### Helicopter finds hiding suspected Longwood burglar

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office Alert 2 Helicopter assisted Longwood police early Friday morning with the capture of a burglary suspect who was trying to evade arrest by hiding atop of a tractor trailer roof.

The suspect was allegedly engaged in a burglary at Paris Auto Sales at 240 North St. in Longwood.

The burglary was observed and then phoned in by a passerby around 4 a.m. When Longwood police arrived on the scene, they observed two suspects hiding in a fenced-in area of the business. Both fled. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit responded, as did the helicopter.

On the first pass over the scene, one of the suspects was observed lying atop of the tractor trailer. He was seen in the darkness by the forward-looking infrared (FLIR) camera on the helicopter. Ground units were directed to the suspect, who climbed down from the trailer and surrendered. The other suspect was not captured. It is believed he fled the area.

The captured suspect has been booked into the Seminole County Jail under the name of Steven Justin Villalona, 19, of 1050 Soaring Eagle Lane in Kissimmee. He faces the following charges: burglary of a structure, larceny and resisting an officer without violence. His bond is set at \$1,000. According to the police report, the suspect was attempting to steal a set of vehicle rims from the Longwood business.

## 3-year-old Sanford murder solved

SANFORD — A partnership between the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) and Sanford police is turning up the heat on unsolved homicide cases.

A new dedication by the Sanford police tactical and criminal investigation units with the assistance of FDLE agents are working to solve 27 murder cases from as far back as the 1970s. And the collaboration is already paying dividends as

officers arrested two Sanford residents suspected of murdering a Sanford man Oct. 25, 2000.

A Seminole grand jury indicted last month Ricardo Luis Lugo, 32, of West 25th Street, and Nestor Edwin Rosado, 21, of West Fifth Street, for allegedly killing 25-year-old Rodriguez. The two are currently being held in the Seminole

County Jail without bond and are scheduled to be in front of Judge Gene Stephenson Tuesday for an arraignment hearing.

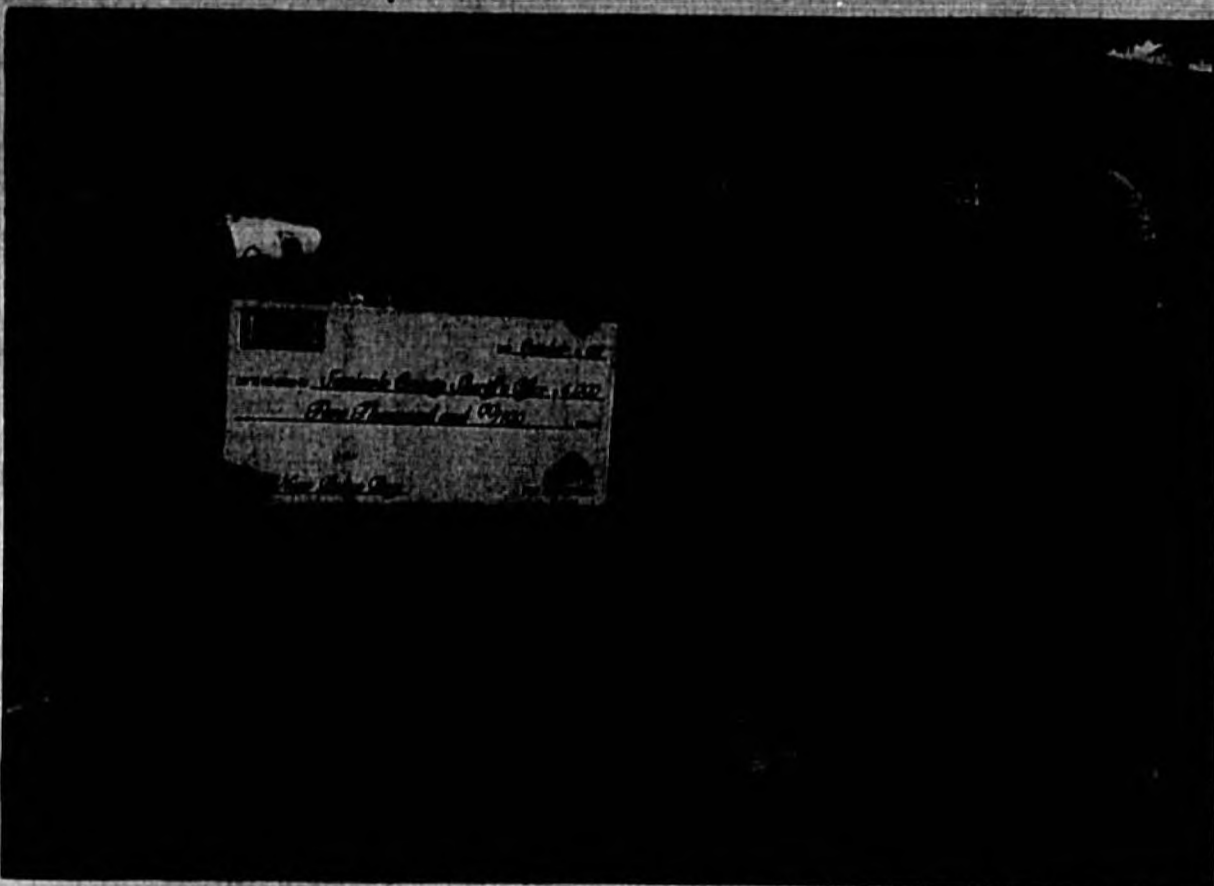
Rodriguez's body was found by police at about 6 a.m. on Oct. 25, 2000, in the trunk of a white Honda parked on the side of road in the area of DeSoto and El Capitan avenues. According to an arrest

affidavit, noticeable blood was found in the area as it was concluded Rodriguez suffered a shotgun blast to the chest and a wound to his chin and shoulder area that appeared to be from being kicked.

The triggerman is believed to be Lugo who shot Rodriguez in the trunk of the car with a shotgun he purchased from a Wal-Mart. Rosado reportedly helped Lugo beat Rodriguez before he was placed in the back of the vehicle. The alleged motive for the killing is suspected

### Milk-Bone, Albertsons donate money for new sheriff's office police canine

What started as a donation from one corporate dog biscuit maker to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Wednesday led to a host of benefits for the community.

Milk-Bone, in partnership with Albertsons, donated \$5,000 to the sheriff's office for a new K-9 officer as part of an on-going effort to support local law enforcement. According to Sheriff Don Eslinger, K-9s play an essential role in law enforcement services by protecting officer safety and performing a number of duties including tracking missing children.

Over the past five years, Milk-Bone has teamed with grocery store chains

to sponsor 233 new K-9 officers across the country, and Wednesday's presentation was the second donated to the Orlando area in the past three years.

This donation, however, was extra special as it also included the participation of three local elementary schools. About a month ago, Neal Fowler, a Seminole County Sheriff's Office DARE officer at Heathrow, Idylwild and Wilson elementaries, was asked to involve his schools in the naming of the new police dog.

"This is a good step of getting them involved in the community so they know not to be afraid of police," Fowler said.

A fourth grade class from

## Robbery suspect nabbed

A robber successfully Monday morning ordered a clerk at a grocery store on State Road 426 and Dean Road, near Oviedo, to give him money. When he allegedly tried it again Friday at a Lake Mary dry cleaner he was foiled.

According to reports from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, shortly before 10 a.m., an unknown black male entered the Winn Dixie Shopping Center, went over to the customer service counter and handed the cashier a note. The note reportedly said, "Be quiet, open register, put money in a bag or die."

The suspect kept his hand in his pocket indicating he had a weapon, and when the clerk opened the cash register till he reportedly grabbed an undisclosed amount of cash.

## Iraqi Diary: A chance to see my two children

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

12 Oct. 2003 Everything seems to be going to hell in a hand basket here. The other night following the police station bombing, our camp was hit with a mortar attack. They hit us pretty bad, they can lob those things into our area from a good distance outside our wall. We returned fire with artillery and sent out a couple of tank platoons. The mortar attack knocked out our internet service, too. It just got back up and running today.

The next day we went out and set up check points trying to get those responsible for that ambush that killed two of our guys from the 1st Armored Division. The 2/2 Cav is under the 1st

AD, and the two killed were from our base. There were two or three seriously wounded too.

There is some guy named Al Sadir that is wanted by the U.S. forces because he has it out for the IPF [Iraqi Police Force] and anyone else who is working with the Americans. They say he wants to raise his own army and everything here is coming under attack.

We had developed a good thing with the Shiites, but now they are turning against us. We seem to be losing what little progress we have made. It doesn't help much when our politicians make insensitive remarks like "Bring 'em on," and when all the promises of restoring utilities and lights have not been kept, even though there are U.S. contractors who were

suppose to take care of these things. The bad part is that the Iraqis blame everything on the soldiers, like we have some say-so in the matter. Now there are rebel-routers inside the Shiite community that are calling for them to attack us. These are the same people that I wrote good things about in previous letters, and now we are literally getting it from every angle here and caught in the middle.

I seriously think we need more troops and we needed them yesterday. It really irks me that while all this political campaigning and fund raising is going on in the states, G.I.s are being shot to pieces like mere cannon fodder or something. Has the whole world

**Lights out:** The plug has been pulled for downtown Christmas lights — at least as far as the Downtown Business Association is concerned.

