Major Proposal

Lack of interest and the absence of any major local issue leads almost everyone to believe that few voters will go to the polls. The most interest being stirred up in the November election is in the \$300 million state road bond issue. However, many people find the bond issue proposal so complicated that they may refuse to vote either

We believe this is the wrong attitude. There are four weeks left in which citizens may fully acquaint themselves with this proposal. We suggest that they start now.

Basically, the amendment provides for the sale of \$300 million in bonds for construction or reconstruc-

tion of parts of the primary road system and for payment of 50 per cent of the necessary right-of-way costs. The counties will pay the other 50 per cent. Beginning Jan. 1, 1966, and for the following 20 years, 11/2 cents

of the first four cents per gallon tax on gasoline will be placed in a trust fund, the "state roads bond fund." The fund will be administered by the state Board of Administration (the governor, state treasurer and

state comptroller.)
The fund is pledged for the payment of principal and interest of the bonds sold or for refunding of bonds issued for the construction of the

primary road system.
