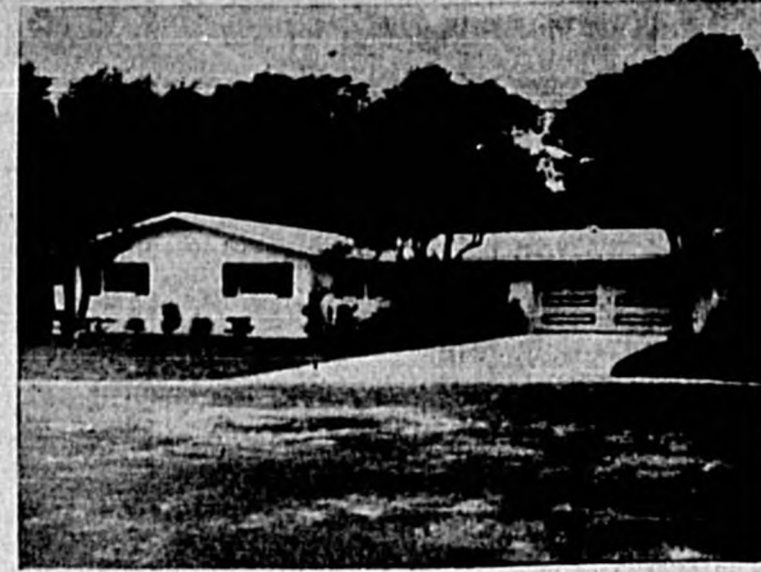

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Johnson Asks Congress For New Housing Program

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson asked Congress today to approve a far-reaching housing and urban renewal program aimed partly at providing better homes for America's poorest citizens.

The Chief Executive advocated expansion of public housing and a series of new measures to cushion the financial blow to families who are forced to move be-

cause of slum clearance projects.

He also reaffirmed his intention to enforce an executive order issued by the late President John F. Kennedy which bans racial discrimination in housing built with federal assistance.

"Whether we achieve our goal of a decent home in a decent neighborhood for every American family rests, in large measure, on the action we take now," Johnson said

in a special message to the House and Senate.

He did not estimate the overall cost of the omnibus legislation.

Warning that rising population and increasing congestion in cities would create greater problems in the years ahead, Johnson asked Congress to elevate the federal housing agencies to cabinet rank by creating a "department of housing and community development."

—Provision of 240,000 public housing units over the next four years.

—Boosting the maximum home mortgage the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) will insure from \$25,000 to \$30,000 on a single-family home.

—New programs for federal aid in planning subdivisions.

—A new federal-state program, financed by matching

grants, to train state and local urban development technical officials in housing and