The association is known by its initials, DBA, which, interestingly enough, are the same initials in the acronym for "doing business as," a common phrase used in legal filings when describing a corporation. And there's the rub. The DBA is barred from doing business as the DBA because the association has never incorporated. The association can't enter into contracts, it can't sue or be sued, and it can't do business as a legal entity because the state doesn't recognize it as one.

So what does all this legalize have to do with Christmas lights? Quite a bit, actually.

**Around the Clock**

The city of Sanford is beginning to ask a few questions before it writes checks to groups who want to do business, particularly event/party planning, with the city. The DBA, led by Sara Jacobson, wanted the city to give the organization \$11,000 to put up Christmas lights and displays downtown. That's a far cry for the no-cost "extravaganza" Jacobson promised two years ago when she hijacked the duties from Sanford Main Street.

The city commission agreed to pony up the bucks, but Commissioner Kevin Hipps and City Manager Al Grieshaber insisted on a contract. Smart move. If taxpayer money is going to be spent, there needs to be a binding agreement that spells what is expected from both parties and, in a worse case scenario, who will be held liable if those expectations are not met or if there is a legal question that arises from the performance of the contract.

Since the DBA is not incorporated, the city can not enter into a contract with the association. Not to worry, though. Grieshaber informed commissioners Monday that the city was going to Plan B. Like a lot of cities, Sanford will be installing the Christmas lights and decorations, which will be located along 1st Street between Park and Palmetto avenues and in Magnolia Square.

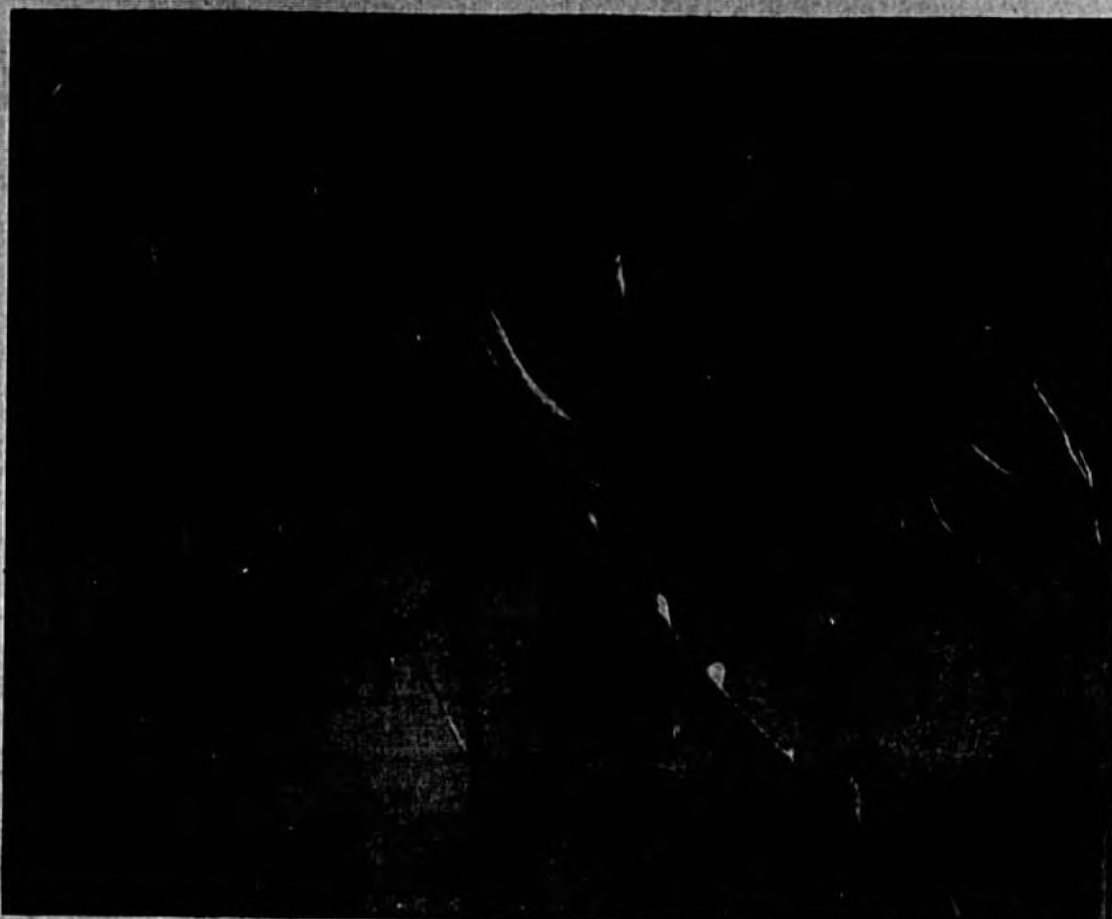
"We've gotten good cooperation from the businesses downtown," Grieshaber said.

**Healthy hearts:** Congratulations are in order the folks out at Central Florida Regional Hospital.

# Pet psychic makes believers out of Helen Stairs Theatre crowd

SANFORD — Take about 500 pet lovers and a few skeptics. Put them all together in Sanford's intimate Helen Stairs Theatre with pet psychic Sorja Fitzpatrick, and what do you get? An evening full of fun, surprises, and even a few tears.

Sorja Fitzpatrick, best known as "The Pet Psychic" on Animal Planet, was in Sanford Tuesday as part of her first live national tour. The evening was part lecture, part spectacle and part pet-motivator advice.

Fitzpatrick gave a lively account of the discovery of her ability to communicate with animals. As a child living in post-war England, she suffered a hearing loss and didn't talk until she was four years old; however, she felt comfortable talking and listening to the many cats and dogs she saw every day on her paper route. She thought everyone could talk to animals until her grandmother told her she had a gift. "Not everyone can talk to animals like you can. You hear everything animals tell you and you can talk to them."

Several lucky pet-owners were selected from a random drawing to have Fitzpatrick "communicate" with their pets via a photograph. As the first group of five got settled on stage, Fitzpatrick asked which had recently suffered the loss of a pet, then went on to describe the dog and the illness it had had that caused its death. And she told the pet's owner, "I know this, because he just ran across the stage. He wants you to know that he is right here with you." Well, Fitzpatrick had me (and most of the audience) right there. We all wanted to believe that those pets we have loved and lost are still here with us in spirit.

Fitzpatrick's first picture was of Franklin, a large black mixed breed dog. Among other things, she told his owner that before he found and adopted Franklin, he had been cared for by someone with tattoos and then taken away in a car and abandoned. She added that Franklin "was worried that his owner would

be upset about a few "peepers" in the house, and asked if he could have a bit more ice cream.

A second picture brought by the same man was of his dog Jeffrey, who had passed away. Fitzpatrick asked if he had had another name (yes, Boo) and who was the lady who Jeffrey loved (the owner's sister).

Another dog, Firestone, told Fitzpatrick that he wanted to know who is the woman who comes to the house and talks a lot. The owner told the crowd it is his sister, and that she always talks to Firestone when she visits. Fitzpatrick said, "No, he says she talks a lot. She comes and gives all the gossip, and we all listen."

The owner of dogs Brandy and Sparky was told that the dogs like to ride in her car but want the blue blanket in the car to sit on. And, Fitzpatrick informed her, "Don't wash the blanket; they like it to be stinky."

During intermission audience members could purchase Fitzpatrick's two books *The Pet Psychic: What the Animals Tell Me* and the newly published *Cat Talk: The Secrets of Communicating With You Cat*, sign up to receive a free sample of her own line of pet food Omega Natural, or browse through a rack of pet clothing and accessories.

After intermission, Fitzpatrick explained how she communicates with animals. Animals' communication is transmitted kind of like radio

signals are transmitted, and their language is very subtle. When she communicates with an animal, she "becomes" the animal and uses her emotions, feelings, senses, pictures in her imagination and hears telepathically in thoughts. She uses her physical and emotional bodies, and pays attention to the feelings she gets in her body's organs. "Imagination is vision," she believes — and she believes that we all receive communications from our pets but are usually too quick to dismiss it. She believes everyone can communicate with their pets by trusting the feelings, emotions, sensations, and mental images they get when interacting with their pets.

I know that everyone who came with an open mind Tuesday night left believing that they, too, might go home and "talk" to their pets.

Other than entering competitive events and special shows, there is plenty of activity in which you can participate. If your club, group or organization is involved in sponsoring one or more of the events, they need your assistance. In this case, it doesn't much matter whether or not you are a senior. Everyone is needed - cooks, time keepers, score keepers, food and beverage servers, people who guide others in need of assistance, and in my particular case, possibly a lifeguard to rescue me should my canoe overturn during the annual canoe sprint competition.

I'm pleased with the last-minute change in locations. I was concerned about the large lake where the canoe races were to be held - Lake Golden at the airport. It was to be moved out there due to construction along the lakeshore. Chairperson Kim Eltonhead however, looked at Lake Golden and knew it would not be as safe, so the event is returning to Lake Carola in Fort Meunier Park. Thank goodness - maybe I won't need a lifeguard. (who knows?)

