in the second half and 60 yards of total offense for the game. Carlo White, Antwan Bell, Cory Bennett and Britt Henderson all had big nights on defense.

Lake Mary, which rushed for 290 yards as a team to stop Lake Brantley 21-8 in its season opener last week, will attempt to remain undefeated against an impressive Apopka Blue Darter team that stopped the Patriots 26-7 two weeks ago.

The Ram starting backfield did most of the damage as Chris Hancy rushed for 191 yards, Anush Collins 71 yards and quarterback Joe Menello 22 yards more, including a 14-yard TD run.

At the start of the season, this week looked like it might be an easy one for Lyman as it was set to play perennial district doormat Daytona Beach-Mainland. But the Buccaneers have surprised everyone by winning their first two games, both wins coming over district opponents.

The Greyhounds have been somewhat of a surprise themselves as they have been very impressive in wins over Orlando-Boone and Oviedo.

SANFORD — If Matt Dillon and Miss Kitty ever decided to get out of Dodge, they would probably feel right at home in Sanford, surrounded by red velvet drapes, a life-size horse, a stuffed cougar and women in flapper fashion in 1920's trappings.

The 1920's Imperial Palace and Saloon officially opened in Downtown Sanford September 18 in the old Imperial Opera House, which originally opened in Sanford June 15, 1910.

Pros and cons of prostate surgery

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there the best way to go for prostatic hyperplasia?

DEAR READER: Prostatic hyperplasia, the benign overgrowth of normal prostatic tissue, is a common affliction that, sooner or later, affects most men. The overgrowth itself is not a problem; it's the consequences that cause symptoms.

The prostate gland, a walnut-size organ that produces seminal fluid, lies at the base of the penis, next to the rectum. The urethra, the tube draining the bladder, passes through the prostate. As the gland enlarges with age, it progressively presses on the urethra, leading to urinary frequency, hesitancy, urgency and nocturia (urination at night).

Many men put up with these symptoms, assuming correctly that they are part of growing older. However, as the symptoms worsen, men become increasingly disgruntled and uncomfortable until, after months or years, they seek help from urologists.

At present, the most popular way of treating advanced benign prostatic hyperplasia is to remove the portion of the gland pressing on the urethra. Called a transurethral resection (TUR), it is performed by urologists who use a special instrument (introduced through the penis) to carve out excess tissue and suow the bladder to drain normally.

In some cases, when the prostate is massively overgrown, it must be entirely removed through an abdominal incision.

Urologists often recommend surgery before symptoms become intolerable. If the specialists suspect prostatic cancer as a cause of the enlargement, the prostate — when palpated during the rectal exam — feels harder than usual, or bumpy. To diagnose cancer,

urologists usually perform a biopsy before doing a TUR. Then, depending on the extent of the malignancy, they recommend one of several treatments, including surgery and

hormone therapy.

World Grandmaster Bob Hamman has contributed many deals to bridge literature that present problems in declarer play. Today's from the Canadian Invitational Pairs last spring; required a fair amount of cooperation from the defenses. West made a shifty vulnerable preempt, and South got his side to six hearts. When West doubled, North correctly surmised that East would lead either a spade or a club for a ruff. So North converted to six no-trump, avoiding the loss of a ruffing trick. But there was still a major problem — how to take 12 tricks. With the opening lead of a diamond, it was not hard for Hamman to play low from dummy. (If West was underdefending the ace of diamonds, more power to him.) East should

win the ace and return his diamond 10.

The defenders could now wait for their club trick. But inexplicably East put in the diamond 10. Declarer won the jack, played dummy's Q-10 of spades, cashed his heart ace, called the A-K-J of spades while discarding clubs from dummy, and took three more heart tricks. That reduced East to the diamond ace and the club K-Q. The king of diamonds was played from dummy. East won the ace and had to play away from the king of clubs to give declarer his contract. For Hamman, it was another day at the office. For hapless East, a nagging question — why had he bothered to come all the way to Toronto to defend a hand so badly? (C)1990, NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.
