## Farm Land Taxes Showing Increase

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—(AP)—A small rise in the average taxes on farm lands in 1936 is reported by the agriculture department in a preliminary survey of 38 states.

The department reports the national average tax on an acre of farm land at 37 cents in 1934-35 compared with the peak of 58 cents in 1929. Taxes per \$100 of land value averaged \$1.11 in 1935, \$1.19 in 1934, \$1.50 in the peak year of 1932, and 55 cents in 1913.

### Will Plead for Low Tariffs and Arms Cuts

### American Ambassador To France Speaks At Washington's Dinner

PARIS, Feb. 23. — A plan for the wide lowering of armaments and trade barriers was made known today in a speech by William C. Bullitt, American Ambassador to France, at a Washington's dinner at the Hotel George V, presided over by Premier Leon Blum.

Bullitt, in the day Americans in France celebrated Washington's birthday in traditional ceremonies, among which Bullitt, accompanied by American military and naval attaches, laid a wreath before the statue of George Washington in the Grand Hotel. Representatives of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Daughters of the American Revolution participated. The Ambassador was seated at a luncheon at his residence in the Rue de la Casse and was accompanied by members of the Canadian and American diplomatic corps.

The dinner, which was sponsored by the American Club, with the president, Theodore Rousseau, in the chair, Bullitt said:

"We are interested in the preservation of peace, and we believe the two fields of foreign af-

airs in which we can co-operate fully with the full approval of the people of the United States are two fields in which may be found the beginnings of peace. I refer to the fields of reduction of trade barriers and limitation of armaments.

"We have made it entirely clear that we believe that unless the trade of the world can be freed from the barriers which now impede it, economic stress may drive the people to desperation.

Hold in hand with the re-creation of world economy goes the question of limitation of armaments. It is impossible to restore world prosperity when the nations are engaged in raising their economic and financial positions by participation in an armaments race. It is impossible to expect nations to co-operate economically if they fear that the revival of some other nation will result in the iron and steel they furnish to that nation being returned to them in the form of bombs and shells."

Premier Blum disappointed expectations that he might take the opportunity to make a declaration on foreign policy by confining himself strictly to what might be called a courtesy speech.

He quoted liberally from Chamberlain's description of his reception by Washington in his "Memoirs d'Outre-mer." He declared that Washington had left as his lasting memorial the United States, whereas the vast empire created on the battlefield by Napoleon had passed into the shadows.

Prolific Artist Discovers Many Are Unfriendly

Eliabemus Also Is Writer Of Books And Music Author

By CHARLES NORMAN AP Feature Service Writer NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Louis Michel Eliabemus sits with a shawl around his shoulders and a blanket over his legs in a room cluttered up by his unsold canvases.

The pictures are ranged a score deep on the floor, they perch on chairs, hide a sofa from view engulf the piano and overflow into the next room.

In their midst, like King Canute with his ankles in the tide, sits their creator, who calls himself "Supreme Parnassian" and "Transcendent Eagle of Art".

Above perched on top of a towering bookcase, two stuffed pelicans with the dust of years on them, look down placidly. By his own admission, Eliabemus has painted 9,000 pictures; written, he says 200 books, most of them unpublished; and composed perhaps a hundred pieces of music. For years he went about the street handing his card to strangers. The card proclaimed him painter, poet, composer, marshall, inventor and "ex-fancy amateur dancer."

He also sent letters to newspapers, which deplored the state of art, but were full of extravagant claims for his own pictures. The letters were signed Mahatma Louis M. Eliabemus, M. A. Wander of the Worlds, and, for variety, "Mightiest All-Round Man."

The "Mightiest All-Round Man" has fallen on evil days. Four years ago a taxi backed into him. He has been chair-bound ever since. He ascribes the accident to the evil spirits of his enemies.

Now he no longer paints or writes. He sits with his back to the window in an old-fashioned brownstone house where he lives in a bachelor's world with a bachelor brother. His view takes in the stair and hall. The house has never been wired for electricity.

Eliabemus is now 73 years old, and fame, long in coming, has finally arrived. Retrospective shows are his lot, and his pictures hang in the great museums

His shaggy white beard thrusts forward dramatically, and he resumes: "Great art is vision, imagination—nothing else. Nobody can beat me for nudes—I'm bigger than Michelangelo."

Limpid blue eyes flash fire and gnarled hands gesticulate. As he speaks he wears the look of a man deliciously surprising himself by the things he is saying. When he had recovered, he went on:

"Here is one of my books. Poe wrote his in 10 hours. I wrote mine in 10 hours. Poe? Bah! I'm better than Poe. Some of those fellows make fun of me. 'Poe's 10-hour play. You

don't make fun of Milton, do you? Or Shakespeare? Well, I have the brain of Milton and the versatility of Shakespeare. Sometimes my language is better than Shakespeare's. He was slipshod, you know.

He paused for breath. Suddenly—"How do I look?"

He reached for a hand mirror on the table and, peering into it, picked up a pair of scissors. He then proceeded to trim his beard.

"There are no great artists today," he resumed, but it was somehow understood between him and his visitor that there was an exception. "There are no great artists today because art is a religion."