But getting back to the week-long events. There will be plenty of exhibits to visit - again for people of all ages. There will be a craft and yard sale on the opening day from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. There's a hobby and Photography Show Nov. 4, 5, 6, and 7, at the Chamber of Commerce building. A dance, open to everyone this year, non competitive, at the Civic Center on Nov. 5 at 2 p.m.

### Huskey: Think regionally to fix traffic woes

To the editor:

I have followed very closely the campaign by (Orlando) Mayor Buddy Dyer and Chairman Richard Crotty, supported it wholeheartedly and voted "Yes" for the campaign. I have had a tremendous amount of experience in similar campaigns during the almost 58 years that I have been involved in the building, development and real estate profession in Central Florida and I would like to offer the following suggestions.

1. As I have written and stated for almost 50 years, Orlando and Orange County should think and act more on a regional basis rather than confining all their effort within the Orange County boundaries.

The majority of all the roads that need to be improved are traveled each day by residents of contiguous counties - Osceola, Lake, Seminole, Volusia and to some extent, Brevard. Basically, Orange County

has asked the citizens and taxpayers of Orange County to support the entire infrastructure that is used and enjoyed daily by the above contiguous counties and this is unfair.

2. I would strongly suggest that as soon as possible, the City of Orlando and Orange County start another campaign to raise taxes - not .05% but .025% (one-half a loaf is better than none) and take the .025% and use it on the most curtail roads which will result in the greatest good for the greatest number of people.

If Orange County is a good financial steward and shows positive results over the next few years with the .025% tax, I firmly believe the voters would be more willing to vote for another .025% to continue this worthwhile program.

3. A large number of residents in the above contiguous counties either work, have employees or own businesses in Orange County. A very active, strong committee (possibly called the Central Florida Committee to Improve Roads) should be formed immediately and should meet occasionally to solicit the input, assistance and influence of the above contiguous counties to lend their support and encouragement to co-workers and friends in Orange County to vote "Yes" for the .025% tax increase.

4. I would certainly eliminate any discussions of a toll road on I-4 and any other fringe expenditures that will not directly make improvements for the masses.

Central Florida, Orange County and Orlando ill never reach their potential without erasing these imaginary County boundaries and start working, thinking and pulling together more on a Central Florida/Regional basis.

If the above strategy and plan is implemented, you will see the voters approving a .025% tax increase. The reason that Orange County and more particularly the City of Orlando has grown and developed into such a great area can be attributed to a large degree by the continued growth and support of all the contiguous counties.

We all need to pull together as one.

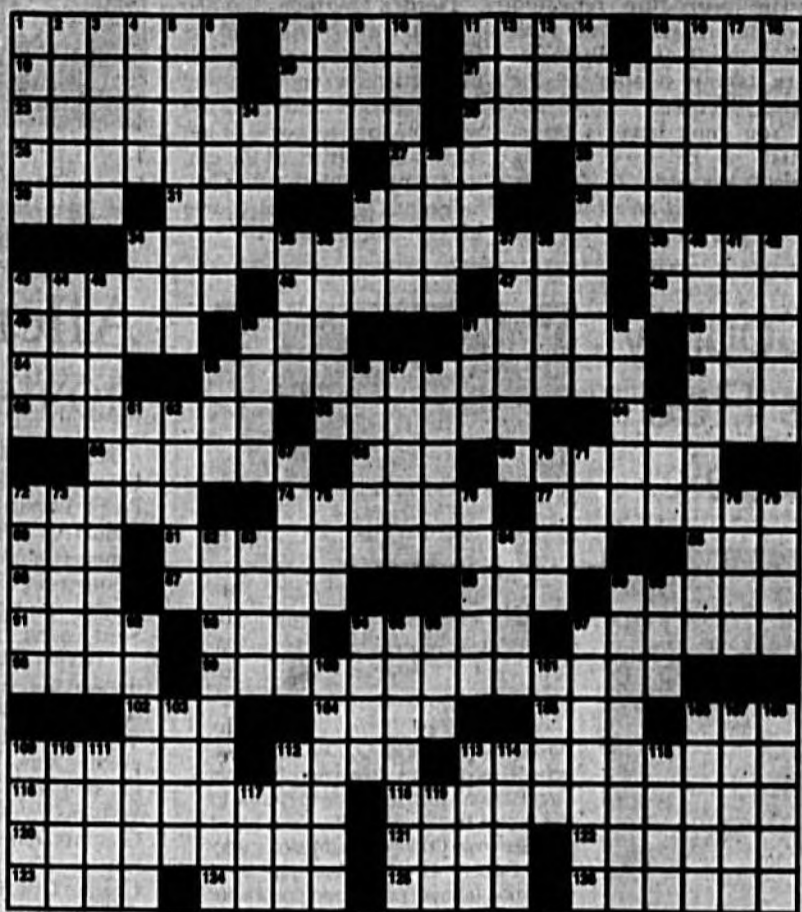

to be that Rodriguez and Lugo were fighting over the same woman.

"It was another one of those cases where it wasn't any number of things it could have been,

it was a dispute over a female acquaintance again," said Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley, referring to a recent homicide at Placid Lake Drive.

At a press conference last month Tooley credited FDLE for its help in solving the Placid Lake Drive murder of Scott Quinn, a former bail bondsman and licensed gun dealer, that was killed by known drug dealer Randolph Mora as he suspected Quinn was having a relationship with his girlfriend. Tooley is again praising the department for its assistance with cracking Sanford's "cold cases."

"We appreciate all their help," he said. "The one thing with these old homicide cases is the victim is gone, the family has often gone — moved away — and the media is not too interested in the case anymore. So really, the only people who care about this poor victim that has been killed, is the police department. We feel like we have a real obligation to these cases."

According to Sanford police Sgt. Chris Collier, the team of FDLE and Sanford investigators are currently working on five of the 27 cases and are producing some leads on several of the old

homicide cases, including one about a year ago on 13th Street.

Some of the new homicide cases are being developed by drug investigations performed by the Sanford police tactical unit, Collier said. It was the tactical unit's investigation eight months ago that brought new information forward leading investigators to alleged murders Lugo and Rosado. Other leads are being developed by FDLE resources, which are sometimes things Sanford police just can't afford, such as intelligence information, bilingual investigators and crime scene expertise, Tooley said.

"They're checking for any stone that was not turned in the past," he said. "They're looking at any evidence that perhaps several years didn't mean anything to us in the past, but now maybe with technology, DNA for instance, has improved may mean something to us."

## Local artist visits Lake Mary Preparatory School

**LAKE MARY** — With a wave of his hand and a slight smirk on his face, Pierre H. Matisse put the finishing touches on the chalk drawing.

He did it one after another, signing his name to works of art created by students at Lake Mary Preparatory School. Matisse, the grandson of French fauvist artist Henri Matisse, was a school guest Oct. 16 that no one will soon forget.

Similar to his grandfather, Pierre specializes in paper cuts, which is an arduous procedure that includes aligning small colorful pieces of paper to create a large work of art. Some of Henri Matisse's most prized paper

cuts are featured at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Pierre too has gained notoriety for his work as his "Bob Sled" paper cut was used in a poster to celebrate the 2002 Olympics in Salt Lake City and several of his landscape paintings are part of the collection at the DeLand Museum of Art.

Although he's lived in the United States for more than 30 years — currently in Ormond Beach — Matisse sports a thick French accent but an encouraging spirit for young artists.

"What we are going to do this morning is we are going to tap the part of your brain where you create ideas," he told a gymnasium packed of Lake Mary prep students.

With two easels set up on stage, Matisse selected about

a half dozen students at a time to fill the canvases with squiggly lines.

"Take a piece of chalk there and start drawing lines," he said.

From the mess of intersecting black chalk shapes, students were then asked to find a picture of something amongst the jumbled creation and fill it in with colored chalk.

"Good, good, good — it's coming along nicely," he said cheering on one group.

The procedure repeated itself several times over with even a group of faculty members taking a stab at the artistic exercise.

"You don't have to be an artist to be a practicing artist," he said. "Everybody that likes art is an artist."

"If you noticed, all the

great artists are famous," he added. "They were famous because they did something no one else had done before. My grandfather and others were doing something that was never done before."

Pierre was born in France to the oldest son of Henri Matisse and fellow artist, Jean Matisse. From the day he was born it was pretty much assured he too was going to be artist.

"I was physically born in a studio," he said.

Pierre's mother, Louise Milhau, was a painter and his father a sculptor, and through that artists lifestyle on the French Riviera and Paris he was able to meet some of the most famed artists of the era, including Pablo Picasso, Salvador Dali, and of course his grandfather, Henri.

### The Way We Were: Bistline family history has deep roots in county

When I learned of Mary Bistline's death recently, I turned to "Memories of Seminole County Families" to refresh my memory on the Bistline family history. This book was published by the Seminole County Historical Society in 2002 and is available at the Museum of

Seminole County History. This family's history is quite interesting so I thought you would enjoy it. I have known the Bistlines for several years through working

with them in the Seminole County Historical Society.

The Bistline brothers, John Jr. and Fred, can trace their family's involvement in Seminole County back to 1881 on their mother's side and 1911 on their father's.

On their maternal side (their mother was Adeline Niemeir), we begin with Josiah B. Clouser (1835-1920). He came to Longwood in 1881 from Perry County, Penn., to work for E. W. Henck, the founder of Longwood. He came with his wife, Elizabeth (1870-1953) and their two children, Charles (1865-?) and Frances (1870-1953).

