## Breeding Association Formed In Escambia County, Agent Says

PENSACOLA, (Special)—More than 600 dairy cows are represented in the Escambia County Artificial Breeding Association which was organized recently, according to County Agent E. H. Finlayson. The association is the second of its kind to be formed in Florida, the first having been organized several weeks ago in Orange County. Dairymen in several other counties are making plans for similar organizations. C. W. Reeves, dairy specialist with the State Agricultural Extension Service, reports. Like the Orange County group, the Escambia County association will receive daily shipments of semen from the Southeastern Artificial Breeding Association of Asheville, N. C. which maintains a stud of proved Jersey, Guernsey and Holstein bulls. Members of the association will be able to breed their cows by artificial insemination at costs only slightly higher than they would have to pay in buying and maintaining bulls on their farms. From artificial insemination they may expect high-producing replacement for their herds as only men from proved bulls will be used.

## Truman Speaks His Mind To Press



AT HIS FIRST POST-ELECTION press conference, President Truman emphasized that the United States will not negotiate with Russia over the German situation until the Russian blockade of Berlin is lifted. Truman told some forty reporters and photographers on the lawn of the temporary White House at Key West, Fla., that he will not back down on all the pledges of the 1948 Democratic platform which the eighty-first Congress meets in January.

Indians Start To Improve Livestock

TAOS, N. M.—(AP)—Tribal leaders are taking steps to improve breeds of livestock at Taos Indian pueblo in Northern New Mexico. The campaign is designed to protect and preserve the limited, but fertile lands allotted to the pueblo. Latest move was the importation, on loan, of an Army re-tribal siders reluctant to reduce their herds.

Scientific surveys have determined that the carrying capacity of the pueblo's 8,679 acres is 901 animals, including both cattle and horses. Recently, there were 1,100 being fed. A reduction program is in progress. Getting some of the families to dispose of their horses proved quite a problem. Tradition, dating to when the horse was the only means of transportation made many tribal siders reluctant to reduce their herds. Do not overfreeze deserts made in the refrigerator; serve them as soon as possible after they are from.

