HAUPTMANN OFFERS COURT ANOTHER ALIBI

German Claims He Was At Home Night When Lindbergh Baby Was Taken From Its Crib

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(A.P.)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann testified before Supreme Court Justice Ernest Hammer in the Supreme Court, the Bronx, today, that he was at his East 222nd Street home in the Bronx, the night of Mar. 1, 1932, the night the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped.

Previously, Mrs. Hauptmann had testified in her husband's effort to escape extradition to New Jersey to answer a murder charge in the baby's death, that he must have been at home that night as he always called for her at the Baker's at which she worked on Tuesday night.

Hauptmann said he remembered clearly taking his wife home that night when asked by his counsel if he recalled "The first day of March, 1932."

Hauptmann said he ate supper at the bakery before going home with his wife. He said he remained at home.

Hauptmann is fighting extradition to New Jersey.

His attorney, James M. Fawcett, will argue a writ of habeas corpus which, if granted, would nullify the extradition papers signed last week by Governor Lehman.

If the writ is denied, Fawcett has declared he will appeal, indicating a possible delay of a day or two before Hauptmann's removal from New Jersey jurisdiction.

David T. Wilentz, attorney general of New Jersey, will argue against the writ, presenting witnesses to support his contention Hauptmann was present at the Soudland mountain home of the Lindberghs near Hopewell, N. J., at the time of the kidnaping, Mar. 1, 1932.

STOLL KIDNAPING ENTERS 5TH DAY PORTENTOUSLY

LOUISVILLE, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The fifth day, the most portentous for Alice Speer Stoll since she was kidnaped, brought a belief today that the family has established contact with her abductor.

Those in a position to know agreed that the fifth day played an important part in the \$50,000 ransom note.

Fears had been expressed that the kidnaper intended to kill the young society matron if at that time he had not received the ransom and made his way to safety.

With all the law forces of the nation massed in the hunt for the wealthy victim, the primary consideration still was for her safety.

Friends of Mrs. Betty V. Stoll, kidnaped society woman, appeared more confident of her early return last night as hundreds of postmen spread over Southern Kentucky highways.

POINCARÉ, FRENCH HERO, DEAD AT 74

War-time President Of France Was "Just Worn Out" After Busy Political Life

PARIS (AP)—Raymond Poincaré, one of the last of France's World War figures, died quietly today. The war-time president and "Savior of France" ten years later, was 74.

Shock of the Marville assassinations may have hurried his end. He grieved over them for he knew King Alexander well, and Louis Barthou was a life-long friend.

Poincaré will be given a national funeral Saturday immediately after President Lebrun's return from Belgrade to attend Alexander's funeral. The body will lie in state until Saturday.

Death came at his home after a short illness doctors thought was not serious.

The elderly statesman had expected to leave shortly on an annual visit to the Riviera.

Although virtually in political retirement since he resigned in 1929, Poincaré had just been selected to a departmental council after a spectacular physical comeback.

Doctors two years ago gave him up for lost. "He was just worn out," they said today. All last night his wife and friends watched with him. He was conscious but an extension of paralysis had stifled his voice.

New Appraisal For God's Work Urged

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Bishop James E. Freeman of Washington, D. C., yesterday urged the nation's Episcopalian clergies to appraise God's work in terms of budgets or programs.

Greater spiritual capital is needed, rather than increased financial resources, he told 500 of the 10,000 laymen, clergy and bishops gathered here for their 15th biennial general convention.

Mission support is the chief aim of the convention and a deficit to the tune of \$250,000 faces the session which must decide whether further drastic cuts in the \$2,500,000 budget recommended by the national council are necessary.

TONG LEADER SLAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(AP)—William Y. Mon, 42-year-old Chinese tong leader, was found shot to death yesterday in an east side basement where he and friends had been playing mah jong. Mon was president of the Tong in association, a little known tong with approximately 1000 members throughout the country.