Clouser's work for Henck was as master builder of a new hotel which for many years was the centerpiece of the town of Longwood, and was known as the Longwood Hotel. (I recall this hotel as having been the scene of our SHS Latin Banquet in both 1951 and 1952. I also attended a couple of luncheons there, probably in the 1970's. The building is now the Longwood Village Inn business offices).

Clouser was also prominent in civic affairs in Longwood, serving as an alderman on the first council (1883) and later as mayor for three terms (1889, 1895 and 1912). In 1883, he was founding officer of the Longwood Cemetery Association.

Clouser built several houses in Longwood, two of which were his, the Clouser Cottage on Church Avenue, and the Clouser home on Warren Avenue, now both located in the Longwood Historic District.

In addition to his building business, he was also foreman of the novelty shop of P.A. Demans, Inc. and was a partner along with his son, Charles, and Frank Niemeier in a general store in Longwood.

After retiring, he devoted his time to making fine cabinets from virgin Florida pine. He was recognized by the State of Florida as "A Great Floridian" by the 2000 Great Floridian Marker Program.

### Double trouble on the Geneva bubble? Maybe not

In 1990, there were 4,149 people in the Geneva area. In 2000, we saw a total of 5,550 residents here. By 2005, an expected 6,300 folks will call Geneva home. And — hold on — reaching build-out capacity in approximately 2010, this rural southeast Seminole County community will almost double in size to a population estimate of 10,000.

How will such rapid growth be managed? Fifty-plus current area residents filled the Geneva Community Center last week to hear Seminole County's answer to this, and other questions on the minds of many. Led by Seminole County Planning Manager Matt West, the presentation to the community covered items such as the protection of the Geneva freshwater "Bubble," possible subdivision requests, recreational facilities on the City of Sanford spray fields, future land use maps, ordinances and overlays, and possible challenges faced as the population in this area expands.

Showing attendees an outline of the legendary "bubble" area, West stated that with regards to development, this outline was used by the county to "define what you could or could not do in the Geneva area."

Currently, according to West, a development review has come before the county for discussion regarding a subdivision at Buck Lake. Proposing a small, four to five lot plan with about five-acre lots, the project developers may come before the county with a

request in the near future. Then again, they may not.

Such is the case also with property located at the corner of State Road 46 and Osceola Road. Holding "grandfathered in" approval for a possible RV park, the property owners recently met with Seminole

County offering to give up that park plan for a one-acre home site community instead. The land, however, sits in an area zoned A-5 (one home per five acres), and although previously approved long ago for the RV exception, the one-acre lot plan would now require the moving of what is known as the urban boundary.

Currently, that boundary ends at the St. Johns River just west of the property. Said West of making a change to that demarcation, "This would not be a good precedent. The moment you start moving it over, there is a domino effect. I could not recommend moving that urban boundary." And while an A-3, 14-lot alternative could still be considered, a water and sewer plan would then be required of the owner thus possibly making it economically unfeasible for them to develop.

According to West, another meeting has taken place of late regarding recre-

ational use of city of Sanford spray fields located on State Road 46 near Mullet Lake Park Road, in which a 40-acre paintball facility was proposed.

To be located east of the Sanford Aeromodelers field, the clear and open property would be equipped with barricades and other devices used in paintball games and would require a special exception from the board of adjustment.

Describing his feelings on this matter as "lukewarm," West said he hesitated to allow more commercial recreation in the area, feeling that this exception might lead to others and the property could end up as "one huge recreation area."

Referring to the future land use map, West then pointed out the large amount of public land surrounding Geneva. Noting the land protected along the St. Johns River as well as the acreage owned by Seminole County Natural Lands, West assured citizens that "there are some ordinances that do affect development or potential development in the Geneva area."

Planners looking ahead in 1991, determined that the existing A-1 zoning of this area would lead to as many as 40,000 home sites at future build-out, and changed the classification for all land east of the St. Johns River to a large lot A-5 zoning. Not only that, but the five acres built on must be high and dry. Considering all the wetland in this eastern two-thirds of Seminole County, planners felt this would cut

down dramatically on urban development, leaving the area with perhaps 10,000 home sites instead.

Due to the zoning overlay protecting the recharge area of the Geneva "Bubble," paving is also limited, thereby allowing uninhibited aquifer filtration. A scenic overlay also exists along state roads 426 and 46 calling for large setbacks and building restrictions. West said this would "protect natural resources and keep the rural atmosphere."

Challenges to such plans are now mostly coming from cities trying to annex and rezone parts of the Black Hammock area near Winter Springs and Oviedo — a situation West described as "a battle."

When asked about Geneva ever facing such a threat from Sanford, West commented that while Sanford is annexing land out toward the St. Johns River, it would be difficult for them to jump beyond that boundary because of the ordinances, overlays and restrictions already in place.

It was noted, however, that the county has no power to stop a city's annexation of county land. Their power lies only in the zoning classification changes then requested by the city involved.

Other questions posed involved boat noise levels, the opening up of the St. Johns/Lake Jesup Bridge to allow more water flow, possible

Fred Niemeyer (1884-1974), Closser's partner in the general store, came to Longwood in 1885 from Scranton, Penn. In addition to his store, he also served as Longwood postmaster for 20 years. And in 1889 he married the Closser's daughter, Frances. They had one daughter, Adeline Alvina (1894-1985), a graduate of the Rollins College Academy. Their home stands on the corner of Warren and Wilcox Streets in the historic district.

The father of the Blaine brothers, John Aaron Blaine, Sr. (1889-1978) came to Longwood in 1911 from Perry County, Penn. to work for Fred Niemeyer as a general handyman. He soon began a business of his own, raising sheep for local hotels and shipping them to a New York City commission house during the non-tourist months.

In 1914 Blaine married the Niemeyer's daughter, Adeline. Their first home in Longwood was on Warren Avenue. His business was across the road between Church and Warren, along Milwee Street. In the 1920's he moved both his business and his home to SR-434.

Blaine served on the Longwood City Council during the 1920's, and 1930's. He was later elected to the Seminole County School Board and served 1943-61. The Lyman High School gym was named for him. It is now part of Milwee Middle School.

He was a breeder of blue ribbon Silver Wyandotte show birds, exhibiting all over the United States and a supplier of prize winning birds to bird fanciers worldwide.

John and Adeline Blaine had two sons, John Aaron Jr. (1923 - ) and Frederick Walter (1926 - ).

John Jr. graduated from Lyman High School in 1941, Rollins College in 1944 and obtained his masters degree from Cornell University in 1948. As a member of the U.S. Army he worked on the atomic bomb at Los Alamos, 1944-46.

He spent his professional career at the Knolls Atomic Power Lab, operated by General Electric Co. in

Schenectady, N.Y. where he was manager of several experimental reactors.

John married Mary Lester Woodruff in 1948. Mary taught school and also operated in Long in an area business group, giving illustrated lectures.

Both John and Mary were active in church work, and John sang in the Okechee Choral Society for 30 years.

They returned to Longwood in 1963 and have been active in various historical societies including the Central Florida Society for Historic Preservation, the Seminole County Historical Society and the Seminole County Historical Commission.

This couple has three daughters, Carol Jean Richman, Anne Adele and Maryellen Seaman.

Frederick graduated from Lyman High School in 1944 and Florida Southern College in 1949. He served in the Navy in the Pacific Theater, 1944-46.

He was employed by Minute Maid, later a division of Coca Cola, becoming manager of Horticultural Research and Technical Services. He is the author of approximately 35 papers on orange grove entomology and developed a method of propagating cola nut trees. He was president of the Florida State Horticulture Society and has been an officer in the Seminole County Farm Bureau for many years.

In 1949 he married Mary Carolyn Stansell from Miami. She was a public school teacher for many years and was also owner and principal of the Oak Tree Kindergarten in Longwood. She is a past president of the Longwood Civic League and served in the auxiliary at South Seminole Hospital. Both Fred and Carolyn are active in the Central Florida Society for Historical Preservation and the Seminole County Historical Society. They are also active in church work.

They have four children, Frederick Walter, Jr., John Leland, Frances Kathryn Stephan and Jane Marie Riordan.

dredging of Lake Jesup, railroad right-of-ways, airport expansion and a possible future study of the "bubble."

While many of the concerns did not directly involve the planning department and therefore could not be addressed in detail, West assured those in attendance that one purpose of the meeting was to gather such information and take it back to the county for consideration.

Thanking the county representatives for coming out, Richard Creedon, of the Geneva Citizen's Association (GCA), expressed appreciation for the reassuring information given community residents. Creedon also noted that even though all these protections are in place, the GCA prefers to be proactive with these issues rather than having to be reactive after the fact and that is why they sponsored the evening's meeting.