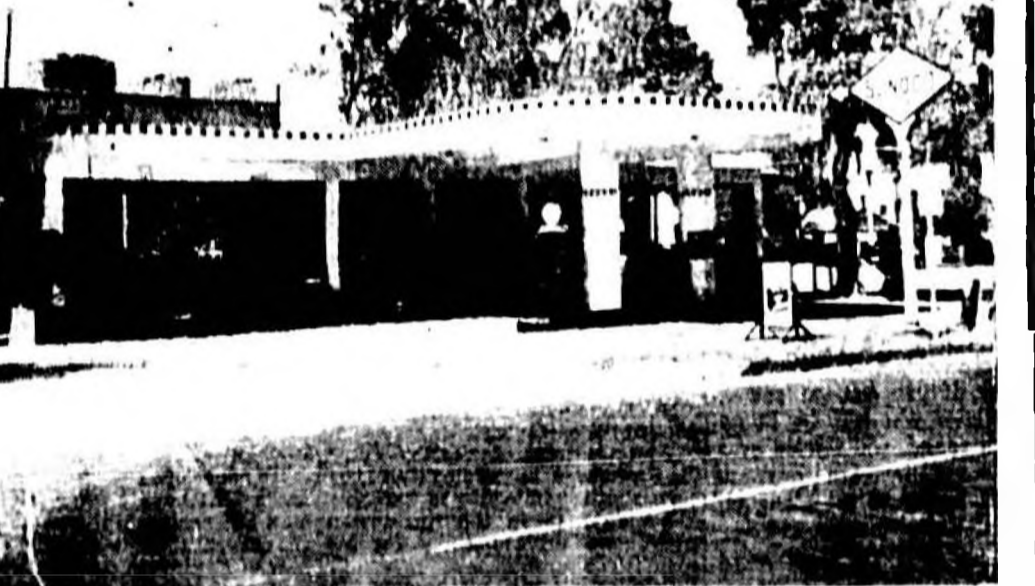

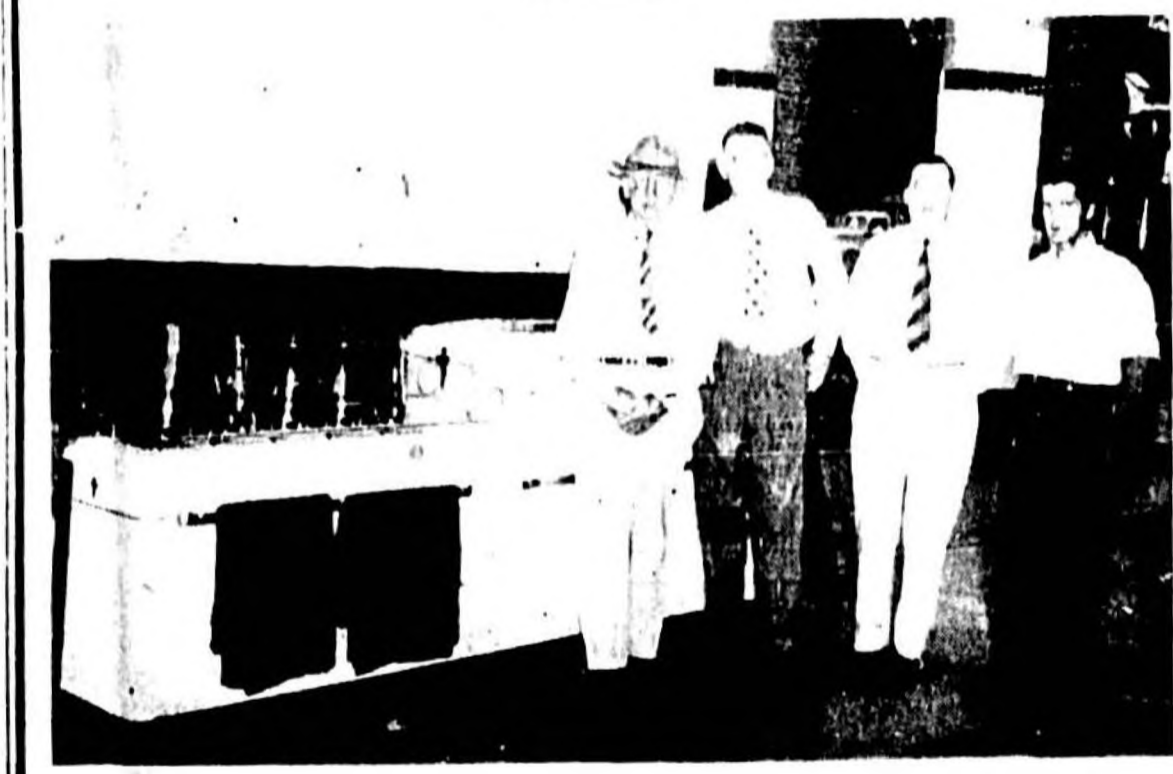



NEW YORK — Casey Stengel's ears must be ringing. When the New York Yankees recently appointed the 57-year-old former Giant and Dodger as their manager, some of the boys had harsh things to say about "Old Case". They wrote that he put in six years as the Boston Braves' pilot and finished fifth once, sixth once and seventh four times. He never once made the first division.

But they forgot to mention that "Old Case" never had a chance with what the Dodgers and Braves had in those days. Both clubs were on their last legs financially and they had no farm systems as we know them today.

Stengel had more laundry on his mind than a washed up baseball player. When he was managing the Dodgers and Braves, this is a tribute to the present owners, he was in the same position as Joe Kessel is today as Washington Senator manager. Kessel is a member of the American Society of Amateur Magicians. He is expected to do miracles. Maybe the old Dodger and Brave bosses expected the same of "Old Case". After all, it was Stengel who took his cap off in the Polo Grounds one day and out flew a sparrow. It was Stengel's way of giving the umpire the bird.

The stories about Stengel are

legion. He is the senior Lefty Gomez. Only Stengel tells most of his yarns with gestures. One time he showed a player how to slide. He did it in a hotel lobby.

When the team won an important doubleheader, Stengel went into his own pocket and bought each player a \$3 steak dinner. In the final week, with Lefty O'Doul's San Francisco team about to challenge Stengel's Oaks, Casey's charges won an important game. He raised the ante to a \$5 steak dinner.

When Oakland crushed Los Angeles, 23 to 15, in one of the University Cup playoff games after the Angels were leading, 9-2, Stengel declared:

"Guess this rates a \$10 steak dinner."

Twenty-seven Oakland players lined up and Stengel picked off \$270 from his roll.

The Commodores are the highest scorers in the Southeastern—233 points for and only 61 against.