DEFIANT MINERS REFUSE TO GIVE UP SUICIDE PLAN

1200 Men Determined To Die Underground Unless Pays Raised

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Lining up even the heaviest odds against them, the defiant miners refused today to give up their suicidal plan to strike for a 100 percent wage increase.

Already they have been driven underground three days and will be terminated there by the end of the week, and water pumps of the mines are being cut off.

Several men were shot here, one seriously injured, in the possession and carrying of firearms. They agreed to end their strike Saturday if they get as yet they had not received their demands.

The battle between the union and company owners of the mines, which has been going on for several months, has now become a struggle for life and death.

STONE ADMITS TOSSING GIRL INTO FURNACE

Laborer Says Child Fell On Concrete While At Play. That He Was Frightened

MOUNT VERNON, N. Y., Oct. 15.—(A.P.)—Police said today that Lawrence Stone, a husky young laborer, had confessed throwing five-year-old Nancy Jean Costigan into a huge apartment-house furnace.

A tiny gold ring, the child's wrist watch, and a few blackened bones were removed from the furnace yesterday after six feet of red flames had been turned off. They were all that remained.

A trail of blood through a basement maze, was interrupted by police as mute testimony of a brutal assault, but Stone's confession, as announced by Chief Inspector Michael Silverstein, said the girl was hurt in a fall.

Stone, discharged handyman at the apartment house, was quoted as confessing that he had been playing with the child in the basement, and had hit her with her rubber ball. She fell, he said, striking her head on the concrete floor. Then she "turned blue."

Stone started to carry Nancy Jean upstairs, the confession continued, but he became panic-stricken. He threw her into the flames. Blood smeared on his clothing led to the arrest of Stone, who is 29.

Stone was taken into custody but was not formally arraigned, after Charles Hutchison, doorman at the apartment house, told officials the man had left a side entrance of the building with blood on his clothing and hands.

Hutchison followed a trail of blood, he said, through the various rooms of the basement to a sub-basement, where it led to an oil burner furnace.

Flames leaped out when he opened the door, he told the police, and he saw the child's skeleton inside.

The blond girl and her mother Mrs. Richard Costigan, had been visiting in the building with the child's aunt, Mrs. C. R. Newhouse. Nancy Jean apparently had gone to the ping pong room in the basement to play with her ball which was on the floor.

MILLARD SMITH DENIES APPEAL FOR INJUNCTION

Circuit Judge Refuses To Permit Return Of Slot Machines

Efforts to secure an injunction restraining Sheriff L. F. McChilchland from seizing slot machines met with failure for the third time in recent weeks when Circuit Judge Millard B. Smith on Friday afternoon, after concluding a hearing in the matter, ordered that the injunction sought be dissolved and the 20 page bill of complaint be dismissed.

Judge Smith had heard testimony all during the day, and State Attorney Lloyd F. Boye had demonstrated how four slot machines, set before Judge Smith could be operated either with money or with brass slugs, and had attempted to show that while the machines are not unlawful in themselves, they could be unlawful and subject to seizure if constructed or permitted to be operated as gambling devices.

As the result of Judge Smith's ruling, Mr. Boye stated today that Sheriff McChilchland now is armed with three definite rulings aimed at preventing the return of slot machines in this county.

Coast Line Fights Boat Competition

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 15.—The state railroad commission yesterday approved an application by the Atlantic Coast Line railroad to make reductions of approximately 40 percent in its freight charges of canned citrus fruits and juices from Orlando and other shipping points to Florida destinations.

The reductions apply on all shipments in less than carload lots. The new rate will be on a basis of 37 percent of the first class charges for freight shipments.

June 30, 1935, was fixed as the expiration date for the rate.

Georgia Teacher Attacked By Negro

ROME, Ga., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Mrs. Pearl Cowan, school teacher, was in a critical condition in a hospital here last night from knife wounds, which she said were inflicted by a negro, as she stepped from a passenger train.

Mrs. Cowan's condition was such that she could not give details other than to describe her assailant as a negro. The railroad station is in East Rome, in a section not thickly populated.