Also attending this night from Seminole County Planning were senior planners April Boswell and Kathleen Consoil as well as Assistant Supervisor Gloria Vyka. 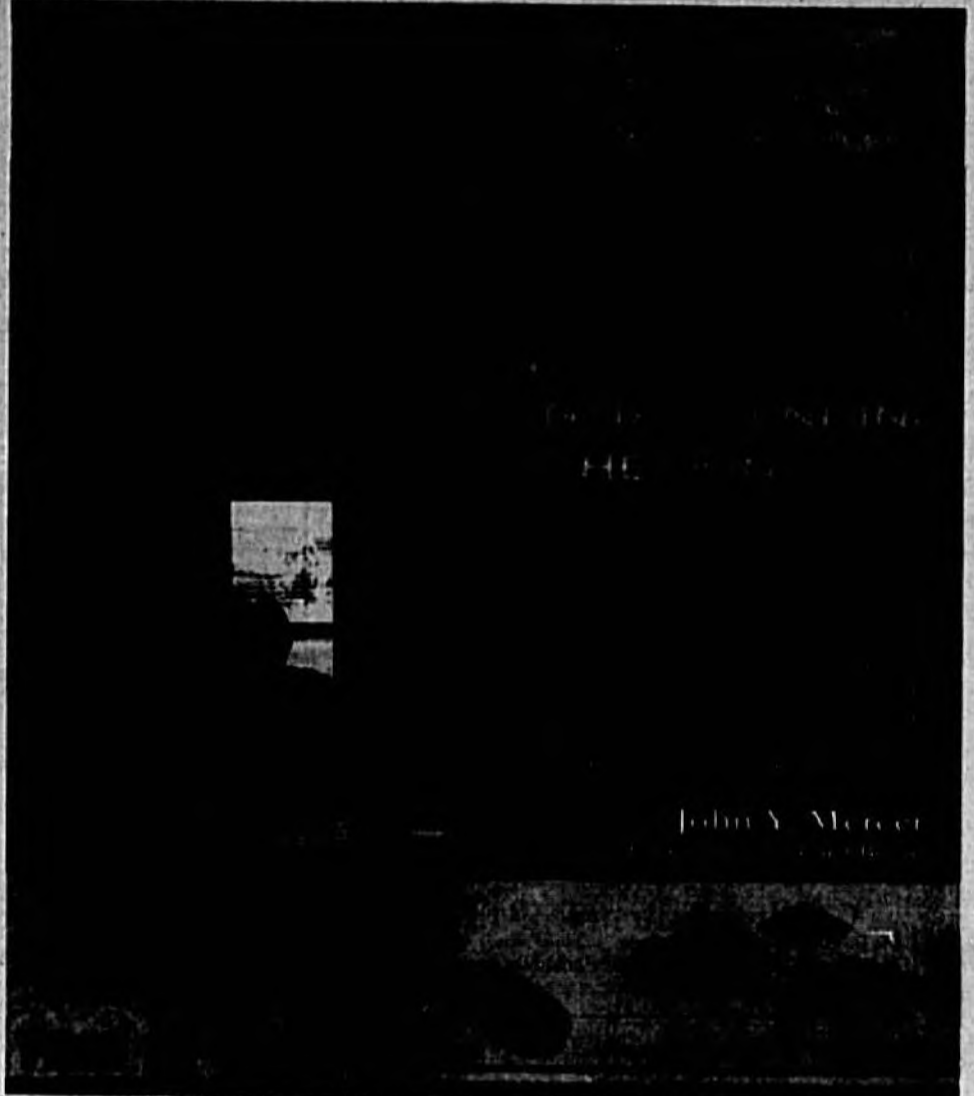

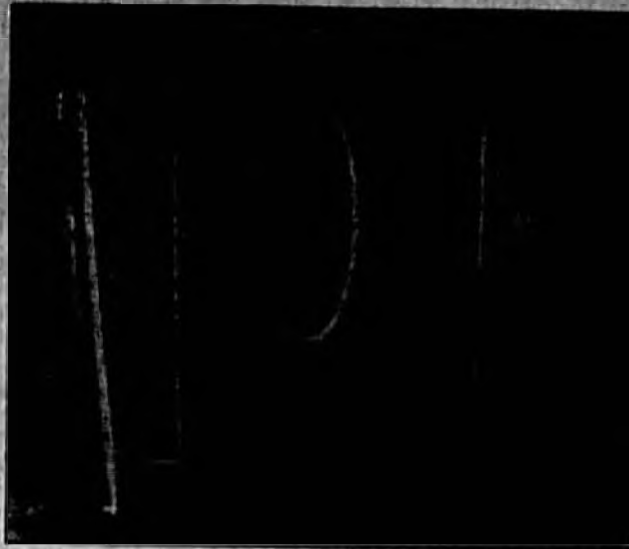

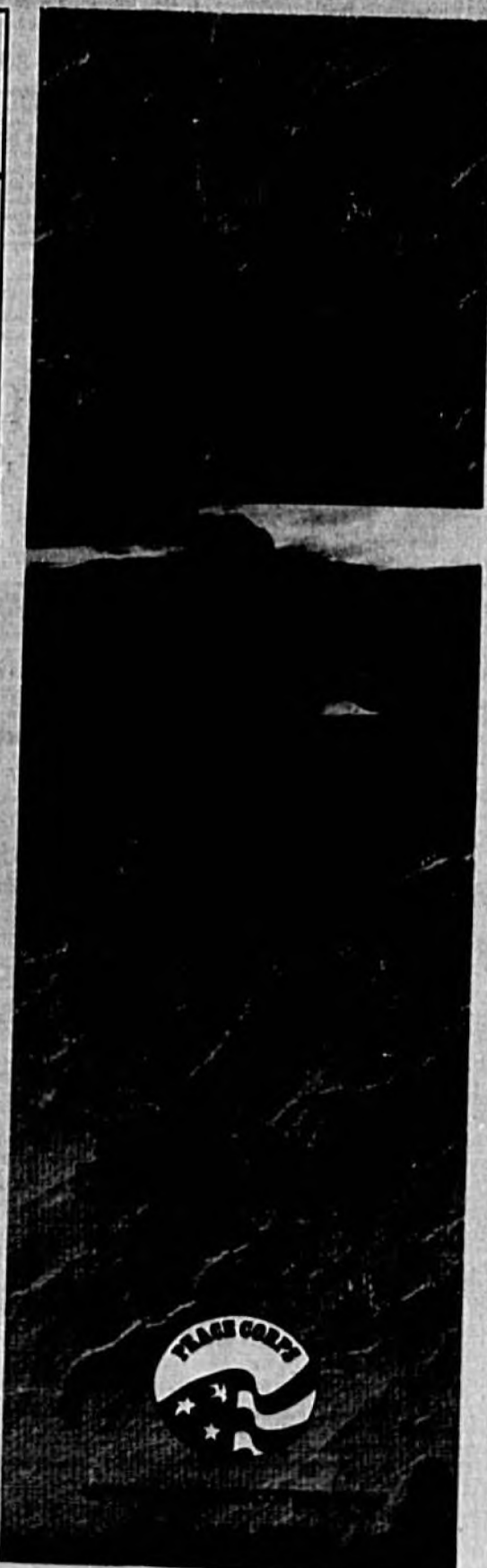

from Hawaii to Australia. He is a survivor of the USS Arizona sinking at Pearl Harbor and was aboard the destroyer that escorted the USS Missouri into Tokyo for the surrender of the Japanese. This radar man served in the U.S. Navy from April 1, 1940 to Aug. 22, 1967.

"Basically, I started and finished WWII," he said.

Westbrook is also a champion of the community. What started as an invite to speak to a Hawthorn Elementary classroom has led this U.S. veteran to become one of Seminole County Schools' most notable and sought after speakers. On average, he visits about two schools a month giving presentations about Pearl Harbor and WWII.

"I wound up going from one classroom to the whole school system," he said. "I have a lot of

fun. The kids are good and I like talking to them."

In addition, he volunteers his time at the Orlando Science Center where he has donated more than 1,900 hours of his time as a roving center volunteer.

"It keeps me young and it keeps me going," Westbrook said about his penchant for community service.

With Westbrook's resume of community volunteerism and service to the country, he was an ideal candidate as the 2003 Golden Age Games honorary chairman.

"He's involved in the community and Golden Age Games, which is great," said Kim Eltonhead, Golden Age Games chairperson.

A participant in past Golden Age Games, Westbrook has

snagged six medals and a handful of ribbons for his prowess as a swimmer and crafter.

Although he's not competing this year, Westbrook will be busy with honorary chairman duties that include lighting the torch at the opening ceremonies on Sunday, Nov. 2, at 1:30 p.m. at the Sanford Civic Center.

The 85 year old is not taking his duty as honorary chairman lightly. He believes in the Golden Age Games and is excited to share his excitement with others.

"You can't — when you get in the older ages — just sit back and do nothing," he said.

"Not only do they (that attend the games) find people that like doing the same things, but it keeps them young and staying fit," he added. "It's really ideal for seniors to be doing something like this."

active sirens, or is it just me? "Iraqi Freedom" my hind-foot, the "liberators" are killing their "liberators."

We did a check point today. At about 1300 hrs we heard a tremendous explosion in the city. It turned out to be a double-car bombing at the Baghdad Hotel, but we were informed that the primary target was actually an Iraqi police station located there, so I don't know how it will be reported in the news. That is a busy road through that area with several big hotels. You could see big black smoke in the sky coming up from the location which isn't very far away. I could hear sirens heading in that direction and choppers flying overhead. We had to stay on our check point, so I can't tell you much about that one since I wasn't there.