Brisson Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

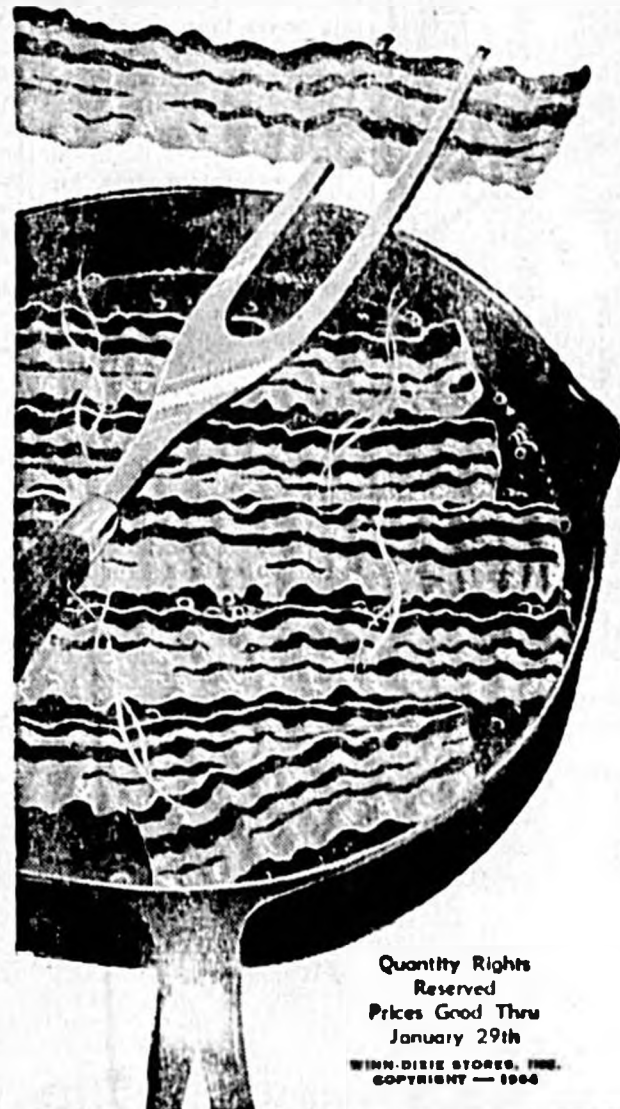

"LET'S TALK DRY CLEANING"

SHRINKAGE is one of the most frequent problems that occur in cleaning clothes, regardless of the cleaning method. Although dry cleaning results in the least degree of shrinkage of any method, there are still cases when shrinkage will occur.

Sometimes such shrinkage is a gradual thing, occurring a little bit at a time with each cleaning—and without your noticing it. All of a sudden the garment is too tight, and it's only natural to blame the latest cleaning. But in some fabrics even the most careful treatment can't completely avoid shrinkage.

There are various reasons for this. One is the practice of stretching fabrics by either the fabric or the clothing manufacturer. Bleaching, mercerizing and dyeing can add to this stretching. When such a stretched fabric is cleaned, by whatever method, it will relax to its normal state. This is called relaxation shrinkage.

The best way to avoid shrinkage is to check labels carefully before you buy to make sure the garment is pre-shrunk. We make every effort to minimize any possible shrinkage in dry cleaning. 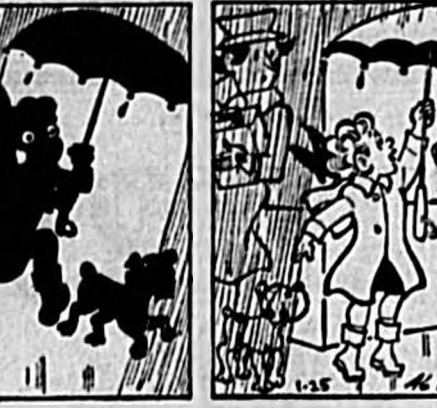
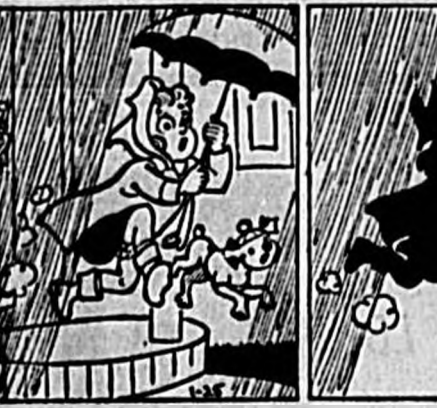

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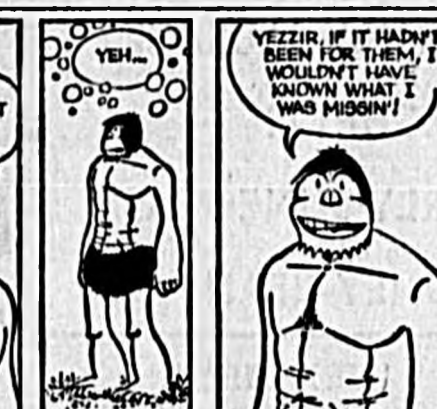
