## Land Acquisition For Park Studied

King Helio, former Orange County planner and now with Schweitzer Associates of Winter Park, was on hand at the Chamber of Commerce meeting this morning to advise the Big Tree Park Committee on the proper procedure to go about obtaining federal funds to purchase property and expand the park. Fifty acres of land owned by the Charles E. Bloom estate had become available. Mrs. Bloom agreed to take the land off the market for 30 days to allow the Chamber of Commerce to try to find a way to acquire it.

Helio, who has just returned from Atlanta, stated that HUD officials there were "pushing open space grants." The county could receive 50 per cent of the money toward the purchase of the land; not only the Bloom property but other land in the area. If part of the land were donated it would stand as part of the county's share.

It was suggested that even after the 30-day period had expired and the land was placed back on the market, it wouldn't readily be sold. George Toney brought out the point that the "swamp" was probably being over-estimated in value and that a developer wouldn't spend money on it.

Helio suggested that the best method of acquiring the land would be to place a referendum before the voters.

A motion was made and passed to have the Big Tree Park committee approach the various land-owners and inquire about acquiring the land.

## Seminole County Roads Hazardous Conditions Cited

Hazardous road situations continue to come to the attention of the Seminole County Commission both in the north and south ends of the county. Commissioner Dan Pelham has recommended the consideration of reduction of the speed limit on Grapeville Avenue from the current 45 miles. Pelham stated that he had been advised that speeding was occurring in this vicinity and suggested that road officials be contacted to conduct a speed limit study.

Commission Chairman John Alexander voiced opposition to the proposal stating that if the road department is going to cut down speed limits on every secondary road, the state would be "out of the secondary road business."

County Engineer William Bush stated that there were blind spots on this road (Grapeville) such as trees, bushes, etc. especially at the intersection of Grapeville and 20th Street which made driving conditions particularly hazardous. An aerial view of this intersection was published in The Sanford Herald more than two weeks ago, citing the "blind spot" for motorists.

Lavender and Bush were requested to make a survey of this area to determine if any other factors of sight visibility results from trees or shrubbery growing on county right-of-way.

Commissioner Greg Drummond injected that many people were over zealous in planting of bushes which later grow on county right-of-way.

Drummond also brought to the attention of the commission the fact that accidents are continuing to occur at the intersection of Bunnell and Bear Lake Road. Drummond queried if there were arrows at the west end of Bunnell pointing to that intersection. Lavender advised that visibility was clear 300 feet each way; that there was a 25 mile speed limit and that no problems existed if people would abide by the law. Drummond still maintained that there was a problem of the speed limit of the intersecting roads and that the ensuing accidents were causing damage to abutting property owners. Lavender was requested to check with the sheriff's office on the accidents in the area and other pertinent criteria.

In other road reports, it was stated by Lavender that Oakland Road was satisfactory in his opinion in relation to grading. Southern Bell Telephone Company was granted a use permit to bury a cable on Eades Park Road.

## Industrial Group Retains Director

Funds raised will be used to further educational, research, and service programs for the retarded of Seminole County and throughout Florida. A major aim of the Florida Association for Retarded Children is to mobilize all governmental and private resources within Florida in securing programs to combat mental retardation.

Chairman Johnson said, "This is the first campaign for retarded children to be conducted in Seminole County and is part of a Central Florida effort including Orange, Seminole and Lake Counties. We are in the process of recruiting volunteers, and hope that everyone in the community will take an active part in this effort to ourselves."

# Environmental Control Becomes Active Issue

Editorial Comment

If coming events cast their shadow before them, then there is no mistaking the fact that Florida's environment has become and will prove itself to be a major issue in the 1970 state legislative and the continuing political campaigns.

What is much more important is that it will be an issue with which the legislators must grapple in terms of action and not oratory, alone.

Florida's rich natural endowments have been so marred, changed and distorted by the fabulous growth in terms of people and industry that fear is more than latent that soon they will be lost beyond repair.

Think back and talk with your own neighbors. Which has been the manager of the fabulous growth in terms of people and industry that fear is more than latent that soon they will be lost beyond repair.

Has it not been the beauties of nature, its beaches, its sparkling streams, its lake-dotted central regions, its clean and balmy air, in short what

God had endowed the peninsula with in abundance? This is not, of course, to dismiss the advantages which accrued to far-sighted industrialists who saw such appeals as providing a spot where with air-conditioning — plants could be located and help employed who would want to stay put.

Nor is it to overlook those large interests which saw the forests, the phosphate mines, the citrus groves and vegetable fields as prime areas for exploitation.

But it is to say that now the voters, aroused by the national drive, for environmental improvement and the stoppage and correction of pollution, will be watching with more than passing interest what happens in Tallahassee when the regular session gets underway next week.

Conservationists are also up in arms. These are men and women whose motivation has been a source that, after years of playing second fiddle to the

lobbyists for special interests, they are ready for the First Violin and Concertmaster positions. Already the legislators who have been keeping an ear to the ground to hear what is shaking the territory, are armed with pre-filed bills and are more than anxious to fly their colors high and clear.

In this respect it is wise for voters to keep this issue in mind when they vote. For all conservationists are not entirely simon-pure in their championship of the environmental clean-up.

Nor are the legislative spokesmen, who will make the rafters ring with their eloquence, unaware that the political climate is sadly in need of an issue which the voters can believe in.

Of course this issue has already had some very small publicity coming from the administrative side of our state government. Nathaniel P. Reed, chairman of the Florida Air and Water Pollution Control

Board, has rendered yeoman service. His travels around the state have served two purposes. One is to show that the Kirk administration is alert to the public indignation at the sad course of Florida's natural environment.

The other is to bring home to every area the immediate environmental hazard it faces. The St. Johns River, for instance, once so charming that it lured notables from all over the world to its shores has now — in its northern reaches, become so foul as to be a menace.

Environmental clean-up with laws to see that it not only gets started on paper but underway in action with sufficient funding to get the ball rolling can be expected.

Once more, however, the old saying that "the remedy is sometimes worse than the disease" must be kept in mind and brushed up when radical reform tries to get out-of-hand!

### Calm GOP "Nervous Nellies!"

By BRUCE BROSSAT NEA Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA)—Considering its own conviction that it is on a winning curve, the Nixon administration lately has been displaying some rather silly political nervousness.

The theme that ran through the GOP committee's little pressure game evidently was this, as told to me by three people directly involved in the seminar situation: "There'll be a lot of guys who will be dropping out of the party."

More recently, a few lightheaded officials at the Republican National Committee stumbled into petty folly when they pressed for a "fairly wide range of technical matters" to be discussed in a two-day seminar in New York presented under the auspices of the American Association of Political Consultants.