Last night, I took two teams of people to the BIAP [Baghdad International Airport] for a video teleconference with their families in Fort Stewart. I guess they patched this through a satellite. Each of us got to talk and see our families for 10

minutes. I got to talk and see Joyce, Andrew and Charlie IV, and before they came on screen I heard little Charlie say "Hey, there's daddy" because he could see my image on the screen. Andrew was climbing everywhere, and pointed and said, in his own way, "DaDa." I think he thought that I was inside the television. C4 told me what good grades he was making and showed me his Harry Potter T-shirt. Man, those boys are sure growing fast. Joyce looked beautiful, I really want to see my family again. The teleconference was nice, but 10 minutes goes by real quick, and you can't even touch them. After everybody had their 10 minutes with their families, we drove back through some of the most dangerous streets on earth, fearing an ambush or road side bombing, with our families still fresh in our minds.

16 Oct. 2003 I've been appointed as the investigator of an adultery case. These are usually handled by commissioned officers, but I guess I was picked because I'm a former CID

agent and have more investigative experience than the junior officers. I won't go into detail for integrity reasons, but this is a 15-6 investigation under UCMJ [Uniform Code of Military Justice] involving Articles 92 and 134. The allegation involves two married soldiers, male and female, and will probably result in a field grade Article 15 punishment. [Non-judicial punishment]. Anyway, I had to do this investigation in addition to running my regular patrol. Tonight I get to relax and will try to watch CSI on my laptop.

My shoulder is giving me one heck of a problem. It is that rotator-cuff problem in the joint, and they just keep giving me 800mg of Motrin. I will probably end up with stomach ulcers and a bad arm. When I reach across to roll-up the window in the humvee, the pain is really bad. Since it is my left shoulder it is hard to steady my weapon with my left arm. Any quick movements really shoots the pain through my arm. Still, I try to stay doped up on Motrin

and continue leading my patrol.

Two soldiers on patrol here came upon four Iraqis planting a IED [Improvised Explosive Device] on the side of the road. They subdued the Iraqis and beat the crap out of them, no doubt saved the lives of G.I.s. But now the two soldiers are charged with a war crime. How can there be a war crime if this is not a war? Why is it okay to kill these same types but not okay to beat the crap out of them? Nothing makes sense anymore. Soldiers are sick and tired of being targets of road

side bombers. They are frustrated and stressed out. It's no wonder they dealt with these terrorists the way they did. Now this will just add to their stress and will probably take two soldiers off patrol. We desperately need all the help we can get.

Every morning when my patrol passes by some horses outside of our camp, I can see the horses nodding their heads. One horse is always in the same spot each morning. On the other side of the road I can see dead horses laying there all swollen up. They seem to have a death grin on their faces as starv-

ing dogs tug at the decomposing flesh of their hindquarters.

I think the horses are nodding their heads for some reason, maybe it is suppose to mean something to me, but what I do not know. These nodding horses are on the same road where the IED was being planted. Maybe their head nodding has to do with that IED incident. I've listened to enough jackasses about this war. Maybe it's time to listen to the horses.

Next issue: Progress gains are small.

# UCF football team in West Virginia

Coming off of a 31-13 Homecoming win over Central Michigan, the UCF Golden Knights (3-5 overall) travel to Morgantown, W. Va. today take on the West Virginia Mountaineers (3-4).

Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. and the game will be televised in the Orlando/Tampa markets on Sunshine Network.

On radio, the game can be heard on the six-station UCF ISP Sports Network. Locally, 740 The Team (WOTM) will provide coverage, with Marc Daniels providing the play-by-play call and Gary Parris offering his insight. In addition, reporter Jerry O'Neill will bring fans up-to-the-minute information from the sideline. Pregame coverage begins at 11 a.m.

UCF will face a West Virginia squad that upset then third-ranked Virginia Tech 28-7 last week in Morgantown. UCF and West Virginia have never faced each other, however this will be the third time this year the Golden Knights have faced an opponent from the BIG EAST conference. UCF lost at Virginia Tech to open the season 49-28 and lost 38-14 to Syracuse in the Carrier Dome on September 20th.

Scouting West Virginia  
Head coach Rich Rodriguez has the difficult task of refocusing his squad

after the upset win over rival Virginia Tech. Fortunately, he has the legs of Quincy Wilson to grind out yards on the ground. Wilson, a senior running back, rushed for 178 yards and a touchdown in the win over the Hokies and has gained 355 yards in the past two games.

Wilson has also scored eight touchdowns on the year. Junior quarterback Rasheed Marshall is efficient and effective, having passed for 991 yards on the year with nine touchdown passes. At receiver, sophomore Chris Harry and senior Travis Garvin provide a deep threat that exploits their blazing speed. Harry has an 83-yard touchdown catch this year, while Garvin has a 93-yard touchdown reception, good for second on WVU's all-time list.

On defense, the Mountaineers boast senior linebacker Grant Wiley. Wiley is the career leader at West Virginia in tackles for loss and places sixth on the career tackles list. He has 93 tackles on the season, with seven of those coming behind the line of scrimmage.

In the defensive backfield, senior Brian King patrols the passing lanes. King leads the Mountaineer squad with 10 passes defended on the year, and ranks first in that same category on WVU's career list. Overall, West Virginia allows 355 yards per game

while only allowing the opponent to score 18 points per game, good for 22nd in the country.

Scouting UCF  
The UCF offense goes as Ryan Schneider goes. The senior quarterback led the Golden Knights to their victory over Central Michigan with 254 yards passing and two touchdown passes. The two scores extended Schneider's school record for consecutive games with a touchdown pass to 27.

On the receiving end of each Schneider touchdown pass against the Chippewas was junior wide receiver Tavaris Capers. Capers has 57 receptions on the season, totaling 508 yards and seven touchdowns. When UCF runs the football, junior tailback Alex Haynes is usually on the receiving end. Haynes has 103 yards rushing and 95 yards receiving against Central Michigan, and rushes for an average of 72 yards per game.

Defensively, head coach Mike Kruczek was pleased with the performance his squad showed against the Chippewas. The defensive unit allowed just 316 yards of total offense, 80 yards under their season average.

Leading the way is linebacker Antoine Poe. Poe ranks second on the team with 76 tackles, including ten See College, Page 3B

# Auberlen grabs pole for Rolex Sports Car Series finale

Bill Auberlen captured the pole for today's (Saturday) Rolex Sports Car Series season finale, part of the Grand American Champions Weekend presented by Brumos Porsche at Daytona International Speedway.

Auberlen turned a 1:48.667 lap at 108.331 mph in the Doran-Lista Racing No. 27 Toyota Doran JEA, setting the fastest qualifying lap by a Daytona Prototype to date at Daytona International Speedway.

"The car feels great," Auberlen said. "From the first day we were here and the first practice, the car wasn't very good. Very quickly, (the crew) adjusted the problems and fixed them and by this morning we're looking really good."

Auberlen will be joined on the front row by Eric Curran, who led all GTS qualifiers with a lap of 1:49.770/107.242 mph in the No. 29 Gardenrom.com Ford Mustang, for the 250-mile race, that takes the green flag at 1 p.m.

Forest Barber turned in the third fastest lap, 1:50.211/106.813 mph, in the No. 34 Chevrolet Doran he shares with Daytona Prototypes points leader Terry Borcheller. Barber will be joined on the second row by Lyndon Amick, driver of the No. 50 Corvette, who was timed at 1:50.971/106.082 mph.

A pair of Daytona Prototypes will start on the third row for the race. Mike Borkowski was fifth quickest in the No. 58 Red Bull Porsche FABCAR, followed by Duncan Dayton in the new PAP Racing No. 7 BMW FABCAR.

Fastest GT qualifier was Johannes Van Overbeek, driver of the No. 83 Flying Lizard Racing Porsche, who ran a lap of 1:55.029 / 102.339 mph.

Borcheller enters Saturday's race with a three-point lead over Borkowski and David Donohue in the Daytona Prototypes championship. Also in the running for the title are Hurley Haywood and JC France, with France qualifying ninth overall in Friday's qualifying session.

The Grand American Rolex Sports Car Series wraps up its 2003 season with the Grand American Champions Weekend presented by Brumos Porsche events. The weekend will feature both the new and greatest sports cars from the Grand American Road Racing Association as well as the legendary machines from Historic Sportscar Racing on the twist and turns of Daytona International Speedway's 3.56-mile road course.

The inaugural season of Daytona Prototype racing has been filled with plenty of excitement and thrills through the first 11 races of the Rolex Series, and the final race of the season may be the best yet as three teams and five drivers enter the Grand American Champions Weekend with a shot at capturing the Daytona Prototype team owner and driver titles.

Tickets will be sold at the gate during the event. Admission to Saturday's Rolex Sports Car Series finale and HSR races will be \$20. Tickets to Sunday's full day of historic racing will be \$25. Parking will be free on Friday and Saturday and cost \$5 on Sunday to anyone not holding an Advance Super Ticket.