"Here," he exclaimed triumphantly, "look at this art magazine." He waved it aloft. "I wrote them to print some good stuff, not Picasso and that sort of thing. By golly, they obeyed me. Look! There's my picture and two of my paintings in this issue."

He paused to let that sink in. "Art," he suddenly exclaimed, "is like a bird flying through the air—you know that, don't you?"

His visitor looked up and saw the stuffed pelicans gazing down with dusty, black-luster eyes.

Atlanta Boy Has 10 Years Experience As Museum Curator; Is Well-Versed

ATLANTA, Feb. 25.—(AP)—A 14-year-old boy, Walter Wellborn, a museum curator with 10 years' experience, can tell you that the "murre" (a bird) is any gulliform of the genus Uria Uria, and he knows the habits of the petrodrome (jumping shrew).

When only 4, Walter killed a rat, skinned and stuffed it, laid and mounted it as Exhibit No. 1 in his personal museum, that now includes specimens from Africa, South America, Europe, Asia and Australia as well as Dixie.

### Sleep Inducing Machine Shows At Northwest

#### Gadgets Drive May Produce Slumber For The Wakeful

EVANSTON, Ill., Feb. 25.—(AP)—Science has pulled a new one out of the bag—a sleep-inducing machine.

The machine, which Morgan says he has used successfully on individuals and groups in his psychology classes, is no larger than a small radio set. It contains an electric motor-driven mechanism causing a diaphragm to vibrate 10 times a minute with a tone two octaves below middle "C."

The "r-u-u-m, r-u-u-m, r-u-u-m" of the machine, like the drone of an airplane motor in full flight, induces relaxation, weariness and then sleep, says Morgan, in all extreme cases. Only a small number of persons find the tone irritating, he says.

The time required to produce sleep varies with the person, his immediate mental and physical alertness and his environment but the professor says he has found that usually one becomes passive and drowsy in a few minutes.

The tone frequently can be regulated by the professor says that 20 times a minute is most effective. The listener is inclined to co-ordinate his breathing with the 20 time rate which, like his breathing when asleep, is slower than the cadence with which he usually breathes.

Morgan suggests it might be possible to put the nation to sleep each night if radio broadcasting stations would send out a series of notes similar in tone and cadence to that produced by his machine. The tones would be broadcast at an hour most persons go to bed—if that could be determined.

He says that households wishing to tune in could do so without worrying about turning off their radio sets if they had an automatic attachment which would take care of that.

The few persons who find the tone irritating could avoid it by not tuning in on the particular stations broadcasting it.

Morgan sees the possibility that many persons might be caught almost anywhere except in bed at the "bed time hour." Anyone who is bored or capable of being thrown into a passive state of mind might be induced to sleep whether he be visiting, reading, eating or driving an automobile.

"It might even be helpful in putting a restless child to sleep," the professor says. "Repetition of the tone could easily catch the child's attention, dull it into passivity and put it to sleep."

### Spanish Government Troops Enjoy Good Health, Get Sufficient Food

GENEVA, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Spaniards, at least in government territory, are enjoying good health despite the famine and are getting enough to eat.

That is the picture of life under the terror painted by a League of Nations medical commission back from a first-hand survey on the civil front.

In a two-week tour of loyal territory, the commission, headed by Dr. A. Lauer, a member of the French Academy of Medicine, visited Alcaniz, Valencia, Madrid, Alcanar, Albarric and Barcelona.

"Business as usual" is a fair summation of its findings. Public health control is functioning smoothly and efficiently, medical personnel is available in large numbers, their professional standards are good and their devotion to their work is untiring.

Although none of the usual causes of epidemic has been lacking, the league experts found that there has been no epidemic of any sort since the outbreak of hostilities.

The population is in good health, the commission reports, and despite the absence of meat, is adequately nourished. Its morale remains excellent, and it has a desire to leave.

Special arrangements have been made, however, for women and children, including provision for maintaining 50,000 stranded youngsters in France and 3,000 in Belgium.

"Food is... very cheap... and the refugees' three meals never cost more than 1 peseta 50 (about 15 cents)," says the report. "Warm clothing for children is obtained by gifts."

### Wandering Vessel, Hungarian Craft, Never Gave Home

LONDON, Feb. 25.—(AP)—A Hungarian ship never has been to its home port and never can go. It is the cargo steamer Colossus—too big to go into its own harbor.

Captain Tokai, of Budapest, the master, explained the situation on a voyage here.

The Colossus, 7,000 tons, was built in 1915 in Sunderland by a British firm. She was registered in Budapest, but can certainly never go there since she draws 23 feet of water and there is only six feet in the Danube at Budapest.

"We have an arrangement with Hungary to use Fiume as a home port, but this is of little use, on account of difficulties in crossing Yugoslav territory."

"So we tour the world, visiting North and South America, and all parts of Europe, transporting coal and grain."

### Burglar Is Drowned In Herring Brine

REYKJAVIK, HARBOR, Feb. 25.—(AP)—The police department has considered turning loose a pack of cats instead of bloodhounds recently when it found itself saddled with its "Subbot" case.