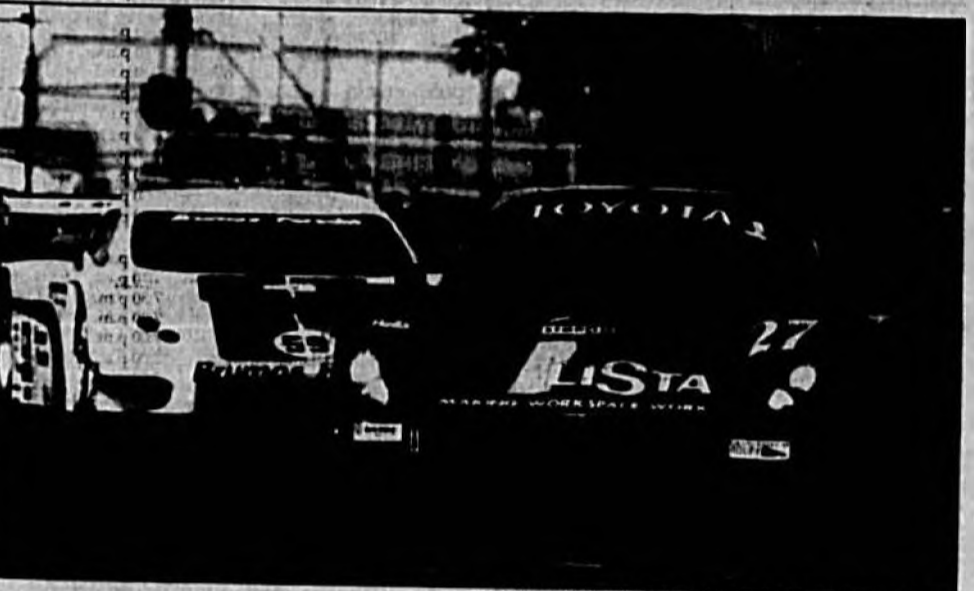

The UCF men's basketball team was select-

ed to finish fourth and fifth and Stetson eighth in the 2003 Atlantic Sun Men's Preseason Polls as picked by the league's head coaches and media respectively the conference office announced Monday.

UCF, which is coming off a record-tying 21-win season, received 79 votes finishing tied for fourth with Belmont in the coaches poll. Selected ahead of the Golden Knights were Georgia State, Troy State and Mercer. GSU, which was the No. 1 choice in both polls, received seven first-place votes from the coaches.

The top five media selections were nearly identical as UCF was chosen fifth receiving 137 votes, again behind GSU, Troy State, Mercer and Belmont.

The top eight teams will advance to the championship and compete for the A-Sun's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. Under NCAA rules for new Division I members, Lipscomb is ineligible for an automatic bid for two years and is not eligible to compete in the men's basketball tournament, as well as Gardner-Webb, who will be eligible next year to compete for the title. Belmont, will host the 2003-04 tournament on March 4-6, in Nashville, Tenn. at the brand-new Curb Event Center (3500).

The top eight teams in the league will advance to the A-Sun Championship, Mar. 4-6 in Nashville, Tenn. Belmont University will serve as the host school.

In 2002-03 the Golden Knights were selected by both the coaches and the media to finish fifth in the A-Sun South and went on to become one of four teams in the conference to post at least 20 wins. The Golden Knights advanced to the A-Sun championship game last season eventually falling to Troy State.

The Golden Knights will open the regular season at home against Puerto Rico Mayaguez on Nov. 22. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m. UCF will play one preseason game on Nov. 13 against St. Leo at UCF Arena. Tip off is set for 7:30 p.m.

Last year under the two-division format, Stetson (6-20, 4-12 A-Sun) finished fifth in the South Division. The Hatters open the preseason at home vs. Florida Tech on Nov. 7.

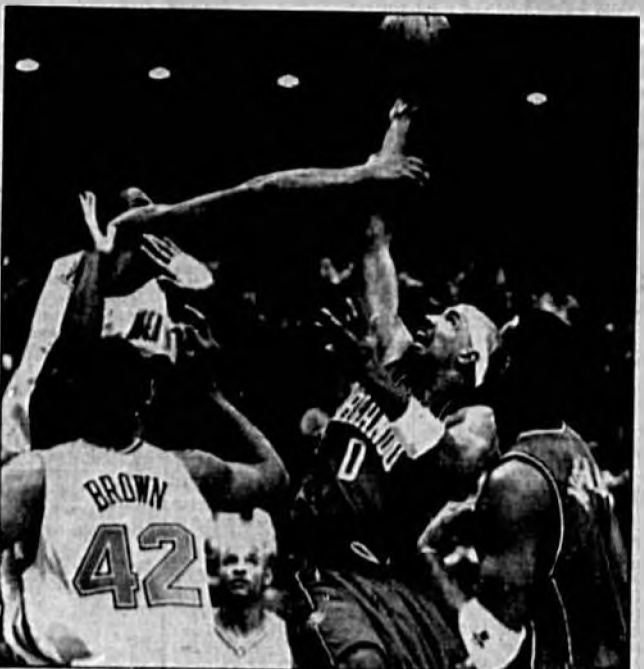

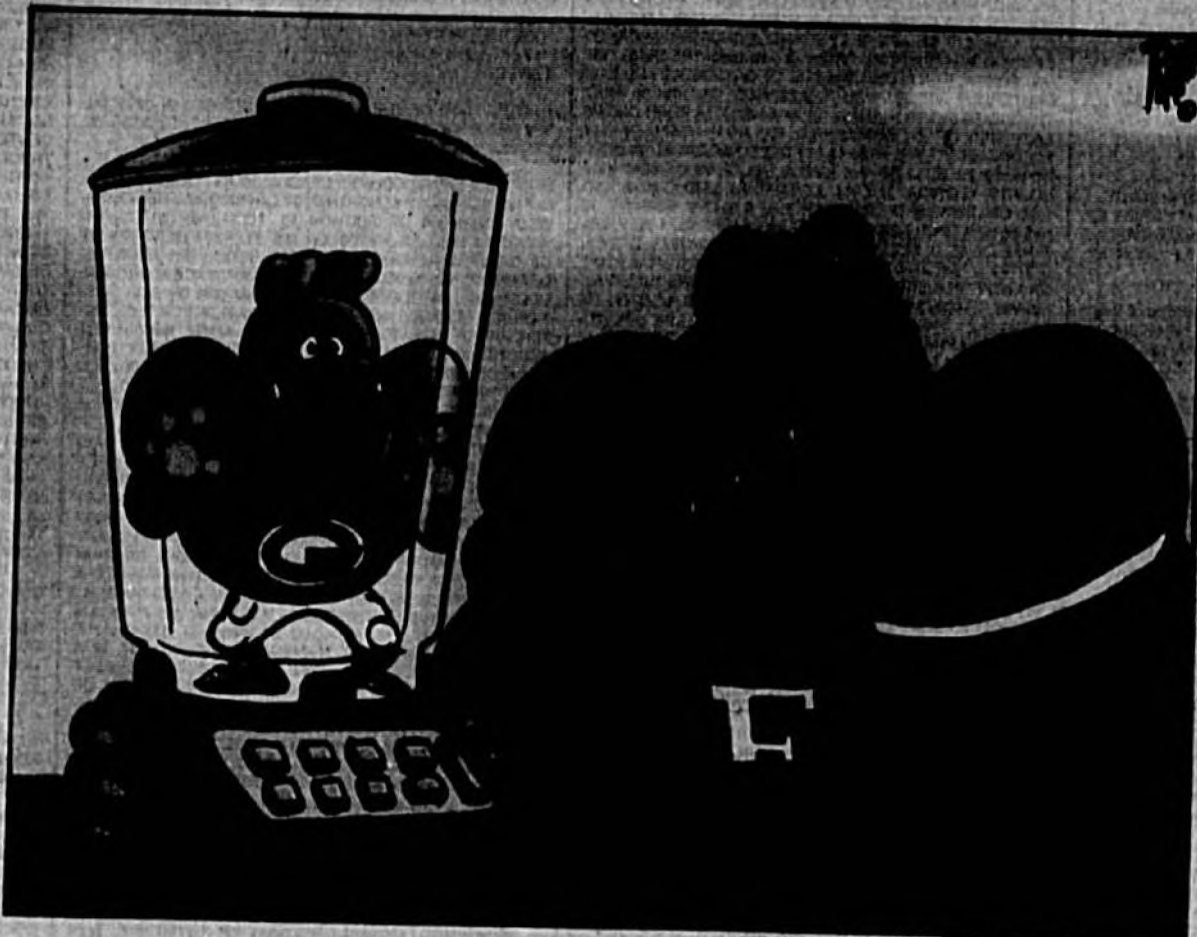

## Stakes high in Jacksonville

It's always a big game when the Gators and the Bulldogs clash in Jacksonville for the "World's Largest Cocktail Party." But this year there is even more at stake, especially for the Gators, who must win to keep their conference hopes alive — and even if they do, there is still a good chance the battle for the East could end in a three-way tie.

The Bulldogs will lay it all on the line, hoping they can dash the dreams of the Gators and prove that close calls the last two weeks against inferior opponents were nothing more than playing down to the competition. Georgia also must overcome a recent rash of injuries and hope its patchwork offensive line can give quarterback David Greene time to find sophomores Bryan McClendon and Mario Raley, who have been pushed into more prominent roles because of others' injuries.

For their part, the Gators hope a bye week didn't take away the momentum they had gained with wins over LSU and Arkansas. Georgia has the motivation, having beaten Florida last once in the last 13 years, especially after the loss to Florida last year (the only defeat of the season) ended national championship hopes. A victory here would lock up the East, since Georgia would need to win only one of two remaining games, both at home.

### Florida vs. Georgia (at Jacksonville)

■ **Records:** Florida 5-3 (3-2 SEC); Georgia 7-1 (4-1 SEC).  
 ■ **Series:** Georgia leads 44-34-2. ■ **Coaches:** Florida's Ron Zook (13-8); Georgia's Mark Richt (28-6). ■ **Kickoff:** 3:30 p.m. EST.  
 ■ **TV:** CBS.

■ **Key for Florida:** Use all the running backs. Ran Carthon, DeShawn Wynn and Clatrick Fason each offer something different. Carthon's straight-ahead style can lull a defense to sleep, allowing Florida to hit them with a dose of Wynn or Fason, who can hit the turbo button and blow right past defenders.

■ **Key for Georgia:** Find someone to block and protect QB David Greene, and try not to look like the team that has allowed 25 sacks already this season. With two guards missing, and the top two fullbacks also injured, the Bulldogs will again count on gimpy and relatively inexperienced players to help pick up the blitz.

### The Rest of the Matchups

#### South Carolina at Ole Miss

■ **Records:** South Carolina 5-3 (2-3 SEC); Ole Miss 6-2 (4-0 SEC). ■ **Series:** Ole Miss leads 6-5. ■ **Coaches:** South Carolina's Lou Holtz (243-123-7); Mississippi's David Cutcliffe (35-21).  
 ■ **Kickoff:** 12:30 p.m. EST. ■ **TV:** Jefferson-Pilot.

■ **Key for South Carolina:** Find a way, any way, to put pressure on Ole Miss QB Eli Manning, or it will be a long day. The Gamecocks' pass defense has struggled mightily in the last two weeks, mainly because it can't seem to get to the quarterback no matter how many players it blitzes.

■ **Key for Ole Miss:** Keep up the good work on defense and let the offense take care of the rest. This team has gone from allowing 32 points a game to allowing only 52 for the month of October. If Ole Miss can keep stuffing the run and keep improving its pass defense, the Rebels will go to 5-0 in the conference.

#### Louisiana-Monroe at Auburn

■ **Records:** Louisiana-Monroe 1-7 (1-3 Sun Belt); Auburn 5-3

(4-1 SEC). ■ **Series:** Auburn leads 4-0. ■ **Coaches:** Louisiana-Monroe's Charlie Weatherbie (46-71); Auburn's Tommy Tuberville (60-42). ■ **Kickoff:** 2:30 p.m. EST. ■ **TV:** None.

■ **Key for Louisiana-Monroe:** Wrap up plays, and don't allow the big runs. Last week the Indians allowed a New Mexico State running back to amass 218 yards on the ground, including a 68-yard score. If they don't find some way to tackle better and fill gaps, they'll have to watch Auburn RB Carnell Williams rack up another record-setting day at their expense.

■ **Key for Auburn:** Score early and often, not just to win this game but to regain confidence after being held in check by LSU last week. Get the running game clicking again with a time-consuming opening drive, and the rest will fall into place.

#### Duke at Tennessee

■ **Records:** Duke 2-6 (0-3 ACC); Tennessee 5-2 (3-2 SEC).  
 ■ **Series:** Tied 13-13-2. ■ **Coaches:** Duke's Ted Roof (0-1); Tennessee's Phillip Fulmer (108-27). ■ **Kickoff:** 4 p.m. EST.  
 ■ **TV:** None.

■ **Key for Duke:** New coach Ted Roof needs to stay creative and continue to mix up the play-calling. Last week, he kept N.C. State off balance with a series of reverses, and by rotating quarterbacks he also keeps a defense guessing, running the option with one and throwing with the other.

■ **Key for Tennessee:** Hold on to the ball. Turnovers have been killing any momentum the Vols' offense has been able to muster. Three first-quarter fumbles almost did them in early last week.

#### Arkansas at Kentucky

■ **Records:** Arkansas 4-3 (1-3 SEC); Kentucky 4-4 (1-3 SEC).  
 ■ **Series:** Kentucky leads 2-1. ■ **Coaches:** Arkansas' Houston Nutt (79-48); Kentucky's Rich Brooks (95-113-4). ■ **Kickoff:** 7 p.m. EST. ■ **TV:** ESPN2.

■ **Key for Arkansas:** Get healthy at running back. Running backs Cedric Cobbs and De'Arrius Howard are sorely missed in a backfield that had only two healthy players available last week. Without a credible running game, the Razorbacks' passing game will be easy pickings for the Wildcats.

■ **Key for Kentucky:** Wind up kick/punt returner Derek Abney and watch him head for the end zone. He is easily the Wildcats' most explosive playmaker, and against a solid defense like Arkansas', they will need every non-offensive point they can get in the game.

#### Louisiana Tech at LSU

■ **Records:** Louisiana Tech 4-4 (2-3 WAC); LSU 7-1 (4-1 SEC).  
 ■ **Series:** LSU leads 15-1. ■ **Coaches:** Louisiana Tech's Jack Bicknell (26-29); LSU's Nick Saban (76-39-1). ■ **Kickoff:** 8 p.m. EST. ■ **TV:** None.

■ **Key for Louisiana Tech:** It sounds odd, but running the ball will be paramount for this passing team. They need Ryan Monts to pound the rock not only to set up the pass, but also to chew up the clock and keep LSU QB Matt Mauck and WR Michael Clayton on the sidelines, where they can't do any damage.

■ **Key for LSU:** Shut down the run, just like the Tigers did against Auburn last week, and force Louisiana Tech quarterback Luke McCown to take to the air. If he does, the Tigers will get at least three interceptions, which will lead to defensive scoring, which will lead to a blowout by halftime.

## 2-MINUTE DRILL

■ **ALABAMA** Junior offensive tackle Wesley Bell broke his left leg in the first quarter last week against Tennessee. Bell was a preseason All-SEC pick, and has started 34 games in his career at Alabama. He also was on the watch list for the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's top collegiate lineman.

■ **ARKANSAS** Brandon Holmes, a former running back who had been playing linebacker, ran six times for 26 yards last week before injuring his knee in the second quarter and missing the rest of the game against Ole Miss. Holmes is done for the season.

■ **AUBURN** Auburn, which had averaged 202.3 yards on the ground, could manage only 50 yards on 34 carries against the conference's top-rated defense, LSU. Carnell Williams, the SEC's third-leading running back at 101.3 yards per game, gained 61 yards on 20 carries and didn't score. Auburn finished with 193 total yards.

■ **FLORIDA** Since 1990, the Gators are 18-6 following a bye week and 8-2 when the next game is at a neutral site. And Florida is 9-1 against Georgia when they face the Bulldogs after a bye week. Head coach Ron Zook is out 1-1 after a bye week, with his one win coming against the Bulldogs last year.

■ **MISSISSIPPI** Kicker Billy Bennett became the leading scorer in school history when he booted three field goals last week to push his career total to 355 points, surpassing Kevin Butler's total of 353. "It's a great honor, Bennett said. "Still, I don't think I'm the kicker that Kevin Butler was. I don't measure up to him by any means." Bennett has 74 field goals in his career, three short of Butler's school record.

■ **KENTUCKY** Kentucky returns Derek Abney tied the NCAA career record for kick return touchdowns with an 80-yard punt return in the third quarter of the Wildcats' victory over Mississippi State. Abney, who broke or tied five NCAA and nine Southeastern Conference records for kick returns last season, has returned eight kicks for touchdowns in his career.

■ **MISSISSIPPI** The Tigers' 21 first-quarter points against Auburn marked the first time they have scored at least 20 points in the first quarter against an SEC opponent since Oct. 12, 1985, when LSU scored 21 in the first at Vanderbilt and went on to rout the Commodores 49-7.

■ **MISSISSIPPI** The Rebels wrap up a four-game homestand this week against South Carolina, looking to go 5-0 in the conference for the first time since 1963, when they won an SEC title. But since the SEC split into two divisions in 1992, the Miss is the only Western Division team without a division title. Ole Miss linebacker Justin Wade said, "It's a new feeling, one we haven't had for a while."

■ **MISSISSIPPI** The Bulldogs haven't exactly rallied around head coach Jackie Sherrill since he announced he would retire at the end of the season. They've dropped both of the games since Sherrill made the announcement, and they've now lost six straight road games and 11 straight SEC road games.

■ **SOUTH CAROLINA** The Gamecocks' running game got a little confidence back, gaining 218 yards against Vanderbilt after being blanketed by rushing against LSU. "We wanted to establish the run in the first series so we could run the rest of the game," said DeSean Thurman, who led South Carolina with 94 yards on 15 carries.

■ **TENNESSEE** The Volunteers' victory over Alabama in the fifth overtime not only kept them in the race for the SEC East crown, it also snapped a two-game slide and prevented the Vols from losing three in a row for the first time since 1992, the year before Phillip Fulmer was promoted to head coach. The victory also made the Vols the first team to beat Alabama three straight times at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

■ **VANDERBILT** Commodores quarterback Jay Cutler set career bests with 319 yards passing and three touchdowns, completing 27 of his 35 passes in Vandy's 35-24 loss to South Carolina last week. Cutler is now second in the conference in passing yards after Ole Miss' Eli Manning.
